Paving projects spark outcry



Plymouth Township approved the paving of three streets, despite the objections of some residents. Township officials said that 60 percent of the residents on each of those streets wanted the roads paved.

Three proposed street paving projects in Plymouth Township drew nearly 100 people to township hall on Tuesday to lodge their arguments for or against paving.

The projects, each supported by at least 60 percent of residents along

each street, were before township trustees for approval.

Jim Anulewicz, township public services director, stressed that it is not township government that starts paving projects.

"This is not government intervention in your lives," he said. Rather,

paving projects are initiated by a resident wanting paving, who collects enough petition signatures to represent property owners with at least 60 percent of property frontage along the street who favor paving.

The township engineering consultant then draws up an estimate of how much paving will cost, and what homeowners' likely assessments will be. If 60 percent still want the project, the township board approves the first of two steps: directing the engineering consultant to take soil borings and bids from contractors.

If the actual cost comes in at less

than 10 percent more than the original estimate — and 60 percent of petition signers still want the project — the township board approves it, construction is scheduled and assessment rolls are drawn up.

Two proposed projects, the paving of Marlowe in the Green Meadows subdivision and the paving of Gold Arbor and Southworth in Tomlinson Estates were before township trustees for step one approval.

Several homeowners said paving would cause Ann Arbor Road drivers to choose their street to cut through

Small planes mean big fun

There's more to do on Labor Day than close up the cottage for the winter or do those chores around the house.

Those with a yen for flight can stop by the Airshow '95 in Northville where pilots of sorts will be doing their best with their craft.

But they won't be leaving the ground. It's the annual show put on by radio control airplane buffs from Plymouth, Canton, Northville and surrounding communities who belong to the Midwest Radio Control Society Inc. of Northville.

"This event has become one of the largest radio control model air-

craft fly-ins in the state," said Ed Douville of Northville, who helps run the show.

The event is Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 2-3, at the club's field on Five Mile Road west of Beck. The show starts at 10 a.m. and continues through 6 p.m. on both days.

"Last year's show attracted almost 100 pilots and aircraft and several thousand spectators," said Douville. "The rapid growth in popularity of this air show is a combination of growth in the giant-scale aircraft hobby as well as the club's beautifully manicured flying site."

Giant aircraft must have a wing span of at least 80 inches or be certifiable as a one-quarter scale model

of the original full-size aircraft.

The flight activities will be continuous, with up to three aircraft in the air at a time. Special attractions include model aerobatic demonstrations by nationally known aerobatic and helicopter pilots, jets and a special demonstration of electric power models by Keith Shaw of Ann Arbor.

Shaw is an internationally recognized authority and leader in electric technology development for model aircraft. He'll be demonstrating a 12-foot wing span flying wing of his own design.

Resident wondering who would trap her dog

After Ginger Johnson's dog, Lady, got a leg caught in an animal trap, Johnson thought the public should be aware.

"My daughter is 10, she has a lot of friends that come through the woods. There's some boys that go through to a pond," she said, adding other stray traps could pose a danger to children.

It happened Thursday in a common area at Colony Farms west of Beck and north of Joy. At about 5

p.m., "She heard me and started yelping, trying to get my attention. It was so ugly, so unusual," Johnson said.

"She wouldn't let me touch it, her leg was just mangled in it. A neighbor helped me get her out of it."

Lady is a 1½-year-old Brittany spaniel and pointer mixed-breed. Johnson said she felt silly calling 911, but didn't know another police number to call.

"The police showed up in less than 10 minutes. The officer said traps are not defined by law, they're not legal

and they're not illegal."

"It didn't look old."

Johnson said it was later that evening that she and her husband started wondering what would happen if a child stumbled onto a trap. "Last year my daughter did a lot of nature hunting and bug collecting," she said.

After taking Lady to the vet on Thursday, the dog got a shot of cortisone and was resting Friday.

"Her leg is swollen, fortunately

there's no broken bones. There's tissue damage," Johnson said.

"It was a live trap, it isn't meant to kill an animal. It has no teeth, but it's got a tremendous snap. It's got 2-inch springs," Johnson said.

Johnson said someone at the vet clinic told her another dog was caught in a trap last year.

"It's very cruel and very ugly. It was hard to believe I'm seeing it right in my own back yard," Johnson said.

World War II veterans remember August 1945

It was 50 years ago this month that "it" was all over. And if you were around in August of 1945 you didn't question what "it" was. The atomic bombing of Japan forced that country's surrender, ending World War II.

The anniversary of the war in which 12 million Americans served was marked on Friday by the Plymouth Rotary Club, which has 15 veterans.

They brought uniforms, medals, pictures and other items from the war. And as each spoke, his photo in uniform, from 50 years ago, was flashed on a screen behind the speaker.

The veterans are: Dr. Bill Covington, Maynard Fleming, John Gaffield, Dick Hoerner, Russ Hoisington, Ted Matley, Dr. E.J. McClendon, Eddie Olson, Ed

Memories: Plymouth Rotary Club member Dick Hoerner put on his World War II uniform to remember what he was doing when the war ended. "There were no heroes," he said.

Quant, Bill Robinson, Gordon Shaw, Al Stanwood, Bob Stremich, Dick Taylor and Jack Tornaga.

"When I got over to Europe, I realized what the British had been going through," Hoerner told the crowd of several hundred Rotary members as he recounted his days in England and France during the war.

"There were no real heroes," he said.

Covington said: "Thanks to us, you are sitting here today."

He recounted his college days in the 1940s and signing up to become a dental officer in the Navy and later in the Army. He said he worked with men who became the "litter carriers in the field."

"This was a different type of hero," he said.

Gaffield, a retired Plymouth photo studio owner, recounted his days as a pilot in Asia during the Burma Campaign.

In an emotional portion of his speech, he read from a war-time journal about the surrender of Japan. He said military people in Asia, where they had been fighting the Japanese, could hardly believe that the war was over.

NAACP representative criticizes legislator's tactics

A representative of the NAACP questioned state Rep. Deborah Whyman's agenda and asked her to stop inciting racism as she asks local communities for support of her legislation to merge Detroit Recorder's and Wayne County Circuit courts.

"Please, please, quit assuming all black people will call out racism. It's not true," said Jim Netter, of the NAACP. "I don't know what your agenda is. If you came to my town, I would show you respect."

Netter took exception to a flier distributed at the Canton Township Board meeting Aug. 22 that urged residents to support Whyman's House Bill 4952.

Meanwhile, in Plymouth the discussion wasn't as heated as in Whyman's hometown. The Ply-

mouth City Commission took no action on the resolution to support Whyman's bill. Commissioner Stella Greene said she felt there wasn't enough information on the financial impact of combining the courts. Plymouth Township trustees supported the resolution.

"The Recorder's Court representative here tonight will incite your elected officials with false claims of racism. This person will say anything to keep you from being able to vote for or against Recorder's Court judges in the next election. The power brokers from Detroit don't want you to have access to the ballot box," the flier read.

Waving the flier, Netter said, "We can discuss this issue without this."

Whyman's bill asks that the two courts be combined. HB 4952 would abolish Recorder's Court

and bring its 29 judges under the circuit court, which has 35 judges. Whyman said the need has come to combine the courts because Wayne County voters — who don't live in Detroit — may only vote for the 35 circuit judges, not the 29 recorder's court judges. Detroit residents vote for judges in both courts.

"This is de facto violation of the principle of one vote per one person," Whyman said. She said that under the current system, out-Wayne County voters pay for recorder's court, but Detroit residents don't.

The 1 1/2-hour debate often fell to innuendos and accusations as Whyman argued her case — sometimes directly to Recorder's Court Judge Thomas Jackson, who urged opposition to Whyman's bill.

"The basic premise is all

wrong," Jackson said. He argued that Wayne County defendants may ask for a circuit court judge instead of a recorder's court judge who usually listens to criminal cases.

"You have control by saying, 'I want a countywide elected judge,'" Jackson said.

The Canton Township Board adopted the resolution. But Treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter was the lone dissenter. "No matter what this board does, it makes little difference," Kirchgatter said.

Though voting for the resolution, Supervisor Tom Yack questioned the township's jurisdiction in the issue. "I'm not sure this is the proper arena for this type of debate," he said, adding that's why state legislators are elected.

"That explains my vote," Kirchgatter added.

In the 1980s, the state Supreme Court gave Detroit Recorder's Court judges visiting reciprocity, meaning they can hear criminal cases stemming from out-Wayne County.

"If they ask for it, they got it," Judge Jackson said, referring to requests for a judge elected by Wayne County voters. "I can't say that it happens in every case."

Jackson urged Canton trustees to consider the House bill. "Before you act on that, know what the facts are. What she has in her bill is not true. It is not based on facts," he said. "I think the real question is there something wrong with the system that's set up." He suggested returning the issue to the state Supreme Court, which created the current system.

An angry Whyman said the current system is "judicial

apartheid" and called Jackson a liar for his comments on the courts' jurisdictions.

Other audience members — some believed to have been asked to attend by Whyman — expressed their lack of support for Detroit Recorder's Court and the current system.

But Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro told township trustees that there has been no difference that he can tell between verdicts from the recorder's court and circuit court. Verdicts from both courts have made the department unhappy.

Audience members criticized verdicts out of Detroit Recorder's Court, some implying its judges are soft on crime. "I think the issue is of representation and voting," Santomauro said, adding that the House bill has nothing to do with law enforcement.

