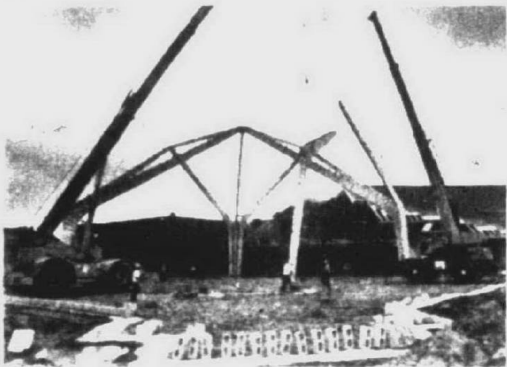

Officials call cut and cap proposal irresponsible

Plymouth Canton school officials say that while Gov. John Engler's cut and cap tax cutting proposal has voter appeal, it's really nothing more than another irresponsible action by the Republican state Legislature.

Cut and cap, which voters will see as Proposal C on the ballot in November, would amend the state Constitution to phase in over five years a 30 percent property tax cut.

Increases in individual property assessments would be capped at three percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less.

The state's general fund would reimburse school districts for revenue lost through the tax cut, but not through the assessment cap.

Cut and cap could mean having to cut 5 percent out of our budget each year for the next five years, said Superintendent John Hoedel. "There's no equity here whatsoever, yet it has appeal to voters."

Cut and cap would be devastating to schools, said associate superintendent for business Ray Hoedel. The plan reduces operating taxes by 30 percent over five years, 10 percent the first year, 15 the next and 20 the next until you get to the fifth year when you get a 30 per-

cent reduction. That cut is supposed to be reimbursed by the state. But since no new taxes are associated with this, the big question is, where is the state going to get the money to reimburse school districts?

"We believe they are not going to get the revenue, so what will happen to our formula districts like Plymouth Canton?"

Hoedel predicts the state will discontinue paying its share of employees' Social Security and retirement.

"Cut and cap has the tendency to limit funds again to schools, which we think is a little bit on the border of irresponsibility," said Hoedel. "Everyone

wants a tax cut, but no one really wants to consider the major impact it's going to have on the public school system, and that's ridiculous. We're going to do it."

The school board will meet at a workshop Saturday, Oct. 15, to discuss the proposal and other tax proposals. The board meets November 8 for a general election.

"We're inviting the community to come as well as our parents to discuss the impact of the tax proposals on the schools," said Hoedel. "We are trying to do for the benefit of the school, leading up to that is to gather the information to protect the impact on the

While the Olive Garden restaurant is a small business, the General Mills Foundation contributes a small portion of funding to a Minneapolis Planned Parenthood chapter, according to officials from the restaurant.

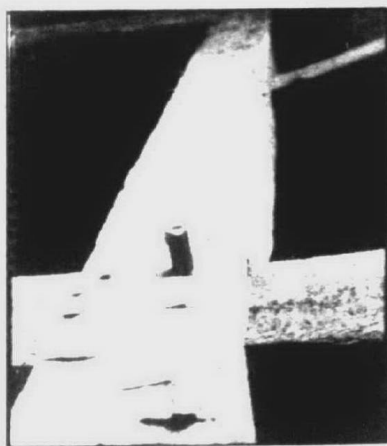

Bits of history

Collectors may buy pieces of old barn, farm

The 150-year-old farmhouse and barn are going to be demolished anyway, so Pat Mills is selling it off bit by bit.

The farmhouse and barn, located in western Canton Township, is slated to be razed yet this fall. The property owner has told tenant Mills to sell whatever is there.

The house has been changed so much over the years and the barn is in such poor shape there is no reason to save it, Mills said. "It is sad to see something that has survived so many years be torn down, but at least this way bits of it will be put to use."

Mills rents the house from developers of a neighboring subdivision. They purchased the land in 1988 for \$1.5 million.

Mills searched for the reasons and means to save the structure, but found the costs to be extravagant and very little true historic value.

The mortise and tenon construction of the barn is appealing to those searching for bits of history, and several people have stopped by asking to have pieces of the siding. To dismantle the entire barn would be quite expensive, Mills said. But the siding comes off fairly easily.

The barn is nearly two stories tall and

was once used to house horses. The loft was taken years ago and the south end is nearly destroyed as a result of the more recent construction. There are a few pieces of original hardware in the structure, but Mills plans to take those with her.

There are some usable timbers in the barn and an old pulley, but both would be difficult to remove without knocking the entire structure down. The siding is worth rescuing first.

There was one man who was interested in paneling his family room with the siding, said Mills who has put up with questions from passersby since she moved into the house.

The house belonged to tenant farmers so the woodwork and floors are not of much value, Mills said. It was once occupied by some of the first settlers of the area.

"The house is really very sound," Mills said. "The plaster walls in the front of the house are original and you can barely even drive a nail into them they're so hard."

Mills will be taking along some old light fixtures, but there is little else from the house that she wants to keep.

She just hopes others will find some enjoyment in the pieces of the house that will live on.

Renovations cause some pains as school resumes

The good news: Voters' recent approval of a \$50-million bond issue spelled capital improvements for just about every building in the Plymouth-Canton school district.

The bad news: Not all the renovations are complete, and that's going to cause some inconveniences for students and staff during the new school year.

Administrators say the week is scheduled to create as little disruption as possible.

Some of the projects are ongoing, said Ray Hoodell, associate superintendent for business. "We're trying to keep any disruption down to a minimum. There will be some little inconveniences in some cases, but we are making an all-out effort to keep that to a minimum."

Expected per-pupil budget range from \$6,000 at Hillsdale Elementary to \$12 million at each of the high schools.

When Salem High School students started school this week, they were happy to see their cramped cafeteria has been expanded to more than double its original size. New roofs at Salem and the Phase Three building renovation will be a thing of the past.

Canton High School athletic facilities have been upgraded, and renovations are scheduled for classrooms there.

Fiber optic lines and cable are being laid in all school buildings for the eventual installation of high-tech equipment that will give teachers access to materials via satellite communications, cable TV, laser and video discs, and teleconferencing.

Electrical, plumbing and playground improvements have been made at several schools.

Construction of two new elementary schools in Canton—one on Warren Road and a second on Shelton—should be completed by September 1993.

Work at Central Middle School hit a few snags. Some teachers who came to the former high school last week to organize their classrooms found rolls of electrical cables, lumber, carpet and other materials in their rooms.

A sub-standard painting job and time-consuming asbestos removal among other things contributed to delays, Central Principal Pat Moore said.

"The original paint crew that came into this building did a very sub-standard job. The main office and teachers' lounge—two major areas for renovation—were painted in white flat ceiling paint. That had to be re-painted three or four times

simply because it wouldn't stay clean. We really needed some gloss."

Our office (which was remodelled) was promised to us July 8. We got in this week Monday.

Problems notwithstanding, Central was ready for students when school started Tuesday.

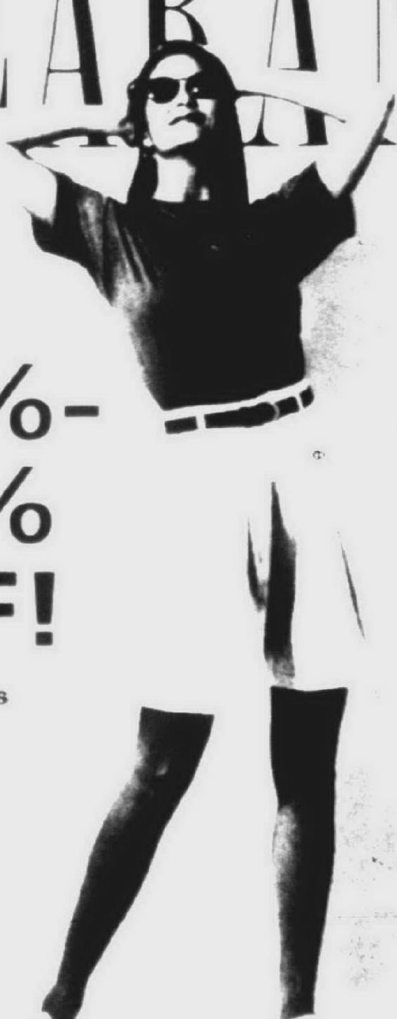
"Our custodians worked almost round the clock all weekend long just to get things presentable," Moore said.

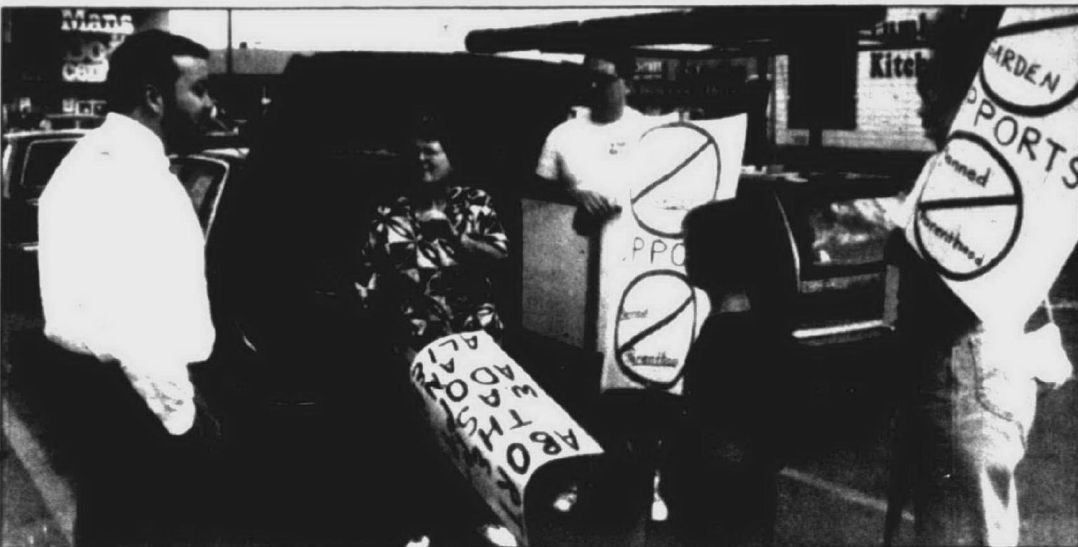
"The Olive Garden does not take a stand on abortion," Tate said. "That is viewed as a strictly personal decision and not a business decision."

The General Mills Foundation is operated as a separate entity, Tate said. The Foundation contributes in excess of \$10 million each year to groups such as the Boy Scouts of America and the American Red Cross. Funds that are given to Planned Parenthood are earmarked for specific education purposes and not for any issue related to abortion, Tate said.

Graham argues that money is easily shifted to one account from another.

Court orders cleanup of Greenwood home

Residents of Greenwood Street in Canton Township are finally seeing some progress in the cleaning up of what they considered a neighborhood eyesore.

Property owner Alexander Biedron pleaded guilty Monday to five ordinance violations, according to Ordinance Officer Miles Davis.

District Court Judge James Garber ordered Biedron to clean up his yard within 14 days or the township would clean it up and send the bill to him.

Biedron also had to pay \$375 in court costs and fines, and will be on probation for one year.

"During the year we will check up on him and if the yard is not maintained, the township can step in," Davis said.

Biedron did not show up on his court date, so he was picked up by police on a bench warrant, Davis said. He was released on his own recognizance and appeared in court Monday for a hearing.

Greenwood residents have been complaining to the township for three years about their neighbor. Grass had grown to nearly three feet and the inground swimming pool

was filled with black, stagnant water. Several residents said they saw rats on the property going through garbage which had been left in piles.

As of Monday afternoon, the grass had been cut and many of the shrubs had been trimmed back. Neighbors expressed relief and said they hoped the home would be maintained on a regular basis.

Tax proposal headed back to ballot

It's back. A proposed 0.5 mill county tax increase for social service programs to benefit the neediest Wayne County residents was placed on the fall ballot last week by county commissioners.

A similar proposal failed by a 60-40 margin during the Aug. 4 county primary.

Also on the ballot, at least for

now, are a series of county charter amendments.

The amendments would "use the separation of powers concept" to determine the relationship between county branches of government, boost the county auditor general's ability to conduct audits, require county commission approval of pay and benefits for non union execu-

tive's office employees and require the executive to file an office reorganization plan with the commission every four years.

The measures are opposed by Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara but were approved for the ballot by county Clerk James Killeen.

McNamara could appeal to the

county election commission, a three member panel including Killeen, county Treasurer Raymond Wojtowicz and chief Probate Judge Freddie Burton.

Supporters say the measures would make county government more responsive, foes say they would unfairly limit the executive's authority.

Realtors: HUD pact will boost open housing

Studies show metro Detroit is one of the most heavily segregated areas in the U.S., but area Realtors point to a newly signed agreement as proof of their continuing commitment to fair housing.

A voluntary affirmative marketing agreement, VAMA for short, was signed Wednesday by the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development regional office.

The agreement is a pledge by Realtors to support fair housing. It also provides guidelines for Realtor training.

Approved by HUD Secretary Jack Kemp in July, the document replaces a previous, 17-year-old agree-

ment between the federal government and housing professionals.

"This is a much simpler document," association spokeswoman Marta Saint-James said. "The older one had some very specific provisions."

Despite its less restrictive nature, Saint-James said the document would prove effective.

She noted, however, that fair housing progress in metro Detroit has been slow.

"Bigotry is still a problem," she said. "You're dealing with people's guts, how they feel inside."

Though it didn't prompt the new agreement, housing segregation has long been a major area issue.

Robert Willis, vice president of the South Oakland NAACP chap-

ter, said "steering" is still a problem.

"I've never been told I couldn't buy a home in a specific neighborhood, but when I was looking to buy a home in Beverly Hills I had a real estate person try to steer me into another area," he said.

Minorities who integrate certain communities still feel a "chilling effect," including cross burnings and additional harassment.

"You're not going to find a lot of African Americans in Dearborn or Sterling Heights," he said. "African Americans don't feel comfortable there."

There were 102 complaints filed with the HUD fair housing office over the past 12 months, including rentals and home sales, office director Ruth Featherstone said.

"That's fairly typical," she said.

Realtors currently receive six hours of training in fair housing law provisions — one hour through the state Department of Commerce, three through the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and two more through a Realtors association program called "Project Pride."

Realtors are members of a trade organization representing about 750,000 real estate professionals nationwide.

Saint-James, a native of Argentina, said fair housing is her personal crusade.

"I've lived all over the world," she said. "In some places, I was in the majority, in others the minority. I know what it feels like."

Fine gifts shop thrives under husband and wife team

Plymouth's Ronald and Barbara Heslop say they're considering expanding their successful bridal registry and tabletop business to Ohio, or even farther.

"There's the possibility of maybe taking it nationwide," said company president Ronald Heslop.

