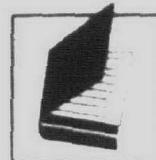

Library plans prompt questions

Building plans for the new Plymouth District Library got a public airing Thursday, and library officials took comments — some negative — over planned designs.

"Isn't that going to stick out like a sore thumb?" said Richard Kirchoff

of Plymouth, over the plan for the library to be 6-8 feet higher than city hall.

The Plymouth District Library Board's building committee was on hand for the meeting, as Library Director Pat Thomas and architect Mark McPherson presented drawings and an artist's rendering of the front

and rear facade of the building.

McPherson responded, saying the new library will be built tall enough to house a third floor, if that's deemed necessary in future years, without raising the roof.

Two floors are currently planned, one 7 feet underground with a second floor above it.

Library officials and the architect stressed that the planned design is geared to keeping the general colonial look of the present library. But Kirchoff, pointing to some proposed design changes including raised windows, said, "We have a beautiful,

beautiful facade here. To destroy it is ludicrous."

Thomas responded that she's received calls from residents favoring plans to generally keep with the current facade. One audience member told Thomas she was impressed with the design.

The design calls for moving the front of the library back 10 feet to make it even with city hall entrance and create a bigger lawn area. The library will be nearly three times the size of the current library.

Customized wheels worth sharing

What's so cool about hot rods? "The power's so awesome you can't believe it," said Paul Rebman of his 1967 Shelby AC Cobra 427 roadster.

"It's just the overall appearance," said Fred Link of his chopped and channeled 1932 Ford pickup.

"I was a 16-year-old hot-rodder that never grew up, I've been a car nut since I was a kid," said Wayne

Penwarden, who has a custom 1941 Studebaker Champion coupe.

"I like to look it over and look for detail," said Doug Mily.

The four Plymouth men showed their cars last weekend at the 44th annual New Haney's and Sony Autosound Autorama at Cobo Center.

"I've been a car nut, a gear head, since I was 16. I just turned 57," said Link, an electrical contractor. All four grew up in the '50s and '60s, the golden age of car customizing,

which eased when car makers began downsizing engines and sacrificing style to economy in the '70s.

Link also collects Mercedes Benz cars which he's shown in the Concours d'Elegance show. "All these other things I've got I can't drive. They're too expensive to drive," he said. Not so with his customized 1932 Ford pickup.

"The cab has been stretched 12 inches; it's been made into a super cab. The top's been chopped five

inches and the body has been lowered over the frame by five inches," he said. "It's all steel, it's not a fiberglass reproduction."

He worked on the design with a car customizer in Denver. "It was something in our heads, it evolved into the Phantom Super Cab," Link said.

The customizing work "makes it real low, it sits low to the ground,

Juniors face proficiency test in March

Canton and Salem high school juniors will be the first students at Plymouth Canton Educational Park to take the standardized "proficiency test" being debuted by the state March 5-6.

This spring also will mark a first for fifth- and eighth-graders, when they take the Michigan Educational

Assessment Program (MEAP) test. Traditionally, they've taken the exam in the fall.

Eleventh-graders will notice that the new proficiency test differs from other standardized tests, said Tom Tattan, executive director for instruction.

"You'll remember that in the SAT test, it was flat-out guessing. Those of us who guessed better did better."

Now, with cooperative learning, students need to have a dialogue, share data and work cooperatively to come up with answers, Tattan said.

Juniors will be tested in math, science and writing.

At a recent board of education meeting, audience members had a chance to sample the proficiency test. Individuals sat in groups of four and discussed the question "What does

justice mean to you?" before writing an essay.

They were asked to remain in groups for a sample of the science test. The "students" made predictions and did a joint experiment to see how ice cubes would be affected by varying amounts of hot water being poured on them.

With Continental Cablevision's re-built system — still under construction throughout Plymouth, Canton and Northville — Kancierz turns on her television and voila! — 2, 4 and 7 are actually reachable by pressing those exact numbers.

Kancierz, of Canton, opened her home in Holiday Park subdivision Monday, Feb. 12, to Continental officials as one of the first subscribers to be connected to advanced fiber technology. Continental also presented her with a new television set.

the suspension is lowered," he said. After attending the Autorama for 20 years, this was his first time participating...

Part of the attraction to the car is that he had another '31 Ford pick up when he was 16. "These are toys that people have created and you can drive them and enjoy them...

The bottom half of the truck is magenta over a pearl base, the top half is plum. The car has a 350 cubic-inch Chevy V-8 engine with an automatic transmission.

Penwarden, who once was into racing stock cars, said his 1941 Studebaker street rod "has a distinct shape. It doesn't look like any late model car. It has sweeping lines."

The body is unaltered except for removal of all side trim. It also has been repainted in red enamel. It has a rebuilt Chevy V-8 engine, and new transmission, axles, brakes and more.

Rebman notes that his green 1967 AC Cobra "is the fastest production car in the world as we speak." It goes from 0 to 100 mph in 13 seconds.

The Cobra, developed by Carol Shelby, has an aluminum body and a 485-horsepower engine.



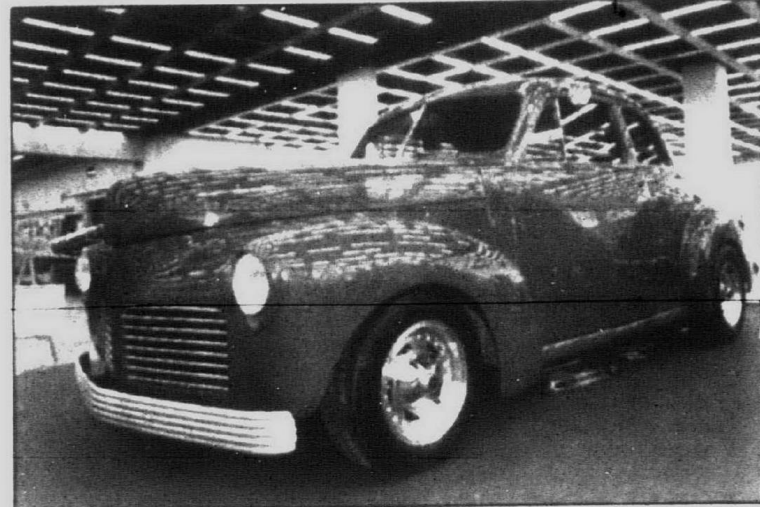

The car was so light and with that motor you have a hard time holding it on the road, it's a true thoroughbred racing car, Rebman said.