Ex-wife of local defendant enraged by mistrial action

A Detroit Recorder's Court judge declared a mistrial Thursday for a Canton resident accused of setting his ex-wife on fire, prompting an emotional outburst from the distraught woman.

"You can't do that!" screamed Karen Janik, 30, after Judge Bruce Morrow declared a mistrial for former Westland resident Michael Janik, 41, charged with assault with intent to murder and arson.

Standing up in the courtroom, Karen Janik also turned to her ex-husband's family members and lashed out at them.

"Why do you people want him off for?" she asked in tears, questioning why relatives want Michael Janik cleared of charges.

"Go ahead! Let him go! Let him go!" Karen Janik sobbed as authorities led her from the courtroom. "What's wrong with you people?"

Her outburst marked a dramatic ending to the third day of a trial that Morrow has rescheduled for Jan. 8. The new trial will come one year and six days after Michael Janik is accused of trying to kill his ex-wife at their former Westland home.

Janik left the courtroom Thursday with family members. He has been free since Feb. 13, when his family posted \$7,000 of a \$70,000/10 percent bond.

The judge declared a mistrial Thursday after assistant Wayne County prosecutor Jerry Dorsey IV, trying to discredit Michael Janik's testimony from Wednesday, questioned him about statements he may have made to

police after the Jan. 2 incident.

Prosecutor warned

Dorsey had implied in front of a jury that the defendant fabricated a new version to aid in his defense, but Morrow ruled that Dorsey's line of questioning went too far and may have violated Michael Janik's rights.

There had been nothing on the court record about any prior statements made by Michael Janik, and Morrow's ruling stemmed from concerns that Dorsey exposed jury members to issues they shouldn't have heard.

Dorsey said in court that he wanted to impeach Michael Janik as a witness because of alleged inconsistencies in his statements. Morrow had warned Dorsey to approach the issue delicately.

Dorsey tried unsuccessfully Thursday to convince Morrow to continue the trial, which was nearly complete except for closing arguments by Dorsey and defense attorney W. Otis Culpepper.

Karen and Michael Janik gave conflicting testimony about what happened when Karen and the couple's 3-year-old twins went to the defendant's house to collect Christmas gifts bought by the defendant.

Karen Janik, who was starting a new life in Florida with the children, said her ex-husband begged her not to leave before he wrestled her to the floor, doused her with cigarette lighter fluid and set her on fire. She had already placed the children in her van and was making one last trip inside the house for toys, she said.

Michael Janik testified that he sprayed his ex-wife with lighter fluid in self-defense after

she slashed him three times with a hunting knife, twice on the neck and once on the wrist. But he denies that he started the fire that injured Karen Janik and destroyed much of the house they once shared.

Karen Janik has scars on both of her hands.

Fluid possessed

Under questioning Wednesday, Michael Janik admitted that he took a can of lighter fluid with him when he left his burning house. He indicated that he wanted to prevent the flames from spreading, even though he said he never phoned the fire department for help in extinguishing it.

Michael Janik was missing for one week after the incident, until he was found slumped over the wheel of his brother's idling van in Livingston County. He has rejected authorities' claims that he was trying to commit suicide by breathing carbon monoxide in a van that had a faulty exhaust system.

Dorsey also raised questions about the knife wounds that Michael Janik says his wife made on his neck and wrist. Under questioning from Dorsey, Janik denied that the wounds were self-inflicted after he left the scene of the fire.

He testified that he didn't seek medical treatment for the cuts because he treated them himself with bandages found in his brother's vehicle.

Janik, a 19-year Ford Motor Co. employee, could face life in prison if convicted as charged. He and Karen Janik had been married just over six months when he was accused of trying to kill her.

Gerald Van Berkel of Gold Arbor said, "If you pave it, they're going to go six times as fast."

Sue Fisher of Gold Arbor asked trustees, "Could you change the (street) name to the autobahn if

you pave it? There are days I had to run across the street. I'm worried about my 8-year-old. I've even seen the police speed down my road."

Both the township staff and trustees stressed that if residents don't want paving, they must convince their neighbors to reject paving too.

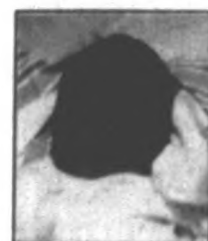

Longer runway not necessarily necessary — Duggan

Building an international tradeport at Willow Run Airport is not necessarily contingent on extending the northeast runway at the airport, said Wayne County Deputy Executive Mike Duggan.

"The runway extension is one possible project of the tradeport," but is not the only project, Duggan said. "The decision of the runway is under review right now and I think there will be a very significant announcement in a few weeks," Duggan said.

Duggan said other aspects of the tradeport plan, such as improving the taxiways at the airport and making infrastructure improvements in the surrounding areas could be done without extending the runway.

The runway extension has run into strong opposition from residents in Canton Township as well as political opposition from Wayne County commissioners Thaddeus McCotter and Bruce Patterson.

McCotter represents the 10th District, which includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township and part of Livonia. Patterson represents the 11th commission District, which stretches from Canton to Huron townships and east to Wayne and Romulus.

Opposed to tradeport

McCotter and Patterson have vowed to fight the tradeport by involving concerned citizens in their districts. The plan is to circulate petitions, contact state officials and organize community groups against the tradeport.

McCotter said he is opposed to the tradeport, with or without the runway extension. He said approving the tradeport would less-

en control of future runway extensions.

"If we get baited into creating the tradeport now, we will have no defense should the tradeport's governing board decide to extend the runway," McCotter said.

He also doubted whether a tradeport could legally be established without a runway extension.

The legislation allowing tradeports calls for a master plan that

McCotter also questioned the claim that the tradeport would create jobs, especially without the extended runway.

McCotter opposed the \$45,000 federally-funded study of the tradeport concept at a Wayne County Economic Development Committee meeting last Wednesday.

The committee approved the study on a 3-2 vote. Patterson and McCotter voted against the study while Detroit commissioners Edna Bell, Robert Blackwell and Kenneth Cockrel supported the study. Commissioner Michelle Plawewski was not present. Commissioner Bernard Parker was excused from the meeting.

McCotter is chairman of that committee and Patterson is a member.

pect for residents north of the airport if the runway was extended, Duggan said.

Yack confirmed his involvement in the discussions.

"At this point, I think the concept is one that my board is thinking about," Yack said. "The fact there will not be a runway extension is a real plus for our community," Yack said.

But Yack said he was not completely sold on the tradeport plan.

"When somebody floats an idea, I want to know where it has been tried before and what success it has had. No one has really shared that with me," said Yack.

There is no guarantee that businesses will spring up at the tradeport, Yack said. The tradeport concept is based on the idea of "kind of building it and they will come," Yack said.

Thomas Fegan, of Washtenaw County and co-chair of the tradeport steering committee, said the tradeport concept was started in 1992 when General Motors closed a plant near the airport and 4,500 people lost their jobs.

Commission to vote

Final approval for the study must be given by the full commission. The vote is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 31.

Duggan said he has been working closely with Canton Township Supervisor Thomas Yack and other officials to develop a revised tradeport plan.

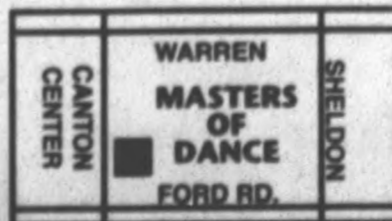

Second, you can call Smart Start at 1-313-953-2001 if you live in Wayne County or 1-810-901-4750 if you live in Oakland County. This voice-mail system allows you to easily access starting dates and times for your local school district at the punch of a button. Also available on Smart Start, co-

sponsored by Jacobson's, is information on special programs for youth dealing with manners, self-esteem, and drug prevention.

Third, you can sit down at your personal computer at home and through a modem and Internet connection access Smart Start at the O&E's World Wide Web page at <http://oeonline.com>. Tradeport concept

The area, which includes about 6,700 acres on the border of Van Buren and Ypsilanti townships, has industrial potential because it has enough vacant land, a vacant factory and easy access to transportation, Fegan said.

In addition to air transportation, two rail lines run through the airport and I-94 and I-275 are very close, Fegan said.

A successful tradeport could create 25,000 new jobs, Fegan said.

Patterson said although he has not been directly involved in the discussions, he understands that changes in the tradeport plan may add an extension of the airport's east-west runway rather than the northeast runway. "They're trying to find a compromise and have

the opposition dissipate," Patterson said. "But I'm not lessening my opposition," he said.

Duggan denied that the new plan includes any extension of the east-west runway. "There's a reconstruction but not an extension of it," Duggan said.

The improvements would be paid for through some type of funding authority that would capture existing state or local taxes, Duggan said. However, the legislation for this funding mechanism has not been approved by the state Legislature.

The runways at Willow Run do not accommodate a fully-loaded 747. One cargo airline, Kalitta Flying Service Inc. recently moved some of its operations to Indiana. Duggan said the jets currently used at Willow Run have no trouble except for the days of

exceptional high humidity or rain. Duggan said only 5 to 10 percent of Kalitta's flights were diverted to Detroit Metropolitan Airport because of weather.

Runway extension

The runway extension, which would jut out of the airport in a northeasterly direction, would mean that part of Ecorse Road would have to be moved. The county has already bought and demolished several houses in the Denton and Ecorse road areas so that Ecorse Road could be moved.

Duggan said he would confer with McCotter regarding the new plan but is skeptical about any swaying of Patterson.

