Parents readied for low scores

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are among a handful of districts in metropolitan Detroit still withholding results of a standardized state test designed to measure minimal skills in reading, math and science.

The district has had half a dozen meetings for parents, advising them to expect a dramatic drop in math scores. The scores reflect a major change in the math portion of the Michigan Education Assessment Program test, said Dr. Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction.

School officials say they will release the

scores only after they've been presented to the Board of Education at tonight's 7:30 p.m. meeting at 454 S. Harvey.

Because the scores are public record, the Observer last week filed a request for them under the Michigan Freedom of Information Act. Community relations director Richard Egli said Friday that despite the request, the scores won't be released until Monday. The district will be in compliance with the FOI Act, as the law allows agencies five working days to supply information.

Barbara Church, curriculum coordinator for math and science, and the architect of the math test, Dr. Susan Rigney of the state Department of Education, addressed parents at a

meeting Thursday. They explained that the math sections of the MEAP are designed not to measure basic skills, but to bring about curriculum changes in line with the state's new math objectives.

JOAN CLAEYS, area coordinator for math, art, music and English at Centennial Educational Park, said the 10th-grade math test covered statistics, probability and geometry — material students hadn't covered. Also, Claeys said, "Over half of our math teachers took the test afterwards and found vocabulary on the test they had never seen and could not even find in the brand new math books."

Changes in the MEAP reflect the needs of

business and industry, said Church.

"When business people are surveyed, they tell us they want students who are problem solvers," she said. "Our emphasis used to be heavily on computation. We're trying to change it to problem solving."

"Kids still need to know their times tables, but they need to be able to understand math well enough to be able to solve mathematical problems," she said.

A recent study showed that the U.S. ranks 19th among 20 countries in student math achievement. All the major industrialized nations ranked higher than the U.S.

Fisher freed, faces new trial in wife's death

Dr. Charles Fisher, who was found guilty of the 1984 duct tape murder of his wife in their Canton house, was freed Friday pending a new trial.

Fisher became a free man for the first time in almost four years as he left the gates of Ionia's Riverside Correctional Facility.

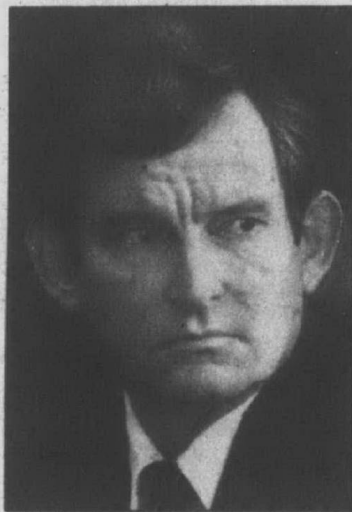
His first stop, according to his attorney Steven Whalen, was to visit an Oakland County apartment that his parents, sister and brother-in-law arranged for him. His family lives in Missouri.

Two juries found Fisher guilty of first degree murder in the death of Ella Maria Mercado Fisher in their sprawling house on Thornwood, in one of Canton's upscale northwest subdivisions. The first trial was ruled in error based on a comment by a prosecuting attorney.

Late last year Fisher got another break. The Michigan Supreme Court reversed the second conviction, ruling that a diary kept by Mercado Fisher should not have been admitted as evidence because it was hearsay.

HIS GOOD fortune continued when Recorder's Court Chief Judge Dalton Roberson agreed to reinstate a previous bond that Fisher had posted during an earlier trial.

During the trials Fisher's defense

was based on a robbery account that he gave police. He said his wife was ambushed by robbers who wrapped her face with duct tape and left her for dead.

The Fulbright scholar also told police he was gagged and bound by the robbers, but after he regained consciousness he was able to free himself and attempted to revive his wife. She never regained consciousness.

Whalen said he was unsure what Fisher's plans were after moving into his apartment.

Melting memories Chill could put thrill in ice festival

No matter what the weather, everything is ready to go for the 10th Plymouth International Ice Sculpture Spectacular, starting Wednesday.

The National

Weather Service predicted rain and highs in the 40s for today and Tuesday, causing festival director Mike Watts to put off displaying ice sculptures until Wednesday.

But he said cooler temperatures are predicted for the start of the ice festival.

"Things look real good," Watts said Friday. "I think it's going to be one of the most successful ice spectacles ever."

Facing liability

Church school puts city at risk for lawsuit

Because a city church did not seek proper permits to allow school classes in a former convent, the city is risking a potential lawsuit, a Plymouth attorney maintains.

Attorney Carol Levitte — who represents Our Lady of Good Counsel Church neighbors who oppose church-school expansion — told city commissioners Jan. 6, "If anything happens there, you lose your immunity."

"I would like the city to take the steps they should have taken," Levitte said.

Commissioner Jerry Vorva agreed. "I can cite you time and time again when the city has swiftly taken action," he said, against code violations.

"I urge the city administration to

quite frankly do their job," Vorva said.

"What the public demands is equity under the law. If we as a city are not going to act equitably then we are doing a great disservice," he added.

Levitte said the church also did not seek proper permits when a church business office was moved to the former convent last year.

But City Manager Steve Walters said church officials are scheduled to seek permits before the planning commission in February.

Walters said the city first became aware that permits were lacking more than a year ago, when the church first applied to build a church school addition.

IN OCTOBER, Walters and the city engineer "met with church representatives, and discussed how to get a legal site plan."

In November, church business manager William Leonard wrote the state police fire marshal division, "It has come to light that our annex building at 1062 Church St. has never been approved by the state fire marshal for use as a school facility, in addition to its use as our parish office center.

"In order to alleviate the concerns of those people immediately involved, we would appreciate an inspection by your department at the earliest possible opportunity," he wrote.

Leonard declined to comment Friday.

Walters said the church was scheduled to seek a proper site plan before the planning commission in December, but not enough documentation was presented.

He said that because the church for several years has used the former convent for school classes, "You don't make them do things like cease occupancy."

"There isn't any particular problem with what they're using the building for, other than they haven't gotten the particular paperwork done," he said.

Police to swap Chevys for Jeeps

Canton police are about to cast off their staid, family type Chevy Caprice for the more bossy, sassy looking Jeep Cherokee.

"It rides higher and there's better visibility for patrol," according to Tammie Colling, Canton police information officer.

When Canton buys its first Cherokee sometime this year it will be one of the first suburban police department to use the jeep, said Canton Police Public Safety Director John Santomauro.

THE CAPRICE when fully loaded for police use is comparable in price with the Cherokee, he said. The exact costs were not available Friday.

"We were told by Chrysler Corporation that it will be in the ballpark of the Caprice," Santomauro said adding that the four-wheel drive jeep has a better resale value than the Caprice and should be considered when comparing costs.

He said he planned to buy one jeep this year unless they are too expensive. Chrysler recently began offering the jeep that is specially equipped for police use.

Every year Canton police replace squad cars that have 80,000-90,000 miles, which takes about two years. The jeep will replace one of those older cars.

Another benefit of the jeep is that they have better load capacity and could be better equipped than the Caprice, Colling said.

Police supervisors gave the jeep a trial run last week.

"Between the bikes and these, there aren't too many places in Canton that we can't get to," said Sgt. Pat Nemecek after he took the jeep for a run last week.

The motorcycles allow police to navigate tighter areas, get around cars in a traffic jam and to disperse crowds. The jeep is great on dirt roads and on farm land.

"We still find stolen vehicles in wooded areas and you have to get back to it," Nemecek said.

MEAP scores drop at private school

Officials at Plymouth Christian Academy are pleased with students' performance on a 1991 state standardized test, even though math scores dropped.

Lower math scores were expected on the Michigan Educational Assessment Program test, as the revamped section was new this year.

The MEAP test traditionally has measured minimal skills in math, reading and science. Written to reflect the state's new math objectives, this year's math section instead emphasized problem-solving ability. Critics say many questions weren't "grade appropriate," and that the 10th-grade test included questions on geometry for which students hadn't yet studied.

SCORING IN THE top quartile in math were 47 percent of PCA fourth graders; 63 percent of the seventh graders and 43 percent of the 10th graders. Last year, 95 percent of PCA fourth-graders scored in the top quartile. Eighty-four percent of seventh-graders scored in the top math quartile, and 96 percent of 10th graders landed in the top quarter.

In reading, 43 percent of fourth-graders scored in the top quartile; as did 51 percent of seventh-graders, and 67 percent of 10th graders.

Of last year's fourth-graders, 54 percent scored in the top quartile in reading. Fifty-nine percent of seventh-graders were in the top quartile in reading, and 10th-graders in the top quartile numbered 71 percent.

PCA didn't administer the science test, normally given to fifth, eighth and 11th-graders, opting instead for the Stanford Achievement Test.

Greg Hovermale, a PCA counselor who proctored the test, said, "We are pleased. We were super pleased last year, but the sub-test math scores (which measured students' performance on questions similar to those on last year's test) show us that our scores held solid."

"I don't think you'll ever see (math) scores in the nineties again, but our goal is we want to see improvement year to year. We have a baseline; now the goal is to move it up."

THAT'S WHAT PCA did with the reading test, revised by the state two years ago. The school hired a consultant from Eastern Michigan University who successfully worked with students and teachers to help bring up scores.

Enrollment at PCA — on Joy Road in Canton Township — is 540 this year.

Hovermale has two criticisms of the test. "I was a straight-A student and took pre-calculus. I felt the math objectives were valid, but many of the questions were totally too hard if the test is supposed to measure minimal skills," he said. This year's MEAP math test was "just as hard as the ACT" college entrance exam, he said.

Last year, MEAP results were broken down. That gave schools a clear picture of the specific subject areas in which students needed more work.

"This year, the results weren't specific enough to make good recommendations educationally," said Hovermale. "I don't think we are getting as much out of the whole MEAP experience as in the past."

PCA officials were happy to see their students hold their own with students in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills, where scores usually are the highest in the state, Hovermale said.

PCA doesn't restrict admission to above-average students, the administrator said. "We try to service the

Plymouth-Canton community. But we are a private school. That has to be part of it (the reason PCA does well on tests)." PCA's small size makes it easier to communicate, and to effect change, he said.

"And it's an inherent advantage to have K-12 all on one campus," he added. "The turn-around time to effect change, given our set-up, is shorter, and it's one of the things I enjoy about working in a small school. It's like working in a small city hall as opposed to a large city hall, I guess."

"In the Asian culture, math is very important," Church said. "Math in our society has a mystique of somehow being hard. It's acceptable somehow for a parent to say, 'I wasn't good in math,' whereas to say, 'I can't read' isn't acceptable. What we're teaching is so critical. It's not OK not to be able to do math anymore."

CHURCH SAYS that more than 75 percent of all jobs require proficiency in simple algebra and geometry as a prerequisite to a training program or as part of a licensure exam. While math used to be taught in isolation, students in many states now are learning to apply math skills to everyday life, Church said.

The aim is to teach tomorrow's adults to, for instance, be able to compare prices and quantities of products to determine which is the better value; to calculate the amount of lumber needed to construct something; or to figure out, based on speed and distance, a driver's arrival time at a destination.

To assist students, teachers are introducing "manipulatives" like coins, strips, blocks and grids with rubber bands for making geometric shapes enabling students to see what half of something looks like, or envision a rectangle or cylinder.

The district is completing a revision of its K-12 curriculum to reflect the state objectives, developed by the Department of Education and the Michigan Council of Teachers of Math.

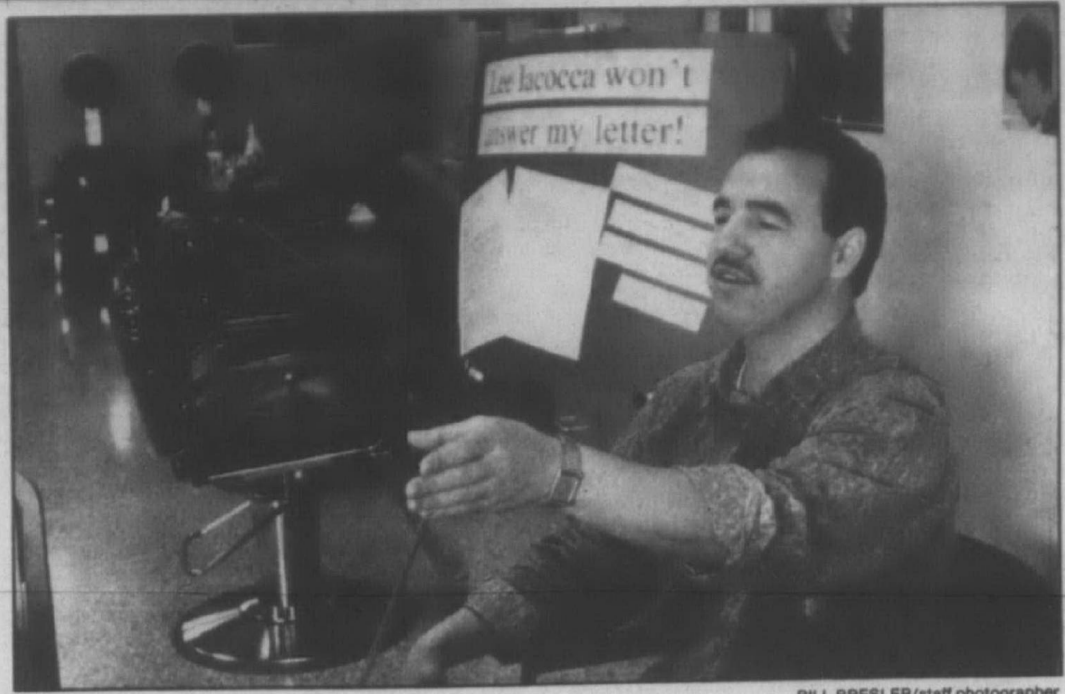
"We're trying to make a switch from teaching the textbook to teaching the district curriculum, using the text as a resource," said Church.

Because there will be less emphasis in the classroom on such things as long division, graphing by hand and memorization of rules, parents will notice their children coming home with a different type of homework, she said.

THERE'LL BE fewer pages of drill problems to do. Instead of work sheets, students will be solving higher-level problems, and perhaps a couple of long-term problems, Church said.