Mily said he was always interested in hot rods, but didn't buy his first until 1984. "I just got with a bunch of guys who were into doing cars," he said.

In 1990, he showed a 1933 Plymouth coupe at the Autorama, and it won in the Outstanding Street Rod, People's Choice and Street Coupe categories.

Mily is showing a customized 1933 Ford three window coupe. It has a chopped top, extended hood sides and a hood scoop. "You can do a lot of new stuff to these old cars," Mily said.

Fiber optics has allowed us to offer our customers more, said Diane Dietz, Continental corporate and legal affairs vice president. The new technology also offers increased reliability of service.

The cluster of fibers equal to about the width of a human hair will provide new channels as well as a clearer, more reliable

television picture and future interactive services.

The new technology has offered Kanclerz and other residents as construction winds their way

12 new channels at no extra charge on the satellite tier of service, as well as four new channels on Pay Per View. The satellite tier, to which most customers subscribe, will cost \$21.95 as of

March 1. It includes all the regular channels and all common cable channels.

HBO 2 and HBO 3 are also available at no extra charge for customers who subscribe to HBO and who have what is called a Smart Box or addressable converter.

The converter allows customers to include parental access codes, as well as access to an on screen display menu and timers for VCR programming.

Kanclerz and her family have been having a good time running through the new programs available, such as the History and Travel channels, a 24-hour golf channel, Home and Garden, Bravo, Court TV, ESPN 2, which offers more offbeat sports such as drag racing, E! Entertainment, 24 hours of cartoons and Country Music Television.

"We have checked out the cartoon show," Kanclerz said of her 3-year-old daughter, Danielle. Kanclerz' favorite is the country music channel, which offers continuing music videos.

"At work, they said, 'If you take a day off, we'll know why,'" Kanclerz said, referring to the variety of programming now available to her.

Continental also is offering Disney and ESPN free to customers. Kanclerz said she likes HBO 2 and HBO 3 because there's always something different to watch.

Customers will get a new remote control with their new converter. The remote allows customers to bring up a menu that includes the parental control, as well as access to ordering Pay Per View.

Victims of fire get help

After a fire Thursday destroyed an apartment house on Penniman, it didn't take long for the community to come to the aid of those burned out of their homes.

Saying residents lost much of their clothing to the fire, Venure Outdoors owner Dan Argonis — his shop is right across the street from the burned-out building — donated clothing.

"We have been outfitting them right here. They don't have any clothes," Argonis said. He provided some socks and shirts, and his store served as a temporary warming station for fire victims.

"Most of them were just watching it in shock, hoping to get something out of there. One of the girls said she just moved everything in from another house," he said.

Pam Haase, owner of the the Plymouth Coffee Bean Co. next door to the apartments, stood outside her business sipping coffee with employees at 9 a.m. as the fire smoldered.

"We're very lucky," she said, that the fire — which raged just a few feet from her business — didn't spread to it.

Haase set up a large jar on the sales counter of the coffee house, to collect cash donations for the fire victims. "A lot of these people don't have renters' insurance," explained Plymouth Coffee Bean Co. employee Barb Renaud.

"I knew one kid living there who just lost everything; his Valentine gift from his girlfriend, his money, everything," Renaud said.

By noon Friday, patrons of the coffee house had contributed about \$100.

The Red Cross paid for lodging for the fire victims who needed it at the Red Roof Inn.

Plymouth Salvation Army Social Services Supervisor Bill Stern said, "We've both tried to help them with food. We have given them some certificates that had been given to us so they could purchase some clothing at Kmart."

Stern said that by noon Friday, the Salvation Army had taken 10 calls from people asking how they could help the fire victims.

The Salvation Army is accepting clothing donations, Stern said. "They're going to need furniture too, if somebody calls and they have a sofa or bed available we'll take their name and phone number and keep a list so when they find a place to move back into, we'll have some resources for some furniture," he said.

The Salvation Army has also been trying to locate permanent lodgings for the six single adults forced out of the apartments by the fire. "Anyone can call us here if they know of rooms to rent," he said.

"Also if anybody wanted to donate money to us they can put on the check 'For Penniman fire victims,'" Stern said. To contact the Salvation Army, call 453-5464.

"The community has called and they want to know how to help and that's great," Stern

said, adding representatives of local churches have also called.

Plymouth Community Fire Department Chief Larry Groth said the cause of the fire is undetermined. "Everything there was so badly destroyed by fire," he said. Fire officials determined the blaze started in an attic storage area. While the building was well-equipped

with smoke detectors, the fire started above them.

There were no injuries in the fire.

City building officials condemned the structure, and it was ordered to be demolished by 5 p.m. Friday. Groth said there was \$200,000 damage to the structure and \$100,000 in damages to building contents.

Edison actions garner applause

Last fall, some Old Village residents and business people roundly criticized Detroit Edison for a series of power surges and outages which damaged appliances.

Since then, Edison has come through with new electrical lines for the area and has settled damage claims. Now, once-incensed customers are singing the company's praises.

"I think they bent over backwards," said Greg Huddas, owner of Yer Grampa's Mustache Barber Shop in Old Village. "I got a monetary stipend; they cleaned up a lot of the power lines."

"Their crews are very good. If you have a question and they can't answer it, they find someone else who can," Huddas said.

Gerry Sindici, co-owner of Robin's Nest Antiques, praised Richard Piacentini of Edison's legal office for processing claims and hand-delivering checks to those with damage complaints. "He's a really nice guy. He's been helping older people get out their claims, he's been paying people right away," Sindici said.

"We always bitch when things don't go well, we should give some credit when people do the right thing," he added.

Sindici said he's received

\$5,000 in compensation for damages to his electrical system, a juke box and other items resulting from power surges last fall.

"I have to tell them thanks as a merchant. He's done a lot for the company image, everyone says how good they feel about what Edison's doing," said Sindici, who also serves on the Old Village Development Authority.

OVDA Director Steve Guile said repairs to the area's electrical system promised by Edison last fall are on schedule. "I've heard some very encouraging reports that Detroit Edison has been sympathetic and very quick in processing claims that were outstanding," Guile said.

"At this point I am very pleased with the way they handled the situation, it's very positive," Guile said.

Piacentini said he began talking with Old Village residents and business people in October. "You don't want to overlook anybody if there is a legitimate complaint," he said.

"People are tired of hearing about a big company trying to get out of things," he said. "We've put forth a sincere effort."

