# Teachers to picket board meeting



Teachers in the Plymouth-Canton school district are looking to settle their contract. They are planning to picket tonight's school board meeting. There has been no serious talk of a strike.

Frustrated with a stalemate in contract talks, teachers plan to picket before tonight's 7:30 p.m. Plymouth-Canton Board of Education meeting at Bentley Elementary School on Sheldon south of Cherry Hill.

Chuck Portelli, president of the Plymouth-Canton teachers' union, predicts a turnout larger than the 300 that picketed last week's board meeting. "We have informed the board office we will be there," said Portelli, adding that no other bargaining em-

ployee groups have been requested to take part.

A mediator met for the second time Tuesday with negotiators for the union and the school board at the administration building. However, little progress was made in bargaining which began at 7 p.m. and dragged on until 4:30 a.m.

At issue are wage re-openers for this year and next, the 1995-96 school calendar and contract language concerning school improvement plans and site-based decision making.

Superintendent Charles Little said,

"Both sides worked diligently to try to arrive at a settlement. There was recognition that our current financial position doesn't permit us to provide the increases which are being requested."

"The teachers' bargaining team, board of education members and administration tried very hard to come up with a creative solution to the finance problem. Unfortunately, we were not at a point of total agreement when the session ended after 4:30 a.m."

While the union has formed a crisis team, talk of a strike is premature, said Portelli.

"The executive board has not even discussed it," said Portelli. "We are optimistic about the process and want to give the process a chance."

"A crisis team is formed to deal

with the situation — to keep members informed, and it also takes suggestions and ideas from members and tries to form some type of plan to help deal with the situation," Portelli said.

Asked how likely a strike is, district spokesman Richard Egli said, "I wouldn't say. The teachers do have a contract, and I think that pretty well says it all."

Under terms of a new state law that takes effect April 1, striking teachers can be docked a day's pay for every day they strike. In addition, the union can be fined \$5,000 per day.

In the event of a lockout, individual school board members can be fined \$250 per day and the district cannot pick up the cost.

# Joint fire department is ready to serve

The Plymouth city and township administrations have signed the agreement making the joint city-township fire department a reality.

The joint fire department becomes effective on Thursday, and within 60-90 days all transitional training will have taken place, officials say.

"I think this is a very exciting time for both communities; it's something we've talked about for years," said township Supervisor Kathleen Keen McCarthy.

"People in Plymouth are going to benefit from a better quality of services at lower total cost," said city Mayor Doug Miller.

efforts to merge services in the city and township will continue, as talks are ongoing with Canton, Northville Township, Northville city and Plymouth city and township to merge fire dispatch operations.

For residents in both Plymouth city and township, officials say, there will be no change in whom to place calls to in case of a fire emergency — just dial 911.

Once city calls are taken by city dispatchers, fire calls will be passed to the township's 911 dispatchers for response. Officials say the switch

will take place immediately and response by the department will not be delayed.

The new Plymouth Community Fire Department will have 22 full-time firefighters and a maximum of 55 part-paid firefighters — trained individuals who respond to fire scenes but are paid on an hourly basis.

Larry Groth, township fire chief, will serve as chief of the new department, which essentially is being folded into the township fire department. Al Matthews, city fire chief, will serve as his deputy.

Firefighters will go through eight weeks of cross-training on apparatus and studying the layout of the two communities. Matthews has been moving data into the township's computers, including personnel records, statistics and other information.

Residents of the northern section of the city will receive better service when trains would have otherwise blocked the path of rescue vehicles, because the township's Beck Road station will be available.

The township's western section will also be better protected, as the agreement calls for the full staffing of the fire station on Beck Road.

The community will be served by three fire stations, all in the township.

# Plymouth begins search for city attorney

City attorney Ron Lowe got himself elected district judge, so the search is on for a new Plymouth city attorney to replace him.

Mayor Doug Miller has appointed a committee of city officials to draft a request for proposals from attorneys interested in the job.

On the committee are Miller, Commissioners Robert Jones and Dennis Shrewsbury and City

Manager Steve Walters.

Their draft "will come back to the city commission for the Dec. 5 meeting, so the commission can make any comments or changes, and then send them out to as many sources as we can round up," Walters said.

By the city charter, the candidate who gets the job must live in Plymouth, or be willing to move here within a year if the commission grants a waiver.

The job advertisement will go to Plymouth firms and to law firms that currently have other

municipal clients, Walters said.

Sending out job advertisements to metro Detroit law firms "will get another batch of contacts," Walters said. "If they're not personally interested they might know people who might be."

On a timetable for hiring a new city attorney, Walters said. "If we get proposals out in the mail by Dec. 10, we'll probably have proposals in by Jan. 10."

City officials would review the proposals and make inquiries, Walters said. A group of top can-

didates would then be identified for further interviews.

"We ought to be in a situation to make a recommendation at one of the two meetings in February," Walters said.

Lowe will leave the job by early January, when he is to be sworn in as 35th district judge. "Ron Lowe's office will continue to prosecute for a few weeks as needed until we get to that February

appointment," Walters said, adding attorney John Donahue will also handle general city legal matters and attend city commission meetings.

To potential candidates, the city will advertise that there are two major components of the part-time job, Walters said: The prosecution of offenses taking place in the city and the handling of legal matters for the city ad-

ministration.

The city attorney attends city commission and other meetings involving the city administration and city commissioners, develops ordinances as requested, handles legal challenges against the city, and pursues the city's interests as plaintiff.

Firms or attorneys applying for the job will be asked to propose fee schedules, Walters said.

## Plymouth Symphony releases 1st CD

The Plymouth Symphony Society has released the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra's first compact disc.

Available in a limited edition of only 1,000 copies, the 50th anniversary compact disc, entitled "Sound Waves," features over two hours of favorite classical and popular selections from such famous composers as Mozart, Jacques Offenbach, and Andrew Lloyd Webber.

The digital recording will be available Nov. 21 and includes selections from Webber's "Jesus Christ Superstar" and "The Phantom Of The Opera;" Tchaikovsky's "The Nutcracker;" "Overture To Marriage Of Figaro"

by Mozart; "Beauty and the Beast" by Menken; and Offenbach's "Overture To Orpheus In The Underworld."

The featured selection, "Night Rivers Symphony No. 3," by Anthony Iannaccone, was recorded live, during its premiere performance, Nov. 13, 1992, with the composer conducting the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra.

Included with the disc is a 12-page insert containing program notes and background information about the Symphony's 50-year history and its conductor, Russell Reed.

According to Reed, this recording marks the realization of a dream of the symphony's board of

directors and himself, and will help the orchestra begin its second half-century on a positive, upbeat note. The CD will be used as the centerpiece for a major fundraising program to be announced later.

The compact discs may be purchased from the Symphony Society office, (313) 451-2112, or from Dearborn Music Co., in Canton; Repeat-the-Best, Plymouth; Borders Book Shop, Novi; and both Gitfiddler and Bookstall On The Main, in Northville. The price is \$10 for season ticket holders and \$15 for other music lovers. Mail orders require a \$2 postage/handling charge, and both MasterCard and Visa are accepted.

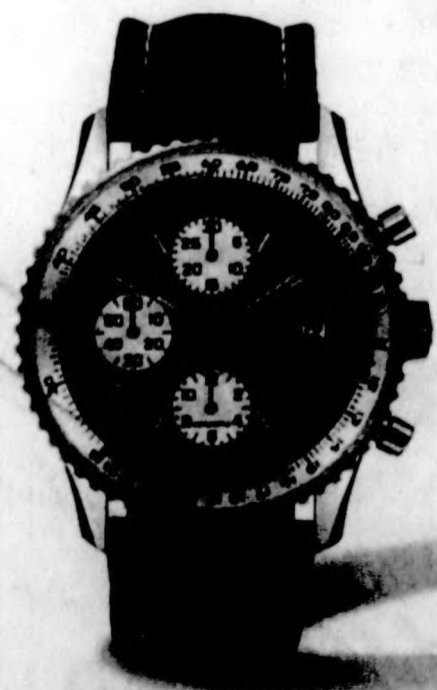

# Goodfellows hit the streets for needy kids

The Plymouth Goodfellows have been raising money for needy kids and families for more than 30 years, and they're back at it on Saturday, Dec. 3.

And among the Goodfellows selling special newspapers will be a family that used to benefit from the Goodfellows' help.

"They say the only Christ-

mas they knew was a Goodfellows Christmas," said Clara Hill of the Plymouth Goodfellows Association.

The group's motto is "No Kid-die Without a Christmas." Their fund-raising activity pays for presents for needy kids at Christmas. The Goodfellows find out about the families through the Salvation Army and other sources.

"We talk to the parents and

find out what the kids want on their Christmas lists," Hill said.

Last Christmas, the Plymouth Goodfellows raised \$6,500 to aid 58 recipients, buying clothing, toys and family food certificates.

Last year marked the first time in four years the group raised enough to meet the needs of needy kids brought to their attention. The group hopes to raise enough

money to meet needs this year, through newspaper sales at street corners on Saturday, Hill said.

The group was founded in Detroit 53 years ago. It was then called the "Old Newsboys," as a former newsboy got the idea to get other former newsboys together to sell newspapers to raise money for needy kids.

While membership in the Plymouth Goodfellows has dipped in re-

cent years, it's now heading back up. Hill said 25 members came to the October Goodfellows meeting, and there are about 80 members in all.

"All proceeds collected go 100 percent to the needy, minus printing costs," Hill said.

If there's any extra money, it goes to other service activities - like the purchase this year of a used refrigerator the Goodfellows stocked with food for an el-

derly resident whose refrigerator had stopped working, Hill said.

Meetings are held on the first Wednesdays of October, November and March. The group also meets informally for breakfast on Saturday morning and sometimes during the week at the Main Street Deli, she said.

## Homegrown poets are featured in new publication

Some Plymouth poets have joined others from western Wayne County whose works are published in "Poems From Home," a 1995 engagement calendar now on sale.

It's the second year Karen Gould of Plymouth has published an engagement calendar featuring the work of local poets.

"There's a lot of good ideas that never get published," Gould said, adding poets typically have to apply to a national magazine to get their poems published.

"I know when I first got published it was the greatest feeling in the world," Gould said, adding she wants to spread that feeling around.

The books, at \$9.95 suggested retail, are available at the Little Professor Book Center, Richardson's Drugs on Ford Road in Canton, and the bookstore on Schoolcraft College's main campus. Other outlets are planned.

While last year's calendar focused mainly on Plymouth poets, this year's edition includes the works of Schoolcraft College students and members of the Livonia Writer's Group. Also represented are Plymouth-Canton schools stu-

dents, members of the Plymouth Poets, and Canton poets.

"It's a little wider in scope," Gould said. Five judges looked over 180 poems by 63 different poets to choose 56 poems for inclusion in the calendar.

"Each judge had a packet of 30 poems. They each selected favorites and made a second list of good possible poems. It's not all one person's vision of what poetry should be," Gould said.

The youngest poet is Matt D'Avanzo, 7, with "Spring." The senior citizens included declined to compete for the title of Oldest Poet," Gould said.