"Bruce Patterson would be against (County Executive) Ed McNamara if he found a cure for cancer," Duggan said.

Soap star has fans in a lather

Joyce Vaagenes of Canton never had any interest in Builders Square II advertisements until her friend Sandie Berczel told her to take a glance at one in a recent Observer.

"She made me look at it. I usually don't look at the Builders Square II ads. I'm not into power tools or anything like that."

She opened the paper and actor John Callahan's face was looking at her. Not only did she take a prolonged look at the ad, the "All My Children" star who plays "Edmund" got her into the store.

"I'm a very big fan of 'All My Children.' I've been watching it for about 20 years," she said while waiting in line to meet the star.

Decked out in a white T-shirt and black jeans, Callahan visited Builders Square II at 42000 Ford Road in Canton recently as part of the store's weekend-long grand opening celebration.

"I've done a lot of Builders Squares. I do them all over the country. We get a pretty good turnout," Callahan said.

When told that the line of people waiting to see him snakes throughout the store, Callahan said, "Good. The ego always gets humbled by a few people."

On "All My Children" Callahan plays Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter Edmund Grey. For the last four months, he and his wife Maria have battled fertility problems.

In an effort to reach other couples suffering from fertility problems, Edmund wrote an anonymous story in Tempo magazine about his plight. But two weeks ago, town busybody Erica Kane announced on her talk show that her brother-in-law penned the story.

"Even the best laid plans go awry by the empress of the realm," he said with a laugh.

Callahan has obviously done his research about fertility problems. He rattles off statistics with no problem. With building intensity, the father of two talks about the emotional toll it takes on women.

In the past, Callahan said, soaps have poked fun at these types of problems so he's proud of the way the "All My Children" writers have handled it.

"It's nice that the story can be

done in a more human vein, a more appropriate fashion. The writers have done a pretty realistic job. On some soaps a couple has fertility problems and one month later, Bingo, she's pregnant. It's been great being able to write about it and explore further the emotional toll it takes on a couple," said Callahan, who studied communications and public policy at University of California-Berkeley hoping to be a First Amendment lawyer.

Edmund and Maria won't give up their fight for a child anytime soon, Callahan said. They still have surrogacy, adoption, and a handful of other options to try.

Besides Callahan's appearance, the Pink Panther made the rounds of the store stopping to have pictures taken with children. Customers got a chance to win a three-minute, \$3,000 shopping spree at the store which recently underwent a four-month renovation.

The name "Builders Square II" describes the "new concept of the store," according to store manager Scott Chapman of Livonia.

"A regular Builders Square store doesn't have the Idea Center or the Learning Center. The facility is much smaller. We added another 35,000 square feet to the store," said Chapman who has been in the home improvement industry for 12 years.

"It has a lot nicer look to it. The goal before the turn of the century is to have all the stores turned over into Builders Square II."

The Learning Center situated near the customer service desk offers videotapes of projects and "how-to" books on decorating. Home improvement projects can be reviewed with store experts as well.

At The Idea Center trained consultants offer computerized design services for kitchen, bath and family rooms complete with three-dimensional floor plans and cost estimates for "do-it-yourselfers" and "buy-it-yourselfers."

"This is truly a store of the future," said Frank G. Felicella, president and CEO of the San Antonio, Texas-based Builders Square. "The technology we are utilizing is helping us connect directly to our customers — making sure we exceed the service the customer is expecting."

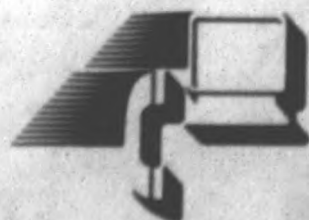

Traveler abundance expected Labor Day

Sizzling summer weather and cheaper gas prices should make this the busiest Labor Day weekend for motorists in at least 11 years, according to the American Automobile Association.

AAA estimates 29.6 million motorists plan to vacation 100 miles or more from home during the holiday weekend, up 2 percent from 29 million a year ago.

Eighty-eight percent of all holiday travel will be by auto, light truck or recreational vehicle. Auto travel intentions are the highest since AAA began reporting on Labor Day travel in 1985.

The average price of self-serve regular unleaded gasoline has dropped 0.5 cent since the Fourth of July holiday and now stands at \$1.178 per gallon.

Another 4.1 million people are expected to take a trip by airplane, train or bus, a 2.5 percent increase from 4 million in 1994. This modest increase comes after last year's 11 percent jump in travel by air, train or bus.

Research data for Labor Day are based on a national telephone survey of 1,500 adults by the U.S. Travel Data Center, which con-

ducts research for AAA. The greatest volume of Labor Day auto travel will originate in the West with 7.3 million, followed by the Southeast with 6.3 million; Northeast, 5.8 million; Midwest, 5.5 million; and the Great Lakes, 4.7 million.

The most popular Labor Day destination will be a trip to a city, where 24 percent of the travelers expect to visit; followed by town or rural area, 22 percent; ocean or beach, 18 percent; lake area, 15 percent; mountain area, 9 percent; state/national park, 4 percent; theme/amusement park, 3 percent; and other/undecided, 5 percent.

Of those traveling, 43 percent will stay overnight in a hotel or motel, while 27 percent intend to stay with friends or relatives. Other planned accommodations are: Camper/trailer/RV or tent, 12 percent; cabin/condo, 8 percent; boat/ship, 2 percent; bed & breakfast, 1 percent; and other, 1 percent. Six percent are undecided or aren't staying overnight.

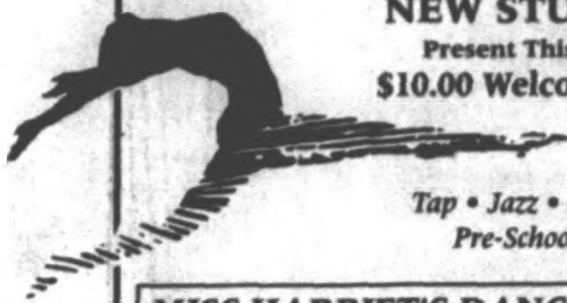

Can your way out of a gardening pickle

I can remember when the Janes Gang owned a family cottage just off Pointe Pelee. One of our stops was a little bakery in Essex. Their crusty dinner rolls tasted equally good slathered with peanut butter or stuffed with ham, cheese, turkey, lettuce and tomato.

Brewer's Retail was where we stopped for a case of Canadian beer — Old Vienna was dad's favorite.

We knew we were getting close when we could smell the pickle vats at the Heinz factory in Leamington.

Delicious memory

I never liked pickles until one day, after the umpteenth free tour, an avant-garde tour guide reached over and grabbed a freshly packed jar from a bustling assembly line and opened it for all who wished to try.

Since that day, I can't get enough. Now that's certainly not to say that I'm a lover of Heinz pickles, and for the record, they do make a classic dill spear. Since that day, I've grown to love homemade pickles "put up" by someone who knows how to do it right.

Pickles have a taste and reputation all their own. Anyone who has ever ventured into a Jewish deli and savored a crisp "new" dill can appreciate what pickle nirvana is all about.

Folks in western Wayne County who have ventured into Getsie's Pub in downtown Northville might remember Dorothy, the evening waitress who used to make a dill pickle that tasted to me what a prime steak must taste like to a cowboy. She was and always will be remembered as my pickle "queen."

But judging from my voice mail requests there are others of you out there who are also searching for the best pickle recipe. Good news folks. This is prime pickle season and have I got the recipes for you.

Pickling cucumbers planted with love and care in May blossomed abundantly during our humid and wet July and August bringing forth a bumper crop of some of the fattest cukes I have ever set my eyes upon. Now a good pickler knows that the smaller and less fat a pickling cuke is, the better it will taste, not to mention the fact that it will have fewer seeds.

If the thought of pickling makes you grimace with thoughts of simmering pots and boiling jars, especially during these dog days of summer, look for a pickling crock. Check out old hardware stores for the best deals, but if your garden is spewing forth pickles, and you need one fast, they are available at Kitchen Glamor Stores, Hertler's Farm and Garden in Ann Arbor (what a fun old store to browse through on a hazy summer day) and most antique shops. Couple the crocks with a cool basement and you'll be soon in pickle heaven.

Of course, those not willing to be patient and allow the pickles to ripen slowly in the pickling juices can take heed as we have even included recipes that can be made in days rather than weeks.

Anyone who has ever made pickles knows that if you make one jar, you might as well make a dozen. Any of our recipes will do either. The most difficult task when making pickles is sterilizing the jars and making sure the lids fit tightly.

The folks at Ball Jars and Kerr Glass both have very respectable books available for purchase at your local book store or gourmet shop. They are paperback, very inexpensive, and spell out everything you need to know about canning, pickling and food dehydration at your local library and through your county extension service.

Canning pointers

I like to utilize a little trick I learned years back when canning was something I thought I had to do. Sterilize your jars by running them through the rinse and drying cycle of your dishwasher (no soap, please!). You can also find everything you need to know about canning, pickling and food dehydration at your local library and through your county extension service.

The folks at Kerr Glass even have a Consumer Affairs Department that can answer your immediate canning and pickling questions during normal business hours. Their toll free phone number is 1-(800)-654-6249.

Children + cooking = mess.
Children + cooking = fun and learning.

To most parents of young children, the first equation would come to mind first when thinking about mixing kids and cooking.

To those parents who give it a try and are willing to sit back and look at the experience as a whole, the outcome will certainly be fun and educational above all else.