"We're definitely thinking of Ohio in '93. We'd like to see what happens this fall and Christmas."

Since opening their first card and gift store in 1975, the business has grown to include 14 stores in Michigan — nine in metro Detroit.

The Heslops built their business around the premise that today's time-constrained shoppers, including bridal registrants, want to see the entire china assortment on the selling floor.

Customers can enter any Heslop's location and choose from 1,500 patterns of china, crystal stemware and silverware.

They've also succeeded at running a business together for 17 years and staying together.

That contradicted the advice of their lawyer back in 1975, who told them he'd never seen a lasting husband-and-wife business partnership.

"That was probably the best thing he could have told us,"

Ronald Heslop said.

"We decided this wasn't going to happen," he said, so they set up some ground rules about running the business.

"They haven't been put to the test a lot, but they have from time to time," he said.

Barbara decides the look of the stores, supervising all merchandising and store operations. Ronald handles all financial matters, including negotiating leases, determining new store locations and overseeing the accounting and purchasing departments.

"It's like you draw this invisible line," she said.

And if there is a difference of opinion, Barbara, being the vice president, defers to the president — Ronald.

One might view the bridal registry tabletop industry as somewhat recession proof, as people are always getting married.

"It is recession proof, but yes, the recession has also affected us," Ronald Heslop said.

Then again, "There is a trend toward more formal dining and entertaining at home," Barbara Heslop said.

Of other trends, the Heslops say brides and grooms are older now than they were when they started the business. "The average age is 24 and a half," Ronald Heslop said.

"It's an older, more sophisticated couple. And we're seeing more and more of the grooms accompanying the brides," he said.

As for china, "There is a trend toward a more sophisticated type of pattern, rather than the old traditional tiny flowers."

The Heslops have recently completed three major remodelings of current stores, in Livonia, Novi and Dearborn Heights.

Since moving here a year ago, the couple said they really enjoy Plymouth.

"Last week, we took a day off and walked the entire downtown," Ronald Heslop said. "We had lunch at the Cozy Cafe and I bought a suit next door, at Milano's."

The company maintains a 70,000-square-foot corporate office and distribution center at the headquarters in Novi, on Heslop Drive.

The youngest of the family's two sons, Tom, supervises the staff in the corporate office and distribution center.



Mallett calls high court rival 'part of the problem'

Justice Conrad Mallett Jr. says his election challenger is part of the state Supreme Court's problem, not its solution.

Mallett was appointed in 1990 by outgoing Gov. James Blanchard and nominated Sunday for a two-year term by Michigan Democrats.

Michael Talbot, a Wayne Circuit judge and the Republican nominee, gained fame in 1989 when he handed out a so-called "basketball score" sentence of 100 to 200 years for second-degree murder.

"That case," said Mallett, "caused the Michigan Supreme Court to develop a rule of law called proportionality in direct response to what it perceived as Judge Talbot's irresponsibility."

"They had to create, at great taxpayer expense, a huge examination process because of the imposition of a disproportionate sentence. In the past, the Supreme Court relied on

the trial judges to behave in a constitutionally appropriate manner.

"They had to create a new constitutional rule to compensate for his abrupt departure from the norm of judicial decorum," Mallett said.

Talbot was reversed on a 4-3 vote of the justices in 1989, a year before Mallett was on the bench. Talbot is making that ruling an election issue.

"People rely on the Michigan Supreme Court to behave in a constitutionally responsible manner," Mallett said. "We are not charged with the responsibility of putting people in jail."

"The court in People vs. Moore said you cannot circumvent the law by sentencing them to death (dying in prison). The Legislature said nothing about that being a life offense. But you say, 'I'm going to depart from the statutes created by the Legislature and sentence them to 300 years.'"

"A judge cannot sentence some-

one to a term greater than the people of Michigan demand."

Open the doors

Talbot cites a study showing the Michigan Supreme Court ranks 49th in the number of opinions it writes. Mallett called it an "apples and oranges" comparison.

"Michigan is one of the few supreme courts in the country that has a purely discretionary responsibility," said Mallett, meaning the court can choose which appeals it will hear.

"Some states, like Virginia, must take death penalty appeals. Some must take all workers compensation

making public every final action taken by the Judicial Tenure Commission."

Mallett was 36 when Blanchard appointed him two years ago, and the ex-governor strongly endorsed him as "a new, youthful justice to give some energy to our state... who can serve us for years."

Talbot has attacked Mallett for never having tried a case, but Justice Patricia Boyle, a Democratic appointee, rose to Mallett's defense.

"You're going to hear a lot from the opposition about being a trial judge," said Boyle as she nominated Mallett. "There's more than one way to prepare to be a justice, and I give you one example: G. Mennen Williams. His courage didn't start the day he put on a black robe."

Boyle said Mallett has "an instinct for truth, a nose for what's false."

Ironically, Boyle voted in the mi-

nority to uphold Talbot's 100-200 year sentence in the murder case.

Kelly nominated

Democrats also nominated Court of Appeals Judge Marilyn J. Kelly, 54, of Bloomfield Township to face Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, the GOP nominee.

Kelly, who served two terms as a Democrat on the state Board of Education in the 1960s and '70s, noted that all three times she had the support of the party, the United Auto Workers, the AF of L and the Michigan Education Association.

Kelly said her campaign would emphasize her knowledge of family law, environmental law, and the concerns of labor and women.

Kelly wrote the Court of Appeals decision that overturned Gov. John Engler's reorganization of the state Department of Natural Resources and elimination of many subordinate panels.



Oakland man tapped for U-M board

Business attorney Larry Deitch, a top money raiser for Michigan Democrats, has been tapped by his party to oversee a \$2 billion public corporation — the University of Michigan.

"U-M is one of our state's most precious resources, one of the five or 10 best universities in America," said the 45-year-old Bloomfield Hills resident with a practice in Southfield.

"But in the last 15 years, Michigan's state appropriation for higher education has declined from fifth among the states to the bottom 30s. I think that is shameful.

"I would like as a member of the board, in cooperation with the other boards, to be a vigorous advocacy group for better funding of higher education.

"That ties into finding ways to hold the line on tuition. We need to continue to make Michigan accessible to people of talent, no matter what their means are," said the father of a UM sophomore.

Deitch noted that Republican regent Neal Nielsen, a Brighton attorney, was quoted as saying he couldn't think of anything nice about the job. "I feel passionately about the University of Michigan and the need to maintain its excellence," Deitch said.

Besides being party treasurer, Deitch also has been a trustee of the Michigan Cancer Foundation, a director of Birmingham's Community House and president of Temple Beth El, general counsel of a bank and a director of several corporations.

nations for eight state education posts.

Deitch was nominated unanimously only after the MEA-endorsed Jack D. Minore, a Flint councilman, conceded.

The other UM nomination went to Rebecca McGowan, an Ann Arbor resident and manager for governmental affairs for the Industrial Technology Institute, a non-profit institute formed in Gov. James Blanchard's years to promote renewal of Michigan's manufacturing base.

Married since 1984 to attorney Michael Staebler, McGowan has been an aide to U.S. Sens. Adlai Stevenson III of Illinois and Frank Church of Idaho and Vice President Walter F. Mondale, working on federal educational issues. She was deputy manager of Mondale's 1984 run for the White House.

"I've been working as a volunteer, particularly with the Center for the Education of Women, which is the organization that provides service and advocacy for women on all three campuses." She expects her six-month-old daughter Margo to

be in the UM class of 2014.

Vouchers hit

A name familiar to area school and community college board members — Kathleen Straus of Detroit — will be a Democratic candidate for State Board of Education.

Formerly a staff member of the Michigan Association of School Boards, Straus now is president of the Center for Creative Studies, with 3,000 students, 30 full-time faculty and many part-time faculty teaching art, design, music and dance in Detroit.

Straus denounced a voucher plan floated at the Republican convention by the Mackinac Center, a conservative think tank in Midland.

"I want to do everything I can to strengthen public education, the backbone of this country. The voucher plan, which would give money to private schools as well as public schools, is the opposite of what I want to do," Straus said.

Straus said it will be "very hard

to work out" a state board-endorsed schools-of-choice plan between public school districts. "How do the kids get to the schools if the parents don't have the resources to get them to the schools?"

Her running mate will be Roman Bochenek, a Detroit resident endorsed by the Michigan Federation of Teachers.

Democrats also nominated:

• For Michigan State University trustees — Dorothy Gonzalez, director of multicultural affairs for the state Department of Mental Health, and retiring U.S. Rep. Bob Traxler of Bay City. Defeated was Shirley Rogers, a Lansing Community College trustee, an officer in an educational secretaries union and endorsed by the MEA.

• For Wayne State University board of governors — Ed Scribner, president of the Metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO and Teamster official, and Denise J. Lewis, attorney and former personnel director of the city of Detroit. MEA's candidate, Javier H. Aguilar, a pharmacist, conceded defeat before a roll call could be taken.

High court nominee ruled against gov

A former language teacher nominated last Saturday by the Democratic party to run against Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley for the Michigan Supreme Court recently gave Gov. John Engler a constitutional spanking over his effort to wipe out boards under the Department of Natural Resources.

Judge Marilyn J. Kelly, of Bloomfield Hills, wrote the majority opinion when the state Court of Appeals declared Engler's sweeping change violated the state constitution.

"(A)lthough he is empowered to transfer (functions), nowhere is the governor granted authority to abolish functions of the boards and commissions of a principal department," Kelly wrote.

"The boards and commissions which (Engler's order) would abolish allow citizens to voice their opinions through public hearings. Some commissions have the authority to make substantial decisions or issue permits."

Kelly said Engler and DNR director Roland Harmes "have failed to set forth any credible evidence establishing that the functions would be preserved under the new DNR. They ask, as a leap of faith, that we believe the new DNR director and staff would have time and resources to perform the functions of 18 boards and commissions."

"We cannot but believe, instead, that the governor's actions have eliminated the hearing function. Therefore, we agree with the trial court that the governor was without authority to abolish the boards and commissions as he did."

Kelly was joined by Judge Myron Wahls. Dissenting was Judge Maureen Pulte Reilly.

Engler will appeal to the state Supreme Court.

Political case

The case has enormous political significance.

It was filed by House Speaker Lewis Dodak, D-Birch Run, two other Democratic representatives and the Senate Democratic floor leader.

Joining as plaintiffs were the

nonpartisan Michigan United Conservation Clubs, several Democratic-leaning environmental groups and David Dempsey, an adviser to former Gov. James Blanchard, a Democrat.

The United Auto Workers and state AFL-CIO filed briefs on behalf of the Democratic position.

Dodak said the ruling "preserves the integrity of the legislative process in our state by upholding the principle of separation of powers."

Former Gov. George Romney, 84 and retired in Bloomfield Hills, filed a brief on behalf of Engler's position. Romney, a leader of the 1961-2 Constitutional Convention, argued that the reorganization section was "self-executing" — that is, it alone gives a governor authority to reorganize a department.

Not so, said Kelly. "The Michigan Supreme Court has specifically found that the provisions . . . are not self-executing" and that the subsequent Executive Organization Act must be read alongside the constitution.

Kelly also wrote that the governor is not immune from a lawsuit which

sought only equitable relief, not monetary damages; and that he lacks authority to appoint the chair of the Natural Resources Commission.

Room for dissent

When the appellate court splits 2-1, the loser frequently goes to the state Supreme Court, and this case is no exception.

The dissenting judge, Reilly, wrote a detailed opinion saying the majority misinterpreted Supreme Court precedents. She attacked the idea that Engler had intruded on the Legislature's power.

"Because the governor has concurrent legislative power with the Legislature . . . to 'make changes in the organization of the executive branch or the assignment of functions among its units,' the governor may accomplish by executive order in that limited area whatever the Legislature might accomplish by the enactment of a statute. Each has veto power over the other," Reilly said.

ROLL CALL REPORT

Senate blocks Treasury from paying for bilingual ballots

Here's how *Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress* were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Aug. 14

SENATE

No on paying for bilingual ballots: By a vote of 35 for and 60 against, the Senate refused to make the U.S. Treasury pick up the costs incurred by states and localities in complying with bilingual ballot legislation (HR 4312).

A yes vote supported federal payment of the cost of bilingual election materials. **Sens. Carl Levin, D, and Donald Riegle, D, voted no.**

Yes on transportation appropriations: By a vote of 74 for and 22

against, the Senate approved a bill to appropriate \$13.5 billion for the Department of Transportation and related agencies in fiscal 1993, including \$282 million for the Federal Highway Administration.

While the Senate version of the bill (HR 5518) authorizes no new congressionally mandated highways, it provides nearly \$300 million for demonstration projects previously authorized by Congress.

A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Carl Levin and Riegle voted no.**

Yes on aid to Bosnia:

The Senate passed, 74 for and 22 against, a non-binding resolution (S Res 330) urging the United Nations to use multinational military force to ensure that emergency food and medicine reaches civilians in war-torn Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Supporter Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said the international community has ignored too long a crisis "all too reminiscent of the atrocities perpetrated half a century ago by Nazi Germany."

"Let us not trip willy-nilly into a combat commitment of

American GIs in the Balkans," said opponent Ernest Hollings, D-S.C.

A yes vote was to approve the resolution. **Carl Levin and Riegle voted yes.**

No vote cuts SDI: The Senate failed, 43 for and 49 against, to spend even more money for the Strategic Defense Initiative during debate on a fiscal 1993 defense budget of \$274 billion (S 3114).

The vote preserved an amendment trimming \$1 billion from the \$4.3 billion SDI level

recommended by the Senate Armed Services Committee for the anti-missile defense system that would be based in space and on land. About \$30 billion has been appropriated during SDI's 10 developmental years.

A no vote was to cut SDI by nearly 25 percent below the committee-approved level. **Carl Levin and Riegle both voted no.**

Yes to expand IRAs:

The Senate voted 72 for and 25 against to expand individual

retirement account tax benefits.

This retained language in pending tax legislation (HR 111) sharply raising income limits for the full \$2,000 IRA deduction. This new limit would be \$120,000 for couples and \$80,000 for individuals, up from \$40,000 and \$25,000. The language creates a special IRA in which taxes are waived on withdrawals of non-deductible contributions held in savings at least five years.

A yes vote was to expand IRAs. **Carl Levin and Riegle voted yes.**

Big taxpayer

While the city's largest taxpayer, Highland Superstores, is seeking Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection, city manager Steve Walters said there's no immediate concern of a financial disaster for Plymouth.

"It would be a devastating case if they were filing to go out of business as Highland appliance," Walters said. "But as I understand their program right now that's not what they're doing."

Highland on Aug. 24 announced it would seek to leave the Chicago market where it operates 19 stores, in order to concentrate resources on its remaining 30 stores in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

"Chapter 11 will give us the opportunity to deal more effectively with certain burdensome obligations, such as closed store leases," said Ira Mondry, president of Highland which is headquartered in Plymouth.