Church hopes parents will be patient and supportive of teachers "and work with them as much as possible, because we really are doing what's best for kids."

Parents also can help by doing things like explaining to their children the everyday math they do in their heads; how to check bill totals in restaurants and stores; how to balance a checkbook; or calculate the miles per gallon the family van is getting.

Lemon woes Disgruntled buyer wants Iacocca held accountable

Nick Selimi wants Lee Iacocca to make him lemonade.

In 1989 the Canton resident bought a Plymouth Voyager SE van from Fox Hills Chrysler-Plymouth in Plymouth and he says the van has been a lemon from the start.

"I now look back on that event as one of the most foolish and disappointing experiences of my life," Selimi wrote in a letter to Iacocca.

AND EVERYONE who walks into Selimi's Salon at Canton Landing can learn all about his ordeal with the two-year-old van that has 16,000 miles and cost \$18,010.50 new.

There on an artist's scaffold Selimi displays a copy of the letter to Iacocca. A question accompanies the script: "He'll travel half way around the world to competition, but won't take care of the business he already has in his own backyard."

His litany of vehicle woes include five repair visits because the transmission sticks in second gear and four return calls because the sliding door jams.

"And then, in this morning's paper, I read that you are going to award bonuses to white collar Chrysler employees," Selimi wrote in a letter to Iacocca.

"Why? Is this their reward for generating revenue for the corporation while victimizing the customers?"

SELIMI SAID he was disappointed, too, by the state's follow-up with a claim he filed based on the Lemon Law.

"They didn't do a thing for me," he said.

"It's the worst car I've ever owned," Selimi said, adding that he has no complaints with the dealer.

"They say: 'We'll treat you good and we'll take care of you. They even gave me a free rental, but still I don't depend on this vehicle.'"

Now, he said, he can't even rely on it to take his wife and three children on a driving vacation.

"I don't feel comfortable with it," he said. "I still think it's a good vehicle. I just got a lemon."

Lease could put snag in library expansion plans

Plans to expand the city's library could be affected by a lease the Plymouth District Library board has with the city municipal building authority, a city commissioner is suggesting.

Commissioner Jerry Vorva raised the subject at the Jan. 6 commission meeting.

But library director Pat Thomas said library expansion plans have included plans to pay off the lease.

"We have every intention of taking care of that debt — either repaying it outright or refinancing that," she said.

She said money to pay off the lease would come from money raised through the current library millage, and not from additional millage the library board is expect-

ed to seek from voters to pay for expansion.

VORVA, WHO IS on a commission committee that meets with library officials to discuss their plans to expand the library, said that "upon investigating the whole lease situation, I have some questions we should possibly direct to the city attorney."

"Can the library board tear down something we're leasing to them?" he asked. Specifically, the library board leases the library building and parking from the municipal building authority.

The library board has announced plans to expand the library at its current site. The plans would include the city giving up some space at city hall to make way for an expanded library. Voters in the library district,

which includes the city and Plymouth Township, would be asked to approve the project.

Representatives of the library board and city commission have been meeting to discuss expansion plans.

The library board could go before voters as early as August to seek a higher millage to pay for library expansion.

DDA removes condos

Although they'll lose money to tackle projects, downtown development authority members recommended to the city commission Thursday to remove a condo development from the downtown development district.

The Meadows, on the southeast edge of the district, "didn't fit in with the real spirit of a downtown. It should be returned to the tax rolls," said DDA chairman Lee Harrison.

Should the city commission approve the change, the DDA will lose

more than \$100,000 in annual revenue from downtown taxes. That would trim the \$655,200 in anticipated revenue in 1992-93 to around \$500,000, according to projections.

Harrison said the removal of The Meadows from the downtown development district "shouldn't affect the street scene drastically."

The downtown street scene renovation plan, hoped to revitalize the business district, could possibly begin this year.

It'll showcase the works of 23 artists from throughout Michigan, from Plymouth to the Upper Peninsula.

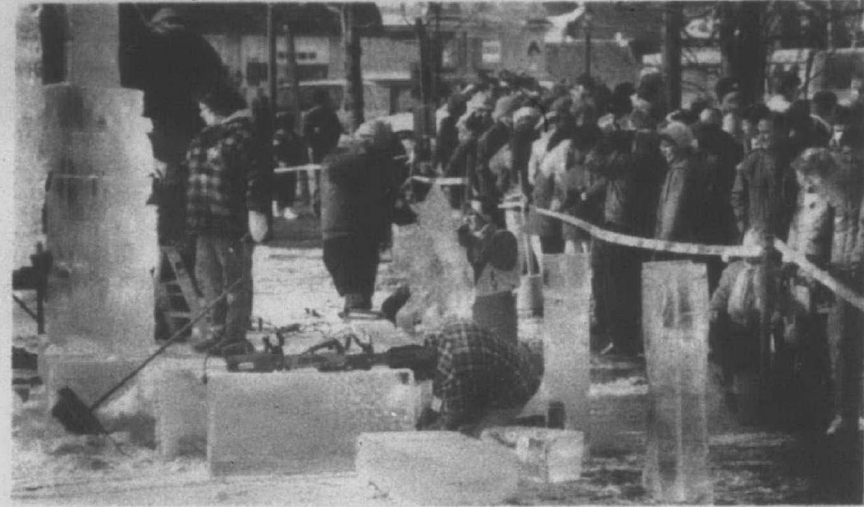

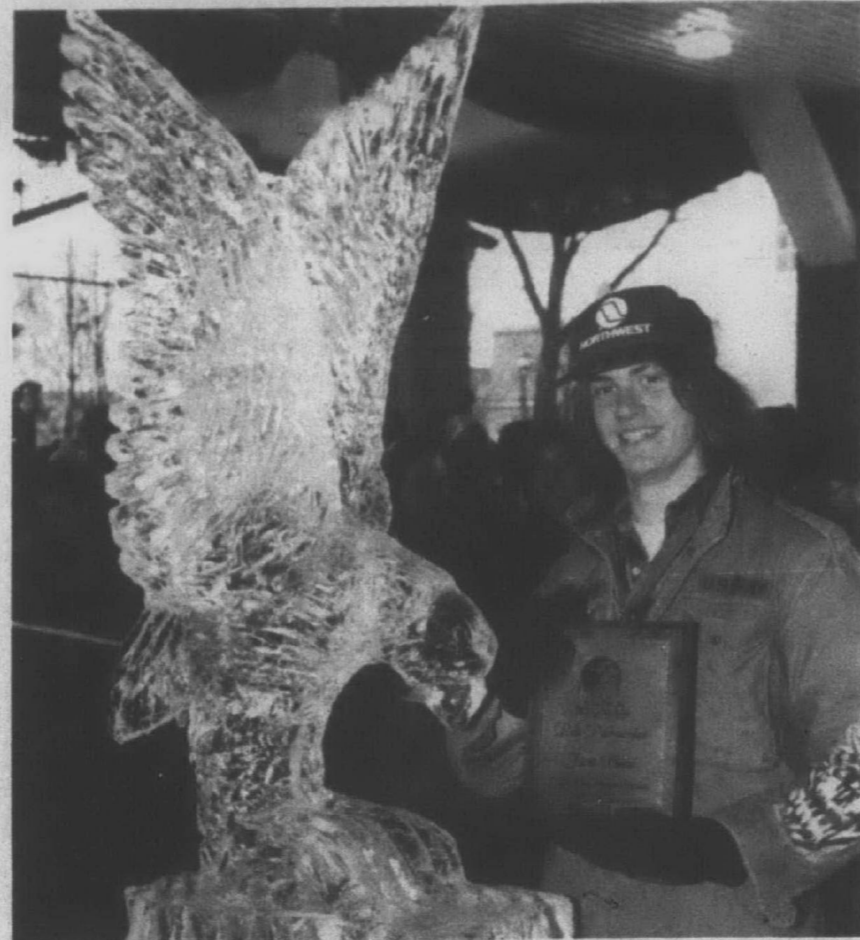
Christmas."

Commissioners mull future as new districts are upheld

Foes of new Wayne County Commission districts vow to fight on, but two area commissioners are already mulling their political future after this week's Michigan Court of Appeals ruling upholding the districts.

In a two-paragraph ruling, an appeals court panel rejected a challenge filed by Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and several suburban commissioners, including Bryan Amann, D-Wayne and Kevin Kelley, D-Redford.

A new appeal will soon be filed with the Michigan Supreme Court, deputy county executive Michael Duggan said.

"That's why we have a supreme court and that's where we're going," Duggan said.

While Amann and Kelley support the final appeal, they're also considering other options.

Amann, who represents Canton, would face fellow commissioner Maurice Breen, R-Plymouth Township, in one newly redrawn district. In addition to Plymouth Township, Canton, and Wayne, the new district includes Plymouth, Northville, Northville Township and a section of western Livonia. Its makeup is seen as giving Republicans the edge.

Amann said he may continue to run for the commission or seek another county office.

"I HAVE options," he said. "I could remain in this district, I could move to Westland to challenge (Democratic incumbent) Kay Beard, or I could run for county clerk."

Amann, a former deputy clerk, was elected to the commission last year. In the process, he sacrificed an \$80,000-plus annual salary as an as-

county commissioner

sistant county executive for the \$41,396-a-year commission post.

Kelley's current district includes Redford and a section of western Detroit. In his new district, he would lose Democratic voters from Detroit and pick up more Republican neighborhoods in Livonia.

"I don't have the problems Bryan Amann has," Kelley said. "I won't have to face another incumbent, and I do have a lot of friends in Livonia."

Kelley, however, said he would sit down with supporters to discuss his future before making any decisions.

Districts were redrawn in September by a county apportionment commission.

Deputy county clerk Marya Sieminski, who sat on the five-member panel, said she was pleased with the appeals court's ruling.

"These districts were fair, are fair and will be fair," Sieminski said. "The court recognized that."

Those opposed to the districts claim they penalize commissioners

who support the county executive.

"This is a setback to McNamara supporters," said Kelley, who more often than not supports the executive in disputes with commission leaders.

Duggan said the new districts favor Republicans at suburban Democrats' expense.

"IT'S A Republican plan and the appeals court panel that approved it are Republicans," Duggan said. "That's a point we'll make at the supreme court."

The initial appeal also challenged population and minority population standards used by the apportionment commission, as well as the presence of Sieminski — an Oakland County resident — on the commission.

Sieminski, however, said she doubted challengers would get any further with the high court than they did with the appeals court.

"The interesting thing is they threw everything but the kitchen sink in with their appeal and the court just threw it out," she said.

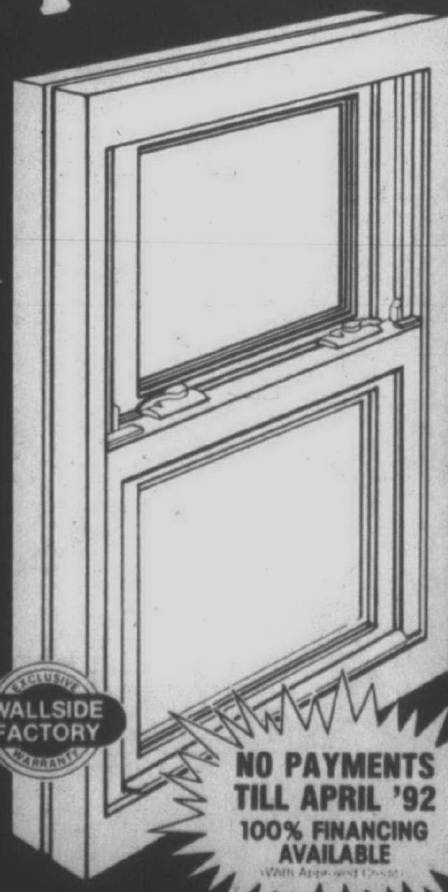

Job training issue tops Dems' agenda

Rep. William Keith is elated that House Speaker Lew Dodak is putting worker retraining and vocational education at the top of House Democrats 1992 agenda.

Keith, chair of the House Education Committee, called his vocational education bill "massive reform. No longer is vocational education a dumping ground for kids who can't make it on the college track or general track."

His bill, co-sponsored by Republican Glenn Oxender of Sturgis, calls for a major industry-school partnership in on-the-job training for students.

"Whether this is the year for it or not, I don't know," said Keith, a 19-year legislative veteran who once predicted his bill would take three years to pass.

DODAK, D-Birch Run, listed job training as his top example of House Democrats' "focus on family security issues."

Dodak emphasized "middle class" families, a favorite political theme. "We must also bring back programs such as the Michigan Youth Corps and Civilian Conservation Corps," he said, accusing Engler of dismantling every program with former Democratic Gov. James Blanchard's name on it.

A Democratic task force to which Keith is close is looking at retraining the present workforce for jobs of the future. Keith said there's no pattern or coordination of the many school, community college, industry and proprietary efforts to retrain workers.

Keith said the speaker scheduled a March 18-19 Conference on Technical Education in Lansing.

"The keynote will be Willard

Daggett, an international speaker on training. He says if you took all the people training people and put them (trainers) in the job market, they wouldn't qualify. That is a scary thought," Keith said.

OTHER ITEMS in Dodak's agenda:

- Affordable child care, licensed by the Department of Education rather than Social Services, with continued inspections.

- Continued existence of MIO-SHA, the state workplace safety program.

- Protection for "urban area" residents — Detroit, Saginaw, Flint and Grand Rapids — from auto insurance rate discrimination.

- Opposition to "schools of choice," favored by Engler and many Republicans.

- Reopening of the Michigan Education Trust to new enrollments. A Blanchard administration program, MET is an investment plan guaranteed to cover a youngster's college tuition at age 18.

- State limitation on college tuition increases.

- Endorsement of a plan to end combined sewer overflows (CSOs) by giving municipalities greater bonding ability for capital-intensive projects.

County proposal says 'Buy American'

Buy American is the focus of a proposed Wayne County ordinance that will get its first public test Tuesday.

A 10 a.m. public hearing is scheduled for the proposal, which gives American-made goods preference in most county purchases.

The proposal comes in the wake of U.S.-Japan trade talks, though primary sponsor Kay Beard, D-Westland, said she's been working on the ordinance for about three months.