Marilyn Romack of the New Morning School in Plymouth said she likes to combine cooking with class work whenever possible because it provides so many lessons. Math skills, science skills, early reading skills, small motor skills, following directions and teamwork should all be listed among the ingredients of any recipe, she says.

The key when starting out is being patient and don't worry about keeping the kitchen clean (maybe cook with the kids the day before cleaning day so you won't feel so stressed). Use aprons to protect clothing, use a large bowl to control spillage and let kids crack eggs in a separate bowl so shells don't get mixed in with the cookies.

Next, let the kids do the work. It's their lesson to learn and their project to feel good about.

Cooking foods that the family can eat is great. Lessons about making

healthy food choices can be incorporated in the mix. In the Feelin' Groovy summer class at New Morning School, teacher Ann Murray had her students replace margarine with applesauce in a chocolate chip cook

recipe, and they made yogurt freezer pops as a good summer cooler.

Some foods, however, can be eaten and can be learning tools in themselves. Romack recommends a recipe for bread sticks or pretzels that the

kids can whip up and then bend the dough into the shapes of letters or numbers. A good shortbread recipe could be used to make a puzzle for kids to work.

Interesting science lessons can be learned from mixing up a batch of gelatin in a large glass bowl, partially chilling it, and letting the kids drop in certain treats — marshmallows, fruit, raisins, etc. — to see which ones float and which ones sink. Finish chilling the gelatin for a family dessert.

Finally some kitchen/food activities are just great crafts that can be enjoyed together. In the Mish Mash Mania class this summer at New Morning School, teacher Ann Sufran had her 3- to 6-year-olds coat a sheet of construction paper with glue mixed with water and then sprinkled spices on top. The smelly collage was a lesson in the various scents produced by spices and how they blend. The resulting artwork is pretty interesting, too.

You might also try making edible necklaces out of cereals, pastas or other circular food.

Whatever the project, make it together and enjoy it together. Moms, dads, brothers, sisters, grandmas and grandpas, aunts and uncles can all get into the act for a great time that blends learning and fun with a little cooking on the side.

■ **Smaller Appetites** — If half of the lunch you pack comes back home, you're probably packing too much. Try half a sandwich and switch to finger foods.
■ **Little Extras** — Brighten your child's day with a clever note, colorful stickers, a funny picture, a small prize, or an unexpected goodie.
■ **Squish Prevention** — Use unbreakable plastic containers. Select sturdy foods (apples instead

of peaches) or carefully wrap and cushion more-fragile items. Pack the heaviest items on the bottom of the lunch box.
■ **Fruit 'n' Veggie Tips** — For easier eating, cut oranges and apples into quarters. (Brush cut surfaces of apples with orange or lemon juice to prevent browning). Buy baby carrots and/or cut veggies into fun shapes. Use a plastic drinking straw to make fruit kabobs. Pack lettuce and thinly

sliced tomato to be added to a sandwich just before eating.
■ **Peer Pressure** — Even little kids feel the pressure to eat what their friends are eating, so be sure to ask your child for input when selecting lunchtime menus.
■ **Be Creative** — Roll sliced turkey and cheese inside a flour tortilla; hide a spoonful of peanut butter inside an oatmeal muffin (fill muffin pan half full of batter,

add peanut butter and top with more batter); and use large cookie cutters to cut sandwich bread into interesting shapes.

Here are a few fun recipes to try with your kids and lessons that can be incorporated.

ALPHABET BREADSTICKS

1 package active dry yeast
1 1/2 cups warm water, about 110 degrees F.
1 tablespoon honey
2 cups all-purpose flour
2 cups whole wheat flour
melted margarine or butter
garlic salt, seasoning salt or onion salt

Place yeast in a large bowl. Add warm water and honey and stir. Let the mixture sit for a few minutes until bubbly. Stir in all-purpose flour. Add whole wheat flour, 1/2 cup at a time. Mix thoroughly after each addition of flour, using a heavy wooden spoon or your hands. Dust additional flour over a smooth surface and turn the dough onto it. Knead dough for 10 minutes. Grease a baking sheet. Cut the dough into quarters, then cut each quarter into eight pieces. Roll each piece of dough until it is 8 inches long, place it on the baking sheet, and form it into the shape of a letter. Brush the letters with melted butter and lightly sprinkle with one of the salts. Let rise in a warm, draft-free place for 15 minutes. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 32 alphabet breadsticks.

Activities: place the alphabet breadsticks on a tray and have your child name the letters, let each child select a letter and name it, make breadsticks to spell out the child's name or other simple words, make pairs of letters and let your child pick out the matching letters.

PRETZELS

1 1/2 cups warm water
1 envelope yeast
4 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
coarse salt

Mix together warm water, yeast and sugar. Set aside for 5 minutes. Put salt and flour in a bowl. Add yeast mixture and mix together to form dough. Shape dough into creative shapes. Beat 1 egg and brush onto dough shapes with a pastry brush. Sprinkle on coarse salt. Bake at 425 degrees for about 12 minutes.

SHORTBREAD PUZZLES

2 cups flour, white or whole wheat
1/4 cup honey
1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine
1 egg
1 teaspoon water

Place flour and butter in a bowl. Rub butter into flour. Add enough honey to moisten into a dough. Use a rolling pin to roll out dough, about 1/4 inch thick. Cut into a rectangular shape. Prick all over with a fork. Use a plastic knife to cut into large puzzle pieces. Arrange on a baking sheet. If desired brush with a mixture of 1 beaten egg and 1 teaspoon water for a glossy look. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 20 to 30 minutes.

MUD PIE

1 cup butter or margarine
2 8-ounce packages cream cheese
2 cups powdered sugar
7 cups milk
4 3/4-ounce packages instant vanilla pudding
2 12-ounce cartons Cool Whip

Oreo cookies smashed

Mix all the ingredients together, except cookies and worms, and stir until smooth. Pour mixture into a plastic flower pot (washed of course and with the drainage hole plugged). Alternate the pudding mixture with a layer of the smashed cookies and some worms. Top with a layer of the cookies.

each indentation with 1/2 teaspoon preserves. Bake 18-20 minutes or until edges are light golden brown. Cool completely on wire rack. Cut into bars. Store tightly covered. Yield 30 bars.

- 12 medium pickling cucumbers, washed but unpeeled
- 4 medium onions
- 2 green peppers, diced
- 2 red peppers, diced
- 3 tablespoons salt
- 5 cups sugar
- 4 cups vinegar
- 2 tablespoons pickling spices (optional)

Slice cukes into circles. Slice onions into rings and peppers into wedges. Sprinkle cukes with salt and allow to stand for 2 hours.

Drain and rinse well with cold water. Meanwhile, dissolve sugar in vinegar. Pour over pickles and add onions and peppers. Mix well. Stir in pickling spices, if desired. Refrigerate in a non-metallic container.

Will keep for 3 weeks. Can be canned at a later date, if desired. Makes about 4 quarts.

CRISP PICKLES

- 10 medium pickling cukes
- Boiling water
- 8 cups sugar
- 1 quart vinegar
- 5 tablespoons salt
- 2 tablespoons whole pickling spices
- 2 teaspoons celery seeds

Cover cucumbers with boiling water. Allow to stand overnight in a large pot or crock. Drain and repeat this process for 4 successive days. (Always add fresh boiling water)

On the sixth day, make a syrup with the sugar, vinegar and salt with spices tied in a cheesecloth bag. Heat liquid and spices to boiling. Place pickles in a clean crock or large clean glass jug (sliced or whole).

Pour hot syrup over the pickles and allow to stand overnight. Drain syrup and reserve. Reheat syrup with spices, pour over pickles and allow to stand again overnight. Drain and reserve syrup. Discard spices. Reheat syrup and pour over pickles. Makes about 5 pints. Can

be canned, if desired.

HOMEMADE SWEET PICKLES

- 1 quart dill pickles (get them from a dell if you don't want to do your own)
- 2 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1 1/2 teaspoon celery seed

Drain pickles and place in a large non-metallic bowl. Combine sugar and vinegar and boil, stirring until a syrup is made. Pour syrup over pickles. Stir in celery seed. Allow pickles to stand at room temperature for 4 hours, stirring occasionally. Repack pickles in a jar or crock in syrup and refrigerate. Makes about 1 quart.



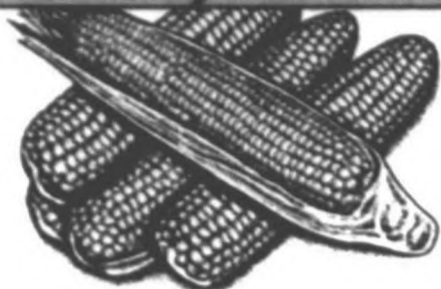

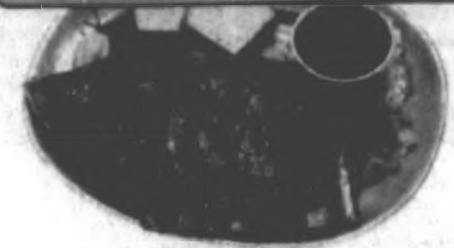

Link your cuffs in a savvy style

Remember that big white shirt that you bought last fall? The one with the long pointy collar and the French cuffs? The crisp white cotton tunic-style shirt was the number one item on everyone's shopping list last year. But you probably didn't bother to shop for cuff links, because all of the fashion magazines showed those French cuffs hanging open beneath jacket sleeves, a starched whiteness completely covering the hand. (How did anyone eat with those dangling cuffs in the way?)

