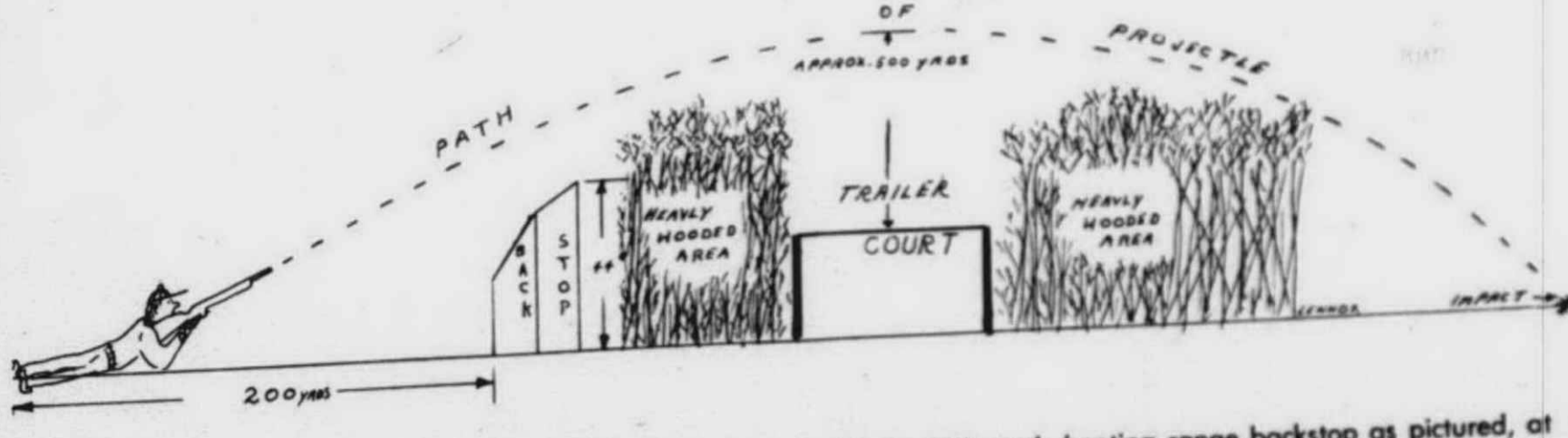
## American Legion Auxiliary

(Continued from Page 1) and Mrs. Cleo Curtis. The stray bullet hit the trailer and went through outside walls, narrowly missing Mrs. Curtis. It was the second such mishap for the park.

The State Police investigated the incident, did not rule out the gun club as a source, but did report that an unauthorized hunter might have fired the shot.

Fortier pointed out Friday that at the time of the inci-

dent, the range was under the supervision of a qualified range officer.

**THE CONTROVERSY** between the trailer park and the gun club has ranged since 1962, when both parties entered court on the matter.

And, according to Fortier, they will be back in court on Nov. 22, next week.

Clyde Smith, one of the owners of the trailer court, appealed to the Township

Board for action at last Tuesday's regular meeting. The Plymouth Township Board tabled the appeal until a full report was forthcoming from the State Police.

Smith said he fears somebody would get killed by a stray bullet.

The State Police office in Redford reported late Tuesday that nothing new had developed on the incident.

The club moved from a Nankin Township location in 1962 to its present location along Napier Rd. It was started in 1935, and now boasts over 750 members.

Fortier said the club's cause had been used as a test case for the National Rifle Association, and that experts from that group had testified to the range's complete safety.

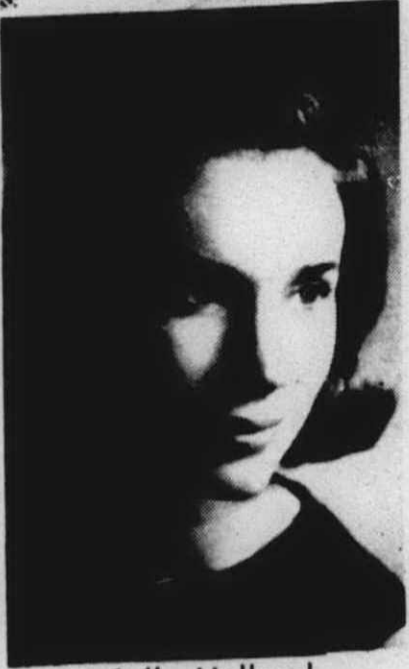

Wash rice thoroughly. Place in large pan with parsley, celery, onion, apple, water and salt. Cover and boil 20 min. Drain. When rice is cool enough to handle, stuff the turkey or other fowl.