But Beard acknowledges the timing doesn't hurt.

"GIVEN THE state of the econo-

my and unemployment in our own area, this is something we need to look at," she said.

The proposed ordinance is based on a federal law that governs goods the county buys with federal grant money, Beard said.

It would require the county to buy American-manufactured goods wherever possible. Exceptions would be made for purchases under \$10,000, scarce goods or for American goods whose prices greatly exceed those available from other markets.

"Initially, it's been set at 6 percent (above the cost of other goods) but that could go higher," Beard said.

County contractors would also be required to use American-made

goods for all contracts of \$50,000 or more. Contracts caught violating the ordinance would be banned from bidding on county projects for three years.

While the county commission holds final approval over the ordinance, most contracts are enacted through the county executive's office.

Executive's office officials said they didn't have enough information on the ordinance to comment.

"We haven't even seen it yet," deputy county executive Michael Duggan said.

The county makes it a policy to do business with Wayne County-based companies wherever possible, though the county's minority sup-

plier ordinance was struck down in court.

Beard said she was uncertain how the public would respond to the Buy American ordinance, but she believes most county residents will be supportive.

"This Christmas, I made it a point to look for American-made goods," she said. "Charity really does begin at home."

A public hearing on the ordinance will be held by the Committee on Audit 10 a.m. Tuesday in Meeting Room 402 of the Wayne County Building, 600 Randolph, Detroit. Comments can also be sent in writing to the committee c/o Commissioner Kay Beard, at the same address.

ARTHRITIS OF THE HIP

Most instances of what you think are hip pains, are not but originate from the femoral trochanter and reflect strain from muscles anchoring there.

Plymouth Christian got its first win of the season and improved to 1-6 overall. Huron Valley dropped to 0-5 overall.

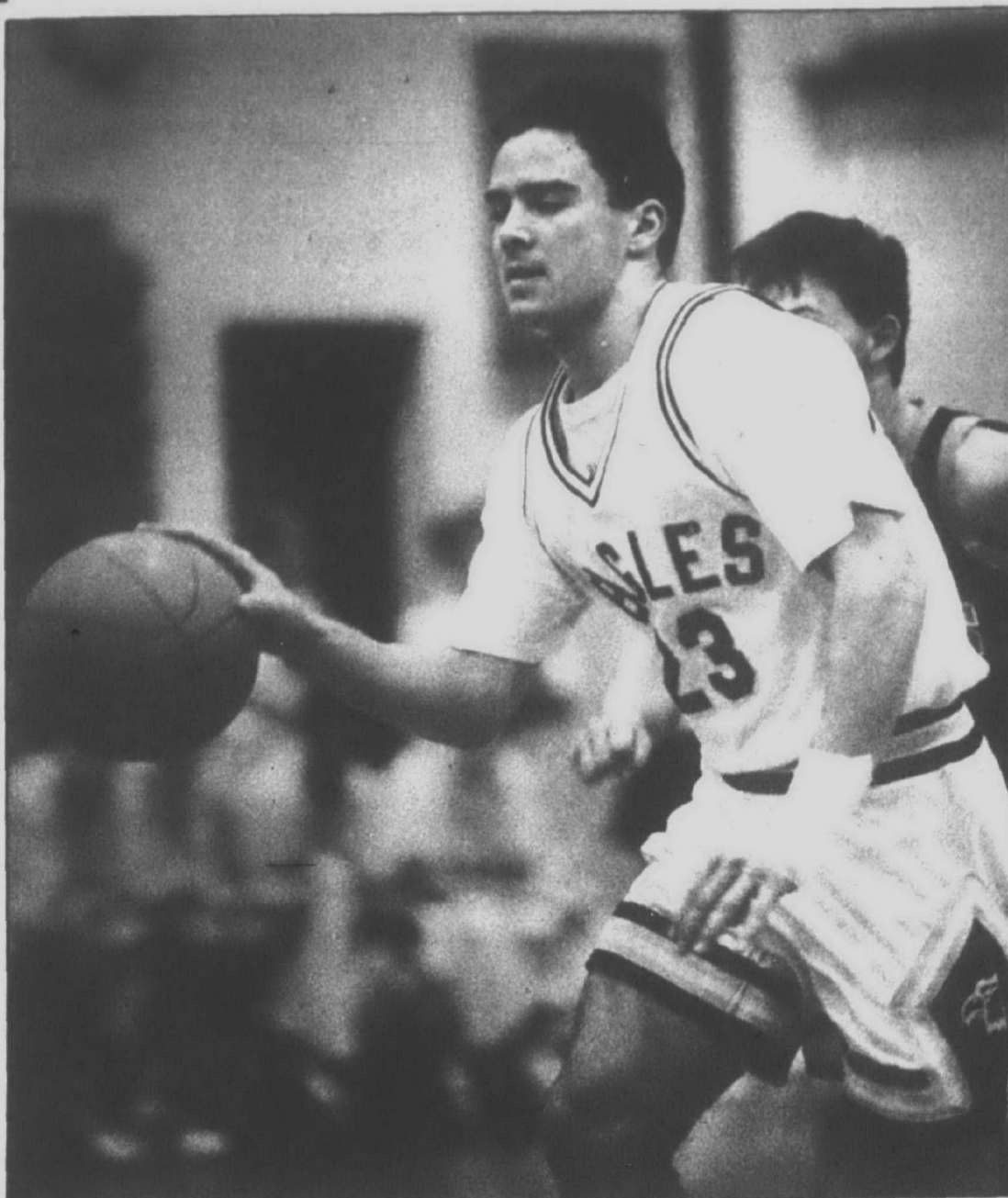

Ocelots lose key players from men's cage squad

Their absence was noticeable

Volleyball star receives All-America recognition

A record-setting season reaped its rewards when post-season honors were presented by the NAIA.

Madonna University's volleyball team landed three players on the 13-player all-District 23 team and one of those — sophomore middle hitter Dana Hicks-Finley — was first-team All-American.

Hicks-Finley's honors were the culmination of a 42-11 Madonna campaign. The Lady Crusaders finished first in the district in the regular season, then lost in the playoff final to Northwood Institute, which went on to place third at the NAIA Tournament.

"Dana is a dominant middle-hitter and blocker," said Madonna coach Jerry Abraham. "Her statistics were among the best in the country. It was very difficult to stop such a power in the middle, she had such diversity in her shot selection. A lot of good teams were impressed with her."

Hicks-Finley, the only sophomore on the NAIA All-American first team, was also named the District 23 player of the

year. But she wasn't the only Madonna standout — junior outside hitter Tonia Smith and senior setter Penny Baker were both chosen to the all-district team.

HICKS-FINLEY LED the team with a .331 kill average and 835 kills, 4.96 per game. Her 321 blocks (2.79 per game) also topped the Crusaders.

The only down side regarding Hicks-Finley is her status: Although she has two years of eligibility remaining, her husband is in the armed forces and is currently stationed in Virginia. That's where she is living now, but Abraham said she is planning to return in the fall.

Smith posted good numbers as well, making Madonna's front line an imposing one. The Walled Lake Western graduate

had a .316 kill average, totalling 518 (3.33 per game) for the season. Smith also had 105 blocks (1.71 average), 3.79 digs a game and a .901 serve average.

Baker shared the setting position with Mazie Pilut, but still posted some impressive numbers: 2,162 assists-to-kills (9.96 per game) and a .925 serve average.

ALL THREE were the district's player of the week during the season, Hicks-Finley turned the trick twice.

Also named to the all-district team was Michigan-Dearborn sophomore setter Kari Domanski, from Garden City (and Livonia Ladywood). Abraham was selected as coach of the year after guiding Madonna to a school-record number of wins and ending Northwood's five-year reign as district champ.

Two other Crusaders were named academic All-Americans: junior outside hitter Melissa Mars (from Redford Bishop Borgess), who had a 3.6 grade point and a .301 kill average; and senior defensive specialist Jennifer Sladewski (from Livonia Stevenson), who also had a 3.6 grade point and led Madonna with 6.10 digs per game.

Dustbin is true to punk

Although too young to have experienced it and they sure don't sound like it, the punk ethic lives with Ned's Atomic Dustbin.

Too often, we get caught up in whirlwind of images and sounds of the late 1970s era of music. Sid Vicious, safety pins through the nose and bodies and saliva flying with equal trajectory quickly come to mind as does the scratchy and snarling guitars and vocals to match with lyrics of angst and anarchy.

What tends to get overlooked is the insurrection that took place from within. For a brief period, music had been taken over by the masses — those who seemingly didn't know the difference between a guitar chord and an extension cord.

Those fledgling outfits persevered on the simplest and purest of inspiration: make and celebrate joyous noise.

Frankly, the history lesson is lost on Ned's Atomic Dustbin guitarist Garath "Rat" Pring a decade later.

"I don't think (punk) influenced us at all, really," said Pring, 21, from his home in Birmingham, England. "We were between the ages of 6 and 9. We listened to a little bit of it after.

"When we started we couldn't afford good equipment, so it sounded raw. It was sounded like we were punk. Basically, we are a pop band."

Though the band's upbringing is similar to a tradition forged by the Sex Pistols, Social Distortion and countless other bands, by no means is Ned's Atomic Dustbin a punk cliché.

SINGER JONATHAN "Jonn" Penney, bassists (yes, there's two) Alex Griffin and Matt Sweet, drummer Daniel Worton along with Pring formed Ned's Atomic Dustbin in college. Musicians they weren't.

Rather the band learned their craft bludgeoning Ramones records. They soon went out on the road, not bothering to turn up for class for two months and were eventually drop kicked out of school.

Maintaining a yeoman's schedule of gigs, they ended up on successive tours with fellow West Midland bands Wonder Stuff and Pop Will Eat Itself.

Undoubtedly, performing live only added more virulence to Ned's Atomic Dustbin's cataclysmic sound, which is largely careening melodic pop ditties driven by psychedelic buzz guitar. Lyrically, songwriter Jonn has an ardent sense of the absurd.

The rawness is detectable on both the band's debut EP, "The Ingredients," and its ensuing LP "God Fodder" on Columbia. Both are adequate representations of their music.

It's their belief, though, that the stage is the ultimate confessional for a band's commitment and passion.

"We built our reputation by playing live," said Pring, whose nickname "Rat" was given to him at age 2 by his mother. "We do over a 100 gigs a year where we've only been in the studio for about say 10 weeks during our whole career.

"IT WEARS on you. Personally, I think it's the best thing about being in a band. The enjoyment still there and there's still a high when you

come off the stage if the gig has been brilliant. You get a kick out of it."

The game has changed from the heady days of punk. Alternative music is no longer alternative, increasingly dominated by major labels who use the term as a ruse for a farm system.

"A couple of years ago, if you were an alternative band in England you were alternative and you stayed there major or not. Now, there's no

such bands like that anymore."

But, as Ned's Atomic Dustbin certainly prove, "The majors hasn't hurt it one way or the other," Pring said.

IDYLLS — Missionary Stew

Yes, they wear their hearts, souls and spirituality on their tattered sleeves of discontent. And, perhaps, they can be a tad maudlin. Missionary Stew may be forgiven for such transgressions, though.

Their pop sensibilities and musical craftsmanship — albeit some borrowed — more than sees them through on "Idylls," the local band's second release.

Missionary Stew has never been a band to use vague imagery and mixed metaphors to speak their case. Rather the five-man outfit uses the stringent confines of a pop song to explore contradiction and confusion within. The quest for spiritual solitude is often hard-fought battle in the Missionary Stew camp, never complete and always questioned.

From that end, this band neither prostytlezizes or panders to those of the Christian persuasion as evidence in the lyrics. "I said I would be true to you/ You needn't ask if I've been good/I can't go

back on what I said," sings Dion Roddy from the confessional number "Can't Go Back" in a flawless voice tailor-made for pop music.

To hone in solely on this band's belief in "Him" and hastily categorize them as Christian rockers would be sorely missing the point and not accurate. Then again, not acknowledging the guiding light that drives this outfit would be an oversight. You just consider it part of the overall package.

Tight arrangements and sterling musicianship allow for that. Spanish trumpets open "Mystery." EMF-sounding keyboards segue way into personal solace in "Peace Like a River."

"No One's Cried for Me" is the band's sole blemish here, no check that, a splattered blot. This resembles a lounge-lizard's opus, complete with piano sounding like the keys were soaked in gin and down-and-out lyrics sung with vocals choking on stale smoke. This song, in particular, sounds out of character for a band of this talent. Perhaps one could surmise it was a joke.

Otherwise, "Idylls" is quite an accomplishment from a band that continues to evolve musically.

