CUTTING UP the egg plant for her Egg Plant Parmesan is Mrs. David Schlick of Sheridan Ave. This main dish may be made a day ahead and stored in the refrigerator until ready to bake, she said.

EGG PLANT PARMESAN SAUCE

- 1 lb. 11 oz. can tomatoes
 - 2 cans (small) tomato sauce
 - 3 or 4 garlic cloves, minced
 - 4 tsp. oregano
 - 2 tsp. basil
 - salt and pepper
- Combine above ingredients and simmer 1 hour.

Peel a large egg plant and slice into 1/2" slices. Flour each slice and dip into a mixture of 3 eggs beaten with 2 Tbl. water. Fry egg plant in olive oil until light brown.

Next, cut 1 1/2 lbs. mozzarella cheese into thin strips.

Using a 9 x 12 casserole, put 1/3 sauce in bottom of dish, layer of fried egg plant, layer of cheese strips, and repeat until ingredients are gone.

Top generously with grated Romano cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 6 generously.

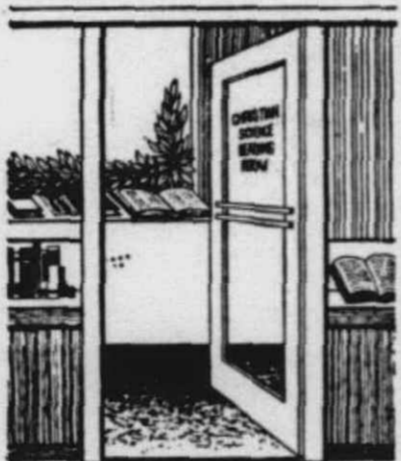

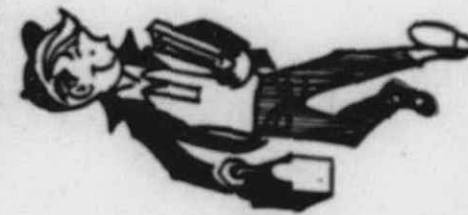

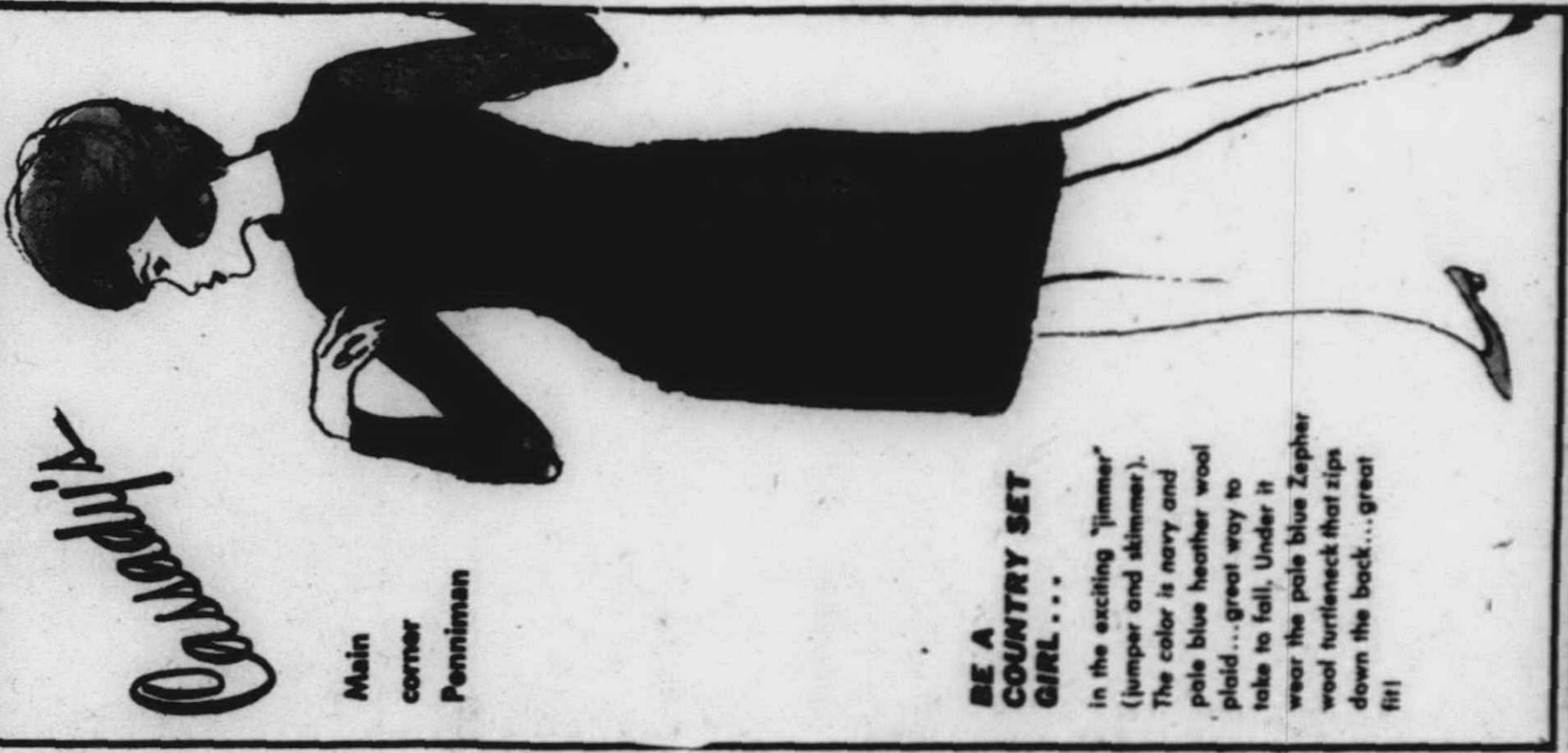
Hamilton continues spectacular rise

America on the moon by 1970-Project Apollo

By Congressman Weston E. Vivian

In addition to his work on general legislation before the Congress, and his work on behalf of particular concerns of his District and his constituents, every Congressman serves on at least one Committee of the House of Representatives.

In my own case, I was pleased to have been elected to the Science and Astronautics Committee.

This assignment matches my own background. Until January of this year, I had been Vice President of Conduccion Corporation, an electronics research and development company based in Ann Arbor. On being elected to the Science Committee, I severed all relations with the company.

The Science Committee has as its main tasks overseeing the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the National Science Foundation. I should like to describe for you some of the long-range planning of NASA, in the course of my next two reports from Washington.

To probe the unknown vastness that surrounds our planet, we already have lifted many instrumented satellites and space probes, of increasing sophistication and complexity.

OUR COUNTRY'S manned space efforts began with Project Mercury, in which we developed the spacecraft and hardware necessary to support one man in a capsule orbiting the earth.

We are now well into Project Gemini, perfecting two-man space flight, increasing the lengths of missions, and learning to maneuver in space. Most recently, during the Gemini 4 flight, you remember that Major Edward White demonstrated the ability of man to maneuver outside the spacecraft itself.

In the middle of August, Gemini 5 will further test our capabilities, with two men staying in orbit for eight days. During this time experiments will be conducted with rendezvous and docking techniques — skills that must be learned if we are to make a successful lunar landing.

The focal point of manned space flight in this decade is Project Apollo. Project Apollo means development by 1970 of a powerful launch vehicle that can send a three-man spacecraft beyond the earth's