UNICEF Christmas Cards to be sold in Post Office

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) Christmas greeting cards will be offered for sale in the lobby of the Plymouth post office, Acting Postmaster John A. Mulligan announced today.

Members of the Plymouth-Northville chapter of the United States Committee for UNICEF will be stationed in the post office lobby Friday and Saturday, Nov. 19 and 20.

In authorizing the sales at the discretion of the postmaster, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien said, "Since its inception in 1946, UNICEF has helped millions of children to a better, fuller, healthier life. Though a part of the United Nations, the organization is financed only through voluntary contributions such as the annual greeting card campaign. Proceeds from one box of cards can provide the vaccine to protect 50 children against tuberculosis. Two boxes will furnish 80 children with a glass of milk for an entire week. Five boxes will buy enough penicillin to cure 50 children of yaws."

Postmaster Mulligan said that there would be no interference with regular postal activities and that there would be no active solicitation of postal patrons by the UNICEF representatives. Sales will be restricted to the assigned area and the Post Office will provide no equipment. There will be no expense to the government.

The blackout was the gigantic power failure that could never happen, but did. And the pamphlet arrived with scary coincidence.

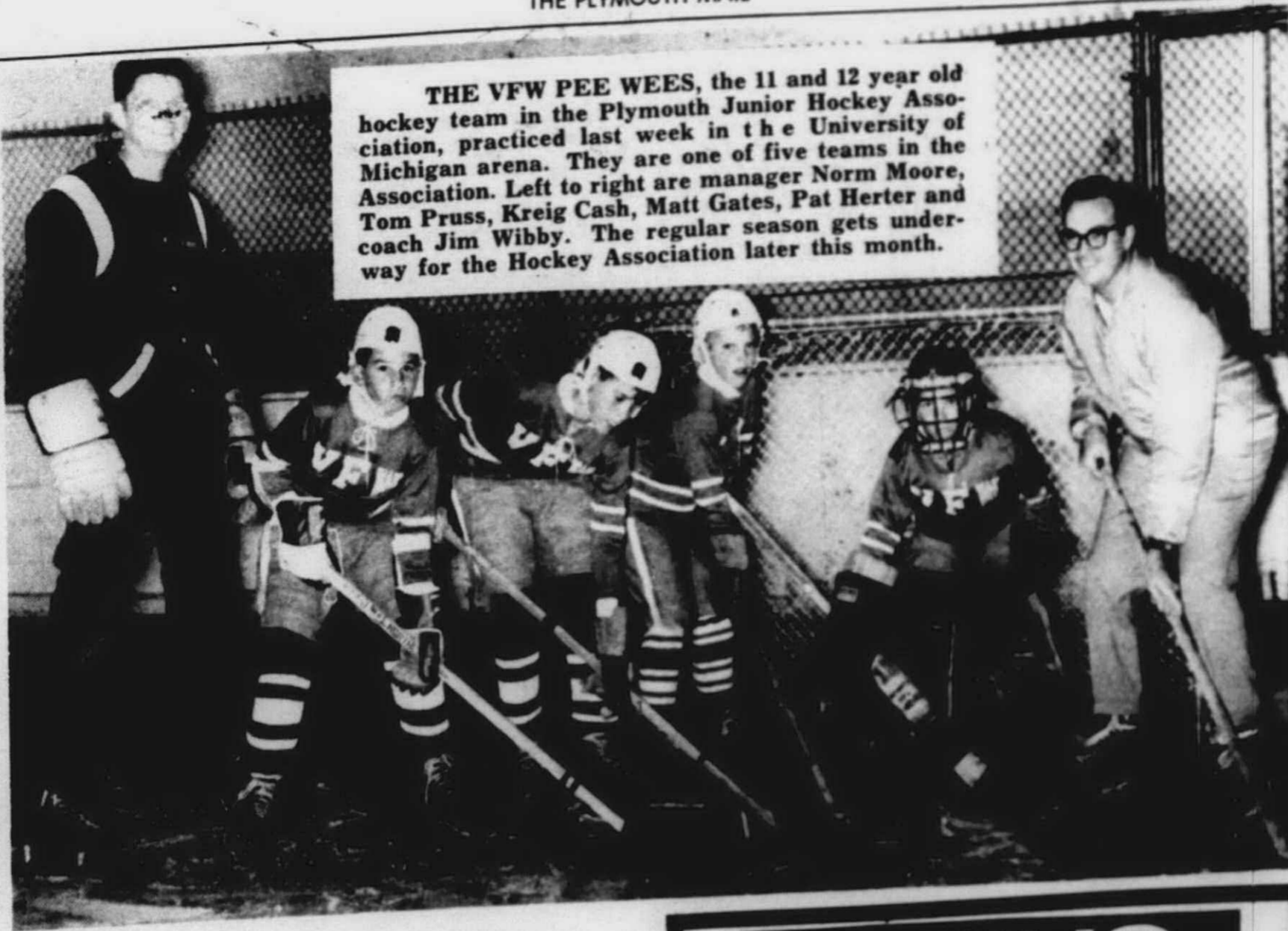

Mr. Wheelock noted in his report the following minimum safety standards which a community wide action program should achieve:

1. Sidewalks, or suitable substitutes thereof, wherever children are required to walk with their backs to traffic on the shoulders of main roads.
2. Warning signs properly placed at all school crossing points.
3. Uniformed and deputized adult crossing guards supervised by the local police department and assisted by school safety patrol boys. Crossing guards and bus drivers should coordinate their efforts whenever feasible.
4. The utilization of every opportunity to teach traffic safety to school children and the general public. Rules for riding bicycles need particular emphasis here.

Until the minimum safety standards are met Mr. Wheelock recommended the implementation of the following secondary procedures:

1. The fullest possible employment of available school bus transportation facilities in these critical areas.