I cannot lift my soul up to the light.
I'm lost forever.
I'm only a Shadow of a Woman.
As a child, I could not understand nor could my mother tell me why she let this go on. The destruction it caused my siblings and myself for a while was overwhelming.
I thank God everyday for the love he has sent me. The man I married is also from an abusive family. Togeth-

er we have had analysis and come to understand this chain behavior. We have found true love and a relationship with great meaning. The chain of abuse can be broken and I thank God we are two of the lucky ones. There is no excuse for abuse.
Grateful it's over

Dear Readers,
For the past few months we have heard from women who have experienced being victims in abusive relationships. They speak eloquently.
I would like to be able to say that this is not a gender-distinct problem and that men also feel stuck in such relationships. However, no man has written. I am hoping that some male reader will write to fill the void.
With the misgiving of knowing that this is a topic worthy of volumes, I will attempt to sum up.
The themes I hear in these letters is that women in abusive relationships feel helpless. Each feels they have no options. Because they cannot leave, then, the reasoning goes, the men must change for the rela-

tionship to be different. If neither partner can change, then it becomes the responsibility of our social institutions to enforce laws or provide support that will stop the abuse.
The first issue — the woman's lack of choice — is a question of the viability of free will. Are people self-determining? It seems that some are and some are not.
I assume that the women who have written to me on this topic are only the tip of the iceberg. If this many have written, then there must be many more, certainly enough that they cannot be considered outside the realm of normalcy.
There are then many for whom the option of free will is sadly not available. These women lack a self capable of being alone.
If you are reading this and having trouble understanding it because you are a person with a strong sense of self, then imagine yourself dancing, if you have no rhythm, or singing, if you are tone deaf.
No matter how hard you willed it,

you couldn't make it happen. Maybe after a lot of teaching you could achieve some success, but without no amount of will could make you an adequate singer or dancer.
Could independence and/or a problem solving ability be something like that? My column that generated these responses asked whether or not it was luck, as a woman from Haven said, that led to a woman being in an abusive relationship.
I took the position that each one of us must take responsibility for ourselves. I said it was not luck. I do not feel as sure of that stand now. Is it the luck inherent in genetics which makes it possible for us to sing on key, dance to the music, solve problems or be independent?
As I have said, that is an issue worthy of volumes and still there would not be an answer to some of the worst problems.
Continuing with our original line of logic, the man should change for the abuse to stop. But must we not say the same of him as we have said

of the woman? If we cannot expect her to have the free will to choose, how can we expect the man to?
If we accept that the behavior is determined rather than chosen for her, then this line of reasoning is for him, too. If he were a strong man, he wouldn't be abusing other people.
And so we come to the responsibility of civilized society to protect the handicapped — whether that handicap be physical or mental. Recently, I received a Haven newsletter in the mail. In it there are articles describing support systems for victims. The counseling enables victims to become "self-empowered survivors."
There is also news of the State Domestic Violence Board and early intervention for juvenile sex offenders. These programs are helping to educate and to arbitrate these difficult issues. Our legal system lags far behind.
Haven is an Oakland County shelter; I hope this kind of help is available in other communities. In a very few cases, some women have found

a way to become independent. They are indeed the lucky ones. I can only hope that they will be an inspiration to those less fortunate.
In pondering this problem, I have become more aware of the large role luck plays in all of our lives. Again, thanks to all the women who have helped me better understand this problem.

'Madame Bovary' adapts to the screen beautifully

When Claude Chabrol set out to tackle a screen version of "Madame Bovary," he stuck close to his source — the classic novel by Gustave Flaubert.

"I decided to be absolutely faithful," the director has said in interviews. "All the dialogue, all the phrases from the film are taken, almost to the comma, from the book. I wanted to make a film that Flaubert could have made himself."

Along the way Chabrol has created a masterpiece of his own. Currently on screen at the Maple Theatre in Bloomfield, "Madame Bovary" is a beautifully realized examination of a woman breaking free of the restrictions of her time, escaping into passions that eventually lead to her destruction.

Isabelle Huppert plays Emma Bovary, the 19th-century tragic heroine who marries a doctor (Jean-Francois Balmer), has a child by him, but then finds herself trapped. She seeks the luxuries of lovers and shopping

sprees that the family can't afford.

VETERAN director Chabrol has perfectly captured the rustic French villages of the previous century. He has also chosen actors who become breathing embodiments of their literary counterparts.

Huppert, who worked with Chabrol on the controversial "The Story of Women," has an amazing quality that allows her to look both plain and stunningly beautiful at the same time. She begins the film grim-faced, even after an elegant ball that she describes as the best time of her life. The depression returns. Emma

seeks the help of the church, but the pastor only makes her feel guilty for her moodiness while the less fortunate starve.

Soon she allows herself to be swept off her feet by a smooth-talking aristocrat. Then she turns to a clumsy young romantic. Both turn out to be cads. When the first skips out on his promise to run away with her, Emma breaks down. Her husband fawns at her bedside throughout, neglecting his patients and throwing the family deeper into debt.

A master of turning the tables on moral issues, Chabrol obviously sympathizes with the henpecked Charles, but also points out the foolishness of blind sainthood. His puppy dog affection and lack of opinions grows grating. He's ignorant of the money that surrounds him in expensive carpeting, drapes and Emma's clothing.

LURKING throughout the film is a conniving Shylock who tempts Emma with imported finery from the big city. He allows her to use credit and when she can't pay, promissory notes and inflated interest sink her deeper and deeper into debt.

Huppert has called Emma Bovary "an eternal feminine archetype," a feminist before her time. In a time when divorce was out of the question, Emma used the resources available to her (mostly her conniving) to fly above the boredom.

Flaubert's characters are indeed timeless. The modern "born to shop" philosophy and reliance on credit cards proves that Emma Bovary still walks among us at suburban shopping malls.

Swiss savoir-faire

Opernhaus exemplifies Zurich's cultural ambition

Switzerland's largest city officially describes itself as a "world-class metropolis," although its inhabitants number just one-twentieth of New York's.

Yet Zurich's location in the heart of Europe, the Swiss-watch reliability of its communications and other services, its banking and business establishment, and its intellectual life all lend credibility to its global claim.

Zurich's cultural ambitions are exemplified by its Opernhaus. The 1,230-seat neo-Baroque building on the east shore of Lake Zurich is starting its second century after recent restructuring and enlargement with a bid to rival such shrines of opera as LaScala and other major houses.

For playing in the operatic big leagues Zurich has called on a 44-year-old Viennese, Alexander Pereira, who during the past seven years served as chief of the Konzerthaus music center in Vienna, Austria.

Pereira's first season as Zurich Opera manager presents some 20 productions with Agnes Baltsa, Renato Bruson, Montserrat Caballe, Jose Carreras, Mirella Freni, Edita Gruberova, Thomas Hampson, Ruggero Raimondi and other international stars, mostly in classics by Mozart, Wagner, Verdi, Puccini and Richard Strauss.

A highlight on the Opernhaus program is the premiere, on Jan. 19, 1992, of the ballet "Tanzpoem," or "Dance Poem," by the newly fashionable Alexander von Zemlinsky, who was the musical mentor and brother-in-law of Arnold Schoenberg. Reprises are on Jan. 22, Feb. 1 and 15, and March 1.

Other Zurich Opera novelties are Ligeti's "Grand Macabre" on Feb. 26 and, on several afternoons, Menotti's children's opera "Hilfe, Hilfe, the Globolinks."

Opera prices range from \$10.70 for gallery seats on some evenings to \$270 for a chair in an orchestra box at a premiere. Many performances are largely subscribed. For more information write to: Opernhaus Zurich, 1 Falkenstrasse, 8008 Zurich; or phone 262-09-09.

MUSIC

The classical and romantic repertory from Haydn to Brahms and the Second Viennese School from Mahler to Webern dominate the programs of more than 100 concerts and recitals scheduled at the Opera House and the Tonhalle this winter and spring.

The orchestra of the sumptuous Tonhalle, at 1 Claridenstrasse, facing the Opernhaus across the

lake, has a new permanent guest conductor, Claus Peter Flor, from Leipzig, Germany.

At the Opera, Ralf Weikert will present Charles Ives' "Central Park in the Dark" in a matinee April 5. At the Tonhalle, "Music From the U.S.A., 1905-1971" (Cage, Carter, Ives, Erickson, Capland, Crumb) will be played by the Helios Ensemble April 12.

Tickets for the opera-house concerts cost \$5.70 to \$34.30; for the Tonhalle, \$7.15 to \$64.30. For more information on performances at the Tonhalle call 201-15-812.

GETTING AROUND

Zurich's Kloten Airport is linked with the central railroad station, or Hauptbahnhof, by frequent trains. The fare for the 10-minute trip is \$3 in second class, \$4.85 in first.

Eight lines of Zurich's efficient surface transit system converge on the square outside the Hauptbahnhof. The ticket for a short ride on the blue trams and trolleys is \$1.20 for 30 minutes, \$2 for longer rides within the city limits, good for an hour with any number of transfers. Children ages 6 to 16 pay half price; under 6 travel free.

Tickets are bought from one of the vending machines at every stop, which are so elaborate that even some residents ask practiced bystanders for assistance. Newcomers may prefer to buy a 24-hour ticket for the entire city network at \$4 or for the whole region at \$16 from employees staffing the underground "ticketeria" at the Hauptbahnhof.

MUSEUMS

The Kunsthau, at 1 Heimplatz, boasts one of Europe's largest collections of modern art since Impressionism. There are also works by Baroque masters from Italy and the Netherlands and by such Swiss painters of the 19th and 20th centuries as Bocklin and Hodler.

The Kunsthau is open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday to Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Admission is \$2.15; for occasional special exhibitions, \$3.70 to \$6.40. Take tram No. 3, 5, 8 or 9. For more information call 251-67-55.

Rietberg Museum is at 15 Gablestrasse in the Villa Wesendonck, a mansion in a park near the western lakeshore in which Richard Wagner lived for years. Now city-owned, the villa contains a 2,000-item collection, including pre-Columbian artifacts. A show of sculptures by artists of Nigeria's Yoruba people closes March 12.

The Rietberg Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday to Sunday, 5-9 p.m. Wednesday. Ad-

EATING OUT

A recent addition to gastronomic Zurich is an offshoot of the Parisian Brasserie Kipp, centrally located on the ground floor of the tower of the astronomical observatory at 2 Uraniastrasse.

It serves drinks, snacks and such substantial fare as choucroute garnie or cassoulet (either one at \$18.60) from 9 a.m. to 11:45 p.m. daily. Book early for Lipp's panoramic Jules Verne Bar on top of the 150-foot tower, which is popular for private parties. For more information call 211-11-55.

Food isn't the main attraction of Kronenhalle; atmosphere is. This old brasserie, at 4 Ramis-

trasse, near the opera house, has become relatively more expensive than it used to be a few years ago, but it has remained a Zurich institution. Pictures by Matisse, Picasso and Miro hang on the dark-wood paneling, lace curtains at the windows screen the fashionable patrons from the street.

At Kronenhalle if you skip the French-style entrees and the fabled chocolate mousse on the menu you can still have a filling lunch on St. Gall bratwurst and rosti, Zurich's all-purpose sliced-and-roasted potato side order, with a small carafe of Fendant wine and an espresso at \$27. For more information call 251-66-69.

Geschnetzeltes (sliced and creamed veal) sausages and other local fishes can be sampled in the

ancient guildhall restaurants around City Hall.

Zunftthaus zur Saffran, at 54 Limmatquai, is a 600-year-old arched building, designated as a historic landmark. It now houses a risotteria on its ground floor. Risotto with mushrooms, seafood, saffron or other garnishings are around \$22 a helping. For more information call 261-65-65.

Fast food is centered around the central railway station.

Travel tidbit: People make the place

We were watching the Yugoslavian civil war on the television news, flinching every time a shell landed in the tiny walled city of Dubrovnik. "I wonder what happened to the guy we met on the top of the mountain," Micky said.

I couldn't remember his name, but the memories were clear: a young man raising a beer glass in Trebinje, or leaning out the doorway in Cilipi shouting "Ho-nus! Ho-nus!"

He couldn't speak English, so that was the closest he could get to shouting "Jones!" I finally found his name in a notebook I carried during that week on the Adriatic coast: Seki.

We'd never heard of Trebinje, but the schedule board in the local bus depot assured us that we could go and come back the same day. We rode a clean modern bus 20 miles up a rocky mountain slope, with locals carrying chickens home from market, and enjoyed the banter even though we couldn't understand a

word.

We explored the old streets of Trebinje and returned to the hotel bus stop half an hour before the afternoon bus was scheduled to take us downmountain. We were drinking beer in the nearly deserted hotel bar when we saw Seki, sitting with a young woman across the room.

He stared at us until we noticed him. He waved us over and kept waving until we picked up our beer glasses and crossed the room. Seki smiled, bowed, pointed to chairs and shouted for more beer.

We couldn't speak their language, and they couldn't speak ours, but talking with your hands and your feet is an important travel skill so we were soon deep in "conversation." They spoke Yugoslavian. We spoke English.

I had a dictionary so the paper place mats were soon covered with words and pictures. He drew a map of North America and we marked Detroit on it. He "asked" about our children and we held up two fingers. Seki worked in a winery somewhere near Dubrovnik.

We missed the first and second bus. We waved goodbye and ran for the last one. That would have been the end of it if we had taken the tour bus the next morning to the Sunday folklore presentation in the village of Cilipi, 10 miles south.

We took the 50 cent local bus instead and when the tour buses left we had the town to ourselves for an hour before wandering back to the

bus stop on the main highway.

I was kicking stones on the shoulder of the road when I first heard somebody yell "Ho-nus! Ho-nus!" The second and third time he yelled we looked around to see where the voice was coming from and saw a man leaning out of a doorway of the hotel across the street. "Ho-nus."

"He's saying Jones," Micky said.

"It's Seki!"

"Where did he come from?" Seki lived in Cilipi, where he worked in the winery. He dragged us into a wine bar where we spent the afternoon sampling the local wine and drawing pictures.

Meeting Seki was just a travel experience, one of many. But when I see news reports of war damage in Dubrovnik, and hear that the beautiful village of Cilipi has been demolished by gunfire, I don't think of history. I think of Seki. I'm glad I remembered his name.

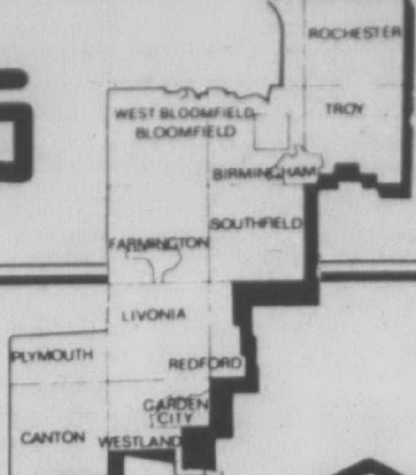

Recipes

CHEESE SOUFFLE WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

This easy to make recipe can be assembled ahead up to the point where the milk and butter are poured on top of the bread and cheese.

11 slices of bread, cubed with the crusts trimmed off (Pepperidge Farm Sandwich bread is recommended)

4 eggs, separated
2 cups milk
¼ pound butter or margarine
½ pound New York sharp cheddar cheese, grated

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Place cubed, trimmed bread into a non-stick sprayed 2 quart size souffle or high-sided baking dish. Sprinkle grated cheese on top of bread and toss to mix well. Heat the milk and add the butter. Once the butter is melted, pour the mixture over the bread and cheese.

Separate the eggs, beating the yolks briefly with a fork and then adding them to the bread and cheese mixture. Whip up the egg whites until they are stiff and form peaks and fold in gently with the other ingredients.