Well, this fall, retrieve that dress shirt from the closet or buy a newer, more fitted version in taffeta or silk charmeuse. It is an essential part of a three-piece menswear-inspired suit. And cinch those cuffs with a pair of eye-catching cuff links. The look this year is much more refined and pulled together. Luckily, we don't have to settle for those generic, initial-engraved goldtone cuff links or polished silver squares with a tiny rhinestone in the corner that every grandfather has tucked

away in a little wooden jewelry box. I searched for some fun and fashionable decorative cuff links and found some definite winners.

Colonel Littleton refurbishes vintage cuff links in 10K gold, enamel and mother-of-pearl. The original designs, all from the '20s and '30s, are glamorous and classic without being boring. Look for his collection at Parisian, Laurel Park Place, Livonia (\$70-\$115).

Designer Nicole Miller, famous for her whimsical silk ties, reproduces her one-of-a-kind designs on vests, makeup cases, diaper bags, umbrellas and even cuff links. Her '96 sterling silver cuff links include

lips, wineglasses, golf ball buckets, champagne glasses, champagne buckets and for the serious "suiter," a bull and bear (\$85).

Most of these playful cuff links are available at Michigan's only Nicole Miller boutique, Adamo at 268 West Maple in Birmingham.

Miller's line also includes formal wear for wedding parties, women's separates and preteen party dresses. Her accessories are patterned in such colorful and artsy themes as Nabisco cookies, Barbie dolls, Kermit the Frog and seed packets for the gardener.

Occupational ties
Doctors, lawyers, golfers, hockey fans, stock brokers, wine collectors, dentists and auto enthusiasts will all find ties appropriate to their hobbies or careers. Miller creates 1,200 to 3,000 of each pattern and then retires the art, so her ties become collector's items. Coming soon to Adamo, the Christmas and New Years collector ties. All ties are \$60.

Back to cuff links. Neiman Marcus at the Somerset Collection, Troy, devotes an entire case to the oft-ignored fashion accessory. Jewelry designers John Hardy and David Yurman craft sterling silver into elegant cuff links. Yurman's are hand-drawn in 14K gold in his signature Cable pattern (from \$230).

Also notable are the white porcelain cuff links by Duchamp-London. Each in a pair is printed with the words Hot and Cold; Yes and No; or Thank You in about 10 different languages (\$65). For real eye-popping fun, check out Nancy & Riese's eyeball cuff links, in the color of your choice. They should draw attention — at least to your wrists — and they make great conversation pieces.

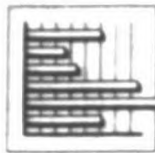

Home Depot opens 12 Michigan stores



Home Depot is credited with being an innovator in the home center retail industry for combining a warehouse format with a level of customer service unprecedented among warehouse-style retailers. Two stores open this week.

The Home Depot opens Michigan stores "10 and 11" on Aug. 31 — one at Webster and Southfield Rd. in Southfield, and the other in Grand Rapids on 28th St.

There is one additional store planned for the state, which is under construction in Saginaw. Each store includes a 28,000 square-foot greenhouse and garden center, for a total of 130,000 square feet of home-related merchandise.

"We're especially pleased to be opening (these) stores in Michigan," said Pedro Mendiguren, district manager. "We offer customers an enormous range of top-quality home improvement products . . . and a

level of service they've never experienced before."

Home Depot provides an easy-to-shop layout showcasing approximately 40-50,000 different kinds of building materials, home improvement supplies, interior design products, and plants and accessories for the lawn and garden. These products are sold to do-it-yourselfers, as well as home improvement, construction and building maintenance professionals.

The Home Depot stores also offer free do-it-yourself clinics and a nation-wide bridal registry service.

The new stores feature a professionally staffed, centrally located,

design center which offers free consulting for home improvement projects ranging from lighting to computer-assisted design for kitchens and bathrooms.

Each store will employ approximately 150 employees, and provide a significant tax and property revenue — approximately \$2.3 million each in sales and property taxes annually, according to a company spokeswoman.

Founded in 1978, in Atlanta, GA, The Home Depot claims to be North America's largest home center retailer. It operates 372 warehouse-style home centers in 30 states, and 17 stores in three Canadian provinces. Gross sales for 1994 topped \$12.4 billion. Stock is traded on the New York Stock Exchange under the symbol "HD," and is included in the Standard and Poor's 500 Index. Home Depot expects to be operating approximately 850 stores by the end of fiscal 1998.

In March, Home Depot received a "most-admired retailer" rating from Fortune Magazine, due in part to a \$8 million philanthropic budget which is directed back to the communities Home Depot serves. Home Depot supports development of affordable housing and programs to benefit youth at risk.

Mendiguren said Home Depot expanded into Michigan last year because the state's demographics "are excellent. You have a good economy, a high percentage of ownership, and people who generally take great pride in improving their homes."

Competition for Michigan's home improvement dollars grows keen as other superstores such as Builders Square, Home Quarters, and Handy Andy (descendants of Forest City) open new stores and tout customer service.

James Purcell's couture designs echo the '60s

Although he uses "the real couture fabric from Europe," to fashion his high-society creations, James Purcell insists he is a purveyor of "American couture."

"Someday I'd like to produce true American luxury goods," he said wistfully backstage at the Concours d'Elegance in Rochester Hills where his fall collection was on parade. "Purses, gloves, shoes, the very top, made in this country for people who

appreciate the design and workmanship that would be behind it."

Right now, however, Purcell and partner Barry Steinhart keep busy



building their fashion house, which they describe as "a real New York retailer, our workroom."

Purcell's designs are handmade by a small staff of just 10 specialists, the owners included. They are sold through Saks Fifth Avenue, Neiman Marcus and Barneys New York.

Purcell describes his clients as "women at the top of their social community who want the best clothing available." These have included Candace Bergen, Hillary Clinton, Phyllis Diller and local celebrities SuSu Sossnick and Elmore Leonard's wife, Christine.

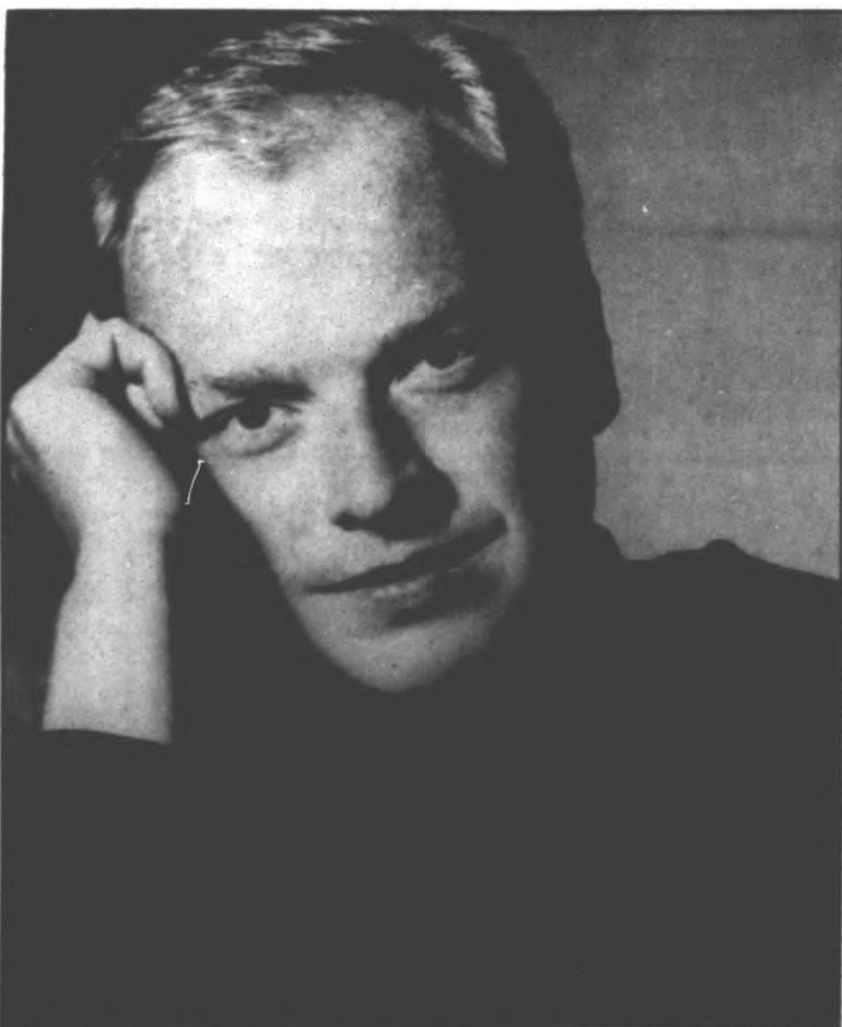
Purcell, 39, explained that his creations are inspired by looks from the '50s and '60s, when growing up in Indiana, he was surrounded by a very fashion-conscious mother and eight sisters. His father was vice-president of the gas and electric company.

"My mother was a big Marshall Field's customer and she wore wonderful clothes," he recalled. "She raised 11 of us, eight girls and three boys. I can't help but be influenced by the fashion silhouettes and designs that are a part of my memories. I've updated these for the '90s and found a ready audience who also fondly recall these designs but have no where else to buy them."

In 1989, Purcell left his job as marketing director of the Chicago Stock Exchange to begin designing women's high fashion, a dream he held since his school days.