Gould's publishing company operates out of a small office in her Old Village home. Her husband, Stephen Wroble, a computer graphics instructor at Schoolcraft College, provides graphic design advice.

Gould said she intends to seek additional material from local writers this year as she is investigating the potential market for a collection of stories from senior citizens about days gone by, and the poetry or essays of children and young adults.

"With a computer, a publishing program and a binding machine, almost anything is

possible and affordable," she said. "And I especially like the idea of providing a voice for the young people and the senior citizens of our community."

She spent \$1,200 on the calendars last year, and just about

recovered her costs. Gould said she spent \$1,800 on this year's calendars. "I'd like to make a little bit of a profit; I printed 500 this year," she said.

As of Wednesday, she'd sold 225.

## Township seeks grant for historical survey

With all of Canton's growth, the Historic District Commission has set its hopes on conducting a study of some 25 houses and buildings to capture the township's agricultural history.

"Any of the homes we have that fall under the historical umbrella are farmhouses or part of an agricultural-based economy," said trustee Melissa McLaughlin, a historic district commissioner.

The commission received township board approval to apply for a grant through the Michigan Bureau of History to conduct a survey of the properties from the years 1805-1945.

Trustee Bob Shefferly opposed the grant application. He also asked for a study session in the future to discuss the amount of money allocated for historic preservation.

The study of the buildings, including farmsteads, will be intensive, with a slide show and photographs. "It's sort of a public education and awareness tool," said Mike Ager, township resources development manager.

The survey is expected to cost \$13,000. The grant would provide \$7,800 or 60 percent, while the township would provide \$5,200 or 40 percent. Commissioners have asked that the money come from its unused allocation in the 1994 budget. If the grant is awarded, the town-

ship board would approve the budget change.

"It is important it be done given the rate we're developing at," McLaughlin said.

The township's designation as a Certified Local Government allows the commission to have access to historic preservation money. But there's a catch. The designation requires the commission to conduct surveys of historic properties.

"If we don't complete survey work, we stand the chance of losing our CLG," McLaughlin said.

Communities designated under the federal Certified Local Governments program - administered through the state - are considered part of an elite group. "It's kind of a prestige thing that we take historic preservation seriously," Ager said.

The buildings that will be studied are not designated historic sites in Canton. The survey would be part of the designation process, but buildings would not be automatically designated. The buildings are privately owned. "The owners are not impacted by this step," McLaughlin said.

Treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter questioned whether the commission's \$5,200 match for the proposed grant could be applied instead to continuing restoration of the Bartlett-Travis House on Ridge Road. She also questioned whether money was available for the survey in the 1994 budget.

## Santa to arrive via helicopter

The public is invited to greet Santa Claus when he arrives by helicopter at 1 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 3, at Builder's Square on Ford Road.

"We will pick him up in a pick-up truck and drive him to the store," said Dale McGriff, plumbing sales manager and vice president of the store's employee club.

Aware that Santa comes by helicopter to the city of Westland annually, McGriff started thinking "A friend of mine owns a helicopter. We had talked about it and he agreed to do it."

# High court rejects suit against schools

The Michigan Court of Appeals has ruled against a Canton family that sued Plymouth-Canton Community Schools for the wrongful death of their 8-year-old son in March, 1990.

Stephen Nalepa, a second-grader at Gallimore Elementary School, died of asphyxiation after slipping his head into a looped belt tied to a rail on his loft bed.

The day before, Stephen and his classmates viewed "Nobody's Useless," a film about a handicapped boy who decides life is worth living after trying to take his own life. The character attempts to kill himself by jumping off a bridge, then by hanging himself with a belt.

The court ruled that school officials, charged with gross negligence by Lawrence and Debby

Nalepa, are entitled to governmental immunity. Citing the federal case "Ross vs. Creighton University," the appellate court found that "the ultimate responsibility for what is learned remains with the student, and many considerations, beyond teacher misfeasance, can factor into whether a student receives the intended message."

Recommended for fourth-through ninth-graders, the film was not screened by staff at Gallimore before it was shown. "Nobody's Useless" hasn't been shown in the district since Stephen's death.

Attorneys for the Nalepas are considering an appeal to the state Supreme Court. Roland Thomas — Plymouth-Canton school board president in 1990 and still a trustee — said he preferred not to comment.

Debby Nalepa is recovering

from injuries she received when she was hit head-on by police in a recent high speed chase in Oakland County. She said she is still "too upset for words. I can't imagine why the court would cite a federal law regarding a university student. Why would that have any bearing? If anyone has a first- or second-grader, they'd wonder how the court could possibly compare the two on an equal level."

Nalepa said her case included testimony from a Canton mother whose son, formerly a student at Gallimore, tried to kill himself in 1985 after seeing the same movie. The boy, who still attends Plymouth-Canton Schools, tried to commit suicide by tying a noose around his neck, climbing on top of a freezer in the basement and pretending to jump.

The mother testified she was told by Gallimore Principal Joyce

Deren that the boy's actions could not possibly be connected to the movie.

"People have to realize this happened in 1985 to a 7-year-old and again in 1990 to an 8-year-old," she said. Nalepa said her son was a talented artist with an IQ of 132 whom she still misses greatly. "Anyone out there will know the heartbreak I am going through."

The Nalepas have another son, Jason, a senior at Plymouth-Canton High School.

"I want to make sure everybody knows I have, or had, two special boys in my life, and one, right now, is quite a young man," said Nalepa. "He's applying to the Air Force Academy. He's at the top of his class and has received many high honors. He's maintained a 4.0 average all through his high school years."

Plymouth-Canton school board president David Artley hasn't yet read the opinion, but said, "Nothing can lessen the loss the Nalepas suffer. They lost a son and it had a tragic effect on their family. I have a lot of compassion for that. I'm a parent and a grandparent, and I can only imagine the tragedy, hurt and pain they feel."

Artley maintained the district is not guilty of negligence. "I do not now, nor did I at the time, feel that the school district was at fault. I never saw that cause-and-effect relationship. I think a tragic, terrible accident occurred. I would hope that they can deal with their tragedy and go on about their lives, but never forgetting the child they lost. They need to deal with it and move on. It's not a family of one child, and that other child needs his parents."

# Airport casino idea draws lukewarm response

Area officials have mixed reactions to county Executive Edward McNamara's idea to put a gambling casino in a new terminal at Metro Airport.

McNamara announced Nov. 15 that he wants Metro Airport's new terminal to include a gambling casino for passengers.

While characterizing gambling as "evil," McNamara said an airport casino would come in handy to help pay for improvements to Metro.

To get his wish, McNamara would need the approval of the state Legislature and the governor.

State Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, said he would be "surprised" if such approval is given, considering the "general reluctance to expand gambling" on the part of Lansing lawmakers.

"Personally, I'd be very reluctant to vote for expansion of gambling," Geake said. "Michigan

said. "Wayne County might as well be permitted to engage in it."

County Commissioner-elect Bruce Patterson, a Canton Township resident, said he's "not categorically against" gambling at Metro Airport.

Commissioner Michelle Plawecki, D-Deerborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township, chairs the committee that has oversight responsibility for Metro Airport.

Plawecki said she needs more information before she makes a decision. "I'm not in favor of it right now because I don't know anything about it," she said.

Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, who also represents Canton Township, said he doubts the Federal Aviation Administration would permit a casino to be built at Metro. "The FAA has not been receptive to a lot of new ideas," Amann said.

No one from McNamara's staff returned the Observer's phone calls by press time.

CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. 94-10 CHAPTER 112 FIRE PREVENTION CODE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 9.203, 9.203.1 AND 9.203.2 OF CHAPTER 112, FIRE PREVENTION CODE, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, ADOPTING AND INCORPORATING BY REFERENCE THE B.O.C.A. NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION CODE OF 1993, ESTABLISHING MINIMUM REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE SAFEGUARDING OF LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE EXPLOSION HAZARDS ARISING FROM THE STORAGE, HANDLING AND USE OF HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES, MATERIALS AND DEVICES, AND FROM CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE OR PROPERTY IN THE OCCUPANCY OF BUILDINGS AND PREMISES, AND ADDING, DELETING AND AMENDING SPECIFIC SECTIONS OF THE 1993 B.O.C.A. NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION CODE, PROVIDING FOR FIRE HYDRANTS AND WATER VALVES, PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES, PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY FOR VIOLATION HEREOF; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE ORDINANCE.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Chapter 112, The City of Plymouth Fire Prevention Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 9.203. Code adopted. The B.O.C.A. National Fire Prevention Code of 1993 as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. is adopted by reference as the Fire Prevention Code of the City of Plymouth governing the safeguarding of life and property from fire and explosion hazards arising from the storage, handling and use of hazardous substances, materials and devices, and from conditions hazardous to life or property in the occupancy of buildings and premises subject to the additions, deletions and amendments to B.O.C.A. National Fire Prevention Code of 1993 as listed in Section 9.203.1 of this Chapter.

Section 9.203.1 Changes in the Code. The following sections and subsections of the National Fire Prevention Code of 1993 are hereby amended or deleted as set forth and additional sections and subsections are added as indicated. Subsequent section numbers used in this Chapter shall refer to the like numbered sections of the National Fire Prevention Code of 1993.

F-100.1. Title. These regulations as set forth herein shall be known as the Fire Prevention Enforcement Ordinance of the City of Plymouth and are hereby referred to as such or as the "Code".

F-111.2. Authorities at Fires and Other Emergencies. The Fire Official or duly authorized representative, as may be in charge at the scene of a fire or other emergency involving the protection of life and/or property is empowered to direct such operations as may be necessary to extinguish or control any suspected or reported fire, gas leaks or other hazardous conditions or situations or of taking any other action necessary in the reasonable performance of duty. The fire official may prohibit any person, vehicle or object from approaching the scene and may remove or cause to be removed from the scene any person, vehicle or object which may impede or interfere with the operations of the Fire Department. The fire official may remove or cause to be removed any person, vehicle or object from hazardous areas. All persons ordered to leave a hazardous area shall do so immediately and shall not re-enter the area until authorized to do so by the fire official in accordance with the state and federal laws.

F-111.4. Interference with Fire Department Operations. It shall be unlawful to interfere with, attempt to interfere with, conspire to interfere with, obstruct or restrict the mobility of or block the path of travel of any fire department emergency vehicle in any way or to interfere with, attempt to interfere with, conspire to interfere with, obstruct or hamper any fire department operation.

F-111.5. Compliance with Orders. A person shall not willfully fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of the fire official or to interfere with the compliance attempts of another individual.

F-111.6. Vehicles Crossing Fire Lines. A vehicle shall not be driven or propelled over any unprotected fire line of the Fire Department when laid down on any street, alley-way, private drive or any other vehicular roadway without the consent of the fire official in command of said operation.

F-111.7. Definitions of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Authorized emergency vehicles shall be restricted to those which are defined and authorized under the laws of the State of Michigan.

F-111.8. Operations of Vehicles on Approach of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Upon the approach of any authorized emergency vehicle giving audible and visual signal, the operator of every other vehicle shall immediately drive the same to a position as near as possible and parallel to the right-hand edge or curb of the street or roadway, clear of any intersection, and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles shall have passed, unless otherwise directed by the fire official or a police officer.