The company has responded to both claim forms sent to Edison by customers, and to phone calls

Custodian injured

A custodian who works at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park lost a fingertip on his left hand in an accident at the high schools Feb. 10.

Details are being withheld until an investigation is complete, said community relations director Judy Evola. "It happened at Canton High School. We are investigating the incident," she said.

"We aren't releasing his name. It's an accident and is under investigation. We're looking into how it happened."

The accident involved an overhead fan that "exchanges the air," a school employee said. "It takes the air out, and brings new air in. There was no cover on the blower,

and the fan belt somehow flicked his hair. He reached up to see what it was, and one of his fingers got caught. He told me it (the blower) didn't have a guard on it."

The employee said maintenance supervisor Dennis Thompson "went around putting guards on all the blowers" after the accident.

Thompson referred inquiries to assistant superintendent for employee relations Errol Goldman, who was unavailable for comment.

"We are very safety conscious and we will do everything in our power to prevent this from happening in the future," said Evola.

Industrial accident kills Canton man

A Canton man was killed Feb. 8 in an industrial accident at E & E Manufacturing Co. Inc. in Plymouth.

Tadeusz Szymoniak, 51, was killed at about 2 p.m. while working at a stamping press.

Company officials closed the auto parts manufacturing business following the accident, so a thorough safety check could be performed. "No one in the plant at the time actually saw the accident," said Plymouth Community

Fire Department Chief Larry Groth.

One investigator said the victim appeared to be reaching under the press for a stray part, when the press struck and killed him. Investigators from the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Agency also reviewed the site, and were to present findings on the accident.

The victim's wife, who also works at the plant, had been called from work just an hour be-

fore the accident to pick up a sick child from school, authorities said.

Szymoniak was born Sept. 22, 1944, in Poland. Survivors include his wife, Zofia; three children, Paulina, Matthias and Mtayida; three sisters and two brothers.

Funeral services were held Feb. 12 at L.J. Griffin Funeral Home in Canton and at the Church of the Divine Savior.

Burial was at St. Hedwig Cemetery, Dearborn Heights.

Not everyone is sold on the merits of the proficiency test and its methods.

Bob Jones, a former Plymouth city commissioner who has school aged grandchildren, was one of the test takers.

"The problem I have with (testing in a group setting) is that usually, there is a dominant person in the group. Usually, one person takes over," said Jones. "I wonder if you get input from everyone. I'm not sure what the purpose of a group discussion is. Are they sharing ideas or answers?"

Jeff Fordell, who teaches at Bentley Elementary, also sampled the test. He sees advantages to its "cooperative learning" aspects.

"I feel that from this point forward, people will work more closely in small groups," he said.

Sheila Alles, Plymouth-Canton curriculum coordinator, said, "The writing test is an attempt to replicate what goes on in the classroom as closely as possible, and the same goes for science."

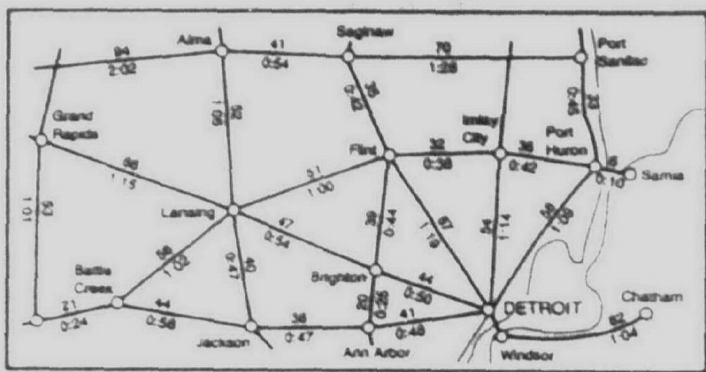
When students write, we often ask them to talk together about what they have written. You and I both know that as writers, we often ask someone to take a look at what we have written and ask for their feedback."

Marv Hesse of Superior Township is not going to permit her twin daughters to take the proficiency test. "I question the fairness and legality of the test," she said.

"They're trying to give standardized tests, but we have no standardized curriculum. The curriculum my girls chose doesn't coincide with the test. Had they started out in ninth grade with them saying 'This is what you

have to take to get certified, they would have chosen a different route."

School officials say the test is forcing the district to "take a hard look at curriculum development." The board recently adopted stricter graduation requirements.

Tattan acknowledges "this is a guinea pig class. We are expecting our juniors to be proficient. This is supposed to count for an endorsed diploma, college admission and as a job requirement, if employers ever start asking for it."

Nonetheless, said district research director Dave Rodwell, the test should be taken seriously. "Students need to be encouraged to approach the test appropriately so they are physically comfortable to take the test, and so that when we put emphasis on the test we are getting a good reading."

Trustee Jack Farrow likes the new approach. "I think the difference between what we did and what we're doing now is that we used to worry about what students knew. Now, we are after what the student can do with what they know."

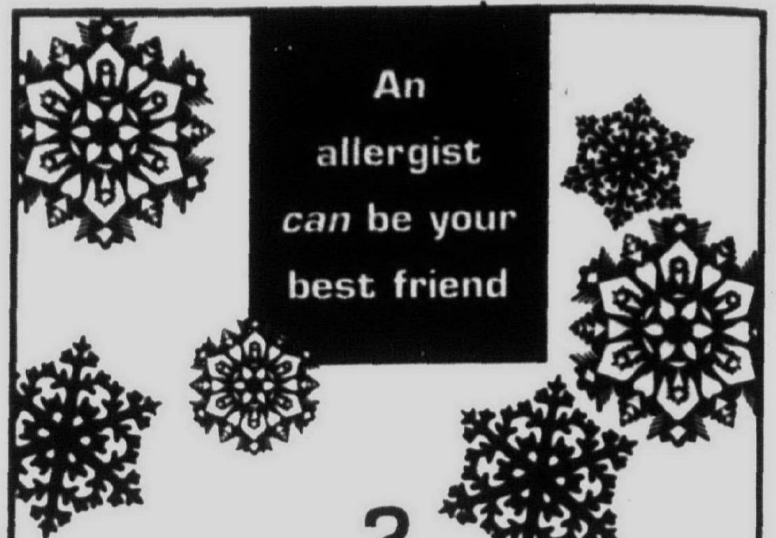

DDA change defeated

A proposed county ordinance concerning local downtown development authorities was defeated 6-7 Thursday by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

The proposed ordinance would have required local communities to notify the county about plans to establish a local development finance authority or a downtown development authority in enough time for the county to prevent the capture of county money.