Under federal bankruptcy law, a firm filing under Chapter 11 can seek to work with creditors on payments. Highland has already paid its 1992 city tax bill, \$116,266.54. Even if they should seek to pay less in 1993 under Chapter 11 provisions, a county program would make up the difference, Walters said.

"I don't see it as too big of an issue in the city of Plymouth right now," he said.

Money saved

Plymouth city manager Steve Walters has saved about \$20,000 in costs, thanks to a toned-down cruising season this year.

Because fewer teens have been showing up in town this summer for cruising, the city spent less on police overtime and on additional officers.

The cruising season typically wraps up around Labor Day.

Conservationist: It's great outdoors

This man can make you lose the end-of-summer blues.

Robert Laich, longtime president of a local conservation club headquartered in Plymouth Township, says the best season is just beginning.

"It's a fantastic time of year to be out in the field," Laich said, of approaching autumn.

"Whether you hunt or whether you don't, get out there early, an hour or so before sunrise. Lean back against a tree at about 5 o'clock in the morning.

"All of a sudden, some critter is starting to crunch something, a blue jay lets out a squawk, the place just comes alive."

Laich, was recently elected president of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, which have more than 130,000 members.

This week, Laich was scheduled to attend a lunch with Gov. John Engler at the Michigan State Fair. The MUCC is fighting Engler over his elimination of several wildlife-conservation related commissions and Engler's efforts to use money earmarked for conservation else-

where in the state budget.

When a commission oversees such an area, "The public has public input," Laich explains. "This is still our state — people want to have a little bit to say about this."

Laich, 62, of Westland, says his favorite outdoor activities are bass fishing and pheasant hunting.

"I grew up on a farm near Ford and Wayne roads. You basically learn everything's got a reason for being, one thing depends on the other."

Knowing his interest in the outdoors, a friend once said he should look into the Western Wayne County Conservation Association. The club meets on Napier between North Territorial and Five Mile.

Before long, it was, "Why don't you run for a position in our organization?" Laich said. Now, the Ford Motor Co. retiree has served as president of the association, as MUCC Region IV vice president and five years as district chairman of the organization.

He's also received the Hackett Award last year, for outstanding service as a member.

A main goal of the MUCC is to maintain wildlife habitat. The group has supported the state's bottle bill and wetlands act, and the maintaining of a trust fund to buy recreational lands paid for by gas and oil drilling lease fees.

The western Wayne club is working with Browning-Ferris Industries to get a nature center going on 47 acres near the BFI dump near Five Mile Road in

Salem Township.

"We want to leave something for the future," Laich said.

Laich is considering a program to get retirees involved in reporting poachers. "The more eyes we've got looking, the more we can get accomplished."

In meeting with Department of Natural Resources people, Laich has been talking about "how we can figure out how to get more public access ramps to the Detroit River, Lake Erie, Lake St. Clair," for fishing.

Laich said he'd also like to see some action to stop the spreading of a plant native to the southern states that has been introduced here and is killing cattails and other plants native to wetlands.

The MUCC has been involved in a

project to reintroduce trout to the west Rouge River, and is "working to get a fish ladder in Flat Rock," to boost the fish population in the Huron-Clinton metroparks system.

"I don't consider myself an environmentalist, I consider myself a conservationist," Laich said.

"I try to listen to their theories, but they don't want to look at the whole big picture," he said.

For example, at Kensington Metropark, "The paths are all covered with goose droppings," Laich said, adding that not managing wildlife leads to problems.

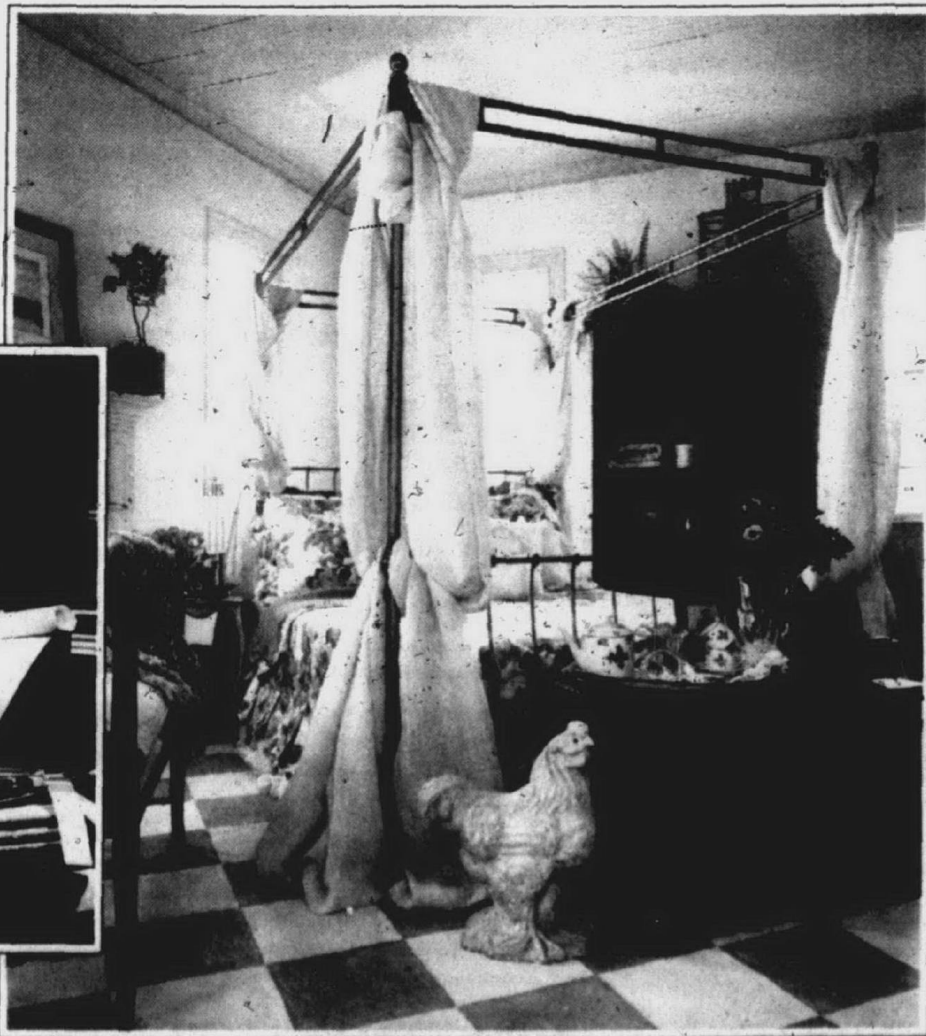
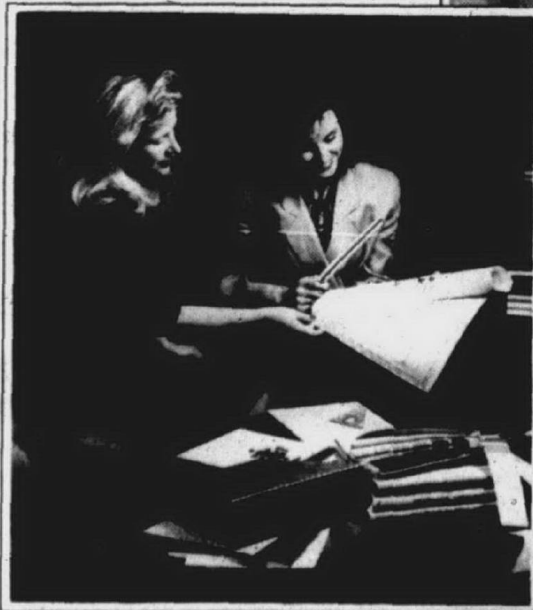

It's politics as usual

Autumn weather isn't the only thing that came early this year. The presidential campaign blew into Canton last week with all the subtlety of Hurricane Andrew.

In the wake of Hurricane George, the debate has centered on the question: Was it a campaign visit or a presidential visit?

It's one of those which came first, the chicken or the political party questions that will probably never be resolved. Both sides are right and wrong on this one. It was both and always will be unless we force a sitting president running for re-election to step down during the campaign year.

The anti-Bush folks contend the president used his office to make a campaign speech in Canton, taking advantage of local government. They also argue that protesters were denied freedom of speech because they weren't asked to get up on the podium with Bush.

They also want the Republicans to pay for every paper clip used that week in the Canton Township Hall.

None of those charges hold water. First of all, nobody's free speech was taken away. The idea behind it is to give everybody a voice, not an

audience, they have to do that on their own.

The Bush rally was bought and paid for by the Republicans. It was their party and they had the right to make up the guest list.

Chances are Bill Clinton and company will do the same thing. There just isn't an obligation to invite party crashers.

But the Democrats and UAW folks who came to heckle the president weren't the only ones caught off base.

During the visit a legion of clean cut Republican kids worked the crowd making sure there were no offending signs and calling a photographer a "media faggot" for taking pictures of a demonstrator at the rally.

Many walked away from the rally with their political perspectives unchallenged, and that's probably why they came. The Republican faithful where there to hear "their president" and the Democrats were there to make trouble.

And it was all for television. Every candidate loves to see him or herself surrounded by red, white and blue in a clean, neat, middle America community like Canton.

It's what gets folks elected, and probably always will.

Get to work

Inaction lengthens state ballot

It's November 1994 and Michigianians will vote on:

- A proposal that could slash property taxes by 10-20 percent in big cities and up to 90 percent on lakefronts and other desirable living areas. The proposal was placed on the ballot after a statewide Realtors association gathered the required 275,000 signatures in a petition drive.
- A referendum that eliminates sales tax on big-ticket purchases. Metro Detroit car dealerships distributed petitions at summer tent sales and in showrooms.
- A Michigan Education Association-backed proposal that ties teacher salary increases directly to property assessments. Local PTAs collected the signatures for this one.

Of course, none of this is true. But neither are the proposals listed above all that far-fetched, given the current climate of inaction in Lansing.

It's time for the Michigan Legislature to shake off the cobwebs and go back to work.

Michigan's representatives and senators — frozen by special-interest politics and fear of voter reprisals — have pretty much abandoned their essential legislative duty. That is setting government policy.

The proof is on this November's ballot, where voters will decide on a rate reform proposal pushed by AAA, the state's largest auto insurer. Without debating the merits of the AAA pro-

posal, we are troubled by its necessity in the first place and the trend it signals.

Auto insurance executives were pushed into action by a legislature that, together with Gov. John Engler, waffled on any meaningful insurance reform bill. When Engler vetoed the compromise that eventually worked its way out of the House and Senate, there weren't enough votes to override.

Elected officials have taken nearly the same non-approach on all but a handful of major issues to pass through Lansing in recent years. Failing to pass workable legislation, they dump complex issues in the hands of voters, usually in competing ballot proposals that often end up canceling each other out.

School finance reform was the sacrificial issue two years ago.

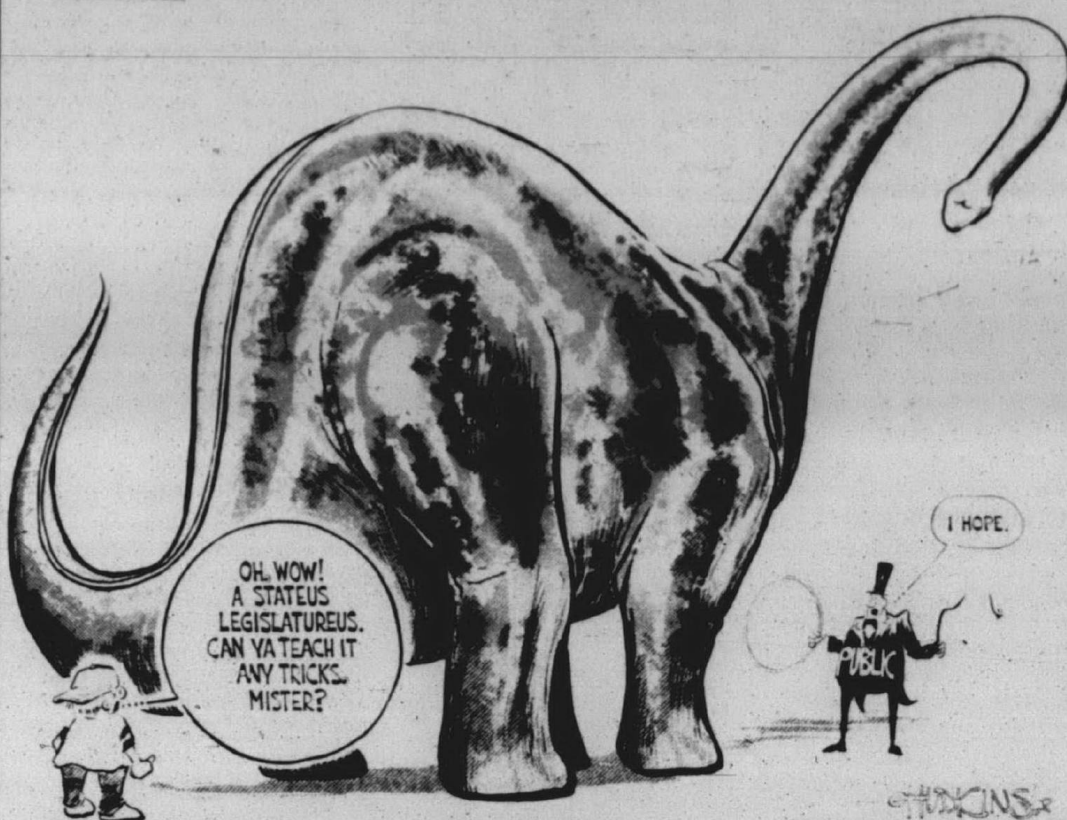
This fall, in addition to the AAA proposal, voters get two options on property taxes.

Ballot initiatives are fine. And the Constitutions (both state and U.S.) are emphatic in the right of the people to decide.

But handing special interest groups and regional power brokers with considerable resources free reign over the ballot is neither practical nor ethical.

The solution is for our legislators to stop playing footsie with lobbyists, stop worrying about public opinion polls and start doing what taxpayers elect them for and pay them to do. Legislate, guys. It's your job.

Interest groups may split GOP

In the good ol' days, presidential candidates used the Labor Day weekend to raise the troops on Detroit's Cadillac Square. This year the crowds will be sparse, the streets dirty, the candidates somehow less mythic. But the stakes will be just as high, maybe higher.

Michigan, the archetypical example of the hollowing out of America's manufacturing might, will be a key state in determining the next president.

Following the state Republican and Democratic conventions last weekend, the Labor Day break offers a time for a few reflections before we are overwhelmed by political hype and pandering.

A political party defines itself by determining "what to keep in, what to keep out," as the Bob Seger song says. Whom you try to attract or repel will define what your party is, what it stands for, to what swing groups it can appeal.