Place the souffle dish in a pie plate that is partially filled with water and bake in the oven for 45-50 minutes.

When serving, spoon a small amount of the mushroom sauce on top of the souffle. Serves six.

MUSHROOM SAUCE

1 package fresh mushrooms, washed and sliced, 8 ounce size
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
1 can cream of mushroom soup
Saute sliced mushrooms in butter. Sprinkle flour over

mushrooms, stirring so as to prevent lumps. Pour in 1 cup of milk and stir until thickened. Add 1 can of cream of mushroom soup and heat thoroughly over low heat. Serve on the side or spoon over individual servings of souffle.

BANANA NUT BREAD

½ cup butter
1 ½ cup flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup sugar
6 tablespoons sour cream
2 eggs, beaten
3 bananas, mashed
¼ cup or desired amount of walnuts

Grease and flour a loaf pan. Cream the butter with the flour, baking soda and sugar. Add the sour cream, eggs, bananas and nuts. Beat until mixed well and pour into loaf pan and bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes at 325 degrees.

FRESH FRUIT SALAD

Cut up fresh fruit (watermelon, cantaloupe, honey dew melon, strawberries and sliced kiwi) and serve on a bed of lettuce.

"KINGSWOOD SPECIAL" ICE CREAM BALLS

Always a favorite at Kingswood School Cranbrook, this is an easy dessert to make. Soften a carton of vanilla ice cream slightly. Using an ice cream scoop, make ice cream balls. Place each ball in a paper baking cup and store in a muffin pan. If ice cream balls get too soft, place in freezer until they have hardened and then roll tops of balls in pecans. Serve with heated Sander's hot fudge sauce.

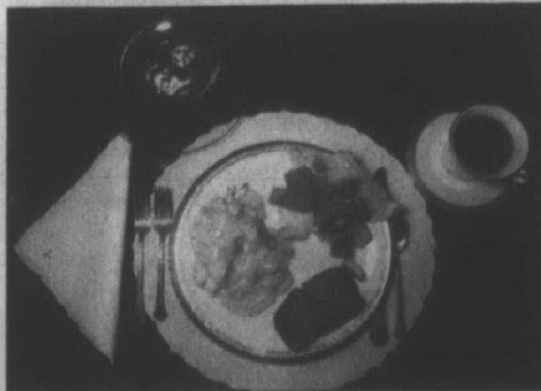

Readers pick best dinners

Picking three Winner Dinner Winners to reprint in celebration of the 100th Winner Dinner column wasn't easy — all of them are good.

But some stand out like Fish Haters Surprise, Italian Meatballs and Chicken Kebabs. Readers called to say they these were some of their favorite Winner Dinners.

I'm still hearing about the Write Your Own Winner Dinner — Sept. 9, 1991. We moved the Winner Dinner column from the inside of the Taste section to the front and something got lost — the Winner Dinner recipes. The error was caught in the middle of the press run and quickly corrected. Half of the papers had the recipes, half didn't.

The half that didn't get the Winner Dinner recipes called to find out if this was the new format. We must have gotten over 50 calls that day, and no one ever forgot the recipes again.

Here are the recipes:

FISH HATER'S SURPRISE

Quick and easy, this recipe submitted by Debbie Wallis Landau of West Bloomfield on Feb. 4, 1991, provides a tasty and appealing way to get family members to eat fish. This recipe serves 4-6.

1 ½ pounds orange roughy or other mild, white fish
1 egg
½ cup low-fat milk
½ cup or more seasoned Italian bread crumbs
¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese
Cayenne pepper, garlic powder and onion powder to taste, or other preferred seasoning, to taste
Canola oil

Beat the egg and mix in the milk and seasoning. Dip the fish fillets into the mixture. Combine the bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese and completely coat the fish with this dry mixture. Place the fillets in a baking dish sprayed with a non-stick coating. Drizzle a little oil on the fillets before baking.

Bake the fish at 325 degrees for 20 minutes. Then, broil for 3-4 minutes until browned, under a 500-degree setting.

RED, WHITE AND GREEN PARTY PASTA

8- or 12-ounce box of bowtie pasta
1 small bunch broccoli
1 large red bell pepper
2 cups fresh pea pods
4-5 large red radishes
1 bottle Wishbone Light Creamy Italian Salad Dressing or other creamy-type dressing of your choice, herb blend of your choice
Fresh parsley, chopped finely, optional

Boil the pasta until it is al dente, about 8-10 minutes. Drain and set it aside.

Clean and separate broccoli into small florettes. Blanch in hot water for a few minutes or cook in the microwave until it, too, is al dente. Drain.

Wash and slice radishes into rounds and slice the red pepper into strips. Wash the pea pods.

Add vegetables to cooked pasta. Mix the herbs in with the dressing and pour over the pasta and vegetable mixture. Toss well and garnish with parsley. Serve in a glass bowl lined with red cabbage leaves.

WINTER FRUIT MELANGE

2 navel oranges
2 firm-fleshed fresh pears
1 jar spiced apple rings
1 tablespoon honey
1 tablespoon cinnamon
Peel and slice oranges and pears. Drain apple rings and set aside the liquid.

Combine fruits and place in an oval baking dish. Add 1 tablespoon honey and 1 tablespoon cinnamon to the liquid from the apples and mix well. Pour this over the fruit. It can be baked alongside the fish for 20 minutes at 325 degrees. Melange also can be made ahead, and it keeps well in the refrigerator.

Attorney sets precedent in wine newsletter, books

Success hasn't spoiled Robert M. Parker, Jr. He is the most read wine writer in America. Even with the rigors of European travel, daily tastings and publishing a wine newsletter that started it all, he remains enthusiastic, upbeat and excited about wine.

We spoke with Parker while he autographed 600 books for people attending a tasting of 1989 Bordeaux sponsored by the Cloverleaf Market of Southfield at Detroit's Rattlesnake Club.

"I am a product of the Ralph Nader generation and I never tire of the chase," Parker said. He states emphatically that wine is pleasure and meant to be enjoyed. "If it isn't, you're drinking the wrong wine."

UNTIL 1984, Parker practiced corporate law in Monkton, Maryland. He followed the love of his life to Europe, married her and fell in love with French wine. By 1978, his love of wine had blossomed into a wine newsletter that he called "The Wine Advocate."

"Actually, I wanted to use the French word, *avocat*," Parker said, "which translates as lawyer or bar-rister. At first, I sent my newsletter free to my friends and anyone who was interested. When I retired from law, I made wine my full-time occupation. I am proud that I remain an independent critic, paying my own way on all European trips and paying out of my own pocket for 75 percent of the wine I critique."

"The Wine Advocate," with a circulation over 28,000 (including 4,700 foreign subscribers), is completely subscriber-driven. It is remarkable that Parker has been able to survive publishing an independent newsletter without one shred of ad-

Although Parker ranks the 1989 Haut-Brion (\$79) as one of the best of the vintage, at half the price we'll take the 1989 Cos d'Estournel (\$38). Not all Bordeaux wines are this expensive. A visit to your wine shop will attest

to that. Several values taken from the Parker tasting include: 1989 Boujeaux (\$16), 1989 La Dominique (\$22.80) and Phelan-Segur (\$15.40). The best buy has to be the 1989 Grand-Mayne (\$14.80), a rising star whose price has not caught up with its quality. (Prices quoted by the Cloverleaf Market, Southfield).

vertising revenue.

It is evident by the twinkle in his eye and the pride in his voice that Parker is pleased that he is not a part of the wine trade, as are the British Masters of Wine, who have set wine opinion for the last 100 years. He is also happy that he, as an American (not British) has become one of the world's foremost wine critics.

PARKER, A prolific author of wine books, has written six books in as many years. His first book on Bordeaux, published by Simon and Schuster in 1985, was recently updated to include 2,700 tasting notes on the wines of 677 chateaux from the 1961 through 1990 vintages.

"I learned about the wines of Burgundy and the Rhone Valley first, but I established my credentials more easily by writing about Bordeaux," he said.

Parker has also published books on the wines of Burgundy, the Rhone

and Provence, and a consumer buying guide that is the most popular of the lot.

"Bordeaux vintages can be divided into heat-wave years producing wines with richness and early drinkability (1961, '82, and '87) and years producing hard, concentrated wines (1986) that require patience," said Parker.

Of the 1989 Bordeaux wines tasted, Parker prefers the Chateau Haut-Brion and Chateau Lafite-Rothschild. However, since he knows that not many people can afford these classic renditions, he is quick to point out good values. For more affordable Bordeaux he likes the 1989 La Dominique and Grand-Mayne.

Parker is well known for his opinion that there are "too many disappointing California wines." However, he does find many distinctive California zinfandels. Perhaps this is because there is no French counterpart for comparison!

ITALIAN MEATBALLS

A family favorite for two generations, this recipe for Italian meatballs and spaghetti sauce submitted by Sandy Futterknecht of Bloomfield Hills on Dec. 24, 1990 is delicious and easy to make. Double the recipe and you will have enough for two meals.

- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 3 slices very dry brown toast or 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs, combined with 1/4 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons parsley, chopped finely
- 1 clove garlic, chopped finely
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper

Combine all ingredients and work together until thoroughly blended. Form 12 balls and fry them slowly in a small amount of oil until brown.

Do not turn the meatballs until they are absolutely browned.

Add several tablespoons of water to the skillet and with a spoon scrape the drippings and add them to the sauce. Simmer the meatballs slowly in the sauce for about 20 minutes.

ITALIAN TOMATO SAUCE FOR THE SPAGHETTI

- 2 cans tomato paste, 6-ounce size
- 1 can Italian tomatoes, 20-ounce size
- 2 tablespoons butter or oil
- 1/4 cup onion, chopped finely
- 1 clove garlic, chopped finely
- 1/4 cup celery, chopped finely
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup parsley, chopped finely
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced

Italian meatballs

Saute onion, garlic and celery slowly in butter or oil for about 5 minutes.

Put the tomatoes through a food strainer and discard the seeds, or simply crush the tomatoes with hands until they are broken apart into pieces. Add the tomatoes and tomato paste to the onion, garlic and celery mixture.

Add all the other ingredients, except for the baking soda and mushrooms, and simmer in a covered saucepan for about 1 hour, if you are adding the baking soda. Cook at least 4 hours on low if the soda is omitted. Stir often to prevent scorching. Then add the meatballs that have been browned on all sides and simmer, covered, for about 30 minutes longer, or until the meatballs are tender. Mushrooms may be added during the last 15 minutes of cooking.

Baking soda should be added 10 minutes before the sauce is done. Baking soda helps neutralize the

acidity in the tomatoes, making the sauce more palatable. Add the soda, a very little at a time, and cook the sauce several minutes longer. Taste and add more soda if needed.

If the sauce should become too thick, a little water or stock (beef broth) may be added as needed. If the sauce is too thin, cook the sauce uncovered for about 15 minutes. This recipe serves 4-6 people.

CHICKEN KEBABS

This quick and easy to assemble dish was submitted by Toni Johnson of Birmingham on Jan. 11, 1990. With a little bit of supervision you can delegate and let your children make up their own kabobs. This recipe makes four to six kabobs, depending on the size of the vegetables that you use.

- Kebabs
- 1 1/2 pounds boned chicken breast, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 2 large zucchini, sliced thickly and halved

- 12 cherry tomatoes
- 1 red pepper, cut into 1-inch strips
- 3 onions, quartered
- 8-9 large mushrooms
- Marinade
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup red wine
- 1 clove garlic, pressed

Marinate the chicken alone in the marinade. The longer the meat marinates, the tastier it will be. However, it can be marinated for just a few minutes and still have a delicious flavor. Peel and quarter the onions and microwave them for 2 minutes. Thread the 4 skewers in this order: chicken, onion, cherry tomato, zucchini, mushroom and red pepper. Place the skewers in a 9- x 13-inch Pyrex baking dish and cover with some of the marinade. Cook on a hot grill for 5 minutes on a side, turning once after brushing the kebabs with more marinade. Remove the meat and vegetables from the skewers and serve over the rice, spooning more marinade on top, if desired.

RICE WITH CELERY AND ONIONS

This rice dish is so delicious. It is

practically a meal unto itself.

- 1 cup converted long grain rice
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 head celery hearts, coarsely chopped, leaves and all
- 1 large onion, coarsely chopped
- 1 heaping teaspoon instant chicken bouillon

Bring all the ingredients to a boil and simmer, covered, for 20 minutes. Remove from the heat and let the rice rest until all the moisture is absorbed.

MAGIC COCONUT PIE

This dessert is easy to make and so delicious!

- 2 cups milk
- 3/4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup biscuit mix
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup shredded coconut

Combine milk, sugar, biscuit mix, eggs, butter and vanilla in a blender. Blend on low for 3 minutes. Pour into a greased 9-inch pie pan and let stand for 5 minutes. Sprinkle with coconut and bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Serve warm or cool.

Event expands

International influence growing

Since the North American International Auto Show adopted its international format in 1989, the show has grown in influence around the globe. In 1991, 700 corporate representatives from 27 import automobile manufacturers attended.

Representatives from Asian-based companies totaled 343, while there were 349 representatives from European-based companies. On the media side, 250 foreign journalists representing 19 countries covered the 1991 show. Over the first three international shows, there have been 60 new product introductions and 60 concept vehicle introductions.

In this interview, show co-chairmen Gordon Stewart and Carl Fischer, Detroit Auto Dealers Association President Kenneth Meade and show general manager Dan Hayes discuss how the show has gained its status and what lies ahead.

Q What objectives did you have in mind when the show adopted its international format in 1989?

Fischer: In 1989, it was obvious to the organizers of the show, and the industry as a whole, that the automobile industry was no longer focusing on individual markets. The market was becoming international and we needed to make our show reflect this.

Stewart: We also wanted to redefine Detroit's position as the center of the auto industry, and to serve the needs of the manufacturers displaying vehicles.

Meade: When we were originally going to the international scope, we visited all the other great international auto shows in the world — Geneva, Tokyo, Frankfurt, Paris — and tried to learn from them. I think it's obvious we did learn, and one of our goals was to reach the stature they had attained. Our effort has been rewarded by the recognition of the OICA (Organization of International Constructors of Automobiles) as the only international show in North America.