After the meeting, Commissioner Michelle Plawewski, D-Deerborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township and part of Livonia, said the ordinance

proposal may be rewritten.

The commission needs to be made more aware of what preventing the capture of county funds would mean, she said.

Commission Vice Chair Kay Beard had addressed the Conference of Western Wayne about the proposal on Feb. 9. At that meeting concerns were raised about the success of local projects if the county prevented the capture of its tax dollars.

Also on Thursday, the commission approved a resolution in support of the capture of county property tax revenues by the Westland Downtown Development Authority for 15 years.

Deadline to vote in primary is Tuesday

Tuesday, Feb. 20, is the deadline to register to vote in the 1996 Michigan Republican presidential primary. The primary is March 19.

Residents may register in their city halls, township halls or Secretary of State branch offices, but be aware: some city halls are closed Monday, Feb. 19, for Presidents' Day, honoring George Washington and Abraham Lincoln.

New voters will need to register. Persons who already are registered need not re-register.

Democrats are not holding a presidential primary. Instead, they are voting in party caucuses Saturday, March 16.

Democratic results in the March 19 primary will have no bearing on delegate selection for the Aug. 25 national convention in Chicago. Party rules say delegates cannot be selected by an

"open" process; only declared Democrats may take part.

Democrats who do vote March 19 may select "uncommitted" or write in a name.

Voters in the Republican primary — will select from (in alphabetical order) former Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander, pundit Patrick Buchanan, Senate majority leader Bob Dole, Rep. Robert Dornan, publisher Steve Forbes, Sen. Phil Gramm, Alan

Keyes, Sen. Richard Lugar and businessman Maurice Taylor.

Gramm last week quit the presidential race but not in time to withdraw his name from the Michigan ballot.

Libertarians failed to get enough votes in 1992 to qualify for an automatic primary ballot spot. Libertarians and other third parties must petition for places on the Nov. 5 ballot.

County board OKs funding for youth services

An ordinance, which many Wayne County commissioners called making the best of a bad situation, was approved Thursday for the allocation of tax money for youth services.

The ordinance spells out the allocation of the 0.1 millage funds approved by voters in 1988. It splits \$1 million annually between Detroit and the suburbs, with \$500,000 to be allocated in Detroit, Hamtramck and Highland Park. The remaining \$500,000 will go to three regional

conferences in Wayne County, the Downriver Community Conference, Conference of Western Wayne and the Conference of Eastern Wayne to be distributed on a per capita basis.

Suburban commissioners were concerned that no formula was in place to distribute the money, and that most of it went to Detroit programs. But commissioners are also concerned that voters didn't want the money allocated for programs, they wanted it used to build a new youth home.

Although the allocation ordinance was proposed by suburban

commissioners, three Detroit commissioners voted in favor, while two suburban commissioners voted against it. It was a 9-4 vote, with two commissioners absent.

Local commissioners Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township, Michelle Plawecki, D-DeARBORN Heights, and Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, voted in favor.

Detroit commissioners expressed concern that the money should go to programs that help young people and that the progress of the programs should be monitored.

"I believe that any community that contributes to the one-tenth mill should have a right to the funds," Commission Chairman Ricardo Solomon said before the vote.

Patterson said he agreed with commissioner Susan Hubbard of

Dearborn who said the only legal purpose for the funds is to build a new youth home. But because the money has been appropriated for programs, Hubbard said she would vote in favor of using the funds to help residents inside and outside of Detroit.

When the 0.1 mill funds weren't used for the home, the commission voted last year to sell bonds to build a new youth home.

McCotter said he fully understood the position of commissioners who were against the ordinance. "But the problem is we have to be brutally honest. We lost when the bond issue was cast," he said.

"This is the only way we can return money to our communities," he said. "It's making the best of a bad situation."

"I know there are areas of need . . . but that does not mean there are not needs in western Wayne County," he said.

Politics has often been called the art of compromise, he said. "No one is happy with this. I think that is the best reason we can say that a compromise has been reached," he said.

Beard said she is not happy with the distribution, but "we have compromised. I think this is the best we can do."

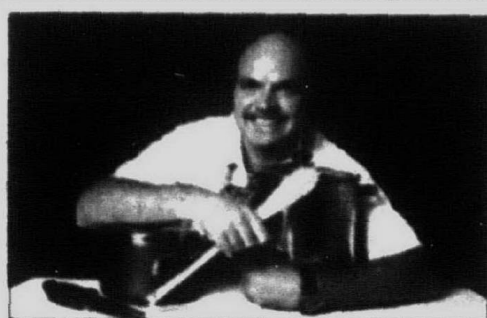

Give up diets and start eating better

You've probably recognized the changed photograph, but couldn't quite put your finger on what was different. No beard? Less hair? Bigger smile? If you guessed all of the above, you're correct.

But the best change is that I'm still losing a pound or two here and there, and my double chin has vanished. I'm now wearing jeans the size of which I have not worn since early high school. My stomach is actually getting flatter, and I've yet to even pick up something called an "Ab Isolator."

When I was about 17 years old, I embarked on my first serious diet. Although it was a bore, I counted calories with one of those tiny little books you pick up at the check-out lane in a grocery store. I basked in the warm compliments of friends and neighbors as the results became evident. Of course, having jumped "on" the diet bandwagon, it wasn't long before I got "off."

Since those days when I had a full head of hair, I've been on countless diets, have lost in my estimation at least 2,700 pounds, and it wasn't until almost two years ago that I finally realized that I loved to eat - too much. I realized that I needed to change from a diet mentality to a healthy eating regimen.

I have memories of the depression that followed each diet, growing especially worse when the pounds returned faster, and in more excess when I returned to my unhealthy eating regimen. All my life I've worked in the food industry, which has wreaked havoc on my waistline.

I vaguely remember the days when I desired a milk shake, and put a handful of ice cubes and a cup of skim milk in a blender with a teaspoon of chocolate extract. As I drank it, I tried to remind myself how good it was. But it tasted as bad as it looked.

That's my number one beef with the diet industry. Being in the food business, why couldn't I prepare food that was flavorful, satisfying and attractive? At one time I likened the taste of diet food with that of a bread-and-water ritual one used to envision in prison.