In these days of TV-driven politics, both parties have tended to bring in as many people as possible, to fudge their differences, to occupy the middle of the spectrum. Lee Atwater, the late national GOP chair, put it best when he talked about the necessity of the Republican Party's being "one big tent" in the context of the abortion issue.

So I was surprised to listen to the different rhetoric coming out of the national and then the Michigan state conventions last weekend.

Republicans were full of talk that I can describe only as exclusionary. Speakers defined the party in terms of what it was against.

Homosexuals and lesbians, certainly. Mothers who chose to work rather than staying home with the kids, probably. People who had been divorced or had a single-parent family, maybe. Taxers and liberals, by all means.

The litmus test, of course, was opposition to abortion. Gov. John Engler won the major fight of the convention when his candidate for the University of Michigan Board of Regents was opposed by Right to Life of Michigan because she was insufficiently ferocious in her opposition to abortion rights.

By contrast, the Democrats (for once thinking seriously they might win the presidency) were full of inclusionary talk. I heard the phrase "one big tent" more than once last weekend in Detroit.

Why the difference? History, as usual. The

Republican coalition that has dominated American politics for the last 20 years appears to be falling apart.

Southern conservatives, Bloomfield Hills business types, anti-abortion blue-collar families from western Wayne and Macomb counties all could rally behind a program featuring social values, opposition to taxes and anti-Communism. But now that the Cold War is over and the spiraling deficit has gutted traditional economic theory, splits are starting to show up between the component groups.

And any complex group whose constituents are pulling in different directions is likely to value highly doctrinal purity. This entails defining who and what are out in exclusionary rhetoric.

Whether that gets votes in November remains to be seen.

Maida plans to go on to get a master's degree in infant mental health, while Elizabeth plans to teach grades K-3.

Rank any Canton-Salem match in that category. On Saturday, the Rocks edged the Chiefs 2-1 in the Plymouth Invitational Soccer Tournament at Griffin Park.

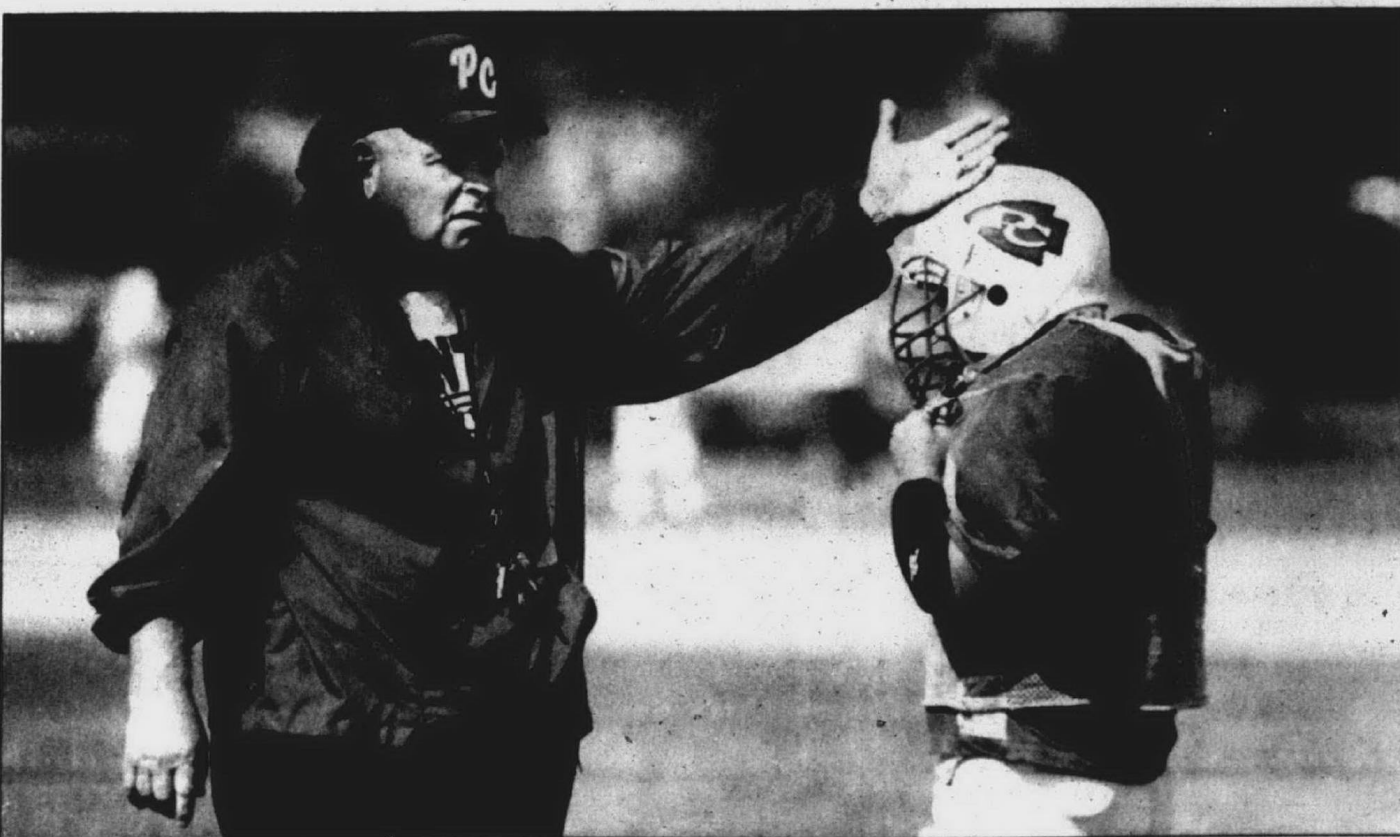
candidate goalkeeper Ryan Henkel, who wrestled the drive to the ground.

Chiefs inexperienced but show potential

Plymouth Canton's football team is dominated by youth and inexperience but also has the potential for rapid growth and success.

The Chiefs, who open Friday with a home game against Monroe, have 16 seniors on their team, which consists mostly of juniors. Two sophomores will start on the varsity.

In addition to putting a good many new players into action, Canton will play a new defense this year, making the transition from a 5-2 to 4-4.

"I'm excited about this team and this year," coach Bob Khoenle said. "I think we have the people who can do a lot of things on offense. The defense is new and the kids are responding to it. I'm eager to see what we can do."

"I feel real comfortable with this group, more so this time than last year. We have a good team atmosphere."

The Chiefs dropped to 3-6 last year following a 9-2 season in which they made the state playoffs for the first

time. Canton arguably could have been 5-4 a year ago had close losses to Northville (28-23) and Livonia Franklin (6-3) gone the other way.

"We have a good chance to win more than we lose," Khoenle said. "It depends how things go. We're young but have a good blend of seniors. We're hoping to progress and get better each week."

"The question is 'Will our kids adapt to the new defense and will our youth get going fast enough?'"

The Chiefs have an experienced quarterback in junior Kevin Shankie (5-10, 175), who started last year with the exception of a couple games when he was injured. Junior Scott Valimont (6-1, 150) is his backup.

The fullback is sophomore Mike Marsh (6-1, 230), a fine athlete with a lot of desire, according to Khoenle. The tailback will be sophomore Lenny Gardner (5-8, 160), who has "great running instincts" and rushed for 1,000 yards on the freshman team.

Other backs are senior Neil Haremski

(5-10, 165) and juniors Eric Arnold (6-0, 185), Steve Acevedo (5-10, 160), Brett Neidam (5-6, 140) and Sam Stafford (6-1, 230), who moved here from Maryland.

"All of them are good runners, and I wouldn't hesitate to use any of them in a minute," Khoenle said.

Shankie will have big passing targets in junior letterman Tim Moritz (6-2, 180), junior Ryan Ostach (6-3, 185) and senior tri-captain Mark Koziol (6-2, 180). The tight end is junior Chris Mazur (6-0, 175).

Breaking in a new offensive line is a major concern for the Chiefs. Senior Bill Talbot (5-10, 210) takes over at center for senior Rich LaBret (5-8, 185), who moves to guard.

Junior Stu Hayes (5-9, 185) started at guard until he was injured in the fourth game last year, and junior Tom Tsallis (5-9, 155) and senior tri-captain Matt Horn (6-1, 195) also are guard prospects.

Seniors Tom Raven (6-3, 210), the other tri-captain, and Albert Hollings-

Spitz returns to coach Canton runners

When Mike Spitz returned to coach Plymouth Canton cross country this season, he might have pinched himself to make sure he wasn't dreaming.

"It's like night and day from when I coached," he admitted.

When Spitz coached the Chiefs in the 1970s until 1981, the squad was well back in the Western Lakes Activities Association pack.

"We were 0 and forever back then," Spitz said. "I can remember when we won our first dual meet. We were working for respectability back then, and we weren't worried about winning championships."

But in 1981, Spitz left coaching and teaching to pursue a career in hospital management. Jim Hayes entered and developed Canton into a title contender. In 1989, the Chiefs won the conference title and finished seventh in Class A.

Hayes retired last season and Spitz decided to return to education and inherit a substantially different program.

"When I woke up in the mornings, I would think about 'What do I really enjoy doing,'" Spitz said. "I've always enjoyed teaching. When I decided to re-

turn to education, returning to Canton was my first pick.

"One of the most important things in a good program is consistency in coaching and Jim gave that to Canton. The goals now are a lot different from when I was here."

David Washenko and Chris Burns are the only runners lost from last season's team, which finished third in the Western Division and fourth overall in the WLAA.

Sophomore Kasey Moothart, a qualifier for the state meet as a freshman last season, returns to lead the Chiefs and appears to have kept himself in excellent shape, Spitz said.

Seniors Shawn McNamara, David Yack and Michael Boland will share Canton's captain responsibilities.

"They are three hard workers," Spitz said. "They are good leaders and will set good examples for the underclassmen, as well as contributing in terms of scoring."

Seniors Kevin Guteth, Justin McClain, David Stroschein and Tom DeGiorgio also will be important for scoring.

"We have a good group of hard working seniors,"

Spitz said. "You can tell Jim did a good job installing a work ethic in the runners."

Juniors Jeff Keith and Todd Smith, along with sophomores Augie Ray, Brian Crockett, Colin Astley and Chris Boland are also fighting it out for spots on the varsity team.

Spitz is impressed with the running of freshman Ian Bedford, who is competing for one of the final openings. Freshmen Erik McClain and Brandon Hartke have also shown promise.

"I'm not sure who will start off running for us," Spitz said. "We have nine or 10 runners who are battling it out for spots and that's a good problem to have."

With Spitz returning to the team's helm, and to the classroom as a life science teacher, he can't stop feeling fortunate.

"I feel fortunate that Jim has built a solid program," Spitz said. "I also feel lucky that he has left me a good group of hard workers who are interested and excited about what they're doing."

"We have set some goals for this season, one being that everyone on the team achieve a 3.0 grade-point average and that everybody supports each other on and off the track. That is important."

The key, however, was holding the cat-quick Reed to 11 points through the first three quarters.

"But there's only so much you can do against a player of that caliber. We knew she was going to score points, but we wanted to hold

everyone else down." Guard Tanisha Johnson, another All-Tourney pick, and Jessica Perkins, added 13 points each for Saginaw. But the Trojans seemed out of sync all night, even with No. 1 fan Mark Macon of the Denver Nuggets in attendance. (Macon played under Reed's father, Norwaine, at Saginaw Buena Vista.)

Jacinta Seals, a 6-3 senior, got into foul trouble early in the second half. The Trojans also felt they got the short end of the foul differential, going to the line only 12 times and hitting four.

"It's a learning situation. Maybe we need a rude awakening this early in the season," Saginaw coach James Milan said. "I thought we played well under the conditions. Sometimes the officiating can intimidate players, but I don't want take anything away from Ladywood because they're a good team."

Officials aside, the only thing that could be taken away on this night was Saginaw's No. 1 ranking, compliments of Ladywood.

If you feel like you're in Acapulco at Old Mexico Restaurant in West Bloomfield, it's no accident. Owners Ramon and Vickie Castaneda visit there regularly to see "what's new."

The Castanedas own two restaurants, both named Old Mexico. The one in Livonia seats about 34 people, and is more casual.

Old Mexico in West Bloomfield is open daily for dinner, and for lunch on Fridays only, it seats about 90 people, and offers entertainment.

The West Bloomfield restaurant is a fun place to celebrate a birthday, or have fun with friends. Be brave, try a flaming Ramon — a drink with a little bit of everything including Grand Marnier, Cointreau, tequila and rum. If it's your birthday, it's a Mexican tradition to have a tequila popper — 7-Up, Kaula and tequila. In Mexico it's called a tequila slammer because they put a hardhat on the birthday boy or girl's head and slam the shot-glass on their head to mix the drink.

They have a hardhat hanging on the wall at both Old Mexico restaurants, but slam the drink on the table.

Bring your camera and take a picture of your friends wearing one of the Mexican hats, and do the limbo or Mexican Hat Dance. If you're shy, just sit in your seat, enjoy dinner and the show. Non-smokers have a room all to themselves in West Bloomfield.

Both restaurants have recently been renovated to increase their capacity and the Livonia restaurant was awarded a liquor license on Aug. 3.

