Looking Around Plymouth

Ken Fisher, Director of Public Safety, is back from a three-week vacation during which he visited the World's Fair in Seattle. The trip and Fair tour made a big hit with Ken.

City Treasurer Ken Way, reports tax collections have reached 93.5 per cent already. That's a bit above normal for this early in the year.

Property owners within the city limits have been warned by City Clerk Joe Near to have the grass and weeds mowed—or the city will take over and charge the costs back to the owners. Joe has set a Sept. 1 deadline.

Plymouth's central parking lot could well become one of the most picturesque in the area. The City Fathers have approved a bit of landscaping in four sections with grassy areas enclosed in asphalt curbing and elevated to make each stand out.

Livonia Scholarship Foundation Forming

A group of citizens, headed by the Livonia President's Advisory Council, is interested in forming the Livonia Citizens' Scholarship Foundation.

Object of such a Foundation is to provide a simple, practical way to give deserving students a means of completing their education beyond the high school level. It is also a plan designed to create wider educational opportunities through local action without resorting to any form of Government aid.

There are, of course, many scholarship programs created by the Government, Foundations, industry, and the colleges themselves but The Citizens' Scholarship Foundation is noteworthy in that it is based in the local community and entirely supported from funds raised from private sources within the city.

This plan, first developed in Fall River, Mass., under the impetus of Dr. Irving Fradkin, has experienced remarkable success since its formation in 1958. In that year Fall River provided 24 scholarships for deserving students. This year over 500 scholarships will be awarded. These are students who otherwise would not have been able to go to college, vocational school, beauty school, or technical, commercial, or nursing school, but are now trained and contributing members of the community.

The idea for a Foundation such as this has spread so rapidly that more than 68 communities in 24 states have established chapters and many others are making plans to become a part of the Citizens' Scholarship Foundation, whose Honorary President is Sam Levenson, TV personality and former school teacher.

In communities establishing chapters, individuals are invited to contribute one dollar yearly for membership. Fraternal, business, civic and educational organizations are invited to take \$100 memberships. Awards are made by a panel of local citizens who select students on the basis of need, scholastic achievement, unusual family circumstances, leadership potential, and initiative.

A discussion for interested citizens will be held on Oct. 2, at 8:00 p.m. at Bentley High School. At this meeting Dr. Fradkin will be the guest speaker. This is an opportunity to become a part of an organization that is both worthy and successful. No one organization will sponsor this Foundation for its success will depend on the support of all Livonians.