I sit here right now looking at page 193 of one of the first diet cookbooks ever printed, and find someone suggesting that I actually puree a slice of bread in a blender with an egg and pour it into an unseasoned, ungreased, cheap non-stick frypan. Then flip "it" over and in 2 minutes you can sit down to a satisfying healthy pancake with a protein and bread exchange.

Did they really pay someone to sit down and come up with these ghastly ideas? Certainly, if you, too, have ever dieted, you know of what I speak.

Creating a healthy regimen

If you are interested in creating a healthy eating regimen, it is important to remember that you need to create dishes that look as good and taste as good as what you were eating. Restaurants and chefs know that contrasts of texture and taste play a great part in appetite satisfaction. Tell that to a mother of three who plans her only night out during the week around her diet group class meeting. A healthy meal with contrasting colors and textures? Looks like a meat-leaf-and-mashed-potato night to me with carrot stick for added color. That idea might be fine for chefs and restaurateurs, but one of the secrets that they use is to make the food taste good. Broiled cod is a healthy entree for sure, but if it tastes fishy and even the family cat shuns it, it's a waste of time and effort.

If, on the other hand, I boil a pound of pasta, while the pasta cooks I can take carrot sticks and broccoli and saute them in a little garlic. Then stir in 1 tablespoon of flour into a cup of chicken broth and pour that onto the vegetables.

I drain the pasta and toss the vegetable mixture on top, sprinkle with a little fresh ground pepper and some Parmesan, and I have a meal that looks great, tastes even better, is nearly fat free, nutritious and, when paired with some microwaved meatballs for the kids, is something the entire family can enjoy.

The essential thing I agree with Susan Power on is the fact that we must all stop the insanity and start cooking food with a reduced fat content that looks as good as it tastes.

Begin using herbs and spices, spice mixes and dried seasonings. Drain off all the fat after browning meats and burgers. If you eat chicken, remove the skin. Instead of milk and butter, use chicken broth in your mashed potatoes.

FROM CHILE ARE 'OH-SO' SWEET!

Oranges are sweet, chocolate is sweet, but onions?

Yes - they're grown in the rich, volcanic soil at the foothills of the Andes Mountains in Chile, and are "Oh-So Sweet!"

Seven Corporation in Southfield is the importer, and former Rochester resident John Battle owner of Battle Produce Exchange in Traverse City, is the exclusive sales agent for the U.S.

"They're the only fresh, sweet onion that's available in the winter," said Battle. "That's because of the opposite growing season. It's summer now in Chile. What makes OSO Sweet onions different is their very high sugar content. They are grown in hand-picked locations, and on average contain up to one-third more sugar than other sweet onions."

OSO Sweets are available Dec. 12 through March at Spartan stores, Shopping Center Markets, Papa Joe's and other specialty markets. Prices range from 99 cents to \$1.49 per pound.

They were developed and perfected in 1988, and the first OSO Sweets were imported to the U.S. in 1989 - 5,000 forty-pound cartons. Over 400,000 forty-pound cartons will reach

North America this season.

Rodger Helwig, director of communications for OSO Sweets, said sweet onions represent more than 15 percent of all onions consumed in the U.S. - 250 million pounds and growing.

A specialty item a decade ago, fresh, sweet onions now represent 15 percent (nearly 250 million pounds) of U.S. onion consumption. Onions represent the third largest vegetable category in volume in supermarkets, along with potatoes and lettuce.

According to the National Onion Association, onion consumption in the U.S. leaped 60 percent in the last 12 years to about 17 pounds per person annually. Called "sweet spring onions" or "spring/summer sweets," because of their harvest time, sweet onions contain more sugar and less sulfur than ordinary, yellow onions, which are available all year, explained Helwig.

The pyruvic acid in the sulfur makes regular onions cause tears and taste sharp, sometimes creating gas or indigestion.

Because sweet onions have a higher water content than regular onions, the sulfur is further diluted. They have a thinner, lighter color skin, are

milder, less pungent, and tend to be more fragile.

OSO Sweets have a crisp texture that will remind you of a celery stalk or an apple. They have a mild, subtle aroma, and sweet, fruity flavor with a pleasant onion taste. Serve them raw on sandwiches, in salsas or dips. OSO Sweets retain their texture, shape and flavor in cooking.

There are lots of reasons to love OSO Sweets. They are fat- and cholesterol-free, low in sodium, a good source of Vitamin C and contain several B vitamins. OSO Sweets are also a source of fiber and important minerals including calcium, phosphorus, magnesium and copper. There are 60 calories per medium (3 ounce) onion.

Look for OSO Sweets with outer skins that are thin, papery, free of bruises, heavy for their size and firm.

Store them in the vegetable bin of your refrigerator, in single layers on paper towels. Cut onions should be wrapped tightly in plastic wrap and refrigerated.

For freezing, chop onions and freeze on a cookie sheet, then store in freezer weight bags or containers. Whole peeled onions can be frozen, but their texture changes so they should be used only for cooking.

In addition to OSO Sweet, other sweet onion varieties include:

Moul (Hawaii) - Which are available in limited quantities on the West Coast and Hawaii.

Vidalia (Georgia) - The first sweet onions to be promoted and distributed nationally. Vidalia onions were named for a town in Georgia, and are grown in 20 specific counties mandated by a Federal Marketing Order.

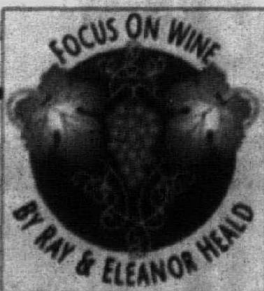
They first appeared in 1931 when Georgia farmer Mose Coleman discovered that the onions he planted were not hot, as he expected, but actually sweet. They are available from late April to early June, but this year because of the freeze they may not be available until early May in large quantities.

Sweet Imperial and Italian Red (California) - Dessert grown Sweet Imperials come from the Imperial Valley of Southern California. The Italian Red is grown in the San Joaquin Valley and available in limited quantities in Michigan from mid-April to early June.

Texas 1015 (Texas) - Were introduced in 1985, and developed in the early 1980s by Dr. Leonard Pike, professor of horticulture at Texas A & M University. They're named for the suggested planting date, Oct. 15, and available from mid-May through June.