F-111.9. Vehicles Following Fire Apparatus. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle other than one on official business to follow closer than 200 feet from any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm or to drive any vehicle within the block or immediate area where fire apparatus has stopped in answer to a fire alarm.

F-111.10. Unlawful Handling or Tampering with Fire Department Emergency Equipment. A person shall not without proper authorization from the fire official in charge of said fire department emergency equipment attempt to, attach himself to, climb upon or into, board or swing upon any fire department emergency vehicle, whether the same is in motion or at rest, or sound the alarm, horn, bell or other sound producing device thereon or to manipulate or tamper with or attempt to manipulate or tamper with any lever, valve, switch, control, starting device, brake, pump or any equipment or protective device, or a part of any fire department emergency vehicle.

F-111.11. Damage or Injury to Fire Department Equipment or Personnel. It shall be unlawful for any person to damage or destroy or attempt or conspire to damage or destroy any fire department emergency vehicle at any time or to injure or attempt to injure or conspire to injure fire department personnel while performing departmental duties.

F-111.12. Emergency Vehicle Operation. The driver of any emergency vehicle, as defined in subsection F-111.7 of this Ordinance, shall not exceed the speed limits or have the front head lights on or display any existing traffic regulations, except when said vehicle is responding to an emergency call or when responding to, but not upon returning from a fire. Traffic signals such as red, yellow and green lights, do not constitute an emergency call. The

when the driver of any such vehicle while in motion sounds audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle as may be reasonably necessary and when the vehicle is equipped with a least one lighted lamp displaying a red light visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of 500 feet of the front of such vehicle.

F-111.13. Blocking Fire Hydrants and Fire Department Connections.

a. It shall be unlawful to obscure from view, damage, deface, obstruct or restrict the access to any fire hydrant or any fire department connection for the pressurization of fire suppression systems, including fire hydrants and fire department connections that are located on public or private streets and access lanes or on private property.

b. If upon the expiration of the time mentioned in a notice of violation, obstructions or encroachments are not removed, the fire official shall proceed to remove the same. Cost incurred in the performance of necessary work shall be paid from the municipal treasury on certificate of the fire official and within the approval of the chief administrative official and the legal authority of the municipality shall institute appropriate action for the recovery of such cost.

F-111.14. Hydrant Use Approval. A person shall not use or operate any fire hydrant intended for the use of the fire department for fire suppression purposes unless the person first secures a permit for such use from the fire official and the water company having jurisdiction. This section shall not apply to the use of such hydrants by a person employed by and authorized to make such use by the water company having jurisdiction.

F-111.15. Public Water Supply. The fire official shall recommend to the chief administrative official of the municipality the location or relocation of new or existing fire hydrants and the placement or replacement of inadequate water mains located upon public property and deemed necessary to provide an adequate fire flow and distribution pattern. A fire hydrant shall not be placed into or removed from service until approved by the fire official.

F-111.16. Street Obstructions. A person or persons shall not erect, construct, place or maintain any bumps, fences, gates, chains, bars, pipes, wood or metal horses or any other type of obstruction in or on any street within the boundaries of the municipality. The word "street" as used in the Ordinance shall mean any roadway accessible to the public for vehicular traffic, including, but not limited to, private streets or access lanes, and all public streets and highways with the boundaries of the municipality.

F-114.1. Property Identification Required. All property upon which houses, dwellings, buildings, businesses and other such structures are constructed with the City shall be considered developed property and shall have a property identification number which shall be posted on the face or other appropriate side of the house, dwelling, business or structure in a manner and location so that the identification numbers are clearly readable to a person of normal vision from the roadway.

Installation of property identification numbers shall be in accordance with the City of Plymouth Sign Ordinance adopted July 1, 1991.

F-503.4.4. Automatic Heat Detector System. In addition to the requirements in F-503.4, an Automatic Heat Detector System shall be installed throughout each dwelling unit, including garages. This system will be interfaced so as to provide an audible warning bell or horn for each unit within the multi-family complex, including apartments of condominiums.

F-504.6. Maintenance of Fire Suppression Equipment. A person shall not obstruct, remove, tamper with or otherwise disturb any fire hydrant or fire appliance required to be installed or maintained under the provisions of the Fire Prevention Code except for the purpose of extinguishing fires, training or testing purposes, recharging, making necessary repairs or when permitted by the fire official.

F-512.4. Automatic Fire Detection System. If an approved fire suppression system is not required in buildings of assembly occupancy, business occupancy, mercantile occupancy, factory and storage occupancy and educational occupancy, then an approved Automatic Fire Detection System will be required which is monitored 24 hours of everyday by an approved alarm company.

F-516.4. Prohibition Against Tampering with Fire Hydrants or Fire Extinguishers. No person shall, without authority of the Fire Chief or his designated representative, open any fire hydrant, except for the purpose of extinguishing a fire or shall wantonly, maliciously, willfully or in a negligent manner tamper with, destroy, damage, disturb, or impair any fire hydrant or fire fighting appliance or alarm, including but not limited to, a supplemental fire protection system, a fire extinguisher, sprinkler systems or an automatic fire warning system.

F-516.5. Interference Prohibited. No person, other than employees and agents of the City shall open or close or in any manner interfere with or operate any valve in the City water system.

F-516.6. Authorization to Operate Hydrants. No person shall open or operate any fire hydrant connected with the Plymouth City water system except in the following instances:

F-516.6.1. Such a person is an authorized employee or agent of the City.

F-516.6.2. Such person is a volunteer or paid fire fighter of the Plymouth Community Fire Department performing the duties of a fire fighter under the direction and supervision of the Chief of that Department.

F-516.6.3. Such person has first applied for and obtained a permit from the City, paying such charges as the City Commission by resolution established therefor, acting solely within the provisions of the permittee set forth in said permit and complying at all times with the rules and regulations established by the City Commission or the City Department of Water and Sewer or both.

F-516.6.4. Such person has first applied for and obtained a license to utilize such fire hydrants for fire emergency purposes only from the City, paying such charges as the City Commission may by resolution establish therefor, acting solely within the provisions of the license granted and complying at all times with the rules and regulations established by the City Commission or the City Department of Water and Sewer or both.

F-516.7. Obstruction and Tethers. No person shall place anything within 10 feet of any fire hydrant or otherwise obstruct any hydrant so as to interfere with its proper use. No person shall use any wrench or tool in opening any hydrant other than a regulation fire department wrench.

F-504.2. Private Fire Hydrant. A "private fire hydrant" is defined as a fire hydrant connected to the City water supply system but located on private property. The employees and agents of the City shall have the right to enter upon private property to determine whether a private fire hydrant exists. Further, the employees and agents of the City shall have the right to enter upon private property for the purpose of inspecting, installing, maintaining, dismantling, repairing, replacing, removing or operating a private fire hydrant. The owner, lease or contractor, or any of them of private property containing a private fire hydrant, shall be responsible for having such hydrant inspected and maintained in accordance with the rules and regulations of the City Commission or the City Department of Water and Sewer.

Chief and the Superintendent of Water and Sewer certify payment of all established fees has been made and the private fire hydrant is in conformity with the adopted rules and regulations.

F-516.9. No Liability. By adoption of this Chapter or by the undertaking of any acts or foregoing of same pursuant to this Chapter, the City makes no warranties whatsoever to any person or for the benefit of any property; and the City, its agents, employees and independent contractors shall not be held liable in damages or otherwise for any act or omission in any way pertaining to fire hydrants, whether public or private.

F-516.10. Penalties. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provisions of this Code shall be punished as provided in the City Code. Each day that violation of this Chapter is continued or permitted to exist without compliance shall constitute a separate offense punishable upon conviction in the same manner heretofore prescribed.

F-517.6. Access to Fire Hydrants. All buildings and portions thereof in the city occupied or used for an assembly, business, educational, high hazard, industrial, residential or storage occupancy, except dwellings, shall be situated within 300 feet of a public fire hydrant by direct public road access or by direct private road access, provided said private road is improved according to the minimum requirements of the Wayne County Road Commission and said public fire hydrant shall be situated immediately adjacent to and in no event a distance greater than 300 feet from said public or private road. Fire department fire suppression water connections shall be located within 125 linear feet by direct road access of a fire hydrant which is supplied by a public water main.

F-517.7. Exceptions. When the Fire Chief determines that the size, construction, location or occupancy use of a building otherwise subject to the provisions of Section F-517.6 does not constitute a hazard to life and property from fire or explosion, the Fire Chief shall have the authority to vary the distance requirements set forth in Section F-517.6 as he shall deem reasonable and necessary. However, in no event shall the 300 foot minimum be extended beyond 500 feet.

F-518.6. Sale of Defective Fire Extinguishers. A person shall not sell, trade, loan or give away any form, type or kind of fire extinguisher which is not approved by the fire official, which is not in proper working order or the contents of which do not meet the requirements of the fire official. The requirements of this section shall not apply to the sale, trade or exchange of obsolete or damaged equipment for junk when said units are permanently disfigured or marked with a permanent sign identifying the unit as junk.

F-5102.2. Definitions. "Fireworks" shall mean and include any combustible or explosive composition as defined by the Michigan State Fire Marshal.

F-3206.10. Self-Service Fueling Stations. Self-service Fueling Stations dispensing Class I flammable liquids, will be required to install and maintain a UL or other nationally approved testing laboratory, fixed pipe dry chemical fire extinguisher system with a combined manual and automatic control system. Said system shall be installed in an approved manner over all of the self-service dispensing areas. The manual controls shall be installed at the attendants console and be clearly marked as to its function. Weather conditions shall be considered to prevent clogging or the operations of the extinguishing system. All employees shall be adequately trained in the operation of the extinguisher systems and the proper use of portable fire extinguishers.

F-3206.11. Future Use. Any location within the City of Plymouth currently using self-servicing dispensing of flammable liquids or who intends to use self-servicing dispensing of flammable liquids in the future shall comply with the provisions of this section. Existing self-service facilities shall be granted a twelve (12) month grace period from adoption of this Code to complete the required installation of a fixed pipe dry chemical fire extinguishing system as described in section F-3206.10.

F-3206.12. Prohibition Against Processing or Industrial Plants. No new bulk processing or industrial plants and distilleries or buildings, tanks or equipment used for the storage, processing, distillation, refining or blending of flammable or combustible liquids shall be located within the limits of the City.

F-3207.8. Restricted Location. The storage of Class I liquids in above ground tanks outside of buildings is prohibited within the limits of the City except:

a. Said tanks for construction purposes may be permitted when application is made in writing and approved by the Fire Chief.

b. A UL-approved farm storage tank of 275 gallons or less capacity may be permitted when applications made in writing and approved by the Fire Chief in within the limits of the zoning use district designated AG by the zoning ordinance of the City, provided that both:

- 1. Proper diking and containment is provided and approved by the Fire Chief or his designate; and
- 2. When installation complies with the Michigan Fire Marshal's requirements, NFPA 90, and all Department of Natural Resources requirements.

Section 9.203.2. Establishment of limits. The limits referred to in section F-3003.3 of the B.O.C.A. National Fire Prevention Code in which the storage of explosives, ammunition and blasting agents is prohibited are hereby established as follows: The limits shall be the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth.