2. The immediate purchase of additional transportation equipment if needed and if this can be done without impairing educational programs. This would envision busing all elementary children in hazardous areas as a temporary measure until such time as minimum safety standards are met.
3. Frequent studies in each of the critical areas. This would include walking routes and safety conditions at crossing points. Participation in these studies by parents' groups such as a PTA safety committee is suggested.
4. A long range study by the board of education of future transportation needs and ways of financing them. Current problems are small compared to what the future holds.

After some discussion by the Board members and the citizens who were in attendance President Fischer stated that the recommendations would be taken under advisement and that a special meeting would be held on Monday, October 25, 1965, at which time decisions would be made on what changes, if any, would be made in the transportation policy.

Superintendent Izbister was directed by the Board to prepare cost estimates on the implementation of recommendation one and two.

Supervisor McEwen discussed the sidewalk situation in Plymouth Township and noted the legal restrictions under which the Township must operate in the construction of sidewalks.

Mr. Wheelock was complimented for the time and thought which he had put into the transportation study which he had requested to make regarding the transportation services now being provided to the students in the Plymouth Community School District.

Mr. Wheelock noted in his report the following minimum safety standards which a community wide action program should achieve:

Member Soth, Chairman of the Facilities Committee, called attention to the scheduled October 18 and 29, 1965, for review and approval of the plans and specifications for additions to Bird and Galimore Elementary Schools and Elementary School No. 7.

Member McLaren, Chairman of the Finance Committee, noted that he had reviewed in detail the bills submitted for payment. He called attention to the increasingly high cost for contract services. He distributed for review the monthly budget analysis.

Upon written recommendation of Ass't Sup't Blunk it was moved by Member Henry and seconded by Member Hulsing that a mechanical check signer be purchased from Burroughs Corporation.