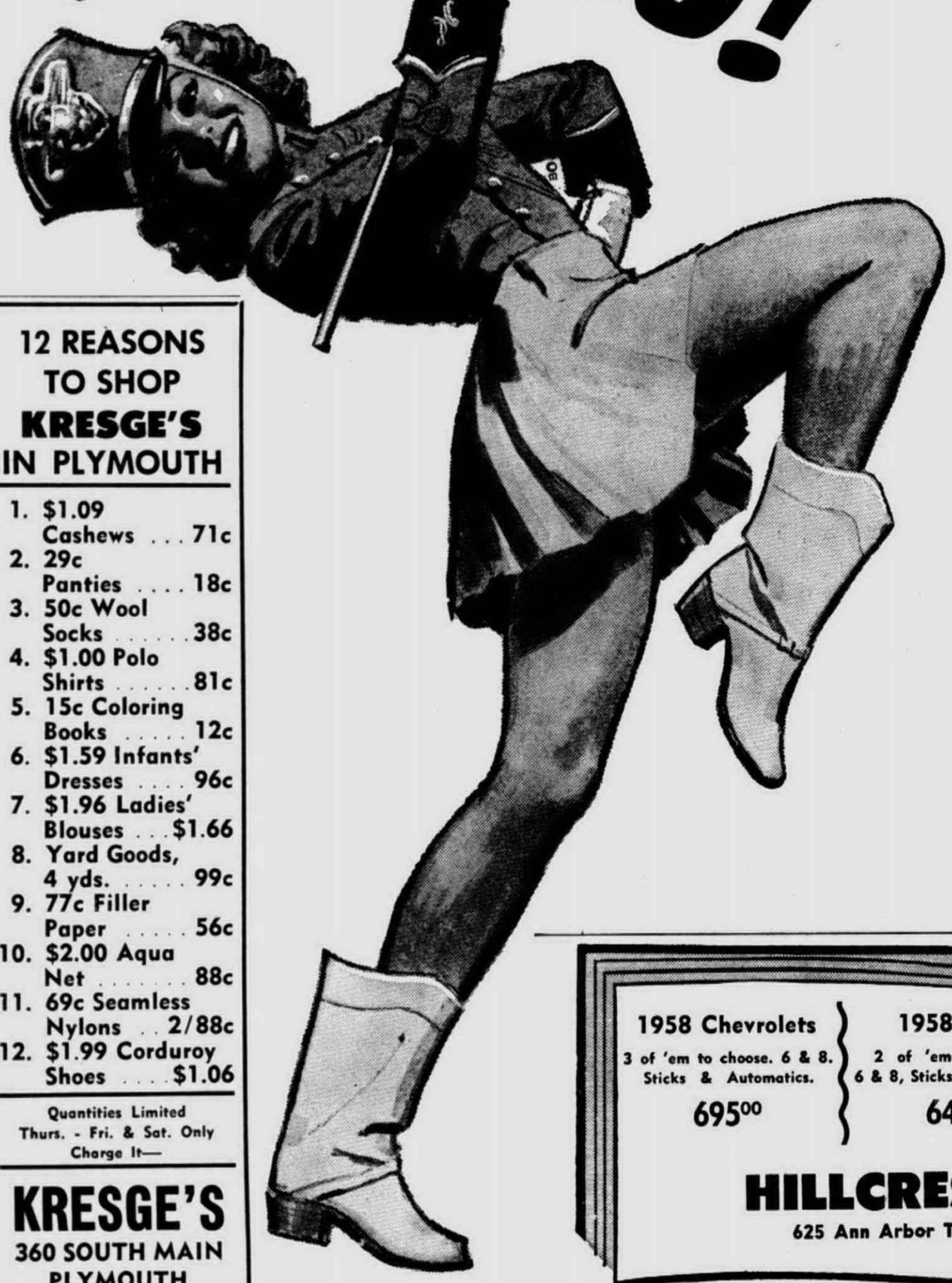

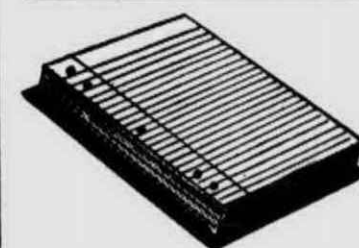

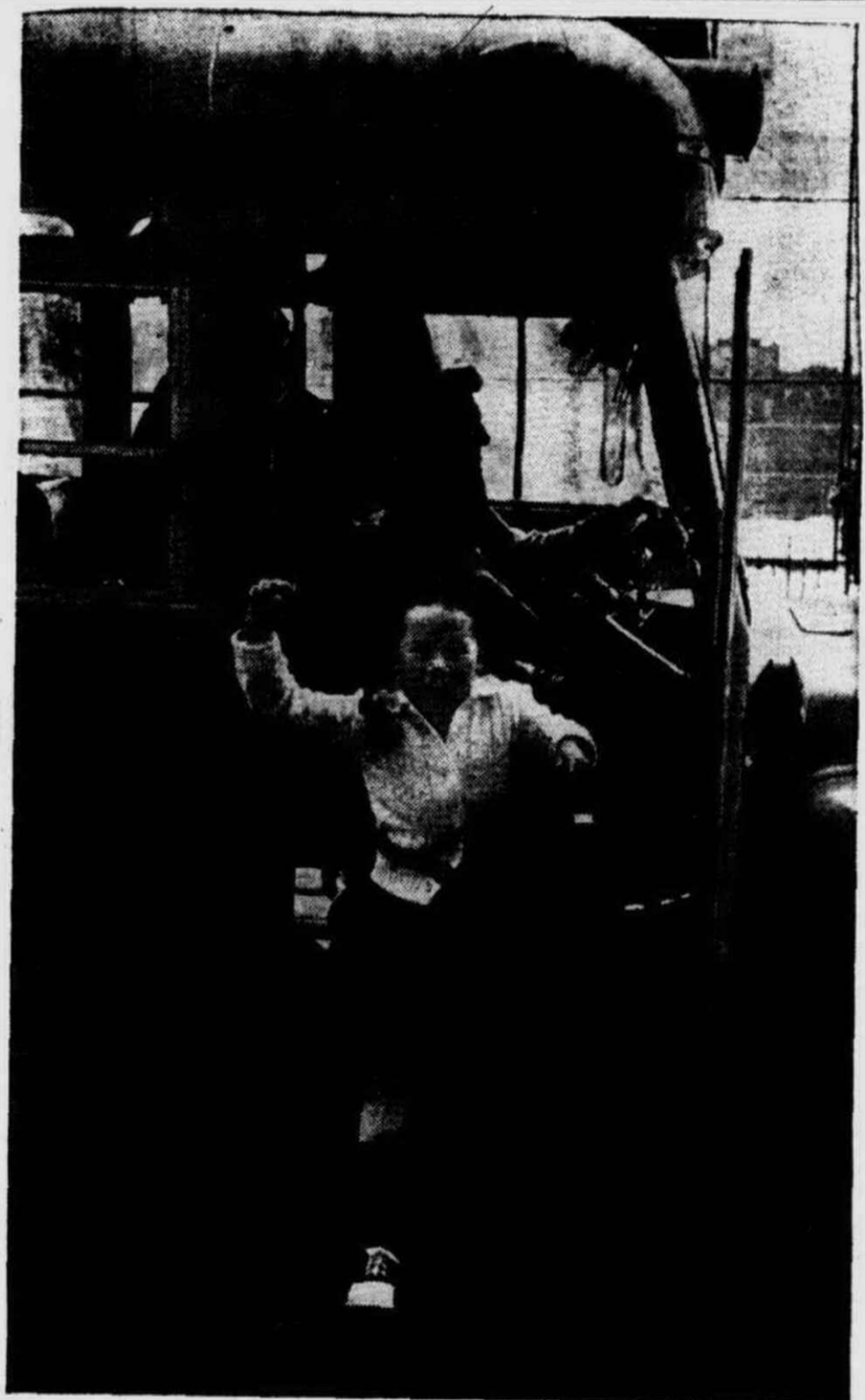

Romney Campaigns Here

GEORGE ROMNEY WHIRLED THROUGH our local district for almost nine hours last week, visiting city and township halls, employe congregations, factory gates, stores and political meetings.

For more than an hour, he greeted employes at the Burroughs corporation plant in Plymouth. Then he went to Plymouth and bounced in and out of stores down main street.

Prior to that the Republican candidate for governor had been in Redford Township hall, where Supervisor McDonald introduced him among others to Mrs. Virginia Smith, who happens to be the wife

of Sam Smith, 17th district Democratic chairman. They had a pleasant few words during which Romney observed, "if more people would put citizenship above partisanship in this state, we'd have a better place to live."

In Livonia he drew a large crowd of employes at the DPW garage. He said there he was aiming "to put an end to this cold political war which has so hurt Michigan" and noted that he had been able to put disagreeing groups into harmony at American Motors, in a Detroit public school fund drive, and elsewhere.