Vickie Castaneda describes the motif of the Livonia restaurant as "Uptown, modern Mexico." The tablecloths are bold with shades of blue, yellow and red. West Bloomfield has more of a Southwest flavor with an interior of dark greens, gray and maroon. Miniature lights on the wall add to the festive atmosphere. Daughter, Alicia, 25, who helps out wherever she's needed in the restaurant including cooking, and waitressing, is responsible for the decora-

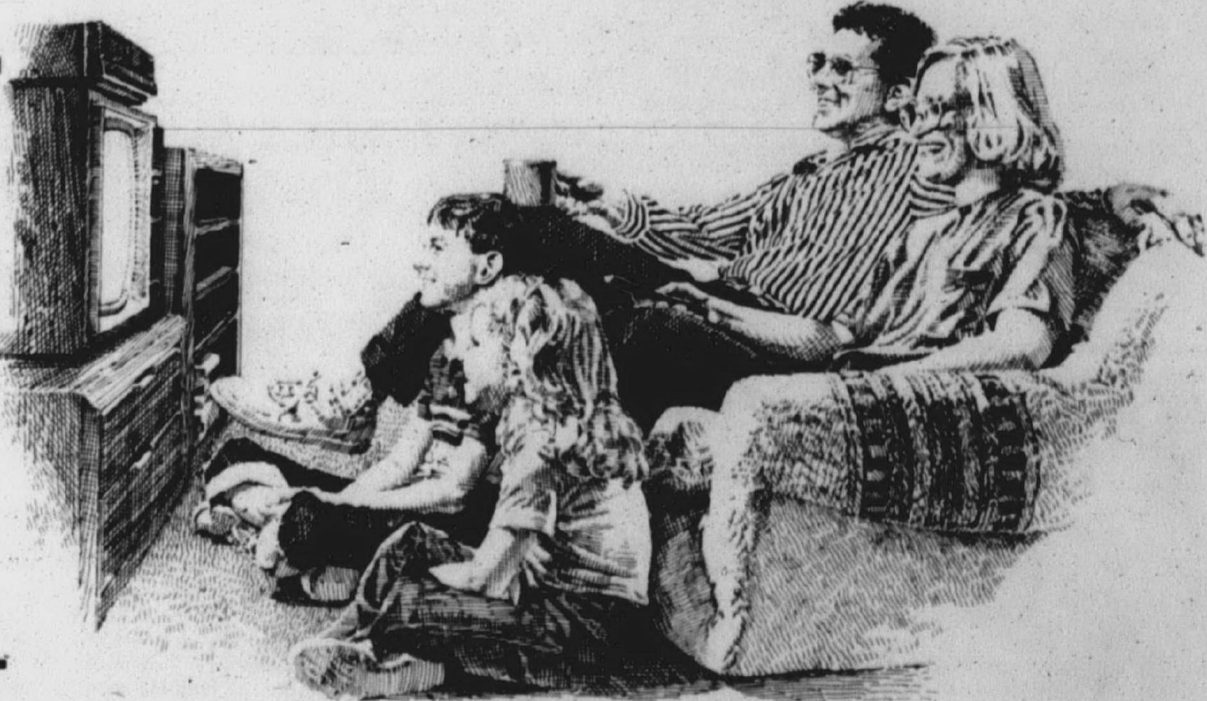

The only place in southeastern Michigan where shorebirds concentrate in any numbers is Pte. Mouillee State Game Area near Rockwood.

Areas enclosed by dikes retain water and provide shorelines where the birds can feed. It's still not the

greatest staging area for shorebirds, but it is the best we have in this area.

Viewing any animal can be hit or miss. And although I did not see as many shorebirds when I visited Pte. Mouillee as people did the week before, I still enjoyed those I saw. Along the mud flats there were lesser yellowlegs, killdeer, short-billed dowitchers, semi-palmated sandpipers, semi-palmated plovers and a mostly summer plumage black-bellied plover. Several species of ducks were also spotted, along with herons, egrets and a young bald eagle.

Walking the dikes and watching

for birds, insects and observing flowers blooming along the way was a great way to spend a morning. Even as I was returning to my car I spotted an osprey, a bird of prey that eats fish.

Though I was visiting the area primarily to see shorebirds, there were many other things to see and enjoy. A broad interest in nature can make any outdoor experience enjoyable. Even if I did not see one shorebird, I would have enjoyed the walk because there were lots of mallow blooming along the dikes.

Mallow likes to grow in marshes, and if you see the connection between marsh and mallow as in marshmallow your connection and suspicion is correct. Marshmallows originally came from a species of mallow that grows in the marshes along the Atlantic coast.

Fruits of the mallow were boiled in water which released a substance into the water. When the water was whipped it would form a frothy product like meringue or whipped cream.

Roots of marsh mallow contain a gelatinous substance that was used to make many different medicinal products and marshmallows. Mal-

low means soft and in earlier times the root was given to babies when they were teething. As the baby chewed the root it softened and released a mucilage that was thought,

at that time, to soothe the baby's stomach.

Franchises enter fertile computer training grounds

Computer training is no longer just the chore of the office hacker or the outside consultant. Franchises have entered the picture with a network of support to keep them current on the latest models and software.

A computer isn't worth the plastic and metal it's made with if it sits on a desk and no one uses it.

That's why hundreds of consultants have set up shop to train employees how to use computers in the past two decades.

Today, a new type of consultant has come on the scene. While computer training was once the purview of former executives and managers from the larger computer companies starting their own businesses, the future holds promise of national franchises dedicated to pure instruction in the use of commercial software applications.

Mark McManus, Sr., president of Computer Training and Support Corp. in Livonia, was the first in the nation to acquire a franchise from New Horizons, a computer training firm started in 1982 in Santa Ana, Cal.

After beginning franchising earlier this year, New Horizons has grown to 15

outlets in major metropolitan regions throughout the country; within days, that number will reach 16.

Unlike in the past where computer consultants came to the business and taught employees on the business's equipment, in the future employees will go to the computer training centers with classrooms equipped with state-of-the-art computers, up-to-the-minute software and full-time instructors, McManus said.

Still a role for the consultant

While there will always be room for the many computer consultants working today, the thriving computer education centers are here to stay, he said.

The consultants will continue doing the work they do best, including specialized computer security, systems analysis, equipment consulting and needs assessment. But McManus said the plain vanilla computer training needed by the vast majority of computer users will be the bailiwick of the franchised computer training centers.

That's a big difference from less than a decade ago, he said.

Prior to 1984, McManus said many companies used custom-made software packages or some of the early generation commercial packages.

Computer industry consolidates forces

The computer industry today reminds many observers of the consolidation of the auto industry 70 years ago.

As more and more players entered an industry generating double-digit profit margins, prices dropped, and growth sputtered. The auto industry's answer to the increased competition was to meld a number of individual enterprises into a handful of dominant companies.

The computer industry is charting the same path. In turn, due to a recession and a move toward standard components, where competing manufacturers now produce almost the same basic parts in their computers, rivals have turned from highlighting technological differences to slashing prices.

Businesses and consumers taking advantage of lower costs have saved as much as 40 percent from prices a

year ago, but the cuts have put some manufacturers on shaky ground and left buyers to wonder if service contracts and warranties will be honored down the road.

"In its infancy 15 years ago, the computer industry was marked by wild growth, but today the industry has matured so much that earnings are in the single digits and even strong companies are struggling," said Rick Inatome, chairman of the InaCom Corp. in Troy.

"Over the next two or three years, struggling companies will either strike a deal with someone else or fall by the wayside. That puts much more pressure on the consumer, who must now make sure he's dealing with stability at all angles."

Inatome knows of what he speaks. Last year, his former company, InaComp Computers, merged with Velcom Inc. of Omaha to better position both businesses in a market now driven by less expen-

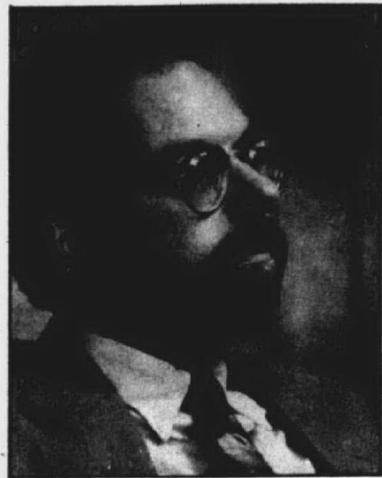
Breaking the silence

Group assists survivors of sexual abuse

■ Helping women who were sexually abused as children cope is the goal of a new group being formed at Plymouth Family Service. The trauma and tragedy of such abuse is all too common, and isn't limited to low-income families. The first group session will be Monday, Sept. 21.

Surviving the trauma of childhood sexual abuse is difficult, but Ann Bradley knows it can be done.



Trauma: "It's hard to imagine, but it certainly happens, more than we'd like to think," David Breeden, Plymouth Family Service director, said of sexual abuse of children.

In many cases, survivors will, for years, deny that the abuse occurred. "Denial, I think, comes from shame also. I want the shame to be addressed, and that it doesn't continue to belong to them," said Bradley, a clinical social worker at Plymouth Family Service.

A group for women who were sexually abused as children is being formed at Family Service, a Plymouth Community United Way agency. The first session will be 5:30-7 p.m. Monday, Sept. 21, at the agency office, 880 Wing in Plymouth.

"Percentages seem to be pretty high. It shows up pretty regularly," said Bradley, who also does work with women in the areas of substance abuse and domestic violence.

In adolescence, those who are being abused may run away from home or become chemically dependent. In adulthood, women who were abused may have difficulty with parenting and other relationships. Eating disorders and anxiety-panic attacks are common among women who've been abused.

"It seems to show up in their 30s and 40s more often," said Bradley, a Salem Township resident. She decided to include only women in the group, because of "safety issues women have to work through first before they can address the gender issues."

Group sessions will be ongoing and open-ended. Bradley would like the group to run for at least a year, and to have participants stay as long as they need to work through issues. She hopes to have an array of participants, not only in age and background but also in terms of where they are in treatment.

The group, which will meet each Monday evening at Plymouth Family Service, will be limited to six women over age 18. A second group will be added if needed, said David Breeden, a clinical social worker and Plymouth Family Service director.

ed if needed, said David Breeden, a clinical social worker and Plymouth Family Service director.

Safety's the key

Bradley will concentrate on developing a safe, supportive environment within the group, so that members are able to discuss their experiences. Group sessions will deal with memories, relationships with partners, the community, children and parents, and with the dynamics of families where sexual abuse occurs.

Discussions will also include socialization of women "and the way they end up handling their anger," she said.

Her philosophy is that survivors "are incredible people. They take that on, yet they continue to do fantastic things." Survivors can and do learn to deal with the trauma, and go on to have rewarding, fulfilling lives, both personal and professional.

Advance registration for the group is required, and can be completed through Family Service, (313) 453-0890. Fee is \$25 per session, with many insurance

plans accepted and a reduced-fee option for those who have difficulty paying.

Bradley, who earned a master's degree in social work from the University of Michigan, has found in some cases survivors of abuse feel they're responsible for what happened. Some won't seek treatment or even talk to others about what occurred.

She wants survivors to know it's all right to be angry "as long as you deal with how that person continues to impact your life."

"They all need to come to terms with where that relationship is and how they're going to handle it," said Breeden, a Plymouth resident who earned a master's degree in social work from St. Louis University.

More awareness

Publicity related to high-profile cases of abuse helps to increase awareness and understanding, they agree. "You certainly find more dis-

cussion of it," Breeden said. "I think that's good." That helps survivors realize they're not alone.

He's pleased to have someone with Bradley's expertise available. She's done volunteer work with the Domestic Violence Project in Ann Arbor and runs a women's support group at the Assault Crisis Center in Ann Arbor.

Bradley, who has three teenage children, has worked with women at Huron Valley Women's Facility and the Washtenaw County Jail, dealing with chemical dependency, sexual abuse and parenting concerns. She's also led women's groups within an outpatient chemical dependency program.

She and Breeden know that sexual abuse doesn't occur only in low-income areas. School counselors and police officers see the harsh realities of such abuse in the Plymouth-Canton community and other affluent areas.

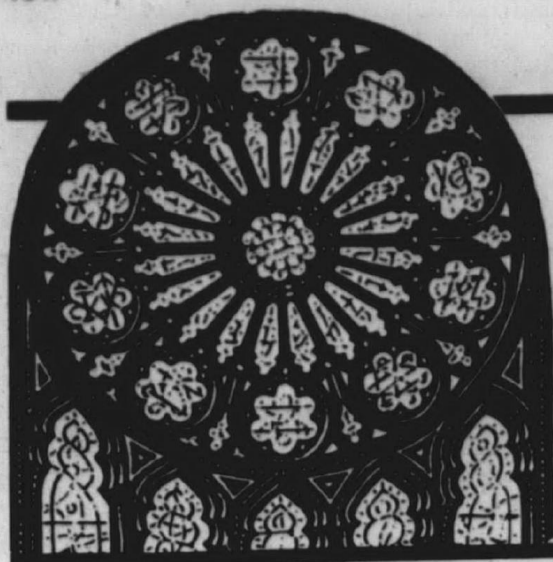

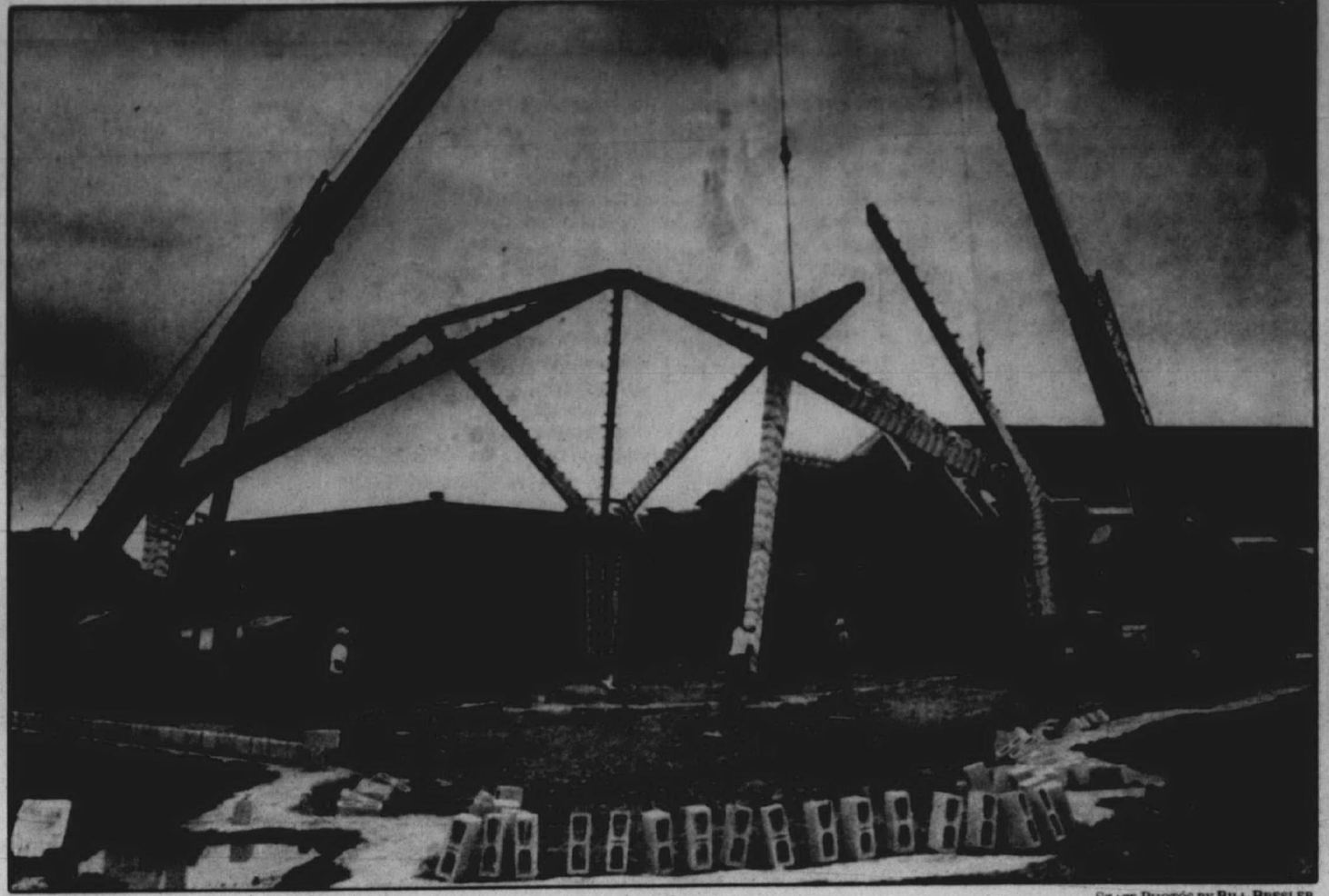

This church is growing in faith and size

When it comes to church construction projects, the Rev. Jerry Yarnell's a veteran. Yarnell has been senior pastor of St. Michael Lutheran Church in Canton for nearly 14 years. The current renovation of the church, on Sheldon south of Warren, is the third one to take place during his tenure. "One more time, and hopefully that'll do it."