Section 2. Violation and Penalty.

Any person, corporation, partnership or other legal entity who violates the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or imprisoned not more than sixty (60) days, or both, at the discretion of the Court. Each day that the violation continues after due notice has been served in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 3. Savings Clause.

The rights and duties which have matured, penalties which have been incurred, proceedings which have begun and prosecution which have been commenced before the effective date of this Ordinance are not affected or abated by this Ordinance.

Section 4. Severability.

If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion hereof.

Section 5. Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 6. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall take full force and effect upon publication thereof.

The nine-year-old Kiddlywinks has done so well with its unique merchandise and personal service, that it's doubling its size by moving into larger headquarters down the street. Ham is president of Flapdoodles, one of the best-selling clothing lines at Kiddlywinks and one of the first to create cotton lycra leggings for children.

Customers are also being asked to bring in gently used and outgrown clothing to Kiddlywinks through Nov. 30 for a Flap-Me-Downs Collection which will be donated to Children's Orchards, Lighthouse of Pontiac, The Judson Center and Mother Wattle's Shelter in Detroit.

Cindy Obron Kahn of Franklin, opened Kiddlywinks in October 1985 as the first franchise of a

New York-based children's clothing shop known as R. J. Crumbsnatcher. After a year and a half in Birmingham, she bought out the franchise and changed the name to Kiddlywinks, ready to do her own thing in 550 square feet of retail space at 120 W. Maple.

Obron Kahn grew up in the area, graduating from Groves High School in 1975. She went on to become a special education teacher, working with deaf children for five years before following her husband's change of employment to New York City.

"I couldn't find a teaching job in New York, so I went to work in retail at R. J. Crumbsnatcher's," she said. "When we moved back to the Detroit area, I knew I wanted to have my own children's shop. Downtown Birmingham is where I wanted to be. I love it here for the great customers, the other business owners, the wonderful small boutiques."

Kiddlywinks stocks boys' and girls' outfits from infant sizes through size 14. The clothing is 100-percent cotton, featuring the Flapdoodles line of mix and match playwear in leggings and coordinated tops and accessories.

Lots of Halloween costumes are sold year-round for fun, and eight different styles of tutus are available for young dancers.

Kiddlywinks also sells one-of-a-kind children's antiques on the premises which are warmly integrated into the shop's decor — a child's oversized dressing room. The interior was designed by Sara Cullen and Ron Rea who have placed much of the merchandise in wicker trunks and dresser drawers.

# Renovations move Northland and Tel-Twelve ahead

Scissors sliced through red ribbons at two major Southfield shopping centers last week, dedicating renovated retail space to new life through the next decade.

An \$11-million remodeling project was completed in time for Northland Mall's 40th anniversary, and at Tel-Twelve Mall, Crowley's Department Store was totally redesigned to increase visibility and make room for new merchandise lines.

At Northland, Birmingham artist Marshall Fredericks showed up to see the Boy and The Bear sculpture he created in 1964 for the nation's first suburban shopping center, moved from the outside, inside. The bronze boy atop a marble bear that for years stood outdoors, now resides between Hudson's and Montgomery Wards in the west end of the mall.

Southfield Mayor Don Fracassi called Northland Center "a great lady," recalling the original gar-

dens, sculptures and retail projects that helped put the city of Southfield on the map back in the early 1960s.

State Sen. Jack Faxon mused that Northland was the birthplace of a city, spawning the subsequent "swift and rapid" development of housing, roads and other commercial enterprises that drew Detroiters from the city to the farmlands past Eight Mile Road.

The Rev. Loyce Lester pointed out that today 90 percent of Northland's clientele comes from Detroit. He praised general manager Catherine O'Malley for her support and ability to work with a diverse community of shoppers and retailers.

The "new" Northland is brighter, lighter and more user-friendly. Cream-colored walls are accented in blue and teal. Pillars enhance visibility. Two new anchors opened at the center in early November, Montgomery Wards and T. J. Maxx. The grand old

Hudson's at Northland is also being remodeled, department by department. Hudson's should be finished by the spring.

### Changing Crowley's

The need to update and revitalize was also felt by Crowley's. Fresh from some hard financial times with a recent \$12-million business loan to move the company forward, Crowley's knocked down walls and rearranged departments at its Tel-Twelve Mall store. President Dennis Callahan said Crowley's plans to expand through new locations in Rochester, Novi and Pontiac.

"At Tel-Twelve, we needed to create the look of a traditional department store with the merchandise visible clear to the back of the store," he said. "Now, shoppers can see all the different departments available. It's exciting, inviting."

Callahan said the Macomb Mall store is the company's most successful, followed by Crowley's

Westborn in Dearborn. "We've had a tough time in Birmingham and we're going to work hard to get that store going again."

He said the company is also producing more direct mail pieces and offering shoppers an 800-number to conveniently order merchandise.

Speeding sales at the register, is another company goal and to that end 120 scanners have been ordered.

Mayor Fracassi cut the ribbon on the remodeled store and told company executives that Southfield shoppers appreciate the location in town and the efforts to keep the store vital. Mall manager Richard Fair was also pleased about the changes at Crowley's.

"They've completely redesigned this store," he said. "It's a lot less confusing. The visibility from the front entrance draws shoppers right in."

Crowley's has opened three Trim A Home holiday shops this year at Tel-Twelve, Wonderland,

# To some birds, Michigan is like Key West in winter

Now that most of the "snow birds" have headed south to spend the winter in Florida, we also see the real snow birds that visit southeastern Michigan for the winter. To birds like the tree sparrow, pine siskin and dark-eyed junco, the Detroit area is their Florida. It's relatively warm here compared to their northern Canada breeding grounds.

Many species of birds move south in fall because winter conditions are too harsh and food is unavailable. If it were not for that

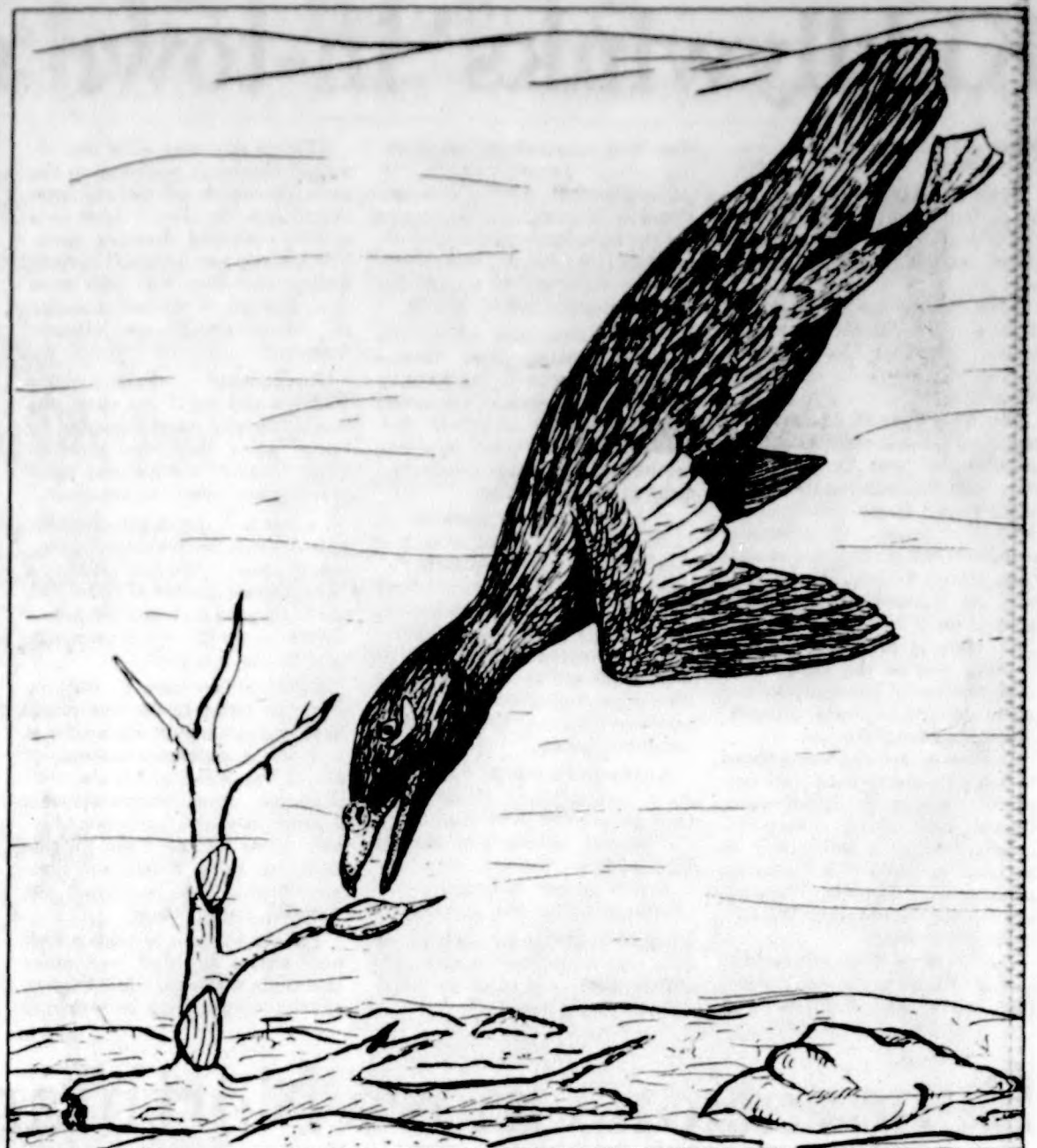
slight tilt of the earth's axis, climatic conditions would be spring- and fall-like all year. But because winter causes cold temperatures, insects become dormant, water freezes and consequently birds like warblers and ducks cannot find food in their summer breeding grounds of northern Canada.

A trip to Belle Isle in the Detroit River will allow you to see some of the northern Canada residents that consider the open water of the Great Lakes a good place to spend the winter. Many species of waterfowl migrate to the east coast where the water doesn't freeze. But a regional population of several species will linger, or stay, in the Great Lakes if the water is open and food is available.

For many years canvasback, redhead, goldeneye, bufflehead and scaup have used the St. Clair

river flats and the Detroit River as stopover areas on their way south or east. Some populations will stay until the water freezes and then move south just far enough to find open water and food. Those individuals that do not migrate as far as others may be the first in spring to reach the breeding grounds and be able to get first choice of nesting sites.

Along with several species of ducks, scoters have been seen along the Detroit River more frequently than in the past. Scoters specialize in eating mollusks from the lake bottom. I can't help but think that those scoters that stop here are finding a plentiful supply of zebra mussels on which to feed. If they can find food and not have to migrate any further, they may stay around longer and ultimately make the Detroit River area part of their regular stopover places.