Hayes: Participating in an auto show is not inexpensive, and we wanted to provide our exhibitors with the most value for their dollar as well. Value comes in the form of media coverage, so another of our goals was to take care of the news media the best way we could. Of course, that's a two-sided issue, because we needed the support of the manufacturers, which we had. So we've dedicated much time and resources to making sure that once the news media arrived they'd be taken care of. This came in the form of the Michelin Media Center, which is one of the most comprehensive and service-oriented media centers in the world.

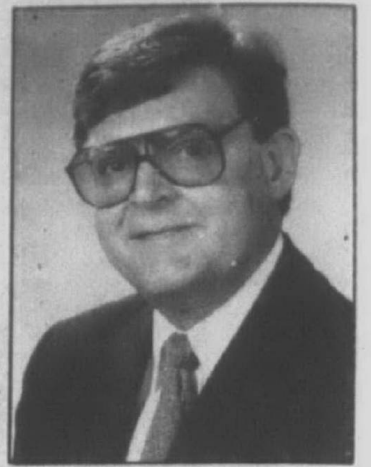
Q: Why do so many automotive executives attend the NAIAS?

Meade: The auto manufacturers have recognized the North American International Auto Show as the concept car show of the world. Over the past three years, the NAIAS has provided the venue for the introductions of more than 60 concept cars. Auto shows often are excellent places to judge the public's impression of potential automotive designs, and some concepts are so well received at auto shows that production plans are put into action. Take the Viper. In 1989, it was a concept car, and

in 1992 it goes into production. Chrysler introduced the 300 as a concept car at our show last year and Europeans will place orders for them now at \$150,000 each.

Fischer: The executives recognize the quality of journalists who attend the show. They also recognize how important a role concept cars can play — they bring media coverage, they display company capabilities and design, and the public loves to look at the future. If the press and public create enough demand, and it is affordable, then they'll build it.

Q: How did the NAIAS become the concept car show of the world?

Stewart: We created a venue for the manufacturers to do what they wanted to do — to explode within it. The manufacturers seized upon it — they're the ones who really sensed the opportunity. We thought there was an opportunity, but they knew there was one. Individually, they almost challenged each other and created this escalating contest between them to achieve the most notoriety and the most introductions. By doing so, they attracted more and more of the world's press.

Hayes: And as a result, I think the press gets more bang for their buck, and more quality stories to cover. This gives them more opportunities to talk to the real key figures in the industry.

But one thing we did do was create a truly international show. Ours is not a nationalistic show — although the domestics are prominent in it — we have given Infiniti, Lexus, Mercedes, BMW, BAMA and all the others the proper positions on the floor, press conference times and treatment they deserve. As a result, we've created a fair venue, and one that manufacturers take advantage of.

Q: It sounds like the manufacturers make good use of the show.

Fischer: I think they're excited

about our show. They're excited about the coverage that CNN gives to the show that goes around the world. We also have established good working relationships with the morning shows — this provides a national audience. Our show also is formed into a one-hour nationally syndicated special. It all comes down to the fact the manufacturers can see they get so much press here. But they get a lot of press because manufacturers don't just have a car on display, they have 40 or 100 executives, designers, engineers and so on available to talk about that car. Their excitement shows, because they'll come to Detroit to talk about their products, their capabilities and their visions.

Stewart: And we see the excitement from around the globe. Pininfarina will be here again for the third straight year. The British Auto Manufacturers Association will be here again. Mercedes and BMW will both increase their presence in 1992. It's obvious to me they all want to be in Detroit — it's the automotive capital of the world.

Meade: With the car business changing so rapidly today, I think the manufacturers truly need a show like ours — especially in North America. They can see the public reaction to their cars, the international reaction, measure it, and go about their business.

TIDBITS ABOUT automobiles from Copley News Service:

• What customer characteristic do car manufacturers value most? Loyalty. As far as marketing costs are concerned, it costs two-thirds less to sell a car to a loyal customer than to a fickle one.

• Until recently, all Japanese automakers had to do was make cars in order to sell them. However, domestic car manufacturer are offering more competitive choices and Japanese companies, including Toyota and Honda, have started offering incentives to attract buyers.

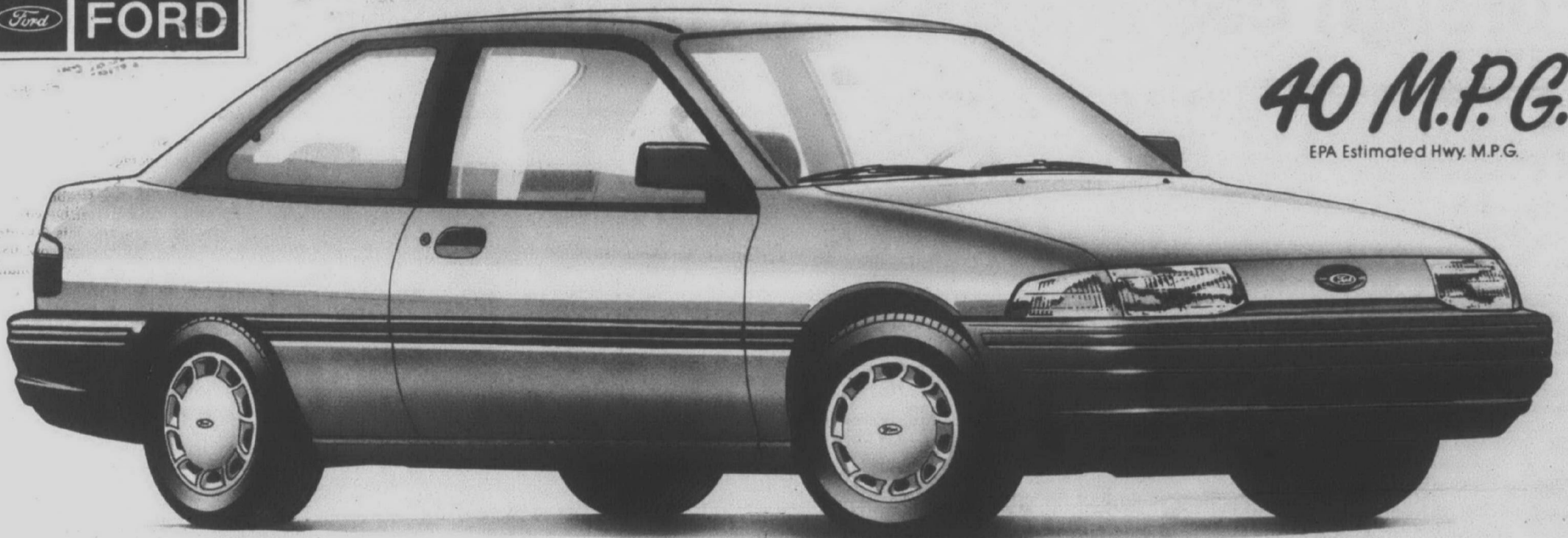

Ultralite flirts with 100 mpg

VISITORS TO the North American International Auto Show who expect to see experimental cars that combine high performance, impressive fuel economy and state-of-the-art engineering won't be disappointed with GM's newest offering: the aerodynamic Ultralite concept car.

GM's 1,400-pound sedan, with a fuel economy rating of 100 mpg on the highway at 50 mph, made its debut during the show's press days this week.

Helping to achieve outstanding fuel use is the car's feather-weight body (only 420 pounds) made of carbon-fiber composites. Ultralite is 165 inches long — the same as the Mazda MX-3 — with a wheelbase comparable to the Lexus LS 400. It easily seats four adult-size passengers, with interior room similar to the Chevrolet Corsica.

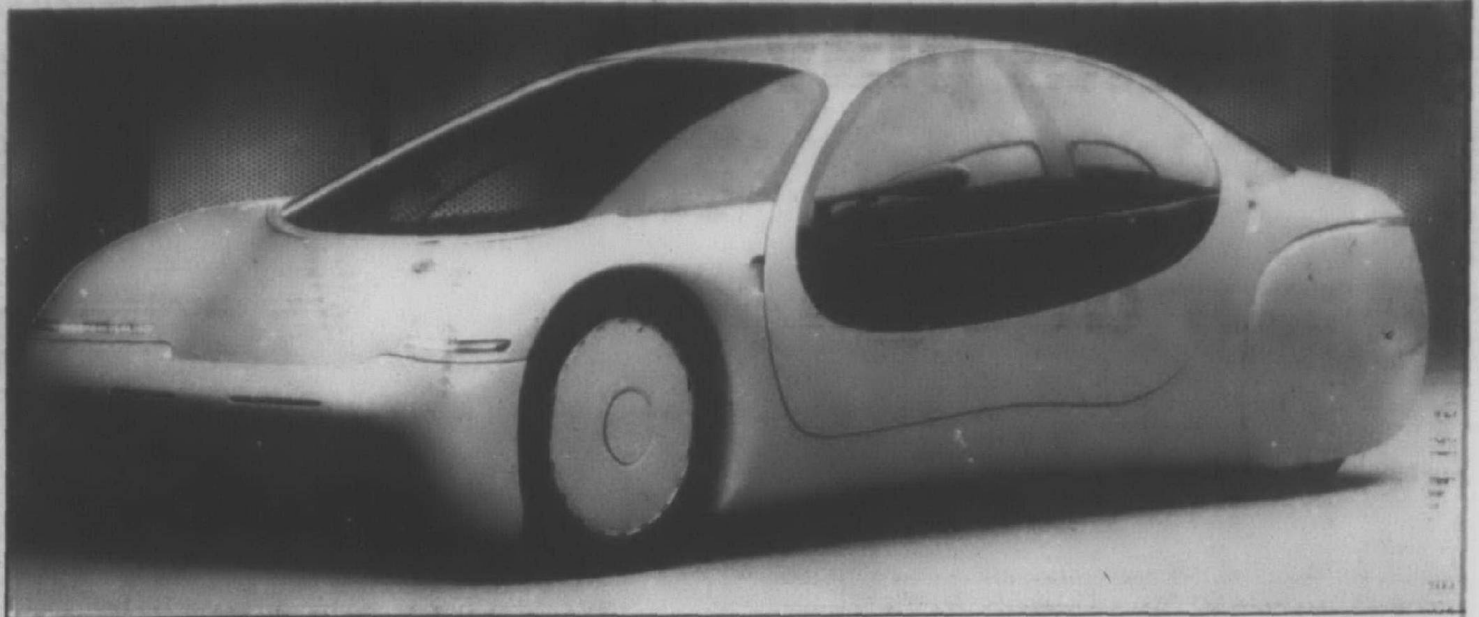
Ultralite's experimental 1.5 liter, three-cylinder, two-stroke engine

enables the car to accelerate from zero to 60 mph in under eight seconds. The engine, transaxle, exhaust and suspensions are housed in a detachable power pod — possibly giving the driver the option of choosing an electric or gas turbine powerplant, said James Lutz, advanced engineering staff program manager for Ultralite.

EFFICIENCY IS evident in the car's heating, ventilation and air conditioning system, which filters out dust and pollen. Insulation properties in the car's outer body material result in less work for the system, which is housed toward the back of the car's central tunnel.

Ultralite's electronic suspension adjusts to an ideal ride height on the highway. Depending on the car's speed, the automatic, computer-controlled leveling system will slightly lower the car's front and rear to reduce air drag.

"A lot of the gains we made in fuel economy can be traced directly to the chassis systems," Lutz said. Inside, Ultralite is designed for

driver comfort and convenience. Seats made of Duofix are thinner and lighter than conventional seats. The material actually reduces road vibration. The speedometer and other gauges are lit with the latest in technology.

Ultralite — the fourth in a series of fuel efficient, environmentally sensitive concept cars designed by GM — has a short hood and tapered shape with gull-wing doors adding to an overall high-tech look.

Prominent, low rolling resistance Goodyear tires on 18-inch wheels add to the car's appearance and fuel efficiency.

"CONCEPT CARS that look like bubble-topped motorcycles have been done," said Gary Dickinson, technical staffs group vice president. "We wanted to take a shot at designing a fuel-efficient vehicle with real-car passenger utility and comfort."

Charles Jordan, GM's vice president in charge of the design staff, added: "It's tough developing an efficient aerodynamic package for four people. It's even tougher turning that package into an exciting car."

Don't expect a car like Ultralite in dealer showrooms soon. For now, carbon fiber — a lightweight, sturdy material used in the aerospace industry — is hard to

manufacture and too expensive to use for large-scale automotive applications.

Carbon fiber, though lighter and more rigid than aluminum and steel, costs several times more than either material. The material alone for Ultralite's body would cost about \$13,000 today.

"It is just these hurdles we hope to someday overcome," Dickinson said. "But the Ultralite project is only the first step in the process."

Foreign car makers unveil newest designs

HERE'S THE lineup of some of the new and redesigned foreign-made passenger cars you'll see at this year's North American International Auto Show:

● **ACURA VIGOR**

Introduced in March, the all-new 1992 Vigor fills a niche between Acura's Integra and Legend models. Vigor is a four-door sports sedan. It includes a 176-hp, 2.5-liter, five-cylinder engine, five-speed manual or four-speed automatic transmission, independent double-wishbone suspension, anti-lock brakes, driver's-side air bag, leather seats, wood trim and a high-end stereo system.

● **AUDI 100**

The all-new Audi 100 is powered by a 2.8-liter V6 engine. It is available in both front and four-wheel drive models. The mid-size Audi 100 begins the three-model series, the 100, S and CS sedans. The 100 is bigger inside and heavier than the car it replaces by some 250 pounds. It has a sculpted, more vertical profile supported by a slightly broader, more aggressive stance.

● **BMW 325i**

Detroit will see the worldwide introduction of the 325i coupe, a spinoff of the 325i sedan. Many specs for the coupe are the same as the sedan, such as a 2.5-liter, 24-valve dual overhead cam, inline six-cylinder engine with a recyclable one-piece fuel tank. The 325i has increased interior leg room with improved exterior aerodynamics. Safety features include a standard driver's-side air bag and an impact sensor to automatically unlock doors and turn on interior lights after impact.