Worshippers hope to have the work completed by February or March of next year, so that they'll be able to hold Easter services in the new sanctuary. "We're building a new sanctuary and some offices and nurseries," said Yarnell, a Canton resident. Seating capacity in the sanctuary will be about 450 to 500, compared to 270-300 in the current one. The building project's been in the planning stages for several years, and will include creating meeting rooms and a chapel area from the current sanctuary space. Some existing space will be converted for classroom use.

"It'll give us more space for our educational programs, Christian education," the pastor said. Carl Gaiser is architect for the project, and Oak Builders the general contractor. Cost of the project is an estimated \$1 million. "It's all our members doing it," Yarnell said of the fund-raising, which has included a fund drive. There will also be a mortgage for the addition. The project was undertaken "to

make room for our current congregation and for growth in the future." The Lutheran congregation currently has about 1,000 adult members, Yarnell said. When he came to the church in 1978, there was a small first unit at the current site in Canton. A new sanctuary was added in the early 1980s, and several years later the fellowship hall and classrooms were added. The current sanctuary will re-

main in use until the new one's available next year. Worship services and activities at the church are proceeding as usual, although the noise and dust associated with construction have caused some inconvenience. "It does tell you that the Lord is doing something," Yarnell said recently, taking a break from his sermon-writing duties. He works with two full-time pastors, the Rev. Drex Morton and the

Rev. Dave Woodby, a visitation pastor and a youth worker at the congregation. They're pleased with the growth at St. Michael Lutheran, and don't mind the short-term inconvenience of construction. "I believe that everyone has a need to know Jesus Christ," Yarnell said. "It meets needs in all areas of their lives." Making space for those people in the pews at church makes perfect sense. "More and more people will find out he has the answers."

Painter finds purpose mixing nature and art

She's a dancer turned artist. And the change came without much ado. "I began painting as a hobby, then people wanted to buy my work. Things took off from there," recalls Plymouth native Jana Conger, a wildlife watercolorist who has lived in Michigan's Irish Hills, near Jackson, for 15 years.

The former professional ballet dancer and instructor has put brush to paper since the early '80s. Five of her works are in limited-edition prints.

Nature and art drive her. In a milestone achievement, her 60-foot-tall by 40-foot-wide depiction of Japanese cranes was picked for the prestigious "Birds in Art" exhibition hosted by Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum in Wausau, Wis.

The 120-piece, 17th-annual international show will feature famous wildlife artists like Robert Bateman, Maynard Reece, Lars Jonsson, Larry Barth, Carl Benders and the museum's 1992 master wildlife artist, George McLean. The show will be open to the public Sept. 12 to Nov. 11.

The museum will host artists for a four-day opening weekend Sept. 10-13.

"It's sounds pretty exciting — meeting all these internationally known artists and seeing their work. I don't really have the opportunity to do that," Conger said.

"I'd hope to meet a publisher who may be interested in publishing my Japanese cranes as a limited-edition print. That'd be a nice happening. It'd be too costly for me to publish it at that size but its size is what makes it so striking."

"Her work rose to the top from a field of more than 1,100 entries," said Marcia Theel, museum interim director. "It obviously stood out from the crowd. That speaks very highly of her work."

Jurying the show were Theodore Wolff, former art critic for the Christian Science Monitor; Lynette Pohlman, director of the Brunner Gallery at Iowa State University at Ames; and Martina Norelli, former curator at the National Museum of American Art in Washington, D.C.

They looked for the best art that represents a broad range of species, habitats and poses. Some works are realistic, others impressionistic, Theel said.

Theel welcomes new names on the roster of artists in the show.

"That adds an exciting new dimension and a shot of fresh air," she said. "You need turnover in a juried exhibition so you don't keep exhibiting the same artists over and over again."

Plymouth roots

During her years in Plymouth, Conger danced with the Ann Arbor Civic Ballet Company, taught ballet through the Plymouth Parks and Recreation Department and Schoolcraft College in Livonia, and co-owned a local dance studio. A product of Plymouth schools, she had studied ballet since age 5.

Conger began working with watercolors about eight years ago. A self-taught artist, she hits the Midwest juried art show circuit 30 times a year. Her original and collectible prints sell for \$25 to \$3,000.

She specializes in wildlife art.

Recounting what hooked her on brushwork, she said: "My husband, Jim, and I do a lot of camping, sometimes for weeks at a time, traveling to places like Newfoundland, the Virgin Islands and the Black Hills.

"Jim's a graphic artist and photographer and takes photos wherever we go. The wilderness inspired me to come home and do something creatively with our experiences."

An environmentalist, Conger says she's "trying to do my bit to preserve what we can and to share a little bit of my love for the outdoors with the public."

Focuses on birds

Conger has painted some landscapes, like of the Taquamenon Falls and sunsets, as well as realistic florals.

But birds are her prime focus. "There's something about their capacity for flight that's spiritual to me — maybe the freedom they exhibit coming and going."

Her themes are contemporary, "real loose," as she put it. "I'm into emotional statements instead of detail. My main philosophy — and what shows up in most of my work — is the oneness we all share as living things."

Backing up her beliefs with deeds, Conger has donated artwork to save rain forests, for avian research and to promote the arts.

Conger describes her art career as "a slow building process. It's really becoming a business. But I'm sure enjoying it."

A Plymouth Symphony Orchestra fund-raiser, the show will feature 26 dealers displaying primitives, jewelry, silver, linens, lamps, English brass

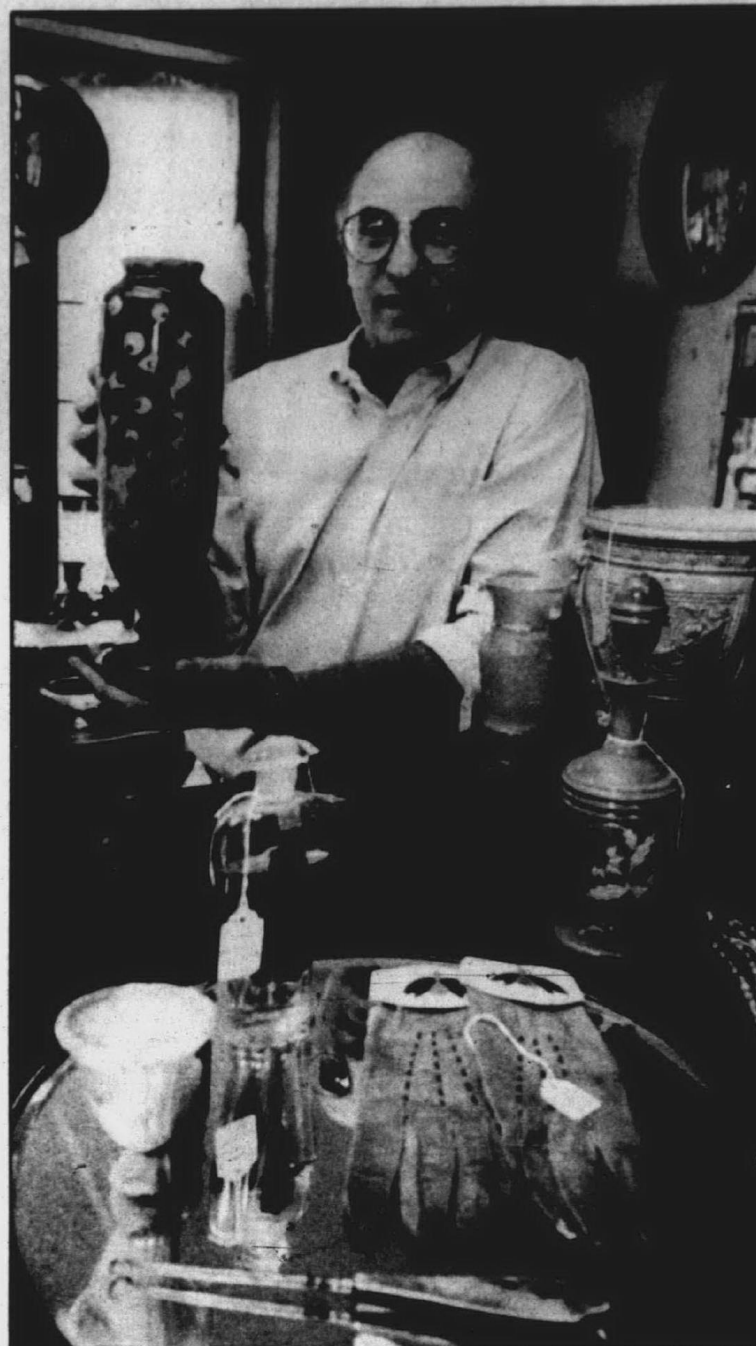
and copper, as well as European antiques Victorian, classic and English country.

Exhibit focusing on state photographers

Livonia Arts Commission and Friends of the Library present a 53-piece exhibition by Friends of Michigan Photography through Sept. 26 in the art gallery of the Livonia Civic Center Library, Farmington Road and Five Mile.

Award-winning photographers, including Joanne Leonard, Bill Sanders, Michael Sarnacki, Carol Toth, John Carney, Hugh Grannum and Carlos Diaz, reveal an array of statements in black and white as well as color at the fourth show in the second-floor gallery.

"This exhibit, in its entirety, was recently shown at Trappers Alley in Greektown and while only a segment of it is exhibited in Livonia, the show is very impressive and a beautiful eye-opener," said Jack Olds, arts commission chairman. "Don't come expecting the usual. Be ready to see new visions."

Diaz, well-known for his images documenting the life and everyday struggles of the common man, unemployed auto worker, laborer and low man on the totem pole, exhibits a powerful black and white montage of nine larger-than-life images in "Artifacts of the Working Class."

An associate professor at Center for Creative Studies in Detroit, Diaz plays

workman's gloves, most worn and covered by dirt and materials inherent to a trade, some with fingertips removed, against a virgin white background.

"We could submit two pieces for the show. I felt comfortable submitting one piece. It's very self-contained," Diaz said in an interview at the gallery.

"It's what I feel to be my strongest piece. I like it more and more I have it around. Conceptually, the idea was solid. It basically came about because of my 'Unknown Landscape Series.'"

Diaz found most of the gloves on the street while shooting the series. He uses an eight- by 10-inch view camera built by Kodak during World War II for military photographers. The large negative size creates finely detailed images and a crisp, clean focus, heightening the sharp sense of realism.

"I kept noticing gloves on the streets. I picked up about 30 of them. I thought they looked interesting. I ended up shooting about 15 of them, then narrowed it down to nine," Diaz said.

"It's nice to know that an object came from the hands of someone. The gloves contrast and complement one another. The dark glove belonged to a guy who tarred rooftops. The rubberized one is

from someone who works with caustic or chemical materials. You can actually imagine what the person who owned the glove did for a living."

"Artifacts" pays homage to people who work with their hands, subtly stating that it happens less and less. Diaz foresees a future trend where "most things done with the hand will be done by machine."

"It isn't the crafts person anymore," Diaz said. "The idea for this piece is that in the future an archaeologist will catalog these strange findings as artifacts," Diaz said, nodding to the catalog numbers labeling each glove.

Diaz uses rough-looking iron framework to compartmentalize each 16- by 16-inch image, ultimately encompassing the poignant statement in a 4½- by 4½-foot format.

"I used the grid as a design element," he said. "It defines space. It isolates parts of the scene. It gives a personality to each of the gloves. Putting them on a white background, it acts as an icon. With the gloves larger-than-life size, it sort of engulfs the viewer."

The "10th Anniversary Celebration Exhibition" at Urban Park Gallery in July showcased 80 photographs by Michigan Friends of Photography members.

"The show is an excellent cross-section of contemporary

photography, from classic landscapes to monumental pieces that use socio-political statements and text," said Laurie Tennent, MFP board member and newsletter editor.

"Photographers in the show come from all over the state of Michigan. A lot of them are from Birmingham and Royal Oak. Carol Toth is head of the photo department at Cranbrook. Hugh Grannum is a photographer for the (Detroit) Free Press.

"We included our collector's portfolio to get people interested in collecting photography as fine art."

Prints by Toth, Sanders, Sarnacki, Leonard and Carney comprise the collector's portfolio available to patrons and benefactors supporting the Michigan Friends of Photography. Ellen Sharp, Detroit Institute of Arts graphic arts curator, served as curatorial advisor for the portfolio collection.

MFP is a 400-member nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting and advancing creative photography in Michigan.

Exhibit hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday-Saturday.

past chairmen of the event," said Judy Lore, show co-chairwoman.

Tickets for the gala event are \$15 per person. They include admission to the show all three days. Admission on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 11-12, is \$3.

"The Plymouth antique show always holds excitement for both the dealers and antiquers because it's the start of the fall season," said Peggy Blaisdell, show co-chair and a dealer.

Throughout the show, tickets will be sold for a hand-pieced, hand-quilted calico on muslin Michigan quilt from the 1930s. Designed in a pinwheel/star-like pattern, the quilt is 73 by 77½ inches. Tickets are \$1, or six for \$5.

"If you want to know where you are and where you're going, you must first know where you've been. If you want to find out where you have been, start by going to the Plymouth antique show," said Mike Hubert in an interview at his Plymouth antique shop.

Hubert and wife, Margaret, will display a variety of items at the show from M. Hubert & Co. Antiques, the Plymouth shop they opened in April 1991 on Forest Avenue.

"I've always been interested in history. It's always fascinated me. It's a connection to the past," said Hubert, motioning to bits of history showcased in the shop. "I've always felt this should be maintained. We're custodians. If we don't take care of it, it won't be here for future generations."

Hubert first became interested in the field 25 years ago with mail order buying and selling of coins. He started collecting antiques 20 years ago and selling them nine years ago.

Hubert buys antiques at estate sales, out of state, and from customers who bring their pieces of history into the shop.

"It is a perpetual treasure hunt. You never know what you're going to find. There's always a surprise," Hubert said. "I look for uniqueness or unusualness in a piece and that it's a good quality item. I love old furniture. I love art glass. I try to buy the best that I can."