A year later, he linked up with Wall Street attorney Barry Steinhart to be-

gin James Purcell Designs. Steinhart is a Michigan native who attended University Liggett in Grosse Pointe, class of 1977, and graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in the class of 1982. The pair financed the company themselves with help from friends and relatives. The first year, they made \$600, but by 1994, sales had reached \$1 million.

"The post World War II years were the last great clothes years," Purcell said. "It was such a fantasy time in U.S. history. Camelot. Prosperity. Women didn't have to look sexy to feel they were attractive."

Purcell's designs are pure, simple and clean, right in step with the current clamor for classics and elegant looks. But Purcell follows say he was one of the first to recall the American glamour years.

"James has a very special niche in the marketplace," said Cheryl Hall of Saks Fifth Avenue.

Hall worked with Purcell to produce the Concours show. "His silhouettes are very ladylike. The fabrics just incredible, the workmanship superb. It's what cou-

ture used to be. It's fashion of a level you don't see very much anymore."

When he wants to relax, Purcell said he heads for his beach house on Fire Island. But those times are few and far between. Mostly it's long, nose-to-the-grindstone days to produce three collections a year, fall/winter, spring/summer and holiday/resort.

One of his favorite designs for fall is a silk trapeze jacket with mother-of-pearl buttons, "great over a slim skirt or silk capri pants." Retail price: \$1,840. (You can pick up some daytime dresses or a cocktail dress for under \$1,000.) But Purcell is quick to point out that the garments are made from couture fabric that begins at \$200 a yard.

Town and Country magazine recently blessed Purcell with a cover story in which Phillip Miller, chairman and CEO of Saks Fifth Avenue paid him this compliment, "It takes courage for a young designer to cut from the finest French fabrics. James is well-grounded. He has a rare talent: He understands women who buy fine clothes."

At last, dreams coming true for a trio of leaders

The thought is always there, planted when you're a kid and nurtured throughout adolescence until you reach adulthood, when — supposedly — you can do something about it.

What do you want to be when you grow up? Ask that question to Tom Moshimer 30 years ago and he would have replied, without hesitation, "Coach." His wish was realized, it's true, but there were always those "conditions" to deal with, the fine print, so to speak.

He had classes to teach, too. As good a high school football coach as Moshimer was, he couldn't make enough money at it to financially survive.

Until now. Early retirement beckoned, and he grabbed it — as long as he could keep coaching.

Which is what he'll do, and it's all he'll do. His wish has come true, finally: Tom Moshimer, now 60, will be a full-time football coach this fall.

Another dream realized

For Brian Wolcott, a childhood wish was also attained when it was announced he would succeed Paul Cummings as the school district's director of athletics and physical education.

Wolcott didn't have to wait nearly as long to realize his dream — he's only 37. But there's no doubting it's a lifelong wish come true.

The new district AD was part of the first graduating class ever to spend four full years at Salem HS, receiving his diploma in '76. He went on from there to get a bachelor's degree from Michigan State and a Masters in athletic administration.

Wolcott spent nine years at Birmingham Groves, coaching a variety of sports, including volleyball, baseball, track, girls basketball and cross country. He was the Groves' track coach for the past seven years, the cross country coach for four.

And yet, throughout that entire span, he and his family lived in Plymouth.

He received his training for the district AD's job by actively taking part in as many activities outside of his work (he taught health and physical education) as he could. "I think I was on every committee in the world," Wolcott said.

"But what helps is the type of work I was able to do. I was able to sit in on committees that write policy."

Not a rebuild

Wolcott won't be one to tear the system in place apart for the sake of change. Indeed, Cummings doesn't officially depart until the end of September, staying on board to help get Wolcott acclimated to the new post.

Does Cummings' presence concern Wolcott? "Heck, no," he answered. "Face it — he's done it for 25 years. A lot of this stuff just comes naturally to him."

"This whole start will take some time. I'm going to have to take a long look to see exactly what it entails."

Wolcott hesitated, then added, "You know what? I'm only in my second week and it just feels right."

Now one must assume no one gets a job like this without selling some ideas on what direction he would like to see the program headed. Wolcott has thoughts like that, but he'll take his time before voicing them. Basically, he doesn't see any need for radical change.

"In terms of athletics, they've done a super job here," he said. "But there are things that need to be addressed — I guess I'd call it plant management."

That means upgrading facilities that are starting to wear down, like the floor in Canton's Phase III gymnasium. Wolcott knows "there are decisions on where the dollars are going to be spent. You have to learn to work with people in the district."

He'd also like to develop more sports activities for more kids, on an intramural basis perhaps. But these are things that will take time, and funding.

Final hurrah

Wolcott knows it. He's in no big rush — he's just where he wants to be. "I've lived nearly all my life right here," he said.

For the man he succeeds, one dream is at an end and another will replace it. Cummings served as district AD for the last 10 years; his list of accomplishments is impressive, from supervising the construction of the lighted soccer field to developing an athletic trainer's program.

He was honored as the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Region XI athletic director of the year for the 1994-95 school year.

So now what? What's on his agenda? "You know, everyone asks me that, and I have to tell them I just don't know," Cummings said.

Speed is Canton's strength

Some pretty big names are gone. There's just no getting around it.

But Plymouth Canton still has talent. The question facing both the Chiefs and coach Bob Khoenle: Is there enough to put them on top, in a position to challenge for the Western Lakes Activities Association title, or perhaps a spot in the Class AA playoffs?

Those kinds of questions are impossible to answer, simply because there are too many unknown factors regarding Canton.

"We think we have good people at the skill positions," said Khoenle, who guided the Chiefs to a 4-5 season in '94. "Our problem right now is up front — on our lines. We're inexperienced and lack the basic fundamentals we need to get to where we want to be."

Canton must rebuild its entire offensive line, and must also replace offensive stalwarts Len Gardner at tailback and Brett Elledge at quarterback.

As formidable as Gardner and Elledge were, filling their positions may be easier. That's because Khoenle can call on junior Rob Johnson, who showed promise as Elledge's backup at quarterback last year, and Mark Montgomery, a speedy junior who will take over Gardner's tailback spot.

Khoenle is optimistic about both. Johnson's capabilities are apparent: He's 6-foot-4 and 195 pounds, has good speed, and is well-respected by his teammates, who voted for him as a team co-captain (with seniors Shaun Dyer, a fullback/noseguard, and Ron Hunter, a wide receiver/defensive back) despite his junior-class status.

Johnson did start one game last year — and that was against Farmington Hills Harrison, which went on to win the Class A championship. "He's fast and he throws pre-

Salem has the stuff for a title challenge

There were 26 seniors on the 1995 Plymouth Salem football team, all now alumni. Among the graduated: all-Western Lakes Activities Association offensive lineman Jeremy Eaton and these all-Lakes Division selections: tailback Mike Brannan, quarterback Brad Lear, offensive lineman Paul Tebben, linebacker Dave Bracht and safety Dan McKinnan.

Sounds like a rebuilding job is in order, right?

Not entirely. At least not according to coach Tom Moshimer. And he should know — after all, he's been coaching the Rocks since the beginning.

In other words, Moshimer is the only football coach in school history. Rebuilding? Maybe so. But that doesn't mean the Rocks will struggle to match last year's mediocre record (5-4).

Indeed, Moshimer believes they'll surpass it, despite the losses to graduation. "I'm not saying we were bad last year," he said. "But yes, I think we're improved from a year ago."

Even after losing three starting offensive linemen, a 1,000-yard tailback, a two-year starter at quarterback, six defensive starters and your placekicker?

How can that be?

Well, it starts with attitude. Moshimer likes this team's approach and outlook better than any of his past three teams. And the last three years are something the long-time coach would just as soon forget.

"We've been 14-13 over the last three years," Moshimer said. "We're looking to break that string."

He added with a smile, "Hopefully, it'll be upward." But he wasn't joking.

The team's fortunes are resting on the line play. Both are strong, although the offensive line is short on depth. "We can put a decent offensive line on the field, but we don't have much depth," Moshimer said.

Seven players will be shuttled in and out along the offensive front. The best is senior Tom Bish (6-foot-5, 220 pounds), who will also play on the defensive line. Moshimer feels

Crusaders hoping injury woes are over

What Jerry Abraham doesn't want is a repeat.

Last season wasn't all that dismal for Madonna University's volleyball team, mind you. But it could have been better.

Injuries deflated any lofty aspirations the Lady Crusaders may have entertained. Going into the season, their biggest concern was replacing setter Mazie Pijut, who had graduated. That changed by mid-season.

Madonna finished 30-21 last year, seeing its season end in the NAIA Great Lakes Regional semifinals. It

was far short of expectations, which were high after the Crusaders' fifth-place finish in the '93 NAIA National Tournament.

As Abraham said after the season-ending loss to Mount St. Joseph's (Cincinnati), "It's been an inconsistent year for us."

Even though the losses seem greater this year — gone are third-team NAIA All-American Mo Paulin and starting outside hitter Julie Wood, both graduated, and Marci Laurencelle, Kate Dunning and Laura Fisher, who opted not to return — optimism is high.

The reason, at least in part, is the sobering effect a season that comes up short. "We do have experience in criti-

cal areas," said Abraham, who has a 309-117 record in his eight years as coach.

That experience starts with juniors Julie Martin, 6-foot-2 from Livonia Stevenson, and Kelly McCausland, 5-11 from Redford Union. Both are entering their third year as starters for Madonna; they will anchor the middle-hitter position.

"Martin and McCausland are two of the best players in the country," said Abraham simply. "Both are All-American prospects."