Walla Walla (Washington) - Are grown in Walla Walla County in southeastern Washington and a part of Umatilla County in northeastern Oregon. The seed originated in Italy and was transplanted to the Mediterranean island of Corsica where a French soldier, Peter Pieri, enamored of the onion's sweet taste, carried some of the seeds with him to the Walla Walla Valley in the late 1800s. Pieri's fellow immigrants soon began raising the onions too, and established the Walla Walla Gardener's Association (a cooperative of local Onion Growers in 1916). Walla Walla onions are available from mid-July to late August.

About this time of year, beverage shops have odd bins specials. This column is rather like that - some items may interest you and others may not. It's full of odds and ends.

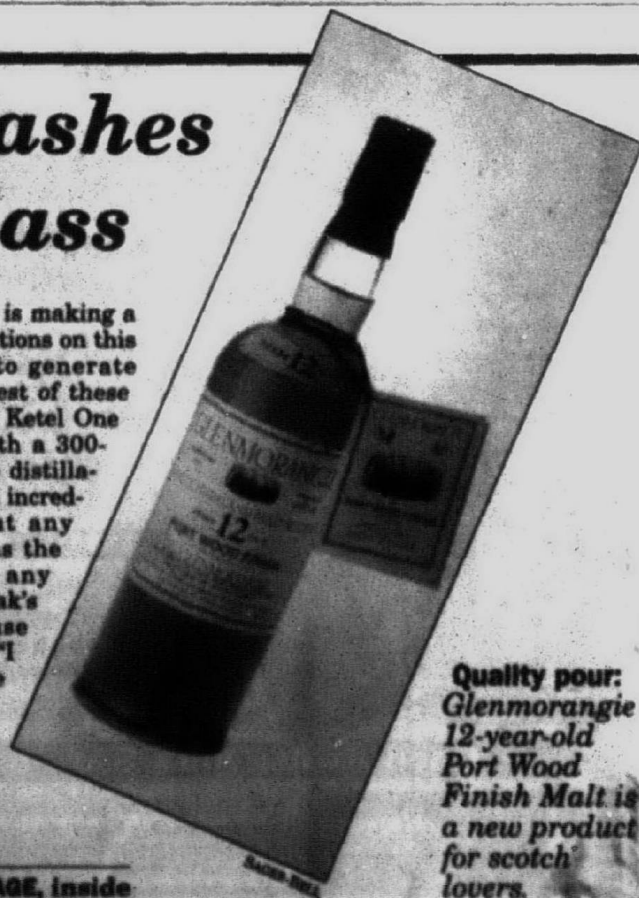
If you're interested in single malt scotch whisky, you may want to try the new Glenmorangie 12-year-old Port Wood Finish Malt Whisky. Glenmorangie prides itself not only on quality, but innovation and has released the first commercial bottling of a malt matured partly in port wood barrels, not just bourbon casks. Glenmorangie engages in intensive research into the elements and processes which shape the character of malt whisky. The new Port Wood Finish Malt Whisky originates directly from analysis of the influence of wood on whisky character

with the intention of improving the quality of the distiller's core product, Glenmorangie 10-Years Old.

The 12-year-old Port Wood Finish Malt is an aged malt matured for at least 12 years in bourbon casks followed by a minimum of two years "finishing" in port barrels. The complementary characters added from the port wood are noticeable in the color, aromas, taste and finish of the whisky. Developing, with a drop or so of water, are layers of complexity, from a butterscotch-like flavor to rich nuttiness in the finish. The newest of these comes from Holland's Ketel One Vodka, a product with a 300-year history. A triple distillation makes this vodka incredibly smooth without any alcoholic bite. "It has the cleanest flavor of any vodka," said Royal Oak's Merchants Warehouse partner John Lossie. "I like it neat because that's when you can detect its delicacy. It's also good over ice where you can discover a hint of refreshing menthol."

OSO SWEET ONION SALAD WITH ONION-ORANGE VINAIGRETTE

- 1 large head Boston or Bibb lettuce, torn
- 2 cups fresh spinach, torn
- 3 large navel oranges
- 1 OSO Sweet onion, peeled
- 3 red apples, cored, and diced
- 1 star fruit, thinly sliced (optional)
- 2 tablespoons sesame seeds, toasted
- 4 rounds pita bread, toasted, cut into wedges

Put torn greens into a large salad bowl. Peel oranges over a medium bowl to catch juices, cut between membranes to section. Reserve juice for vinaigrette, add sections to salad bowl. Mince 1/2 OSO Sweet onion, reserve for vinaigrette. Cut remaining onion into thin slices. Add onion, apple, and star fruit (optional) to salad. Garnish with sesame seeds. Toss well with Sweet Onion-Orange Vinaigrette, serve with toasted pita wedges. Serves 6.

SWEET ONION-ORANGE VINAIGRETTE

- 3 tablespoons orange juice
- 1/4 cup minced OSO Sweet onion
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons Dijon-style mustard
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 1/2 cup salad oil

In a bowl, whisk together the onion juice, OSO Sweet onion, vinegar, mustard and honey. Gradually whisk in oil until well blended. Yield 1/2 cup.

SWEET ONION RELISH

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 6 large OSO Sweet onions (approximately 3 pounds), peeled; thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 cup chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons honey
- Salt & pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh dill, or 1 tablespoon dry

In a large skillet, heat the oil. Sauté the onions for about 15 minutes, or until soft but not browned. Add vinegar and simmer for 10 minutes or until liquid is reduced by half. Add chicken stock, cook until liquid is reduced by half. Add honey, salt and pepper to taste; stir in dill.

This relish may be served warm, cold or at room temperature. It will keep for several weeks refrigerated in tightly sealed glass jars. Yield 6 cups.

OVEN-ROASTED OSO SWEET ONIONS

- 2 OSO Sweet onions, about 8 ounces each
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled, sliced thinly
- 3 bay leaves

- 8 parsley stems
- 3 sprigs fresh sage or 1/2 teaspoon dried
- 2 sprigs fresh oregano or 1/4 teaspoon dried
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil

Heat oven to 500 degrees F. Cut unpeeled onion into eighths. Place onion wedges in a single layer on a shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with garlic and herbs. Season with salt and pepper; drizzle evenly with vinegar and olive oil. Roast until onions are lightly caramelized and barely tender, 12-15 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool. Serve at room temperature. Serves 4.

We describe it as having a fresh, icy taste when served neat and well chilled. For a fun innovation, drop a small pickled green tomato into chilled, neat Ketel One or a classic martini. Each part is aged separately in charred white oak casks and blended later to produce the various styles of rum. Light or silver rum is aged one year. Gold or dark rum is aged three years.