"I'm constantly reading or studying. I'll drive down to Toledo (Museum of Art) to see their glass collection. If I read enough and look enough, the more I'm able to know."

Hubert makes it a policy to ask customers what they collect, because there isn't enough room to put everything on display. He also maintains computerized searches for that hard to find antique. "We're going to get a good variety for the show, a little

bit of everything," Hubert said.

"We'll have an 1840 butler's desk, art pottery and art glass, Fiesta ware from the 1930s, one or two rugs and paintings, lamps, lighting, costume jewelry, plus 1930s sports medals, a clock or two, a piece or two of porcelain, furniture and decorative pieces, and a theater ticket taker."

For the second time, Sharon Burton will participate in a league antique show; her first was last January. She owns the Plymouth antique shop, Burton Gallery Antiques, on Penniman next to Cafe Bon Homme.

She'll feature a Victorian hall seat from an old Plymouth home, a twig love seat and two chairs plus twig plant stands, lots of bed and table linens, a large selection of Victorian silver plate, wooden house brackets from a historic house in Plymouth, and fancy iron fence trim similar to the Wilcox house for decorating a brick fence or house peak.

"They're always wonderful shows," Blaisdell said. "It's such an affordable show and it's an accessible show. All the dealers are very knowledgeable and eager to answer any questions people have about antiques."

Blaisdell, co-owner of Blaisdell Antiques with husband John, will offer a Victorian walnut dresser, a walnut dropleaf two-drawer stand, a mission oak coat rack, an unusual late 1800s golden oak junior chair, a golden oak child's desk with chair, lamps, ironstone with tea leaf pattern, antique linens, candlesticks, pitchers, kitchenware, vases, a Victorian photo album and sewing baskets.

Pauline and Jacki Work of Farmington Hills will once again display estate jewelry and silver.

To refresh antique shoppers Friday and Saturday, the Penniman Deli will serve a mini deli of sandwiches, salads and desserts. Coffee and soft drinks also will be available.

Hubert compares enjoying a concert by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra to antiques.

"The PSO promotes a function or service to the community to interest people in an art form. It's adding something to your life that adds quality. It's like the antiques," Hubert said.

"If they liked Back to the Future 1, 2 and 3 films, they ought to come to this show."

Antique show hours are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 11, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 12.

Memoir captures growing up on farm

Crafters aid

BOOK BREAK
"Eighty Acres, Elegy for a Family Farm," by Ronald Jager (257 pp., Beacon Press, \$9).

In these economically trying times, I've made a decision. In the future, I plan to devote a bit more space here to paperback books, especially if the books seem to be of exceptional quality or of particular interest to Michigan readers.

Some may be newly published, some not so new. All will be currently available on bookstore shelves, though, and many you'll be able to take home for about half the price of a hardcover.

First published in 1990, "Eighty Acres" is the first-person account of a boy's childhood on a Michigan farm during the 1930s and '40s. If you grew up on a farm — anywhere, at any time — this finely crafted memoir will speak to you in a very special way. If you didn't grow up on a farm, this book may make you wish that you had.

Jager, born into a Dutch Calvinist farming community in Michigan ("at the second knuckle of the ring finger") writes from the perspective of his present home in New England, where he was a long-time professor of philosophy at Yale before his retirement several years ago.

His aim in this book, he writes, is "to capture and exhibit the experience of being young and on a farm — work and whimsy, warts and all."

Lucky for us, that's pretty much

what Jager does. Although his always sympathetic portrait of his parents is a bit much at times, overall, "Eighty Acres" is no rose-colored Valentine, memorializing the wonderful way we were back in the good old days. While life was good down on the farm, it was not all bright and beautiful, he emphasizes. In fact, some of it was horrible.

Case in point: One dark morning, Jager and his father discovered one of their young cows, after calving, had "spent the night quietly expelling (her intestines)."

The veterinarian was quickly called — something resorted to only in the direst emergencies — and, along with Jager's father, set about trying to remedy the situation by easing what the cow had lost back into its proper place.

Incredibly, the men succeeded in their gory task, only to have the hapless cow do the same thing all over again the next morning.

Then there was hog-butchering day, a singular event firmly embedded in the memory of any child who has ever happened to witness it.

"Calamity is riveting," Jager writes, in connection with the bloody drama.

Seated atop the granary steps, he and his brothers and a sister viewed the spectacle: As the porcine squeals "would die away into a raucous gurgle ... the hog's legs would stiffen, and she would ... stagger, and collapse into a red sea of her own blood," he remembers.

Life on the Missaukee County farm had its lighter moments, of course. In fact, some of them were uproariously funny. For example, there was the strange case of the eager beagle puppy, born oddly una-

ware of the power of its own nose. If Chips happened to lose sight of his quarry in a tall bean field, using his canine olfactory senses never seemed to occur to him. Instead, "he leapt high into the air above the beans and jerked his head in a quick semicircle ... until he glimpsed his quarry ... then ... charged off in the new direction ... popping into the air every few seconds as if riding a pogo stick."

Jager possesses a distinct gift for bringing a reader to the scene and also for evoking considerable amounts of nostalgia without descending into treacly sentiment. Both are to be credited for most of the success of this book.

Some especially pleasurable nostalgic moments he shares here: gathering milkweed pods for the

war effort (the pods were used in life jackets), listening to the spiel of the Watkins man ("like an hour-long TV commercial in a world without TV"), simmering sap toward maple syrup in the big farm kitchen, answering calls of nature on icy Michigan mornings, and, with the help of God and a peppermint, enduring the excruciatingly long Calvinist church services.

Jager also provides here a memorable picture of a part of the Michigan landscape, plus an engaging, brief history of the Dutch Calvinists, their values, and how they came to settle this particular community in Missaukee County.

This year's show drew 100 crafters. "We've tried to reach that magic number for several years, and we've finally made it," Daniel said jubilantly.

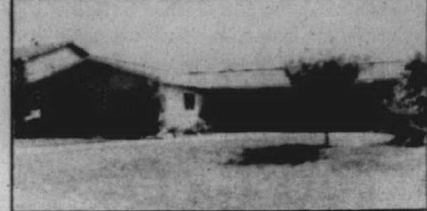
Money is raised through booth rentals and concession sales. Show proceeds go toward historical preservation at Greenmead.

Psychological boost seen in under-8 percent mortgages

(AP) — Rates on 30-year mortgages jumped back above 8 percent nationally, pushed up by a plunge in the value of the dollar.

Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 8.01 percent, up from 7.87 percent last week, according to a national survey released Friday by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

The jump brings the rate back to its level of early August, before it sunk to last week's 19-year low.

Because of uncertainty surrounding the dollar, economists were uncertain whether mortgage rates would continue to rise or whether this week's increase would prove to

be a blip. "At this juncture it's too early to tell," said economist David Lereah of the Mortgage Bankers Association of America. "Rates could come down or they could rise. But I don't think they could edge up too much further because the economy is so lackluster."

The value of the dollar began crashing last Friday as investors, attracted by high interest rates in Germany, began selling dollars to buy German marks. The plunge of the greenback in turn, put upward pressure on U.S. interest rates. The dollar hit a post-World War II low against the mark earlier this week

Real estate agents and analysts said that when mortgage rates dropped below 8 percent for the first time in almost 20 years it made a psychological difference to consumers, even though rates have been dropping for months. "This (8 percent) is an attention grabber," said Paul Haveman, vice president of HSH Associates, a Butler, N.J.-based publisher of

mortgage information. "It's a psychological boost equal to the moment when the rates first fell below 10 percent — way back in November 1990."

Even though rates have been dropping incrementally, each new mark makes a difference, Haveman said.

Haveman sees 8 percent rates as offering the possibility of being able to overcome a major obstacle — consumer confidence. "Now it's getting down to the point where you can actually buy and pay less than if you rent."

Recent home buyers also have already started to refinance,

Haveman said. "Late June, early July was when it really started to sink in that people that missed the boat back in January and February had another chance. But then, the average was about 8 1/2 — much higher than it is now," he said. "So you're starting to see people who only bought three or four years ago who are in a position to refinance."

It may not be worth banking on rates going down further, said Dorcas T. Helfant, president of the National Association of Realtors.

"I think people are going to ask themselves, 'Why am I waiting when I can lock in these rates for 30 years?'" Helfant said.

Condo becomes landing strip for errant hot air balloons

Some co-owners are using a field adjacent to our condominium for use of a hot air balloon. Sometimes the balloon lands on the condominium site, causing concern for our residents. What can we do about this?

check your condominium documents to determine whether there are any restrictions or prohibitions on landing balloons or other airborne devices in your condominium. It would seem to me that this area may not be covered by your specific documents and a regulation may be necessary. You should get a legal opinion so that the board is not left up in the air on this issue. You may also wish to speak to the co-owner involved requesting his cooperation and explaining that damage to the residents or the con-

dominium premises could result as well as to the person in the balloon. We have insects in our condominium coming from the ground and I am concerned that they may be termites. The board of directors has been mum about this question when asked by my husband. What can I do? Get an investigation by a reputable company who specializes in termite or insect infestation. If there is a problem, bring it to the attention of the board of directors and request that the board reim-

burse you for the costs involved since it is apparently unwilling to do the investigatory work themselves. To the extent that the insects are coming from common elements, it is the association's responsibility. Perhaps when the members read this article, they will assume their responsibility themselves and relieve you of that task. One of our tenants parades around the condominium project in less than skimpy clothes. Some of the residents think that

she is an exhibitionist. I believe she has violated ordinances regarding proper attire. How can the board handle this delicate situation? I am not sure that this is the type of issue that the board wants to get involved in unless there is some potential harm to the residents of the association. Perhaps it might be a good idea to have a general statement made in the newsletter regarding proper attire on the premises without directing attention to the resident in question.

I also believe that this more properly might be left to an individual co-owner to suggest that he or she is personally offended by the attire, stated in judicious terms. In the case of peeping Toms and the like in condominiums, the whole issue must be considered before any action is taken that might result in potential liability for the association or its directors. Senior housing: design challenges

■ Architects are beginning to take notices of the changes housing must undergo to attract senior citizens who want to maintain an independent lifestyle.

It can be difficult to grow old in a house built for the young. With each year's passing, stairs are more difficult to climb, showers develop into a painful chore and faucets become an agonizing test of strength.

Most seniors take the inevitable irritation in stride, but some are being driven from their homes as once user-friendly amenities such as door knobs and window latches no longer turn or open as easily as before.

While surveys show most people nearing retirement age prefer to remain at their current address, many potential seniors and those in their golden years can stay in their homes longer than anticipated by taking advantage of a number of new products designed to make residences more accessible, both inside and out.

Mike Rein, a partner with Bowers and Rein Associates, an architectural planning firm in Ann Arbor, which is helping design Botsford Commons, a retirement community in Farmington Hills set to break ground in the fall, said senior housing offers its own challenges.

"We have to keep reminding ourselves that we're designing homes for people who are more prone to take it a little easier," said Rein. "That means all floors must be flush. Even sliding doors are out because they have that little track."

Lighting a concern

"We also found seniors tend to live in the middle of rooms because they have a problem with depth perception and can't distinguish between the floor and walls. To counteract that, we put in put in more lighting than normal."

"In the kitchen, appliances are closer together, with the sink next to the stove so a pot of water doesn't have to go far."

Scheduled to open a model home by spring, Botsford Commons will include 90 privately owned homes, 48 apartments and 50 assisted living units. The project is being developed by Botsford General Hospital on the grounds of the Botsford Continuing Health Center (formerly the Farmington Nursing Home).

Each residence will include such features as non-slip flooring, adjustable closets, energy-efficient appliances, lower counter tops and cabinets, removable cabinet doors under sinks and other amenities. The total cost of the development is \$22 million.

"The project is for people who feel their present home is too large or would prefer living with people their own age," said Faine. "We'll also be putting in such services as a pharmacy, health club, barber shop and beauty salon so people won't have to travel far to take care of their needs."

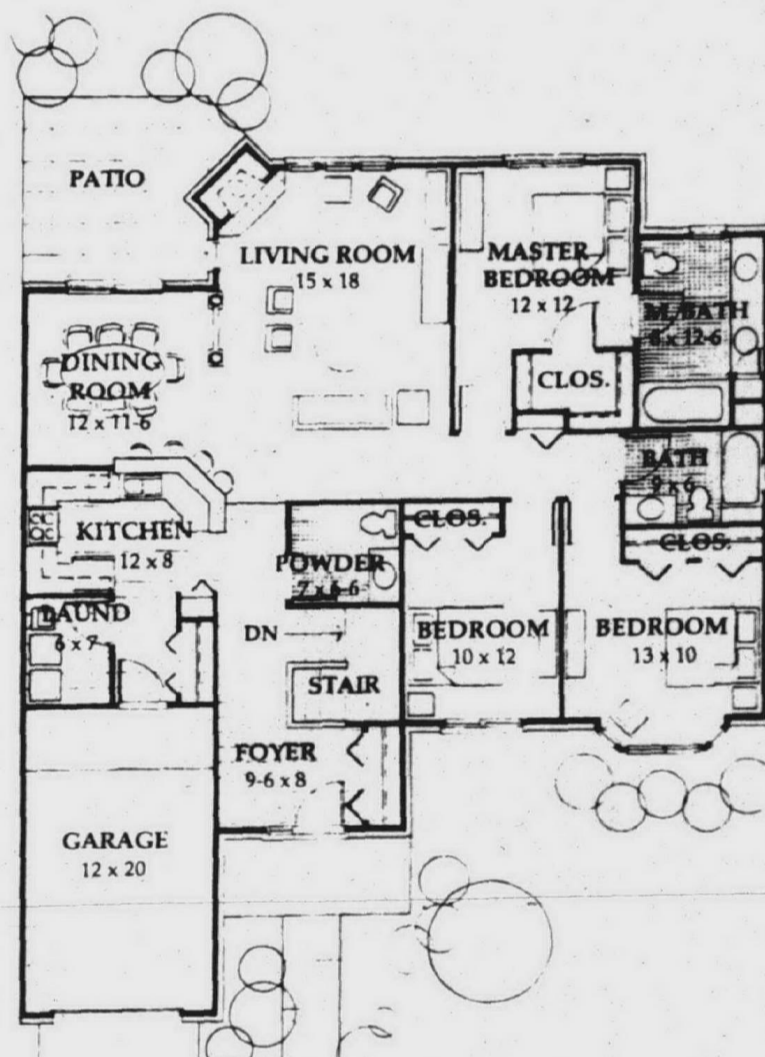
Senior-friendly features

Among the building trends of the future aimed at the older homeowner are driveway and sidewalk slopes that do not exceed 5 percent, eliminating all steps, in-home elevators for those who can afford it, wider hallways and doors, higher electrical outlets and more lighting.