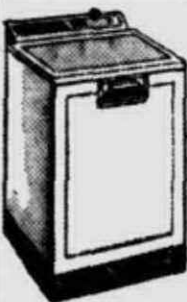

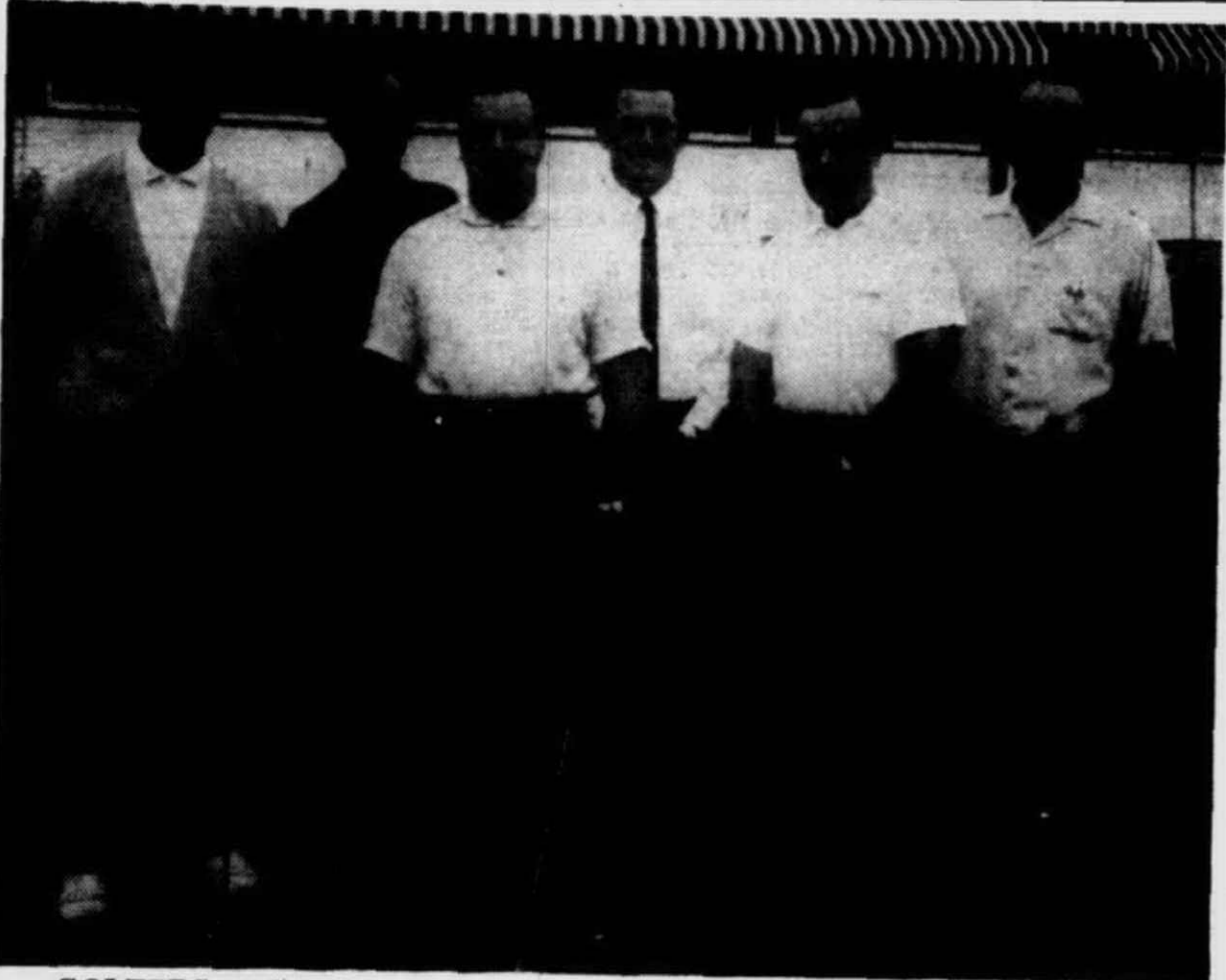

Redford Teams Capture Honors in Tournaments

A double-barrel salute goes out to Redford DAV and Redford Champion Sporting Goods, the champs and runnerup, respectively, in Livonia's Class D summer baseball league.

Both DAV and Champion stepped out into outstate competition last week and each came up a winner.

DAV, playing in the state district tournament at Jackson, turned back host Jackson, 4-3, to qualify for the state semifinals which were scheduled for this Tuesday.

Champion, playing right up to its name, annexed the Class D Inter-City title by scoring three straight victories at Dearborn.

The DAV-Jackson battle was a thriller. The DAV team, composed for the most part of Redford Union high school players, pushed over the winning run in the seventh inning on some alert base running by Bull Driscoll.

The inning opened for DAV when Gene Hamlin walked and advanced to second on a sacrifice by Mike Medworth. Driscoll then hit a bouncer on which Hamlin was nailed at third. Rick Clark, who pitched the route for DAV, helped his own cause by singling Driscoll

to third. At this stage Clark was picked off first. But while he was being run down, Driscoll took off from third and crossed the plate before Clark was tagged for the final out of the inning.

Clark then stepped to the rubber, struck out three men and finished with a total of 13 whiffs for the game. He fanned seven of the last men to face him.

It took an uphill battle to Jackson, 7-4.

The hosts grabbed a 2-0 lead in the second and the advantage held until the fifth when DAV pushed over three runs on successive singles by Bob Green, Hamlin, Bedworth, Driscoll and Don Keys.

A single and three stolen bases brought Jackson even again in the fifth and set the stage for the winning spurge by DAV in the seventh.

The Champion Sporting team started its title drive by gaining a 7-1 verdict over Dearborn Township. Don Walker hurled the route for the victors, fanning ten, walking two and allowing only four hits.

The title game on Wednesday pitted Champion against Wyandotte in a battle of unbeaten, again Champion had to fight back.

Wyandotte grabbed a 5-2 lead. But in the fifth Rick Harlow and Don Svenson singled, Black walked, Bill Sproul was safe on a fielder's choice, Bell doubled and Swiss single to lift Champion into a 7-5 lead.



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