In cooking, black rum adds unique flavors to glazes or basting sauces for meat and poultry. Premium or specialty rums can have as many as 12 years aging giving them flavor twists.

SCALLOPED CHICKEN

- 2 ribs celery, finely chopped
- 6 green onions, finely chopped
- 4 sprigs parsley, finely chopped
- 2½ cups low-fat packaged stuffing mix
- 1 (14½ ounce) can fat-free chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch

- ½ cup skim milk
- Dash salt and fresh ground pepper
- 3 cups cooked chicken meat, skinned, boned and diced
- ½ cup dry bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon corn oil margarine, melted

Heat ¼ cup of the water in a skillet over low heat. Add the celery and green onions and parsley and cook for 5 minutes. Place the stuffing mix in a large bowl. Add the vegetables and their cooking liquid plus an additional 3 tablespoons of

water and mix lightly with a fork. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Spray a 9 by 13-inch baking dish with non-stick vegetable spray. Place the stuffing mixture in the bottom of the dish and set aside.

To make the sauce, warm the chicken broth in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Dissolve the cornstarch in the skim milk and add to the broth. Cook slowly, whisking until mixture slightly thickens. Stir in salt and pepper. Pour half the sauce mixture over the stuffing.

Place chicken pieces on top and cover with remaining sauce. Combine the dry bread crumbs with the margarine and sprinkle over the top. Bake, uncovered, until golden, about 25 minutes. Serves 6 (1 cup each)

Romantic pasta dinner for two simple

AP — With a little careful planning, dinner for two can be simple and romantic. Serve a simple main dish with a salad, a loaf of good bread and a store-bought dessert.

In the following recipe for pasta, the sauce can be made in advance.

ANGEL HAIR WITH PEAS, ROASTED YELLOW PEPPERS AND TOMATO CREAM

- 1 yellow bell pepper
- 3 large, ripe plum tomatoes (about 12 ounces)
- ¼ cup water
- ¼ cup heavy cream
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- ½ cup frozen peas
- 6 ounces (about 1-3rd of a 1-pound box) angel hair pasta

- ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Heat the broiler and place the broiler pan about 4 inches from the heat. Broil the yellow pepper, turning as necessary, until all sides are evenly blackened.

Place the blacked pepper in a small bowl and cover tightly with plastic wrap. Cool completely. Cut the pepper in half, remove the core and scrape away the blackened skin and seeds. Cut the peeled pepper into thin strips.

Core the tomatoes, cut them in half and set one of the tomato halves aside.

Combine the remaining tomatoes and the water in a blender. Blend until smooth. Pass the tomato mixture through a fine sieve into a bowl. Stir in the cream, basil, salt and pepper.

Scoop the seeds from the remaining tomato half and cut the tomato into neat dice. Set aside. (The recipe can be prepared up to this point a day in advance. Refrigerate all ingredients.)

Combine tomato cream, yellow pepper and peas in a large skillet.

Cook the pasta in a large pot of boiling water according to package directions. Drain the pasta and add to the skillet. Toss until the pasta is coated with sauce and the ingredients are evenly distributed. Divide between two shallow bowls and sprinkle with cheese. Sprinkle the diced tomato over the pasta. Makes 2 servings.

Fisher trial testimony is conflicting

Two witnesses offered conflicting testimony in the third murder trial of Dr. Charles Fisher last week.

The former Canton resident is charged with first-degree murder in the July 1984 asphyxiation death of his wife, Ella Maria Mercado Fisher. Mercado was found bound and gagged with duct tape in the living room of their home on Thornwood. Fisher claimed intruders bound and gagged both of them before stealing his Toyota pickup truck.

Dr. Madeleine Leininger — who headed the Wayne State University transcultural nursing school program in which Mercado was enrolled — testified that Fisher told her two months after his wife's death that he was grief-stricken.

"He said his whole world was falling apart; that he had nothing to live for. He'd lost Ella and her son and that his whole life was literally shattered."

However another witness, Marguerite Orosz, testified that she was being courted by Fisher in August after meeting him through a personal ad of the defendant placed.

"Did you respond to a Detroit Free Press ad placed by Charles Fisher on Aug. 19, 1984?" asked Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Bob Donaldson. "Yes," Orosz said. "Did you ever do that before?" asked Donaldson.

"That was the first and last time I ever responded to an ad," said Orosz.

Orosz testified that she

learned Fisher was 44, not in his late 30s as he stated in his ad. She said that she traveled to the Caribbean with Fisher and that he proposed to her in September or October "about one month into the relationship." Orosz said she received a ring "around December" but broke off the relationship when she learned her fiancé was a murder suspect.

Leininger also testified that Fisher urged her not to admit Mercado into the graduate school program.

In a letter Fisher requested be destroyed promptly, the microbiologist claimed his wife was unstable and "would bring sorrow to WSU and the whole program" if admitted, said Leininger.

Fisher said he would "be happy to re-evaluate her potential for success, regardless of our marital status, at a later date," she testified. The correspondence was on University of Dominican letterhead, signed by "Dr. Charles R. Fisher, assistant dean."

Mercado was admitted by a university committee despite the letter.

"She was admitted because of

her enthusiasm, the experiences she had, and her strong goal to strive and to succeed," said Leininger. "Intellectually, she was quite smart. She also wrote well. That was another strength."

Leininger testified that Fisher was strongly opposed to Mercado's plan to travel to Germany and Belgium where she planned to do field work in July and August.

After Mercado's death, Lein-

inger said she was contacted by Fisher. She said Fisher wanted to establish a \$5,000 scholarship in Mercado's name and to donate her nursing books. She said Fisher also requested to meet with her and some of his wife's classmates, which she declined to do.

Peggy Shinkel, one of Mercado's classmates at WSU, testified that Mercado was unhappily married. Shinkel said Mercado told her shortly before her death

that she intended to divorce Fisher "and be on her own in an apartment with her son, Sean."

Michigan State Police evidence technicians testified that fingerprints lifted from the duct tape found in the home implicated Fisher. They also said there was no sign of forced entry or burglary at the Fisher residence at the time of the attack, around midnight on July 14.

Mercado was hospitalized and in a coma until July 20 when a

life support system was removed. Dr. Charles Andrews, Mercado's primary treating physician at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, testified that tests showed "there was no evidence of brain function, and that Ms. Mercado was essentially brain dead" with no chance of recovery.