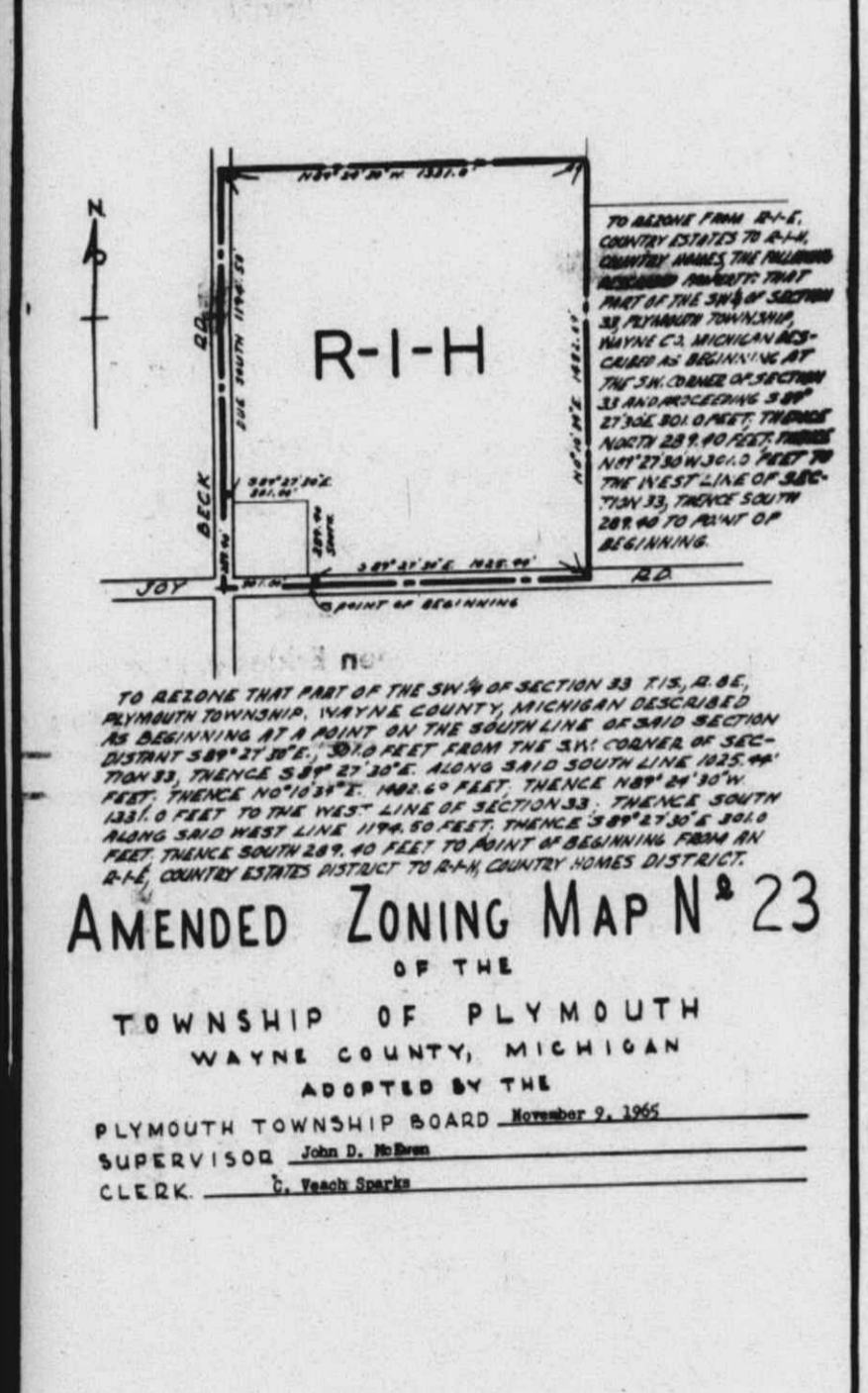

### ORDINANCE NO. 14.04'65

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amending Zoning Map No. 23, attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance.

PART II. Section 2.04 is hereby amended by the addition of the following paragraph to read as follows:

The areas comprising the zoning districts, the boundaries of said districts, as heretofore established and adopted, are hereby amended and marked Amendment No. 23, to the Zoning Map of the Township of Plymouth, which Map is hereto attached and made a part of this Ordinance, and any part of the Zoning Map of the Township of Plymouth as now established, which conflicted with said Amendment No. 23 of the Zoning Map, is hereby expressly void and of no force and effect.

PART III. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinance in conflict, herewith, are hereby repealed.

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take immediate effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law.

PART V. ADOPTION. This Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Plymouth by Authority of Act 184, of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1943, at a meeting duly called and held on the 9th day of November A.D. 1965, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Does anyone stay at home any more? The arrivals and departures make the old neighborhood seem like Grand Central of late.

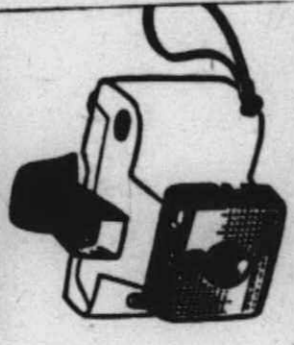

The power failure in New York City temporarily spoiled plans for a get together between the John Conns and Robert Jenkins. The Conns, who had been spending sev-

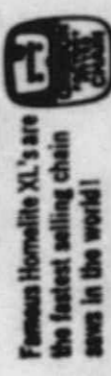