Unfortunately, they were two of the reasons Madonna struggled last year — or, rather, the injuries they suffered were. At times, the Crusaders were without five starters last year.

With some better luck, that should change this year. The team's only sen-

ior is 5-10 middle-hitter Tiffany Joseph.

Outside hitters Paulin and Wood, and setter Fisher, must be replaced. Meg Paris, who started at Ferris State before transferring to Mott Community College, will fill the void at setter. First, however, Paris must overcome a leg injury that sidelined her late last season.

Heather Steinhilper, a 5-10 junior, and 5-10 Erin Comment and 5-8 Erin Gregoire, both sophomores, all gained valuable experience last season, but only Gregoire survived without injury.

Vicki Toth, a 5-10 sophomore from Redford Union, will serve as back-up setter, and Emily Marlow, a 5-11

Shamrocks seek to regain their playoff form

The Coaches Room at Redford Catholic Central, typically the place where coach Tom Mach prefers to talk football, wasn't conducive to an interview after classes Friday afternoon.

Students and coaches were coming and going and the school band could be heard through the courtyard windows, practicing for Saturday's season opener.

So Mach called an audible, suggesting to move the interview to another room. He walked into the crowded hallway and pointed to the nearest door.

"Let's go in the weight room, there's no one in there," Mach said.

Hard to believe. It must be football season, because this room is rarely empty in the off-season.

The Shamrocks were especially persistent the past eight months, because a 6-3 record is unheard of with this football power.

The Shamrocks failed to make the state playoffs for the second year in a row, and the last time that happened was 1984. CC has won three state championships, including the Class AA titles in 1990 and '92, and are one of the favorites in AA this season.

Optimism is high because the seniors on this year's team were undefeated on the freshman and junior varsity teams.

Before that, a bunch won Cath-

olic Youth Organization titles either at St. Michael in Livonia or Our Lady of Sorrows in Farmington.

Weighty issue

From January on, the weight room is open three days a week for the football players. The program is accelerated in the dead of winter with a week called "March Madness."

Players arrive at school more than an hour early, and are to be in front of their weight lifting station by 6:29 a.m. The gym also is used for running drills.

How impressive is the program?

One of Mach's friends in coaching, Monroe head coach Ralph

Carducci, is starting a similar program at his school.

"We demand a lot, that's why we call it a 'Disciplinary Agility Program,' they learn the idea of sacrificing for the team," Mach said.

If you plan on being late, don't show, says the Shamrocks' strongest lifter, senior two-way standout John Spolsky (6-foot, 235 pounds).

"You don't really like it when you're doing it, but at least all your friends are there doing it with you," Spolsky said. "Then it's all over and we go to school, but not to fall asleep in class. We're doing it to get better, not to make excuses for the rest of the day."

The Shamrocks have 29 players who weigh at least 200 pounds and on the offensive line CC averages 239 pounds.

Spolsky bench presses a mind-boggling 405 pounds. Spolsky was a first-team All-Observer choice on defense last year as a linebacker. He's the area's best fullback and will move to nose guard on defense.

"It makes me feel good when he gets the ball — he runs like a full-back should," Mach said.

The Shamrocks' quarterback is junior Greg Call, who may be the team's best athlete. The left-hander's favorite target will be senior tight end Eric Gilbo (6-7, 250), who caught four passes last

year.

Gilbo has the best hands and the team's best arm — he's a former quarterback. The wide receiving corps also includes seniors Joel Rioux (5-7, 160), Steve Mondry (6-0, 185), Tom Valenti (6-0, 180) and Mike Ambroziak (5-11, 180).

"Gilbo catches very well, he has hands of glue," Mach said.

The backfield features junior tailback Greg Alcalá (5-7, 170), a shifty runner who played on the junior varsity last year. Also spending time at tailback will be senior returnee Kevin Quay (6-0, 180).

Rockets again looking to rule in Lakes Division

It's nothing new. It's not a revelation.

Westland John Glenn High's football team will be a contender again this year in the Western Lakes Activities Association. The Rockets, 136-42 in 18 years under

coach Chuck Gordon, are also seeking their eighth post-season playoff berth since 1985.

Last season, the underdog Rockets came within a minute of reaching the state Class AA finals at the Pontiac Silverdome. After an 0-2 start in 1994, Glenn regrouped and finished with an 8-2

record, capped by a heart-breaking 13-2 semifinal loss to Bay City Central.

After the Rockets' strong finish, many believe there will be a carry-over from the end of last season. Many coaches have them pegged as the hands-down favorite to win the Lakes Division of the WLAA,

but Gordon isn't buying that.

"Our division is very balanced; it's wide open," he said. "People forget we were involved in a lot of close (division) games last year."

The Rockets are preparing for Friday's home lift-off against Howell, but they'll be without All-Area tailback Brent Washington, who gained 1,400-plus yards. He is now a freshman cornerback at the University of Michigan.

"Offensively, we had a big, fast tailback in Brent (Washington) who we really really featured," Gordon said. "This year we're going to have to play a different style. We'll throw more and I think we're capable of doing it."

Also lost was All-Area defensive back/quarterback James Hagelthorn, along with 290-pound All-Observer offensive tackle Ron Schoenheide (now at Michigan Tech). Second-teamers Jim Lock and Phil Graca, a pair of offensive linemen, also graduated.

Jay Jackson, a 5-foot-5, 150-pound senior who gained over 100 yards in a 30-0 season-opening loss last season to Howell, returns at tailback. He was switched to wide receiver in 1994 after Washington came back from an early-season knee injury.

"Jay has good quickness," Gordon said. "Some people may be deceived by his size, but he runs hard and will take it up in there."

The offensive line is a hard-working group," Gordon said. "We think they will develop into a good line. They just need experience."

Glenn, using a 5-2 alignment defensively, returns four starters. They include Cook at tackle, senior defensive end Keith King (6-2, 200), along with Griglio and Sosnowski at linebacker.

"Having them back has helped the progress of that unit," Gordon said. "We have guys who are battle-tested. If the others come along, we have a good chance to become a good defense."

Bish has ability enough to continue playing collegiately.

Others with experience are seniors Derek Ellison (5-11, 205), Craig Mroczka (6-3, 215) and Brian Charleifour (5-8, 240). They'll be joined by juniors Tim Koccoloski (5-10, 175), Mike Middel (5-11, 160) and Kevin Guse (6-2, 195). Another player who could bolster the line is senior William Brooks (6-2, 210), who may switch from fullback.

Most of those players will also play on the defensive front. "We have strength on the defensive line," said Moshimer. "That's where our depth is."

Bish is the leader on the defensive front, together with Brooks and senior fullback Kevin Grim (5-8, 160). Together with the other offensive linemen, they'll have to play well — mainly because the linebackers are all new.

"We're very green at linebacker," admitted Moshimer. "We lost 'em all. We're going with young kids, all kids off the JV."

To prove his point, the player with the best grasp on a starting linebacker's position is a sophomore: Brett Burleson (6-0, 170). Others who figure to see plenty of action are seniors Scott Tofil (5-11, 150) and Randy Mack (6-1, 155) and juniors James Chapman (6-0, 180) and Koccoloski.

The defensive backfield isn't as unsettled. Senior Dirk Schmiedel (5-10, 165), who started at safety last year, is one of Salem's most versatile performers. He and junior Nate Gray (6-0, 175) are vying for the starting spot at quarterback; if Schmiedel doesn't start at QB, he'll be at wingback.

Ashraf Youssef (5-11, 175), a senior who will try to fill Brannan's shoes at tailback, will also be at safety, with junior Matt Johnson (5-11, 170), senior Frank Lewicki (6-2, 170), senior Kirk Craggs (6-3, 170) and senior Adam Dailide (5-10, 145) all seeing action.

Even with Lear's loss, Moshimer figures the team should be in solid shape at quarterback, with Schmiedel and the very promising Gray. "It's hard to say he has more tools (than

Lear)," Moshimer said of Gray. "Let me put it this way: Given time, he can be better."

Youssef and senior Sean Alsobrooks (6-1, 155) both saw time at tailback last season, playing behind Brannan. At fullback, Moshimer thinks the team is better with Grim, who started there last year, returning; he's being challenged for playing time by Johnson.

Schmiedel, Dailide and Chapman provide the Rocks with a lot of depth at wingback; senior Ryan Hoffman (6-3, 170), Mack and Alsobrooks will share time at split end. Tight end is also a position

of strength, with Craggs returning, joined by Lewicki.

A year ago, Moshimer called on soccer star Mike Kley to do his placekicking, and he was more than adequate. Kley's gone, but there are two others to replace him: junior Brian James and senior Taras Seniuch. Like Kley, Seniuch also plays for Salem's soccer team.

At the moment, Moshimer thinks Seniuch will do the punting and James will handle the placekicking. However, both boot field goals better than 40 yards during Thursday's four-team scrimmage, so that could change.

ty good," said Khoenle of Johnson.

He also has a knack of "making things happen," according to Khoenle — same as Montgomery (who stands 6-0, 195), Hunter (6-3, 195) and junior flanker Jason Pennebaker (6-0, 180).

Their combined abilities in the open field are what Khoenle is counting on, because the offensive line's ability is a mystery. Of the seven players Khoenle is counting on, five are seniors: center Matt McIntosh (6-1, 250), guard Jason Mazur (6-1, 195), and tackles Max Lafferty (6-3, 245), John Wright (6-0, 210) and Chris Hornick (6-2, 245).