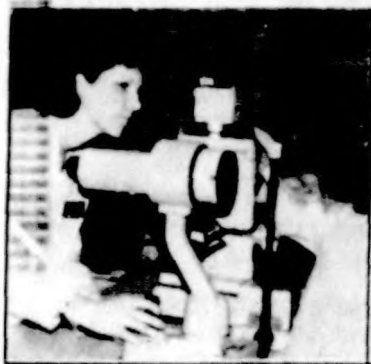

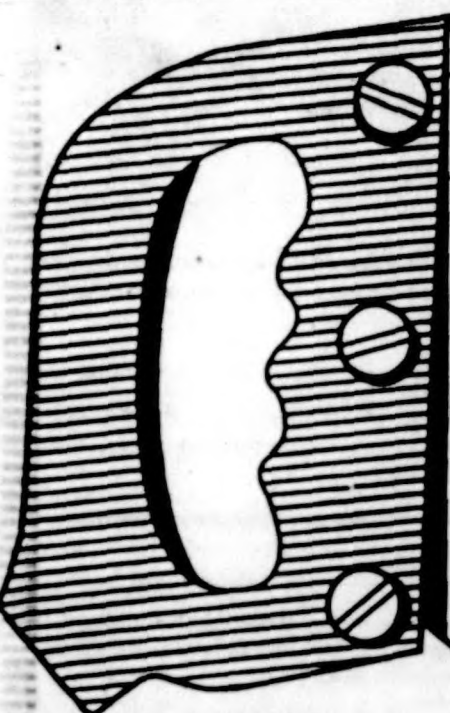

## Thanks for memories, Mr. Gingerbread Man

If I had to guess, I would guess that just about everybody loves gingerbread. Ask any of your gourmet-type friends, and more than likely they will tell you they do. My guess is that they will also tell you their favorite kind of gingerbread, who used to bake it, how it was made and where they ate it.

Gingerbread is a holiday favorite that fills the air with wisps of ginger, molasses and nutmeg. It is also a comfort food that warms the soul, the mind and hearts of young and old alike.

In the Janes Gang family tree, different women made different types of gingerbread. Momma would only bake old fashioned gingerbread in her heirloom 8- by 8-inch square pan.

We'd usually enjoy it with a big dollop of Cool Whip immediately following Sunday dinner. Any leftovers would be eaten by dad with his ritual morning pot of coffee.

### Raisin eyes, nut noses

Aunt Phyllis, on the other hand, was the proverbial gingerbread people creator. Her early-American decorated home would have a multitude of gingerbread families adorning the Christmas tree. Plates of gingerbread men, women and children would be garnished with raisins for eyes, nuts for noses and dots of frosting for buttons and dresses.

Aunt Edna was known for a gingerbread layer cake that could have won a prize for good looks at the Pillsbury Bake-Off. Momma said it was too bad she always overcooked it because, "Aunt Edna was well past 80 years, she had a hard time seeing the dials on the stove, but it was still good drenched in a hard whiskey sauce."

Stories, in the end, are the stuff of memories, and I like to think that when you make one of these gingerbread maven's recipes, you'll be providing loved ones with a few new stories and some delicious memories.

### Royal pedigree

Gingerbread and its making is steeped in history. Queen Elizabeth I supposedly invented the gingerbread man while playing with her gingerbread. Of course, where would we be without the story of Hansel and Gretel and the gingerbread house that turned out to be the witch's den?

In her first edition of "The Boston Cooking School Cookbook," Fanny Merril Farmer featured five different recipes for gingerbread. She wrote: "Gingerbreads vary from the simplest eggless mixture made with hot water, to a rich and buttery sour cream concoction which makes no pretense of being inexpensive."

Surprisingly, Ms. Farmer chose not to incorporate gingerbread people because "that was a craft item whereas good gingerbread is best served warm as a luncheon bread or with afternoon tea."

As with just about any other great recipe, the best gingerbreads are made with the best ingredients. In her book, "Entertaining On The Run" (William Morrow, 1994, \$25), author Marlene Sorosky suggests that the best gingerbread is made with the freshest spices.

Fresh ground cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger are a must, especially when most of us have spices older than the cars we drive. Ground spices lose 10-15 percent of their potency every year, especially when exposed to air and humidity.

If you use fresh cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger, the dish will be 50 percent more aromatic and tasty. Simply grate these fresh, whole spices on the finest side of your hand grater/shredder.

You can also expect better results when using pastry or cake flour, rather than all-purpose flour. Cake flour is usually triple sifted and certainly is not a prerequisite for making great cookies, but it does make a difference when baking cakes and pastries.

The folks at General Mills, makers of the Softasilk brand of cake flour, claim their product is milled with a smaller grind and has a lower protein level for more tenderness.

Heavy bleaching of the flour also helps break down the gluten and allows for better distribution of the fats and therefore better moisture retention.

Personally speaking, I get excellent results when preparing gingerbread by using a heavy, commercial-grade bakeware or oven-proof glass. Aluminum tins and pie plates have a tendency to brown the bottom crust and make a drier product.

## Round up kids for jolly afternoon of baking



Holiday magic: A cookie decorating party is lots of fun for kids of all ages.

An afternoon of cookie baking and decorating can be a terrific creative outlet for kids. It also has all the markings of a holiday party when each child invites a few friends to join the fun.

Organization is key to ensuring peace and goodwill, especially if you've invited a mixed-age crowd. Let the older kids take over the kitchen and bake while the younger ones turn the family room into Santa's workshop and decorate cookies baked the day before. At least one grown-up Santa's helper should be in each location to supervise and lend a hand if needed.

Little decorators will have lots of fun "dressing" the "Chocolate Teddy Bear Cookies," a recipe created by the Quaker Oats Company.

The ready-to-spread frosting you can buy in the supermarket is great glue for small candies, and it can be used to make mittens, ties, shoes, and other accessories.

Give each child a small plastic knife for safe spreading. Muffin tins or small unbreakable bowls will keep candies and sprinkles organized and easy to use.

Put the bakers to work mixing the dough for "Kris Kringle Shortbread." What makes this cookie such a snap is the mixing method. The ingredients are measured into a large resealable plastic bag, then squeezed and kneaded into a smooth dough. To shape, pinch off small pieces of dough and drop on the cookie sheet. Or, for more evenly shaped cookies, roll dough into balls. Using two fingers or the tines of a



fork, flatten cookies then decorate with colored sugar, sprinkles or other small holiday candies and bake.

Tied with ribbon and a small ornament, they'll be sweet remembrance of a magical afternoon.

Here are some more "Kids in the Kitchen," cookie baking tips from the folks who make Sun Maid Baking Raisins.

- Get ready to bake - select the recipe you want to bake. Discuss the baking project with mom, dad or an adult helper.
  - Keep several thick potholders handy.
  - Read the recipe entirely before beginning, making sure you understand the instructions.
  - Review the list of ingredients to make certain you have everything on hand. Gather all of the ingredients on the kitchen counter or table.

  - As you add each ingredient, put it back in its correct place. That way, you won't be confused about whether or not the ingredient has been added.

foods now taste good."

Ajluni said she uses the AHA Cookbook's new and revised fifth edition. That book, or the paperback fourth-edition, is available in area book stores.

"I've discovered there's a number of recipes available in this cookbook for good-tasting party foods, such as lemon-pepper mushrooms and pita crisps.

The young mother believes that "everything you put in your mouth affects you." That's why she is attempting to instill in her son good eating habits.

"I know that Steven is still young, but I really watch what I feed him. So far, he likes oatmeal, and he doesn't know what candy is."

She added that when the family travels, she carries healthy munchies, like bagels, pretzels and bananas.

Christine Stromp Hanba of Livonia said that having a small child and being connected with the cardiology field — she is a nurse — are among the reasons that she serves healthy foods in her home. "She always served healthy meals and has stressed the importance of being active and being fit. This is how I am raising my nine-month-old son, Joey."

Hanba said she substitutes low-fat or no-fat ingredients in her recipes.

Dips are an important part of Hanba's entertaining menu. She especially likes the cranberry-orange dip and the Mexicali bean dip from the "Lean and Luscious and Meatless" cookbook, by Bobbie Hinman and Millie Snyder.

Jan Westveer of Troy also serves healthy food when she entertains, because, like Hanba and Ajluni, she is an AHA Heart Ball committee member, and she's married to a cardiologist and has a nursing background. Westveer is also the mother of four children, ages four to 20.

# Bake memories of gingerbread

## GINGERBREAD PEOPLE

- 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, room temp.
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar, packed
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1 large egg

Sift the flour, ginger, cinnamon, soda, cloves and salt together in a large bowl. Set aside. Using an electric mixer, cream butter and sugar together until fluffy and smooth. Beat in molasses and egg. Add the dry ingredients and mix well to incorporate. Gather dough into a ball and divide into three pieces. Flatten each piece into a disk, wrap in plastic and refrigerate until firm. (Can be made a day ahead.)

Position rack in center of the oven. Preheat to 375 degrees.

Line two baking sheets with parchment paper. Set aside. Roll

out one chilled disk of dough on a lightly floured surface to 1/4-inch thick. Using a gingerbread cutter about 5 inches in height, cut out gingerbread forms.

Transfer with a spatula to baking sheets. Space cookies about 1 inch apart. Gather all leftover dough and repeat. Bake cookies at 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Allow to cool for 1 minute then remove to cool on wire racks.

Store in airtight containers. Makes about 2 dozen.

## MOMMA'S RICH SOUR CREAM GINGERBREAD

- 2 eggs
  - 1/2 cup sour cream
  - 1/2 cup molasses
  - 1/2 cup dark brown sugar, packed
  - 1 1/2 cups cake flour, sifted
  - 1 teaspoon ginger
  - 1 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/2 cup melted, unsalted butter
- Beat eggs until foamy and stir in sour cream, molasses and brown sugar. Set aside. Sift together the dry ingredients and stir into egg mixture and mix well. Stir in butter and incorporate. Lightly grease and flour an 8 by 8-inch baking dish

and bake in a preheated 325 degree oven for 30 minutes or until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 4-6.

## AUNT EDNA'S GINGERBREAD CAKE

- 1/2 cup solid vegetable shortening (i.e. Crisco)
  - 1/2 cup granulated sugar
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
  - 1/2 cup molasses
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 tablespoon instant coffee dissolved in 2 teaspoons hot water
  - 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
  - 2 teaspoons fresh grated lemon peel
  - 2 cups cake flour
  - 1 tablespoon cinnamon
  - 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon ginger
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
  - 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease and flour a 9-inch round cake pan. Set aside. Cream together the shortening and both sugars until fluffy, about 2-3 min-

utes. Stir in molasses, eggs, coffee, vanilla and lemon peel and mix well. Set aside. Sift together the flour, spices, soda and salt and stir into shortening mixture.

Stir until just mixed. Do not overmix. Pour into prepared pan and bake in a preheated oven for 45 minutes or until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 6.

## GINGER CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

- 5 large crystallized ginger slices
  - 2 tablespoons plus 2 cups powdered sugar
  - 1 pound cream cheese, room temp
  - 1/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, room temp
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger
  - 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract

# What's in coolest box in the house?

In addition, respondents looked inside the coolest box in the house and found a TV remote control, gym shoes, car keys, one dead parakeet and a dead snake, and one set of very frosty false teeth.

The three most commonly found items on refrigerator shelves are milk (83 percent), eggs

(37 percent) and butter (36 percent). Preserves, jams and jellies (10 percent), pickles (6 percent) and condiments such as mustard (7 percent) and ketchup (6 percent) are most likely to linger in the chilly environs of U.S. iceboxes, some for as long as a year.