● **GTB1**

Produced by Monte Carlo Automobile Co., this car will make its North American debut in Detroit. It is the world's first car made completely from carbon with closed cells and flexible honeycomb, the same technology used in Formula One, Indy cars, Group C and IMSA GT sport racing cars. Only 100 will be made at the rate of 10 per year. The power unit will be a 12-cylinder engine by Carlo Chiti, formerly of Alfa Romeo.

● **INFINITI**

The newest addition to the Infiniti line goes on sale this spring as a 1993 model. The J30 has twin projector beam headlights, a broad hood and a wide grille. The luxury sedan also has a sloping trunk, full-width tail lights and an integrated bumper. Standard are power door locks, remote keyless entry, Bose audio system, in-dash disc player, driver's-side and front passenger-side air bags and anti-lock brakes. It is powered by a 3.0-liter, dual overhead cam, 24-valve V6 engine.

● **JAGUAR XJ220**

This 200 mph super car marks its North American debut in Detroit. It topped 212 mph in

speed trials at the Fort Stockton Proving Ground in Texas, making it the world's fastest production car. Only 350 will be built by JaguarSport at Bloxham, England. It will not be sold in the U.S.

● **MERCEDES 600SEC**

Mercedes-Benz will unveil the 600SEC at the Detroit show, the first worldwide introduction by Mercedes in the U.S. The two-door coupe is powered by a 402 hp, 6.0-liter V12 engine. The car will be available in two versions, the V12-powered 600SEC and the 500SEC, which comes with a 322 hp, 5.0-liter V8. Both ultra-exclusive four-seater coupes are offered as 1993 models.

● **MITSUBISHI**

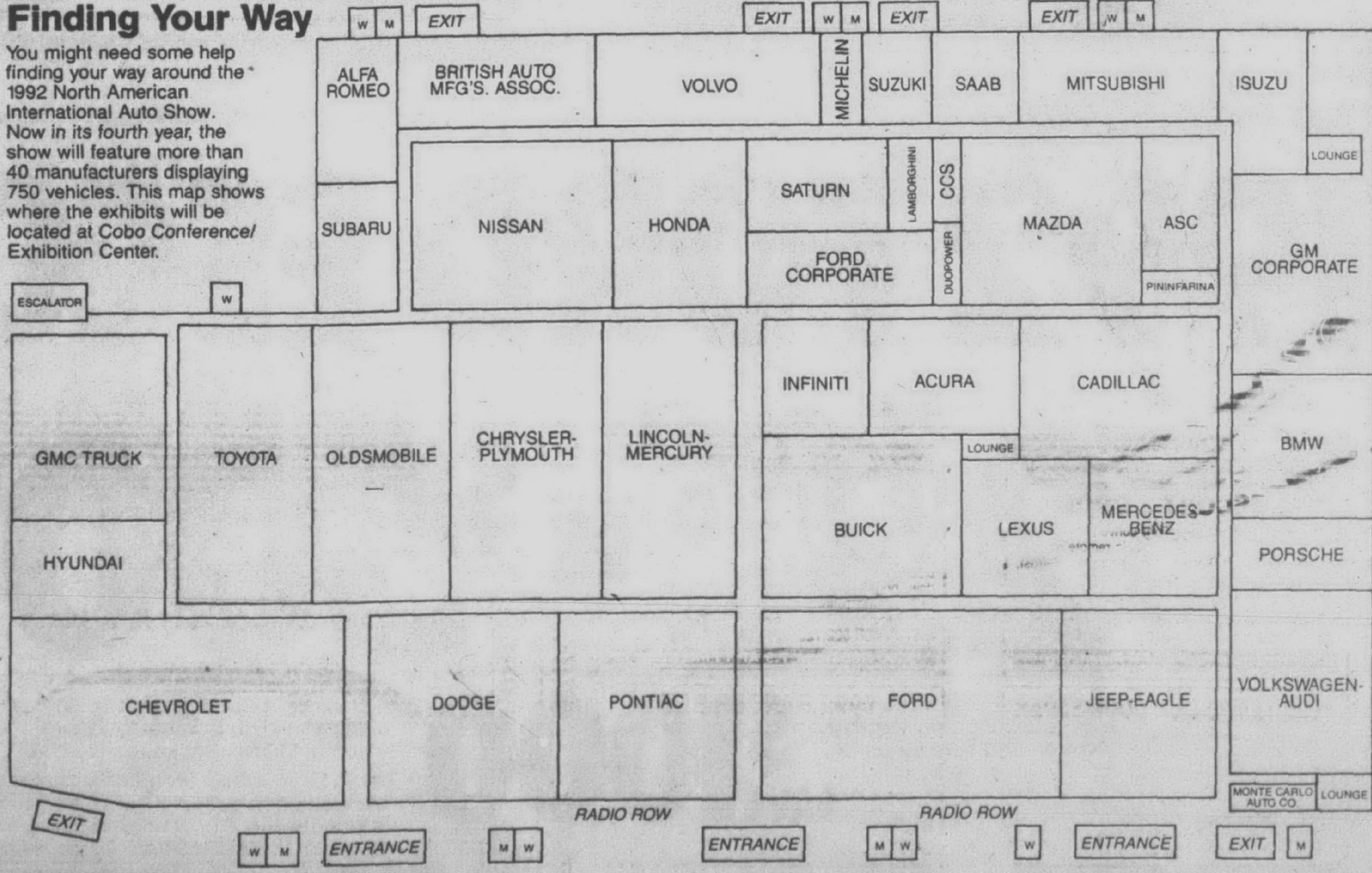
● **Eclipse** — The worldwide introduction of the re-skinned 1992 Eclipse will be in Detroit. The Eclipse lineup will have a choice of three engines, two transmissions and either front or all-wheel drive. The Eclipse and Eclipse GS are powered by a 1.8-liter single overhead cam engine. The GS features a 16-valve, 2.0-liter dual overhead cam engine with two intake and two exhaust valves per cylinder to increase combustion efficiency. Eclipse GS Turbo has a front-drive; the GSX has all-wheel drive. Power-assisted four-wheel disc brakes is standard equipment on all models.

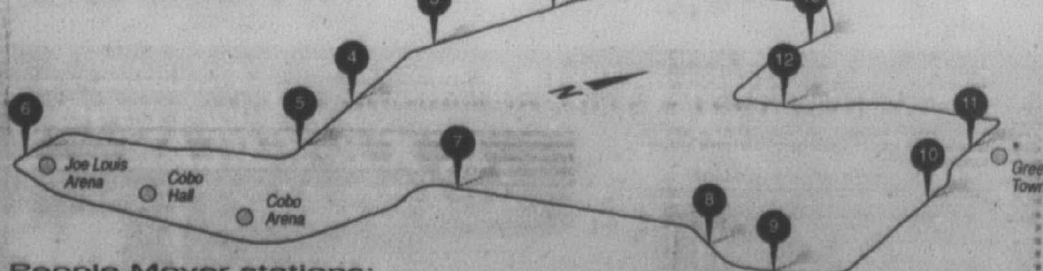

Students play creative part in car design

WHEN PONTIAC and Michelin decided to look for some innovative ideas for the next generation cars, their first stop was the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit.

For a class called Advanced Viscom (or visual communications), 12 Transportation Design majors were asked to work on two separate projects: design a Pontiac Grand AM for the 1996-97 model year and design two concept cars for prototype Michelin tires.

The results — which judges call "outstanding examples of creativity" — will be displayed in separate exhibits at Detroit's North American International Auto Show Jan. 11-19.

The student designers showed their work and met automotive designers from General Motors, Ford, Chrysler, Toyota, Nissan and BMW at a Michelin-sponsored reception at the school.

"Students in our design classes are often asked by automakers to stretch the original design of a car

by adding youthful imagination," said Sandra Braden, CCS's executive assistant to the president.

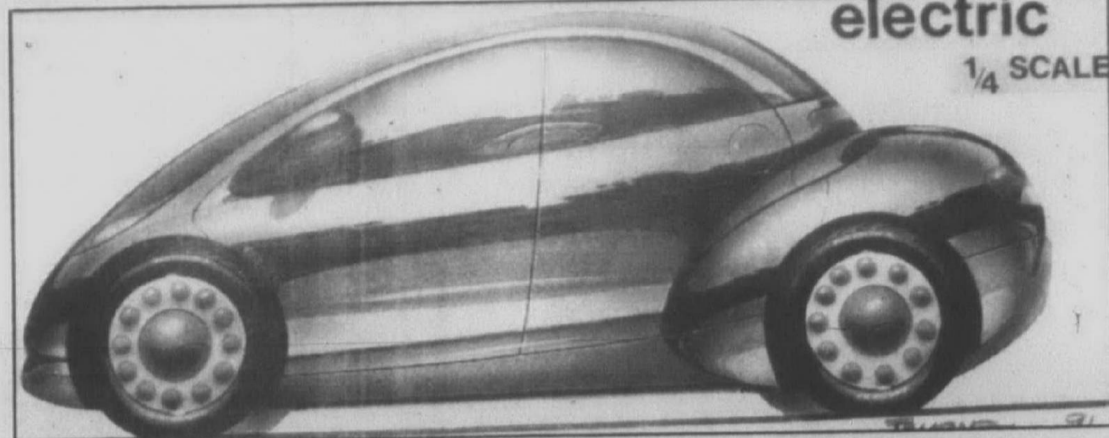
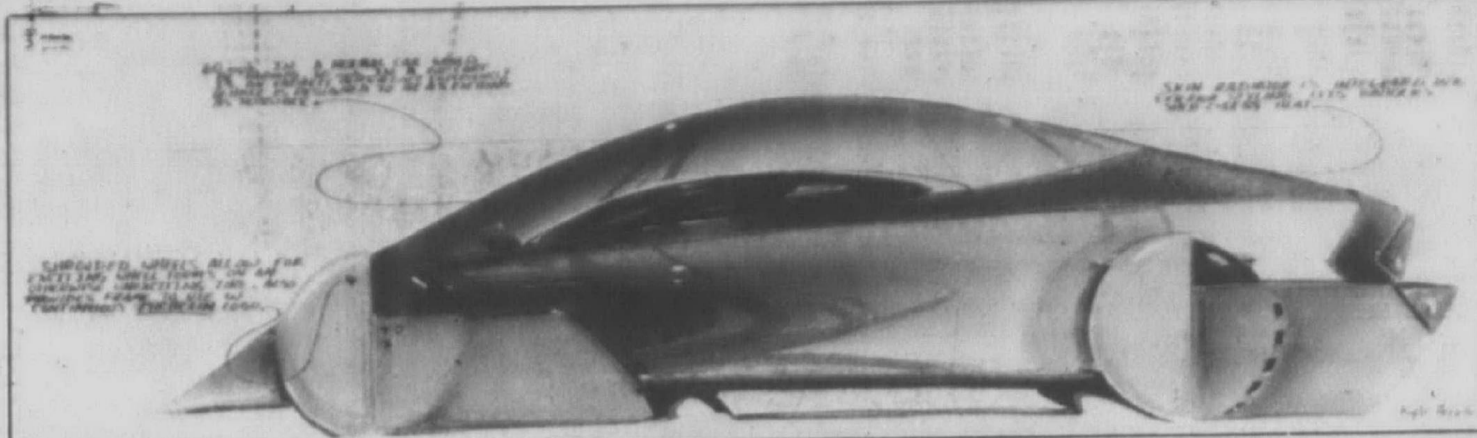
PONTIAC'S ONLY guideline for their project was to design the Grand AM from the exterior to interior, the opposite way automotive designers generally work.

Working in reverse, students were able to familiarize themselves with the car's outer body before planning inside details. Besides that, the senior design students had carte blanche, said John Manooogian, chief designer at Pontiac's Exterior Studio No. 1.

"We asked students for their most creative solutions to problems without being concerned with cost or technology. We wanted them to try designs they normally wouldn't try for business," Manooogian said.

What Pontiac got were creative drawings (done in felt tip pen and black tape) that often "pushed the envelope of acceptance," said Manooogian, who added, "That's exactly what we wanted."

The Michelin project gave students even greater freedom, since they were developing a car

from imagination, not redesigning an existing one.

Michelin told students to design an "advanced-looking" electric car and a high-speed luxury coupe for which it was developing tires. The results were futuristic, aerodynamic vehicles "that stretch the imagination," said Carl Olson, chairman of CCS's Transportation Design department.

LOCAL WINNERS in the Michelin design competition were Kyle Houchens of Rochester Hills, second place-electric car, and Minhnhut Truong of Southfield, third place-electric car. Winners earned \$1,000 for first place, \$750 for second, \$500 for third. The project was judged by designers from Michelin, Pontiac, Ford and Chrysler.

CCS began exhibiting concept

car drawings at the Detroit auto show four years ago when the show was granted international status.

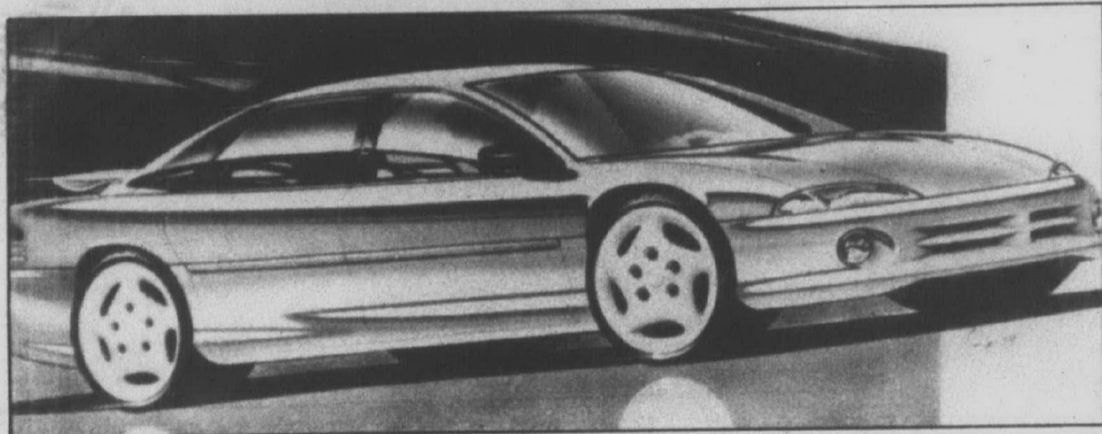
Olson, who lived in Europe before coming to CCS, knew the importance of the international shows in Geneva, Tokyo, Frankfurt and Paris and wanted his students' work exhibited before a worldwide audience here.