Those hoping to stay in their present homes have the option of adding some do-it-yourself features. "There's no reason people can't slowly adjust their homes to fit their needs," said Steve Faine, administrator of professional and support services for Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills.

"Windows that open out instead of up are a good choice for those thinking long-term. As the nation's grows older, builders and merchants are beginning to specialize in products which are easier to use."

Among the senior-friendly features available today, many of which are being displayed at area home shows, are



doors with levers instead of knobs, French doors in place of sliding glass doors, backing for grab bars should they ever be needed and shower stalls with built-in seats.

In the kitchen, new appliances have doors that are easier to open and controls that operate with a tap of the finger. Countertops for sinks are available that adjust to three different levels, complete with insulated piping. And once the cabinet is open, it permits easy wheelchair access.

"We've seen a great deal of business in child-safe products for the home, and now senior-friendly products are drawing more and more sales," said Frank Flynn, sales manager for Russell Hardware in Birmingham.

"Grab bars are probably our biggest seller in that category. We also have a swing-free hinge which allows a door to be offset from the jamb so people passing through have a clear opening. The

hinge allows for wheelchairs to pass through much more easily, and it's a lot less expensive (\$50 for a pair) than tearing out a door to make a larger opening."

While senior-friendly products are a tad on the expensive side, Flynn said prices should drop as demand picks up. According to the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB), the number of people aged 65 and older will double between 1990 and 2030. And from a survey by the NAHB's National Council on Seniors Housing, approximately 86 percent of those 55 and older say they prefer to remain in their own homes.

Mortgage break for energy-efficient houses

For home buyers who lower their energy bills by adding such improvements as heavier insulation or more energy-efficient windows, the mortgage industry will reward their conservation by offering more generous loan deals.

As long as home owners show monthly savings on electricity, gas and other energy consumption, participating lenders will count those savings as income when qualifying prospective buyers for a mortgage.

Most of the plans, commonly referred to as energy-efficient mortgages, are patterned after a new marketing push by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. (Freddie Mac), one of the nation's largest sources of mortgage money. The plan is open to first-time and move-up buyers, sellers and refinancees.

"Energy-efficient mortgages are very helpful for people who have trouble qualifying for a specific home and need that extra bit of cushion to be approved," said William Yaw, vice presi-

dent and director of marketing for Standard Federal Bank in Troy.

"But for someone who puts 50 percent down on a home, and has a good, steady income, the energy-efficient mortgage wouldn't come into play. The plan is for people who want to buy a little more than the maximum house they can afford."

Many of the plans offered by area lenders are tied to the buyer's housing debt-to-income ratio, where the maximum permissible monthly mortgage payment, often limited to 28 percent of a borrower's income, is raised by as much as 33 percent after an inspection by an energy consultant or appraiser.

For example, if household income is \$38,000 a year, the maximum mortgage payment permitted by most lenders will be around \$886 a month. The payment includes principal, interest, taxes and property insurance. At that rate, the homeowner would be limited to a loan of roughly \$90,000, using the standard 28 percent ratio and a monthly mortgage payment of \$886 at a fixed mort-

gage rate of 9 percent.

But with an energy-efficient mortgage, an energy consultant may find a future home owner could save as much as \$90 a month on utility bills by adding \$5,000 worth of improvements such as an attic ventilation system or selective window replacements.

The \$90 savings would then be added as income so buyers could qualify for a larger home. Monthly payments would be higher but the lender would be willing to view the buyer as an acceptable credit risk due to the savings on energy bills.

Under this new scenario, the home owner could qualify for a loan of roughly \$103,000, using a 31 percent ratio instead of 28 percent. The \$5,000 worth of improvements, though, would have to be added within a year after the buyer moves in.

"The whole idea is to give borrowers a little compensation for doing what basically makes a lot of sense anyway, buying a house that wastes as little energy as possible," said John Hemschoot, di-

rector of mortgage policy for Freddie Mac. "Why should buyers be penalized for spending money in an intelligent way?"

Newly constructed homes are also part of the package, as qualified buyers can add any energy savings below an average scale to the mortgage equation at the time of application. Again, an appraiser would likely determine what amount would be saved on more energy-conscious systems.

What's more, some area banks have put their own spin on the concept. Comerica offers what it calls a community homebuyer program where the minimum down payment is 5 percent, paid either by the buyer, a relative of the buyer or a non-profit neighborhood organization. Under traditional lending guidelines, banks often require a minimum down payment of 10 percent with little room for flexibility. But the current economic climate and poor consumer confidence have made it more

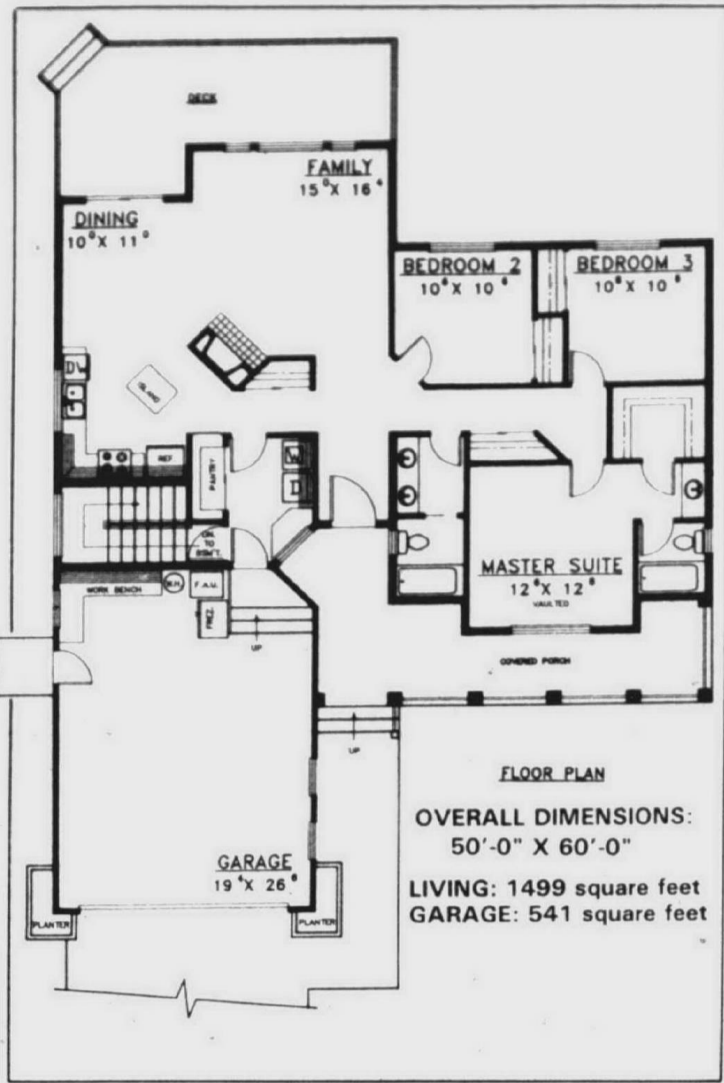

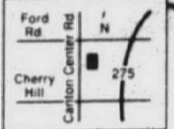

(AP) — Rocks and stones in a garden are a little bit like weeds — if correctly put to use, they can add value and interest to the garden. Size is not a factor; from pebbles to boulders, rocks can be put to good use.

Rocks add strength, texture and color that complement plants. For the most dramatic display, use rocks that are indigenous to your area. If you are attempting to create a natural setting, rocks and stones should look like they belong.

With a little imagination, every size and shape can be used. Small stones can be raked over a weed barrier, like black plastic or landscape fabric, to create a fine-textured mulch. Stone mulches around trees and shrubs help protect trunks and stems from mower damage during the summer.

Larger rocks make attractive edging along paths and around irregular-shaped beds of flowers, shrubs, or a mix of ground covers and spring bulbs. Rocks can be set on the surface or slightly into the soil to produce variety. Large rocks can also be used to hold back mounds of soil raised planter beds. A slightly irregular shape helps create a natural appearance to your garden design.

A large, interestingly shaped boulder can serve as an accent point in the landscape. It can mark the entrance to a driveway

or tone down an exposed water or gas meter. When rocks are used to cover a problem, make certain that all items in the design blend well together. Too often, the rocks and related landscaping only draw attention to the problem.

Flat stones make ideal stepping stones and pathways in the garden. When they are set into the soil level with the surrounding lawn, you will be able to mow right over them. Sunk stones are also easier and safer to walk on and they also can be used for a rough-textured patio or set of steps.

If you are able to get enough flat stone and rock, you may even be able to construct an attractive stone wall, which can be a work of art and add greatly to the appearance of your landscape or garden.

Stone walls add height and can be constructed for a planting space on top. Wall can also be functional to hold soil or stabilize a slope on the property.

Natural rock ledges that crop out of the ground also can be used to advantage. When the soil is so shallow that mowing is a problem, you can expose more of the rock to create small planting pockets of soil.

If the existing stone is set quite low, add more rock layers to give some additional height to the final design.

difficult for some prospective buyers to meet such guidelines.

"These plans are designed to meet the needs and desires of the consumer by allowing eligible applicants to finance a home under a variety of scenarios," said Kathy Pitton, a spokeswoman for Comerica in Detroit.

"Flexibility is the driving force of the industry today." Comerica also offers a home-rehabilitation mortgage, a plan sponsored by the Federal Housing Administration, which

allows buyers to finance the purchase and improvements to a home at the same time. Again, an energy consultant or appraiser helps determine what amount can be borrowed.

National Bank of Detroit does not offer energy-efficient mortgages, but will, on a case-by-case basis, allow extra credit for buyers who install new windows or other significant home improvements, said Renee Ahee, second vice president for NBD.

Schoenherr, said developer Dominic J. Mocerri Jr. of Mocerri Development, Grand Blanc.

Builders covet the M-59 corridor, which follows the natural progression and population growth pattern.

The Vineyards represents some of the last available, buildable land in Sterling Heights, which became a city in 1969. Utilities only came to this area of the city last year. "The site is pristine with 55 acres of wooded area, ponds and creeks," Mocerri said.

More than 25 percent of the site will remain natural with wildlife, woods and a stream. Two spring-fed lakes boast lit fountains and stocked fish. Brick and limestone privacy walls surround the site's perimeter berms. Colorful greenbelts flourish. Each entrance is marked by a brick monument with a handcarved redwood logo lettered with gold leaf.

"The landscaping will rival anything in Bloomfield Hills," said Mocerri, who in 1989 participated in the Homearama

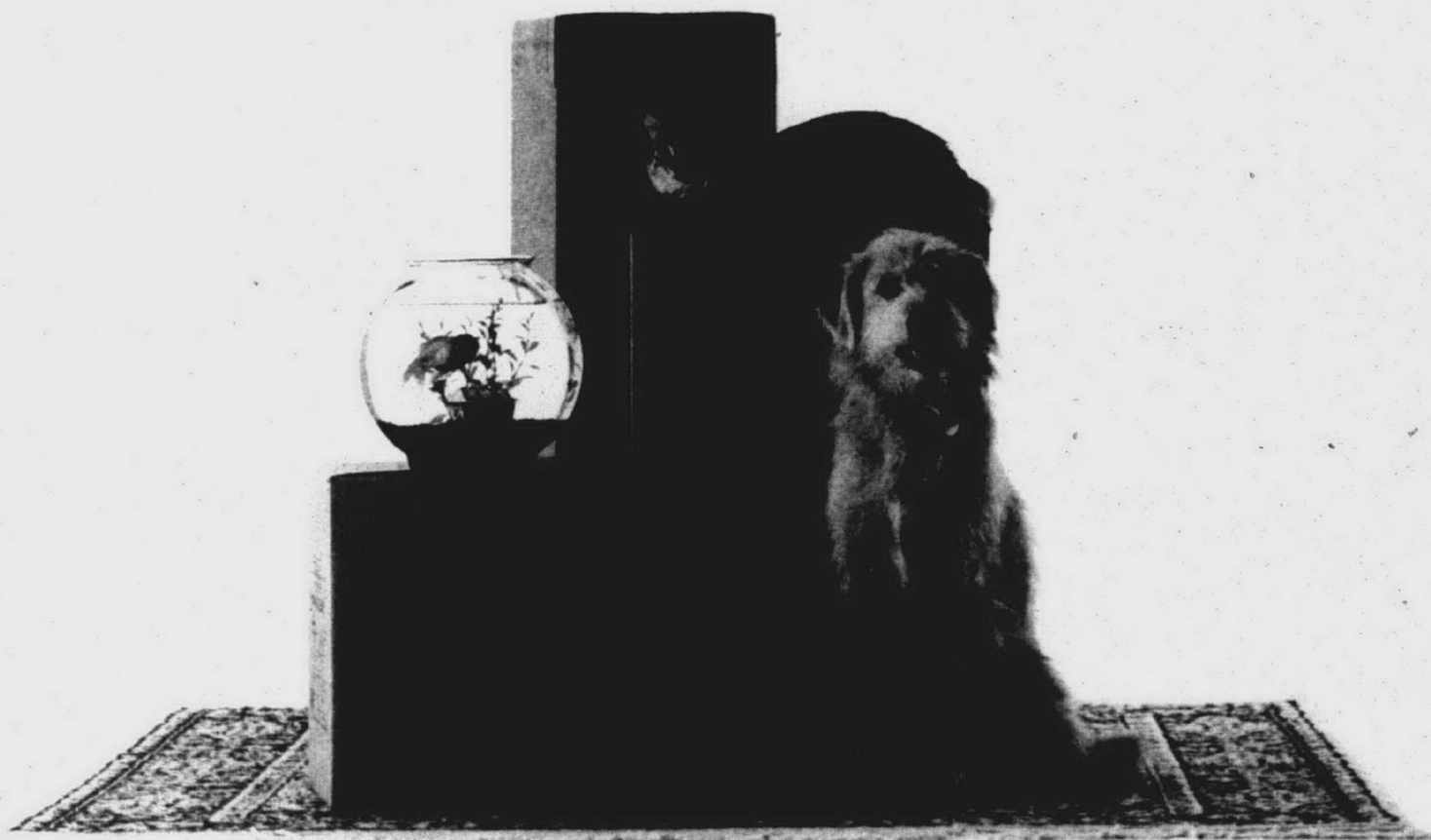
held at the Hills of Oakland in Oakland Township.

The Vineyards offers move-up homes — a family's second, third or fourth home — as well as maintenance-free condominium living for singles, couples with grown children, first-time buyers and smaller families.

"The Vineyards neighborhood represents some of the most appealing styles in residential design today," Mocerri said. "The homes 'share a casual elegance' and many, he said, 'feature multiple levels, dramatic rooflines and flexible interiors that welcome the use of high-volume ceilings, window walls, sunrooms and decks.'"