The national survey was conducted in observance of Whirlpool's first national Clean Out Your Refrigerator Day on Nov. 16.

The hectic lifestyle of today's families was reflected in the survey respondents' casual refrigerator cleaning habits. Just over half completely dismantle their refrigerator for cleaning. Only 12 percent wipe down the shelves and

drawers weekly, with most taking on the task monthly (32 percent) or just twice yearly (21 percent). Although the average consumer may not boast a sparkling clean refrigerator, one heartening trend was noted: most do eliminate outdated food on a monthly (27 percent), bimonthly (12 percent) or weekly (19 percent) basis. Perhaps that's why almost three out of four people polled confidently predict they would pass a special inspection by the "refrigerator police."

As an added note, although one might expect to find caviar and champagne in the "refrigerators of

the stars," Whirlpool's survey identified that celebrity refrigerators are mainly stocked with familiar beverages. Troy Aikman, quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys, reports you can always score milk, orange and apple juice in his refrigerator, while Michael Bolton sings the praises of his ever-available supply of bottled water, half and half cream and orange juice. TV show host Regis Philbin puts skim milk, strawberry jam and leftover take-out food in the spotlight. Only Martin Yan of "Yan Can Cook" fame prefers a more exotic assortment: packages of tofu and pot stickers, a ½ pot of jook, Asian pears and baby bok choy.

## CHOCOLATE TEDDY BEAR COOKIES

1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, softened  
 1 cup sugar  
 2 eggs  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate pieces, melted  
 2 cups oatmeal (quick or old-fashioned uncooked)  
 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
 1 teaspoon baking powder  
 1/4 cup salt (optional)  
 Ready-to-spread frosting  
 Assorted small candies

Beat together margarine and sugar until creamy. Add eggs, vanilla and melted chocolate. Add combined oats, flour, baking powder and salt; mix well. Cover, chill about 1 hour. Heat oven to 350 degrees F. To make bears, shape dough into 1-inch balls for the bodies, 1/4-inch

balls for the heads and 1/4-inch balls for the arms, legs and ears.

On ungreased cookie sheet, gently press pieces together to form bears, placing 2 inches apart. Flatten slightly; bake 10 to 12 minutes or just until dough is firm to the touch. Cool 2 minutes on cookie sheet; remove to wire rack. Cool completely. Decorate as desired. Makes 2 dozen cookies.

To melt chocolate — place in dry glass measuring cup or microwaveable bowl. Microwave at high 1-2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds, until smooth. Or, place in top part of a double boiler over hot water; stir until smooth.

## KRIS KRINGLE SHORTBREAD

1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine, softened  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 2 cups oatmeal (quick or old-fashioned uncooked)

1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour  
 Colored sugar, nonpareils or sprinkles

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Place margarine in large (1 gallon) resealable plastic bag; seal. Squeeze with hands until very soft. Open bag; add sugar and vanilla. Reseal; squeeze and knead until ingredients are well mixed.

Add oats and flour, reseal. Squeeze and knead until ingredients are well mixed.

Open bag; scrape dough together with spatula and remove from bag. Shape into 1-inch balls; place on ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten balls with fingers or tines of fork to 1/4-inch thickness. Decorate as desired. Bake 12 to 14 minutes or until bottoms are light golden brown. Cool 1 minute on cookie sheet; remove to wire rack. Cool completely. Store tightly covered. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.

She estimated that 100 women volunteers will spend 30 hours preparing the gingerbread men. They mixed 27 batches of a batter (the recipe can be found at the end of this story) which makes about 48 dozen cookies per batch.

"We roll it and cut it and bake as many as we can in a morning or evening," said DePup. The cookies are wrapped and stored in egg

boxes. The church's institutional-sized kitchen has four large ovens.

"It's hard work and it's a lot of fun. People tell stories and you get to know people you didn't know before."

"You have to have someone in there who has done it before because it's a big job, and when you have 13 women working, you have to be organized," DePup said.

During one of the "Hand-in-Hand" stops, visitors are invited to decorate the gingerbread cookies and take them home.

"Hand-in-Hand" is presented by the church every three years, which is probably just the right frequency for the hard-working cookie volunteers.

# Enjoy all those cookies without feeling guilty

Holiday memories often include the aroma of home-baked cookies. Unfortunately, many cookies are loaded with fat.

For example, refrigerated cookie dough may have 5-6 grams of fat per serving (usually 2 cookies). Box cookie mixes may have 6-10 grams of fat per serving, even if one follows the lowfat preparation method.

So in a heart-healthy diet, is it possible to have your cookies and eat them too? Yes, if one follows some easy recipe modifications, according to Rozolana Karanec, a dietitian with Henry Ford Heart and Vascular Institute.

For a healthier holiday, Karanec suggests trying some innovative fat skimming "tricks" that will result in delicious cookies.

■ Dried fruit such as raisins, prunes or apricots into the cookie dough instead of high fat ingredients like nuts and chocolate chips.

■ Use smaller amounts of nuts (1/4-1/2 cup per recipe).

■ For a satisfying crunch, leave the nuts in larger chunks.

■ Replace half the fat in the recipe with an equal amount of pureed fruit such as ripe bananas, stewed prunes, applesauce or canned pumpkin.

## Here's a recipe to try SUBARU COOKIES

1/4 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup tub margarine  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 2 egg whites  
 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
 1/2 cup vanilla non-fat yogurt

1 teaspoon baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
 Vegetable oil spray

Heat oven to 425 degrees F. Cream sugar and margarine.

Mix in vanilla, egg white and yogurt. Mix together flour, baking powder, baking soda and nutmeg. Add gradually to yogurt mixture. Mix well. Chill.

Divide dough into 3 equal parts. Roll each part 1/4-inch thick on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Cut with 2-inch cookie cutter. Place on cookie sheet sprayed with vegetable oil spray. Decorate with colored sugars.

Bake until no indentation remains when touched, approximately 6 to 8 minutes. Makes 4 dozen cookies. Each cookie is 57 calories, 1 gram of fat.

# Eat right to put yourself on 'The Road to Wellville'

Responding to consumer confusion about conflicting scientific nutrition messages reported in the media, Bruce Obbink, president of the California Table Grape Commission, offers this commentary on the state of the American diet:

"Want to lower your blood pressure? Eat 10 to 14 pounds of grapes a day — but nothing else — and your high blood pressure will be eliminated. Sound like another 'miracle' diet? Well, it was — in the 1970s. The proponent was Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, coiner of Corn Flakes and the subject of the best-selling novel, 'The Road to Wellville,' and the just-released movie of the same name.

Kellogg was the director of one of the first American diet clinics, Battle Creek Sanitarium. There Kellogg treated patients with peculiar nutrition and exercise regimens he could follow outside of

the confines of the sanitarium. For the weak of heart it was grapes, grapes, grapes; for skinny patients it was 26 feedings per day, their stomachs weighted with sandbags to increase the absorption of nutrients. All the rest ate bran, bran and more bran.

"Bran does not irritate," Kellogg enthused, "it titillates!" More than a century later, our inclination is to regard Kellogg as a huckster and possibly a hoax. But in our 20th-century eagerness, are we any closer to Wellville, that mythical land of fitness and good nutrition where everyone lives to a ripe and vigorous old age? Think for a moment about thigh cream, liposuction, the passing frenzy over oat bran, and the screaming diet guru hosting television infomercials. Are we on the cusp of the road to Wellville or cut-off content and in the ditch? One thing's for sure, scientists

know more about human nutrition and fitness than at any time in history.

Unfortunately, the consumer perceives that the current information interstate is clogged with conflicting facts: Take anti-oxidant vitamins; don't take killer anti-oxidant vitamins. Eat healthy ethnic foods; don't eat Italian, Chinese and Mexican food with their payloads of killer fat. And don't over teach movie popcorn, fast-food-french fries or anything else that tastes good.

It's no wonder that the American Dietetic Association found during a recent study that one-third of Americans no longer want to be bothered with nutrition. Another third knew they could improve but they don't want to. The remainder think they're on the Road to Wellville already, so bug off.

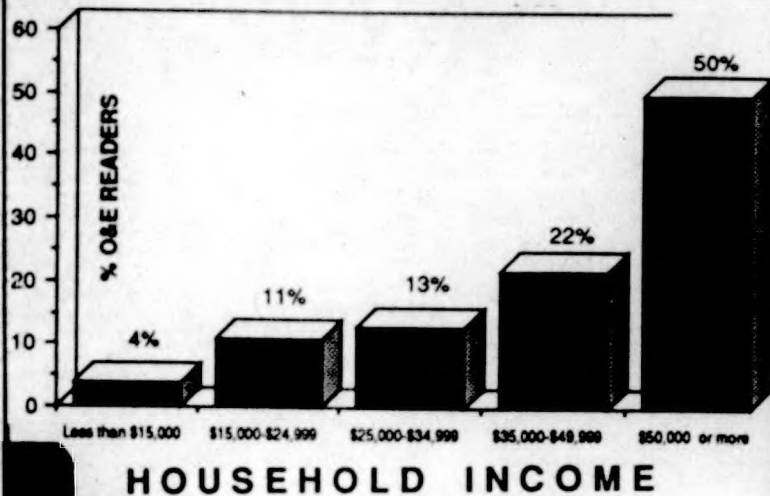

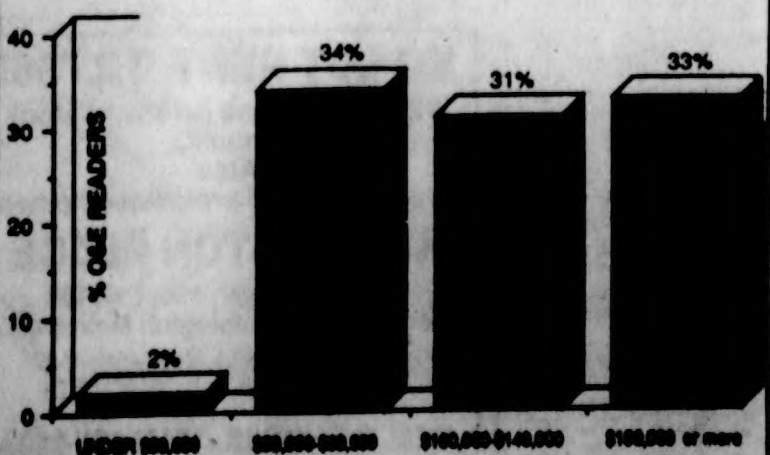

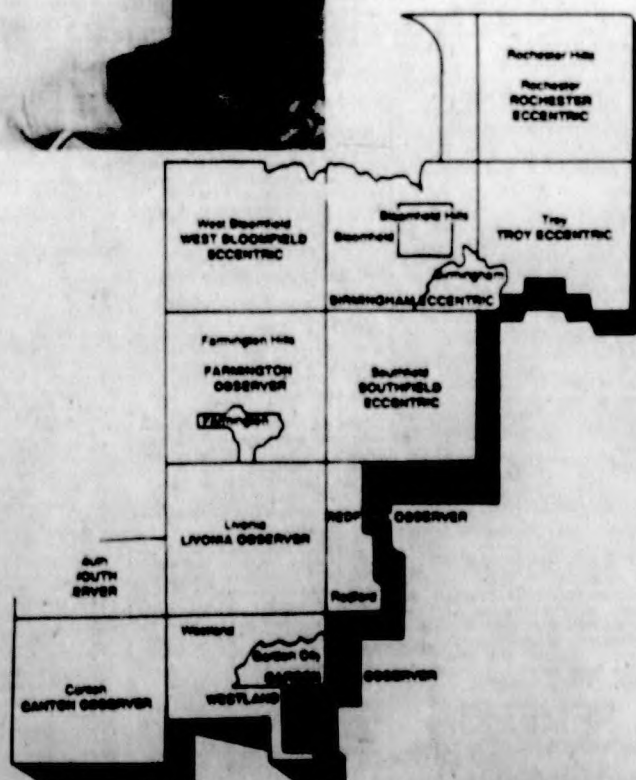

## Warnke leads Canton girls to quarterfinal

Another key for Canton was successfully navigating the Mustangs' full-court press.