"Our designs stretch the limits of

technology — feasibility is a small concern," Olson said. "The most important element our student designers can bring to the automotive industry is creativity."

(Visitors to the auto show can see the student's Michelin project at the Michelin display, between Volvo and Suzuki. The Pontiac project will be in the CCS display, between Mazda and Lamborghini.)

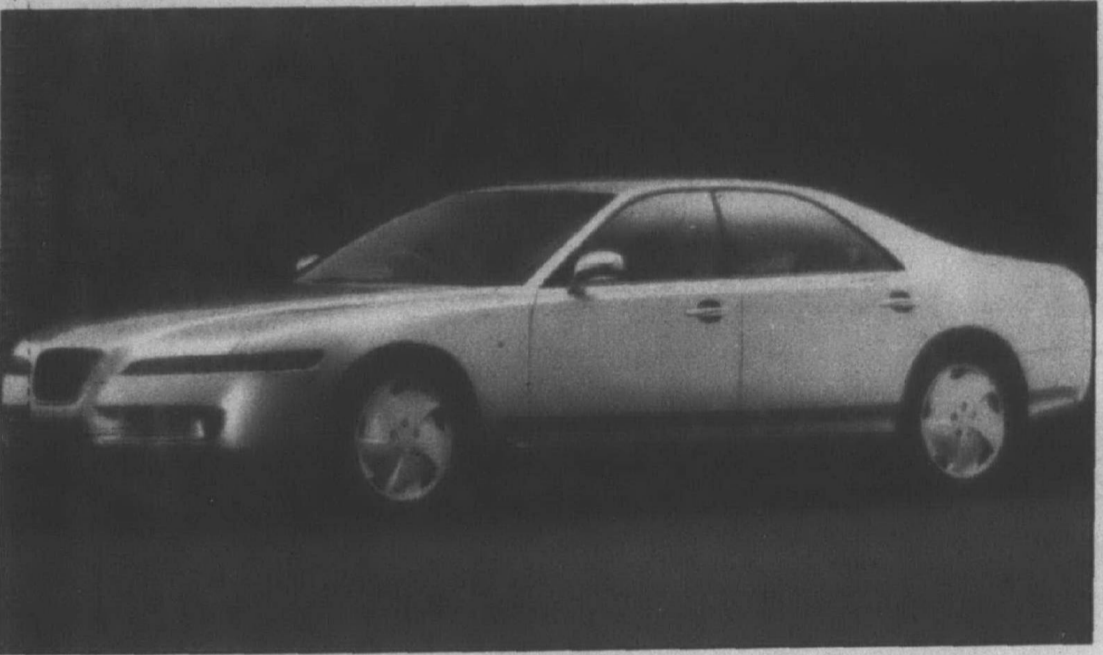
Honda's aim: lightweight, fuel efficient

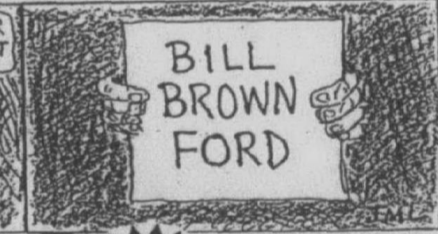

Green-up

Environment takes stage at auto shows

THE WORLD'S great auto shows have always been a stage for new machinery, a place where an incredibly complex industry meets to strut, posture and take sideways glances at its competition.

But a dramatic change is in evidence this year, as major auto shows — Frankfurt, Tokyo and now Detroit — take on some of the trappings of a political convention as well.

Issues important to both the auto industry and general public have been influencing both the speeches and the cars on display. For perhaps the first time, the auto manufacturers not only want to interest people in their wares, they want to be listened to.

The change emerged first at West Germany's Frankfurt auto show, held last spring — as usual, the first major European show, the gathering that traditionally provides the litmus test of new automotive technology heading for the world's markets.

For decades, Frankfurt has been the venue where horsepower wars begin, where roadholding claims are argued and the major Italian designers demonstrate why every major auto manufacturer in the world turns to Turin for advice on how a proper car should look.

THIS YEAR, the theme was air pollution. A decades-old issue in the United States, dating back to ancient talk-show jokes about Los Angeles smog, air pollution in West Germany was identified strongly with the observed decimation of trees just a decade ago — a circumstance that quickly led to the establishment of the so-called "greens," a political movement that quickly attracted such a large following, it became one of the strongest common grounds transcending countries and political parties.

In fact, Europe has lagged decades behind both the U.S. and Japan in adopting catalytic converters, setting emission standards and experimenting with alternative fuels. A good deal of the pro-environmental rhetoric has been aimed at the European auto industry as a result, and has escalated to include charges that even the no-speed-limit German autobahn network is wasting fuel.

The need to refute some of these charges, and promote the notion that Europe's auto industry is in fact socially responsible, prompted the green theme to emerge full-blown at Frankfurt this year.

Virtually every manufacturer sought, with some success, to point to an aspect of the business that solved some environmental problem or other.

VOLKSWAGEN AND BMW unveiled new electric cars, and both companies claimed to have solved the problem of re-acquiring and re-using plastics. Volkswagen went so far as to announce it was opening a re-manufacturing plant that ultimately would take in old Golf models, strip them to their basic components, and put them back in the materials stream.

Not all manufacturers found it easy to embrace the theme. Mercedes, introducing a 4,000-pound, V-12 luxury sedan with a sticker price in excess of \$125,000, struggled and squirmed, then brightly pointed out that its 200-mph exotic sports car on display was made of aluminum, hence could be recycled.

Regardless, the tone was set, and a few months later, at Tokyo, the Japanese pulled out all the stops.

The Tokyo Auto show, where U.S. and European manufacturers normally expected to be scared to death by new Japanese gadgets and auto technology, became a showplace where U.S. and European manufacturers were scared to death by a plethora of electric cars, new engines, experimental transmissions and even one concept car claiming 100 miles per gallon.

IT WAS fairly easy to dismiss the Japanese demonstrations as a public relations effort. Japan has been notoriously lax in enforcing its own environmental laws against industrial pollution and late in assessing Tokyo air quality.

But in recent years, this has been changing rapidly, with stiff laws and stiffer enforcement changing the industrial climate substantially. Underlying the Tokyo displays was the reality that most of the cars were headed overseas anyway, and it was crucial that Japanese cars stay current with the demands in the

U.S. and Europe.

All of which leads up to Detroit, which has emerged in recent years as a major forum for world auto issues, as well as a stepping-off point for new hardware.

The "green theme" pursued at Frankfurt and Tokyo is being shipped wholesale to Detroit, where U.S. consumers will get their first look at the likes of Nissan's and BMW's electric cars; the Honda high-efficiency engine; and even Mercedes and Audi's outrageous, but all-aluminum sports cars.

BUT IT'S a theme that mixes uncomfortably with the reality of the U.S. market today. In fact, the auto analysts that gather in

Detroit to debate current issues will be addressing the trade-offs that ultimately will follow a spate of environmental legislation — nothing like the wholesale embracing of the concept that emerged at Tokyo and Frankfurt.

In the midst of a deep recession, and anxious to rekindle public enthusiasm about cars in general and the 1992s in particular, the Detroit show this year ends up as a more traditional marketing onslaught, rather than a public issue forum.

Leading the way is Chrysler, which is anxious to quickly gain notoriety for its new intermediates due out in mid-year, and an all-new Jeep model that will be built in the

new Jefferson Avenue plant. The new models are being pitched as the cars that will "save" Chrysler, and sales acceptance is certainly critical to the survival of the company.

Likewise, the new Ford Taurus, GM intermediates and new Ford and Chevy trucks represent the largest investment in new models seen in several years.

IN THE background is ongoing debate in the U.S. Congress about extending emission standards or tightening fuel economy requirements. The U.S. already lives with the tightest safety and emission standards, and manufacturers are resisting any further legislation.

The result is an odd conflict between hoopla and a general celebration of new models intended to lead the industry out of the doldrums, and a plethora of concept cars making a political statement from Europe and Japan.

The green theme that emerged in Germany, and gained so much momentum in Tokyo, arrives in Detroit to confront glitz and hardware. The result is likely to add some drama to Detroit's effort, an underlying conflict that should make Detroit the most interesting of all.

"Against Her Will" Finds Matthau in top form

Slow start yields fascinating story

Multiple award-winner Walter Matthau is seen all too rarely on television, so it's good to report that his latest project for the small screen is as good as the last.

In 1990, Matthau starred in "The Incident," playing small-town lawyer Harmon Cobb. Harry Morgan played irascible Judge Stoddard Bell and Susan Blakely costarred as Harmon's daughter-in-law, Billie. "The Incident" was praised by critics and viewers alike and won the Emmy for Outstanding Dramatic Special. Brothers Michael and James Norell, who scripted the film, were honored with Christopher and Writers Guild awards.

Now, Harmon Cobb returns, when CBS presents "Against Her Will: An Incident in Baltimore" on Sunday, Jan. 19. Matthau reprises his role, as do Morgan and Blakely. Delbert Mann directs from a teleplay by the Norells.

In 1947, Harmon moves to Baltimore to take a position with Judge Bell, now retired.

Accompanying him are Billie (widowed in the last film) and his granddaughter, Nancy. Although grateful for the opportunity, Harmon soon finds the practice of civil law dull and unfulfilling. Then, by chance, he meets an anguished young man and learns of Marika. Five years previously, the young woman had voluntarily committed herself to a state hospital to be treated for depression. (A psychiatrist had advised the movie, since private care was unaffordable.) Trouble is, now they won't let her out. Her angry, devoted fiancé implores Harmon to free Marika from the asylum. But how?

Harmon's task is complicated because of Maryland's status as a commonwealth, which adheres to "sovereign immunity"; the state cannot be sued. An arduous search through history may reveal a precedent allowing him to bring suit, but he still will have to convince the jury Marika is "cured" or that the hospital is unfit.

The Norell brothers' skillful script balances intelligence with strong emotional resonance.

Harmon still grieves over his son's wartime death; his resentment when Billie starts dating comes as no surprise. The alternately warm and combative relationship between Harmon and crusty Judge Bell is fascinating, particularly as the judge's real reason for taking Harmon into his practice comes to light. When Harmon meets Marika in the refurbished coal bin that is her room at Walnut Hill, he is stunned by what he encounters: a place of ceaseless noise and palpable misery.

The acting in "Against Her Will" is first-rate. Matthau endows Cobb with a craggy nobility, making him a plain-spoken soldier for justice. Morgan is an endearing curmudgeon as Judge Bell and Susan Blakely fares well as Billie. Among supporting players, Barton Heyman is brilliant as Donald, another "patient" and Marika's devoted friend. Heyman's timid testimony is moving and powerful.

Viewers should be advised that "Against Her Will" starts slowly and seems unpromising. Once it catches fire, however (in a fine clash between Matthau and Morgan), the movie never stops and emerges as a vivid reminder of what television is capable of achieving.

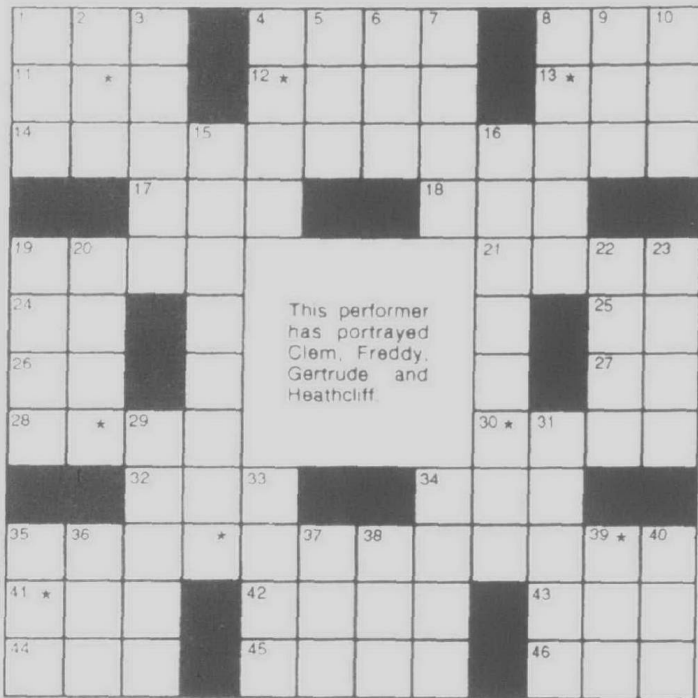

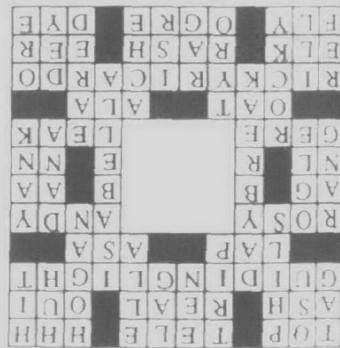

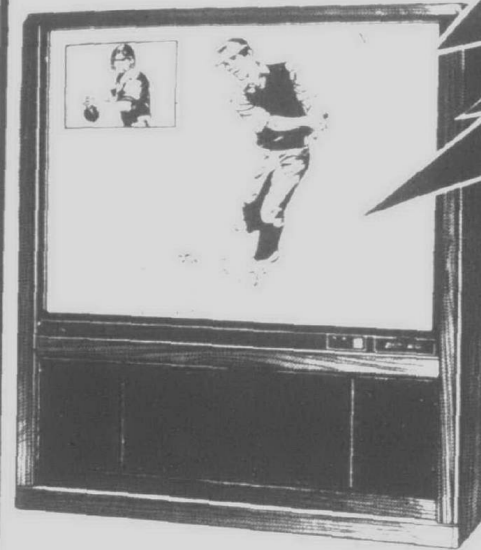