He has two juniors to call on, too: guards Nick Kanaan (6-0, 200) and Pat Krause (5-11, 180). However, of the seven, only Wright gained any type of experience playing Canton football in '94, and that was with the junior varsity.

Lafferty played JV as a sophomore, but a medical problem sidelined him last year, and Hornick played only defense during his junior season.

"We've got the size, but they're inexperienced," said Khoenle. Which makes it such a question mark.

The other offensive spots are anything but. Hunter and Pennebaker will be joined at the wide receiver spot by senior returnee Nick Belyk (5-11, 175), whom Khoenle said has "excellent hands."

Dyer (5-8, 180), the team's only upperclassman in the offensive backfield, is solid at fullback; sophomore Nick Allen (6-0, 200) will also get some time there. And there's depth at quarterback, with junior Pat Nelson (6-2, 190).

"We've got our strong points and we've got our weak points," Khoenle noted. The defensive line, while a bit more experienced than the offensive front, is still uncertain. Dyer rates as a "terrific noseguard," flanked by Hornick and Wright at the tackles.

Lafferty, Mazur and Nelson will fill the defensive end spots, with seniors Tony Vassallo (6-0, 235) and Jim Kirila (6-0, 235) adding depth.

At linebacker, Khoenle will call on Allen, Kanaan, Montgomery and junior Jason Tallant (6-0, 185). Hunter, Johnson, Pennebaker, Belyk, senior Jim Jarems (5-11, 175) and junior Eric Sarrault (5-9, 150) make the defensive backfield appear solid.

Jeff Fliass, an all-state selection

from Canton's Class A championship soccer team, filled in as the team's placekicker last year. He'll be replaced by another soccer player: senior Rob Gumber. Pennebaker will do the punting.

"Our assets are our quarterback, wide receivers and backfield," said Khoenle. "We've got great speed."

Those lines are a problem — but not the only one. "We don't have the depth we'd like to have at certain positions," Khoenle said.

Still, optimism reigns. "I can see it happening," said Khoenle. "At this point in time, compared to last year, I'd have to say we're a better team."

Will he be able to say that come October? Canton opens the season at Monroe Friday, then plays Western Division title contender Northville and powerhouse Harrison on successive Fridays at home.

"I think we could be in the top three," Khoenle said of Canton's division chances. To realize that, however, the lines will have to mature quickly so Johnson, Montgomery, Hunter and Pennebaker can display their talents fully.

What won't change is the intimidating schedule. The Rocks open at home Friday with state-ranked Belleville, a team that hasn't lost a regular-season game since the second week of the 1993 season.

After that, it's on to Northville, which challenged for the division title a year ago, followed by Westland John Glenn — the team

Moshimer tabbed as the "team to beat" to win the Lakes' title.

Indeed, the Salem coach called the division race this year more formidable than ever. "It's very balanced," he said. "I think our division is as tough as it's ever been."

Farmington, Walled Lake Central and Livonia Stevenson all appear to be solid, with North

Farmington an unknown factor. And Salem? "We could be good if we don't get hurt," he replied.

The Rocks have just one division title since joining the WLAA, and that came in 1982. "We've been second-best a lot," said Moshimer.

He hopes to guide them to first-best this season.

Offbeat projects highlight most anticipated fall movies

Pierce Brosnan is supposed to resurrect the James Bond franchise this fall. Big deal. What really excites me about the upcoming releases are the kooky concepts that filmmakers have been able to sell to their investors.

Shannen Daugherty hanging out at the shopping mall. Wesley Snipes and Patrick Swayze donning feather boas. Anthony Hopkins as Richard Nixon. Now you've got my attention.

So here, in no particular order, are 10 films I will be among the first in line to see. Please remember that these picks are from the same reviewer whose favorite movies this summer ranged from

"Crumb" to "Babe: The Gallant Pig."

"Four Rooms." "Arizona Dream." Strange as it sounds, I've never met a Johnny Depp movie I didn't like. So imagine him teamed with Jerry Lewis and Faye Dunaway in a comedy

"Clockers." Martin Scorsese, as producer, hands the director's reins over to Spike Lee. Richard Price has adapted his own novel about the inner-city drug trade, and though he gets my vote as Hollywood's most overrated (and overpaid) scribbler, everyone is raving about Delroy Lindo's performance as a wily drug dealer. (September)

"Mall Rats." Kevin Smith advances from his \$23,000 directorial debut in "Clerks" to this \$3 million take on life at the neighborhood shopping mall. Smith, who played Silent Bob in "Clerks," appears again, but it's really bad girl Shannen Daugherty's role that has everyone guessing. (October)

"To Wong Foo, Thanks for Everything! Julie Newmar." What a title. What a concept. Wesley Snipes, John Leguizamo and Patrick Swayze don their party clothes as drag queens headed from New York to L.A. in this decidedly offbeat comedy. With the ever-idiosyncratic Bebe Rexha ("Used People") at the helm, this one could go either way. (September)

"Mighty Aphrodite." As usual, Woody Allen is being secretive about his latest project. All we know at this point is it's about marriage and stars Allen, Helena Bonham Carter, and Michael Rapaport. (October)

"Dead Presidents." The title

Moore and starring the late John Candy; and "From Dusk Till Dawn," a dark comedy about Mexican vampires penned by the ubiquitous Quentin Tarantino and directed by "Desperado's" Robert Rodriguez.

Chrysler sky high over Cirrus, Stratus

It should come as no surprise that Chrysler's newest cars, the Dodge Stratus and Chrysler Cirrus, are named after clouds, especially since the carmaker expects sky-high sales.

The cars have replaced the Chrysler LeBaron, Dodge Spirit and Plymouth Acclaim in the Chrysler lineup.

The Cirrus and Stratus were Chrysler's best-kept secret before their introduction. No journalist, photographer or even a renowned spy photographer Jim Dunne could capture the Cirrus or Stratus on film before their Detroit debut.

Chrysler sent out cassette tapes that featured the "Mission Impossible" theme with actor Peter

Graves inviting journalists to the introduction. At a press conference, Chrysler President Robert Lutz, accompanied by Graves, orchestrated an impressive "Mission Impossible" scenario before the Cirrus and Stratus were driven through a steam cloud in a simulated warehouse

dock.

Targeted to compete in a market dominated by the Toyota Camry, Ford Taurus, Honda Accord and Mitsubishi Galant, the Cirrus and Stratus mark Chrysler's third entry into the sedan market in as many years. The vehicles will be marketed to people between 35 and 50 years old who want a mid-sized, well-equipped sedan.

"It sounds like a mission impossible to compete in this market segment and succeed," said Lutz. "I'd call it just extremely difficult. Will it be tough? You bet. But I think we can easily sell

300,000 of these cars every year."

Both the Cirrus and Stratus are 4-door sedans. All new from the inside out, the cars feature dual air bags, optional anti-lock braking systems and optional integrated child seats. The base price for the Cirrus is just over \$17,000. The Stratus' base price is \$13,965.

"Our mission three years ago was to determine what the domestic compacts were not providing and identify the root of the imports' success — quality and safety were givens," said Lutz. "Once the team knew

where we had to go, they went to work designing and engineering products that offer breakthrough design, sports-coupe performance, safety features and outstanding value."

The Cirrus and Stratus are equipped with the Neon's base 2.0-liter 16-valve SOHC engine mated to a 5-speed automatic transaxle. Also available is a 2.4-liter twin shaft DOHC with 4-speed automatic transaxle or a top-of-the-line 2.5-liter 24-valve V6.

Both vehicles were designed by Chrysler's Large Platform Team, with advice from IndyCar driver Emmo Fittipaldi.

The Cirrus and Stratus, like the LH triplets and the LHS and New Yorker sedans, were drawn with a cab-forward design and provide a new level of interior roominess.

Both vehicles are designed to meet 1998 side-impact standards set by the U.S. government. The Cirrus and Stratus are offered with available equipment like remote keyless entry

with a panic alarm feature, a security alarm illuminated entry, lockable folding rear seat with valet lock and hidden storage compartments.

Production of the Cirrus and Stratus are at Chrysler's Sterling Heights, Mich., Assembly Plant.

The Cirrus is the first Chrysler vehicle to bear the division's new badge. The badge, first seen as Chrysler's corporate symbol in 1924, was replaced by the Pentastar in 1962. The new badge, which will eventually replace Pentastar on all of Chrysler's models, is a seal and ribbon bearing the Chrysler name.

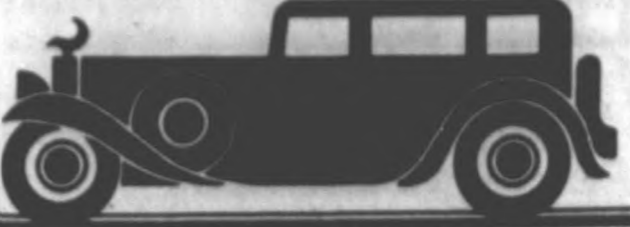

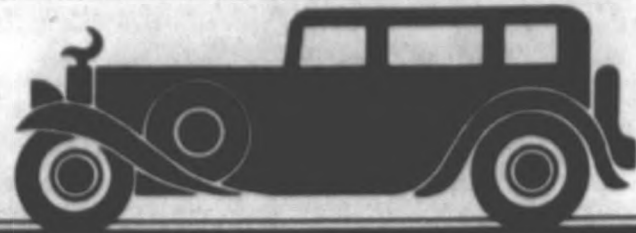