"We were able to handle the pressure," Blohm said. He praised his players for using simple fundamentals — such as catching the ball with two hands and keeping well-balanced — to beat the Marian press.

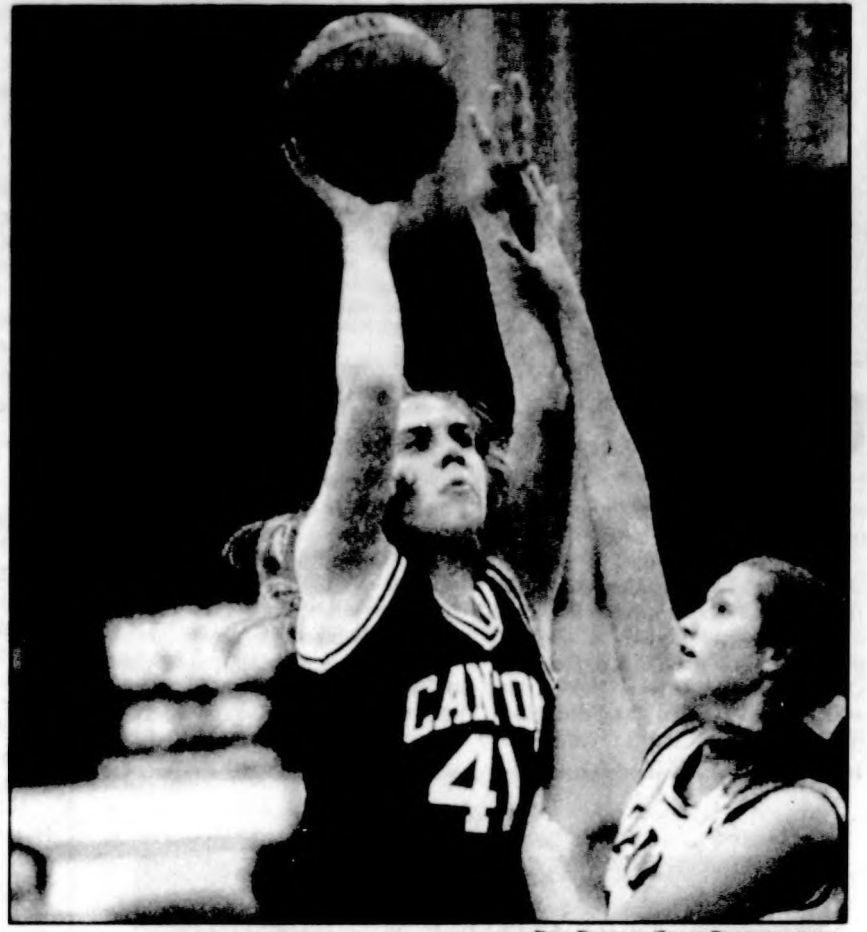
"They picked apart our press," agreed Lillie-Cicerone. "They were composed."

Harrison wins 7th state crown

Whoever said statistics are for losers will get an amen from the Farmington Hills Harrison football team. The Hawks managed to win their seventh state championship Friday despite falling short in some otherwise key statistical categories. But Harrison had the better numbers in the one area that mattered most, outscoring Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central 17-13 in the Class A title game at the Silverdome. It was the second straight championship and fifth in the last seven years for the Hawks (12-1), who have played in a record nine finals. "We kinda knew all year we were going to win it," Harrison senior Kevin Bryant said. "We didn't think anybody in the state could stop our offense. "They might not have wanted to say it, but everybody knew in the back of their head we were going all the way again." The Rangers (11-2) did their best to contain Harrison, and the Hawks had their hands full trying to stop Central's power offense. Central controlled the ball for nearly three quarters of the game, had four times as many

first downs (16-4) and ran twice as many plays as Harrison (65-30). Those numbers usually tell a different story, but the Hawks won the game with three big plays — two by Jason Granger and one by Nick Williams — and a Kyle Vessell field goal. "I've always said big players make big plays, and these kids right here made the plays," Harrison coach John Herrington said, referring to Williams, Granger and Bryant. "We've been a big-play team all year. We can power the ball, too, but this team was too good; we were fortunate to break one. Obviously, we were not a ball-control team today." Yet the Hawks seemed in control of the game after the first quarter. Central possessed the ball for all but 2:13 of the opening period; however, the Rangers were stopped on downs at the Harrison 16 and ended a later drive with a punt. Williams ran a state-finals record 90 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the second quarter, and the Hawks led 7-0 after Vessell kicked the extra point.

Meanwhile, the Harrison defense got tough and held Central to four first downs in the middle quarters. "(Coach) Bob (Sutter) said it was time the defense stepped up and played a good game, and they did," Herrington said. "They kept us in the game when we couldn't get anything going. "They have a good power game, and we did a good job overall against their run. We moved a lot of guys in and out to keep people fresh." Big play No. 2 came from No. 2 on the first play of the second half. Granger cut outside and tightroped the sideline 80 yards for another score and a 14-0 lead. The Harrison defense continued to play well until Dave Vorce's interception, which sparked a 60-yard Central scoring drive. Jay McKellar ran 8 yards for the touchdown, and Keith Debbaudt's extra point cut the deficit to 14-7 with 8:51 remaining. Granger produced the third big play, returning the kickoff 77 yards to the Central 15. The Hawks had to settle for Vessell's 28-yard field goal and a 17-7 advantage. "We've had big plays done on us, and we learned early in the season not to hang our heads,"

Central two-way player John Roark said. Then the game got tight and more interesting than Harrison wanted. The Rangers finally left their rushing attack and went to the air. Greg Wood completed four of 10 passes on a 70-yard drive — all for first downs. The last went 9 yards to Mike Miller for the touchdown. "I didn't want to take our kids out of the ballgame and away from what we do," Central coach Tim McGee said when asked why he didn't throw sooner, "and our game is the power game. But they did a good job of stopping us from getting some of those key passes." Debbaudt missed the extra point, and Harrison's lead was 17-13 with 2:24 on the clock. Central recovered its onside kick at the Harrison 46 and threatened to win the game. But Bryant intercepted a deep pass by Wood with 1:58 remaining. It was Bryant's 10th (and no doubt his most important) interception of the season. "It was a big game, the last game of my high school career, and I wanted to make a big play to remember it," Bryant said.

Big plays key to Hawks' win

If it was flag football, Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central defensive back Rob Eiben might have had a chance to catch Farmington Hills Harrison fullback Nick Williams. Williams, running with a towel tucked into his pants, burst through the line of scrimmage and raced 90 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the second quarter in Harrison's 17-13 Class A state championship victory over Central at the Silverdome. Eiben chased Williams for the final 50 yards and got within reach of his towel, but was only able to trip up the Hawks' star after he crossed the goal line. "When I first busted it, I got a good grip on the turf and exploded," said Williams, who finished with 133 yards on 14 carries (a 9.5 average). "I started getting tired at about the 20 and knew he had to go for my legs, so I just kicked it up." Williams' run was a state championship game record for all classes and set the tone for other big plays by the Hawks. Williams almost made it into the Michigan High School Athletic Association record book in last year's state championship, falling one yard shy of the Class A record with 168 yards on a record 29 carries in a 12-9 win over Midland. Junior tailback Jason Granger accounted for the rest of the Hawks' excitement on offense, running around right end 80 yards for a score on the first play of the second half, and returning a kickoff 77 yards to set up Kyle Vessell's 28-yard field goal in the fourth quarter. Senior defensive back Kevin Bryant helped Harrison preserve the victory with an interception in the last minute at the Hawks' 7-yard line. The Hawks were outgained, 245-208, in total yards and limited to four first downs, but the big plays more than made up for the disparity. Granger's 80-yard run was the

second longest TD run in the history of Class A state championship games. He crossed the goal line with 11:46 remaining in the third quarter, meaning it took him 14 seconds to ramble 80 yards. That's the same time it took Williams to run 10 yards further. The 5-foot-8, 148-pound Granger was kidded afterward that the 6-2, 248-pound Williams was faster. "You know, Nick, he's a power runner and he ran up the middle; it was just him and one guy," said Granger, who had 82 yards on seven carries for an 11.7 average. "I had to go outside and make a couple moves. That's why it took longer." "I raised my hands (signaling a TD) before Jason made his move on the guy," Williams said. "He's the fastest guy I know in the open field." Granger's most impressive run, however, might have been when he ran 77 yards on a kickoff in the fourth quarter, shortly after Central had cut the lead to 14-7. Granger sprinted up the middle and after colliding with the Rangers' Kevin Crowther, spun and sprinted up the sideline before being knocked out at Central's 15. "My brother (Roy) told me right before the kickoff to hit the middle as fast as I can and it worked every time," Granger said. "I hit it so quick, when the guy hit me, I just spun off." Except for the big plays, Williams said Central had such a good defensive game plan it "seemed like they had our play book." When asked if Ken George, the Harrison graduate who coaches basketball at Central, could have told the Rangers a thing or two about the Hawks, Harrison coach John Herrington laughed. "Ken George doesn't know a football from a hockey puck," he said.

"He moved, but I heard he might come back," Granger said. Granger, Kevin Bryant and Nick Williams, the players who came upstairs to the press conference, had to answer a lot of reporters' questions.

But the bonus was each got to eat sandwiches and soft drinks, which were part of the spread for the reporters and workers in the press box.

Despite not having the ball for long, Harrison was in good shape with a 14-0 lead after nearly three quarters.

Central had the ball for 33 minutes and 53 seconds, the Hawks for only 14:07.

But then Harrison didn't need long drives. Williams and Granger had long scoring runs on first down.

Playing in their first final, the Rangers came back to make it close.

"It was a hard-fought game," Herrington said. "They were tremendously prepared for what we do. They stopped a lot of things other people haven't stopped all year."

"It was a classic, hard-fought football game that went down to the end like a championship game should."

"I'd like to congratulate Farmington Hills Harrison," Central coach Tim McGee said. "They have a great football team and an outstanding coaching staff."

Herrington is getting used to the question: How do the Hawks keep on doing it? That's winning state championships. Harrison is 7-of-9 in the finals and 3-of-3 in this decade.

"It's a new set of kids every year," Herrington said, "and all the situations are different. We had a 4-5 year a while ago and I enjoyed coaching that year, too."

"The tradition started in '74, and we have the same coaching staff. Kids come to Harrison expecting to win."

"We started here in the Dome with a loss to (Birmingham Brother) Rice, and it was long hard road to come back."

You might hear this phrase from some Harrison fans: The Dome is our home. But Herrington won't be among them, not

even after seven successful visits there for the state finals.

"I don't like that," he said, recalling that was the Muskegon Catholic Central slogan in 1981 when Harrison upset the Crusaders. "We got here this year, but we might never get here again."

Still, he's making a name for himself. Being built near the Silverdome is a subdivision named — true story — Herrington Hills.

For the second straight year, Harrison was the home team, wore its dark green jerseys and won the game.

That should put any superstitious Hawk fans at ease. Harrison had won its first five state titles while wearing visitor's white.

The Hawks also were runners-up in 1976 (green) and 1987 (white).

Winning one state championship is a special distinction for high school athletes. Two is doubly nice.

"Not many people get to experience this," Bryant said. "When I get older I can say 'Yeah, I've got two rings.'"

"It feels good to repeat. Not many people can say that," Williams said. "My goal coming into high school was to win a championship, and I came out with two."

Was it ESP, or does Herrington just know his talent that well? After the Rangers recovered an inside kick with two-plus minutes left in the game, Herrington foresaw Bryant, who plays safety and is responsible for deep coverage, making a big play.

"At the end, I thought they were going to have to throw, and I honestly thought Kevin was going to make an interception — and he did," Herrington said. "My emotions went downhill with the inside kick, but the kids still continued to play hard."

Forget the retirement parties and cancel the farewell speeches. Ken Butler's coaching reign at Walled Lake Central isn't over yet.

Behind the defensive play of junior guard Jessica Alsup and the scoring and rebounding of sophomore center Becky Cummings, the Vikings not only fought off elimination from the Class A girls basketball tournament Wednesday, but kept Butler's final season alive for at least one more game with a dramatic 54-53 regional final win over second-ranked Rochester Adams at Lapeer East.

The 63-year-old Butler, in his 18th year at Central, said he decided last fall this season would

Central pulled away in the second half to defeat the Chiefs, 63-49, in a Western Lakes Activities Association game on Oct. 25.

"It feels great to be going to the quarterfinals," said Cummings, who scored a game-high 21 points and cleared 14 rebounds. "We were really surprised to find out this is his (Butler's) last season. We were in shock and we were

pretty sad because he's such a great coach and he's really carried us through this year.

"It would be nice to win (the championship) for him, sure. But we're not sure how far we're going to get. We just have to play one game at a time at this point."

Adams, which made its earliest tournament exit under fourth-year coach Fran Scialowicz, had its 19-game winning streak snapped and ended the 1994 season 21-3.

Despite being shadowed by Alsup in Central's box-and-one defense for the better part of three quarters, Dayton-bound senior guard Courtney Ruffing scored 17 points and nearly brought the Highlanders back from a 51-40 deficit with 5:08 remaining.

Ruffing started an 8-0 run with a 3-pointer that closed the Adams deficit to 51-48. She later stole a pass near midcourt and drilled a pull-up trey with 55.3 seconds left to cut Central's lead to 53-52. Alsup and Ruffing would then trade free throws to leave Central ahead 54-53, setting up a hectic final 6.1 seconds.

Cummings, who had 10 points, nine rebounds and one block in the second half, missed a one-and-one opportunity and Adams sophomore forward Emily Schmidt collected the rebound. Schmidt got the ball up floor to junior forward Shannon McCoy (12 points), who zipped a cross-court pass to Ruffing, but a hurried 17-foot shot from the left wing fell short as time expired.

Rasch, also one of the state's best players, scored 13 points, including six of the Ventures nine points in the first quarter. But she was held scoreless in the second quarter and limited to two shots. Country Day, which never trailed, led 12-9 after one quarter.

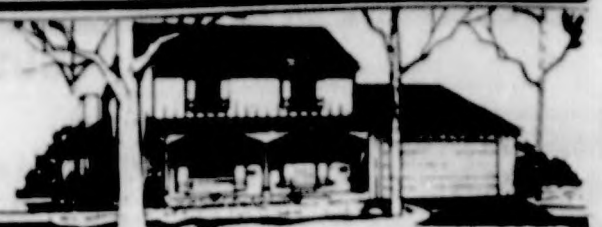

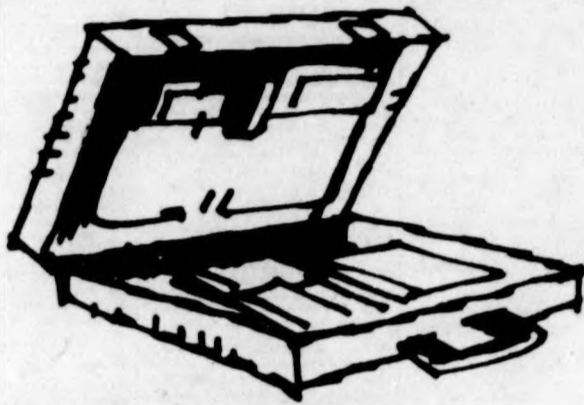

# WRITE IT AND REAP!



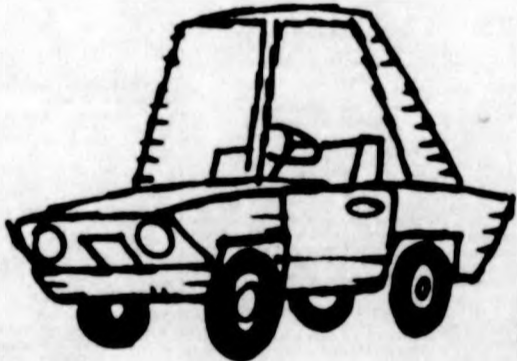
**1. Give the reader specific information.** Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!



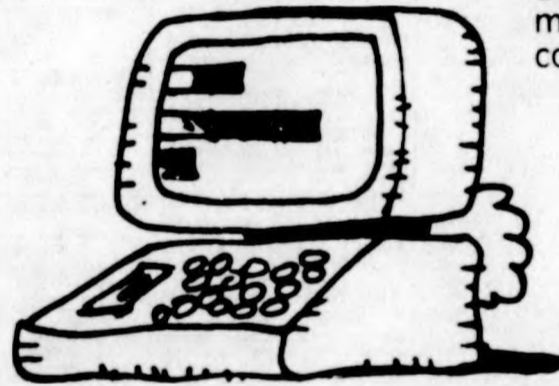
**2. Include the price.** Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.



**3. Avoid abbreviations.** Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side wall) tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



**4. Include phone number and specify hours.** Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



**5. Run on consecutive days.** Your ad will not get results if people don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative.

# Salute to Dancers for Life offers hope and insight

Canada's leading dancers are at the top of their form in *Salute to Dancers for Life*, an hour-long special premiering Thursday, Dec. 1, on CBC.

Veronica Tennant, former principal dancer with the National Ballet of Canada, is producer and hostess of the special, which airs on World AIDS Day. She is joined by co-hosts Brent Carver (*Kiss of the Spider Woman*) and writer Tomson Highway.

It was Tennant herself who came up with the idea of a telecast built around *Dancers for Life*, the annual Toronto gala designed to raise both funds and awareness for AIDS and HIV-related issues. It took some three years to bring the idea to reality, however.

"I was involved in the performances over the years, and there was something very special about this assemblage of talent, people really touched and moved and believing in raising AIDS awareness for numbers of reasons," she says. "The spirit was so remarkable that I just said, 'Well, this has to be shared with more people.' I went to CBC

with the idea and they loved it. They said it was very exciting and important. So now things have come to beautiful fruition.

"I just can't overemphasize the generosity of spirit these dancers have, and have had, over the years. They basically really wanted this TV show to happen, and the show is a tribute to their generosity."

Tennant also credits the Ministry of National Health and Welfare for helping make the telecast a reality.

"It was with help from their AIDS Strategy Department, their support and financial commitment, that helped us make this show happen," she says. "They said that to have people of the visibility and the talent and stature of our cast, talking openly and positively about how this is something that involves all of us, this was very important to them.

"The anguish in this show was in keeping it down to one hour, because there were so many performers and companies that wanted to be involved."

Standing out in a consistently excellent program are:

- Margie Gillis' poignant recollections of her brother Christopher, also a dancer ("He was my world,

...the most important person in my life") before performing her own solo dance to a Sinead O'Connor song.

- Highway's salute to his late brother, dancer Rene Highway.

- The Danny Grossman Dance Company in a gender-bending finale set to music by Jelly Roll Morton.

One of the most striking moments is Carver's a capella rendition of the ballad "Scarlet Ribbons." While the song dates back to a time when HIV was only a random series of letters, the haunting melody and ambiguous lyrics struck the singer as appropriate.

"I had thought of the song quite awhile ago, and just was humming it to myself. And they said, 'Well, when you host and say a few words, if you want to sing it, that would be great,'" he explains. "The song kept coming back to me: 'Scarlet ribbons, scarlet ribbons.' And the actual story of what goes on within the song: it's just the idea of a child in prayer asking for scarlet ribbons and this fellow is wandering through town looking for them, because there ARE no scarlet ribbons. Where are they? He finally finds them, and it's the mystery of what this scarlet ribbon is about, and what those 30 red ribbons are about.

"He says, 'If I live to be 200, I'll never know from where came those scarlet ribbons.' At this point, I think that if any of us live to be 200, hopefully someone may find out where it (the HIV virus) has come from."

Anyone working in the arts is living in a time of loss, Tennant says, and programs such as *Dancers for Life* provide a necessary catharsis and wellspring of hope.

"Our friends in New York say they're almost shell-shocked by it," she says quietly. "You become numbed by all the facts and figures - and the names, and the constant memorial services you find yourself going to.

"With events like *Dancers for Life*, there is a message there of hope and buoyancy and determination. It's courageous for performers to talk so openly about things so close to them, as Margie and Tomson did."

### Greenspan documents Lillehammer Olympics

Bud Greenspan, the world's foremost writer, producer and director of documentary sports films, has outdone himself again with the official film of the 1994 Olympic Winter Games. *Lillehammer '94: 16 Days of Glory*,

premieres Sunday, Nov. 27, on The Disney Channel.

"We tell the stories of a remarkable country and several outstanding people who personify the Olympic spirit," Greenspan says.

"It almost reminded me of a Sonja Henie movie," he says of his experience in Lillehammer last winter. "The snow was perfect. It was cold as hell, but you didn't mind it. You saw horse-drawn sleds in the middle of main street. People lived in tents along the cross-country skiing course for two weeks, getting the best seats. It was

like a tailgating party at a football game. I've never seen anything like it.

"It was a grass-roots Olympics with all the modern trimmings, and it was the people of Lillehammer who made it that way. And in this day of Dream Teams and \$90 million salaries for guys who can't play, it was something very special for all of us."

Part 1 includes profiles of American speedskater Dan Jansen and 16-year-old figure skater Oksana Baiul.

Part 2 will air next Feb. 12, the first anniversary of the opening of the Lillehammer Games.