The trial is set to resume Feb. 26 before Wayne Circuit Judge Cynthia Stephens. Fisher's two previous convictions were overturned.

Grant to help local students prepare for the workplace

Who could better help students learn about careers and the type of education needed than business people?

"There are so many different levels of participation," said Betty Bloch, program coordinator for the Plymouth-Canton Business-Education Partnership Program.

In conjunction with the Canton and Plymouth chambers of commerce, the schools have been awarded one of four School-to-Work grants from the Wayne County School-to-Work Partnership.

The \$12,717 grant will establish a school-to-work advisory council for Canton and Plymouth. School-to-work program is intended to provide career awareness and preparedness for students K-12 and beyond. "It's a system of lifelong learning," Bloch said.

The new advisory council will serve as an umbrella for the partnership, co-op and shadowing opportunities offered to Plymouth-Canton students. "Initially their responsibility is to create a market plan for school-to-work for Plymouth-Canton and to create a greater awareness," Bloch added. Approximately 50 percent of

the council will be comprised of decision makers in the business community, as well as educators, parents, municipal leaders and students.

"I think this will definitely increase community awareness and it will help the chambers entice businesses to get involved," said Fran Toney, Plymouth Chamber of Commerce director. "This will enhance the programs in place."

Bringing in businesses is becoming increasingly important. The Canton Chamber has surveyed its business members to find that "one of their greatest needs is finding individuals with the proper skills," said Linda

Shapona, Canton chamber executive director.

Employers have cited the lack of math and reading skills among applicants, as well as problems with basic work ethics, including attitudes and loyalty. Shapona added.

That's where the partnership program can help. Plenty of programs are offered, including job shadowing where students hook up with a business person to learn of that particular career, as well as the Breakfast of Champions where business speakers talk to middle school achievers.

The partnership program also

offers involvement with elementary students. "With the little ones, we start with the basic career awareness," Bloch said.

At the middle school level, students will explore specific jobs and take interest inventories. Students also learn about employability skills, such as punctuality and reliability.

"The chambers help me find people to do all these things," said Bloch.

Under the council's umbrella, efforts will be devoted to the co-op program for which teachers will establish base skills that are needed. When students complete the program and achieve the

skills, they will receive certificates, Bloch said.

While the Plymouth chamber has long had an education committee, the Canton chamber only recently formed one with Pat Williams of Michigan Induction as its chair.

"There are so many programs out there. It's set up for as much or as little time as people have to give," Williams said.

Business people are needed to participate in the variety of programs offered through the business-partnership effort. Interested participants should call either the Canton chamber, 453-4040, or the Plymouth chamber, 453-1540.

Residents oppose plan to open megastore at Ford and Haggerty

A Super Kmart is coming to the Plymouth area, but the folks in Canton who live near the proposed site at Ford and Haggerty roads aren't happy about it.

Plans for the Super K include a grocery store in a 177,757-square-foot building, plus a garden shop of 21,800 square feet. There is room for a 25,000-square-foot stand-alone retail building also on the site for another user.

"We spend 15 minutes waiting

in this mess," said Greenwood resident Ron Zonca, referring to the congested Haggerty-Ford intersection. His house in the Willow Trail subdivision backs up to the proposed Super Kmart. "It's not going to work, guys."

Following a public hearing recently at which residents filled the Canton Township board meeting room and adjacent hallway, Canton planning commissioners recommended approval of a site plan and special land use for the Zaremba Group, which

would develop the megastore on 27.39 acres on the north side of Ford Road, between Man's Do It Center and Haggerty Road.

Commissioner Tom Sullivan abstained from the vote, saying he had had a conversation about the project apart from commission business and did not think it was appropriate to cast a vote.

"I understand people have a lot of discomfort with this. It certainly is not something people look forward to having in their back

yard," said planning commissioner Melissa McLaughlin, also a township trustee, adding that planning staff and commissioners have done the best they could with the proposed development.

"We don't stand on I-275 and flag these people down," she said, responding to residents' concerns about increased development and accompanying problems, such as increased traffic.

Commissioner Ron Lieberman echoed her sentiments. "To me

the traffic impact is significant and it will continue to be significant."

Developer Gary Biales said he has not only complied, but exceeded many township regulations. Among those are a 425-foot front setback, compared to the 85-foot required, 166-square-foot rear setback compared to 30 required and 92-square-foot side setbacks, compared to the 15 required.

The development will have three entrances off Haggerty, with the center one considered as the main entrance and a third for trucks. An entrance will be on Ford Road and will include a traf-

fic light. Developers also will build a connector road to which other nearby businesses may connect.

The development also will have three detention ponds — the development sits in a floodplain — and one-quarter acre of the wetlands will be replaced as three-quarters of an acre on the site.

"We have tried to leave what natural terrain there is in the back," Biales said, adding that berms up to seven feet high will be built, as well as a eight-foot wall to hide the loading docks at the rear of the building.

Jackie Chan faces 'Rumble in the Bronx'

When a tourist from Hong Kong comes to New York City to attend his uncle's wedding, his plans include a little relaxation, sight-seeing and helping out around the family grocery store. But someone forgot to tell him that the market was in the middle of the South Bronx.

Jackie Chan takes on a ruthless motorcycle gang and the mob in "Rumble in the Bronx," the definitive comedic action-adventure film that brings Hong Kong-style movie madness to the mean streets of America's meanest neighborhood.

The film, a New Line release, opens at metro Detroit movie theaters Friday, Feb. 23.

Caught in the middle of a crime war, Chan teaches the locals not to mess with a seemingly average Joe who just happens to be a world-class daredevil and martial arts master.

With films like "Supercop," and "Project A," Chan has become a pop-phenomenon and cult icon who has re-defined the words "action hero." A legend to his fans for his death-defying stunts, he has also charmed critics, who have hailed him as the modern day successor to silent movie clowns like Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton.

Written by Edward Tang and Fibe Ma, the film is produced by Barbie Tung and co-produced by Roberta Chow. Raymond Chow serves as Executive Producer.

Jackie Chan had the idea for "Rumble in the Bronx" when he first visited America to make "The Big Brawl" in 1980. "After I did that picture," he recalls, "I stayed to study English, and I got the idea for doing the story where I'd come to America as a student and tangle with a local gang.

"But when I went home to Hong Kong and tried to sell the idea to my boss, he said, 'You're never on schedule, you run over budget, and they won't let you do that in America.' A few years later I saw 'The Karate Kid,' and it was 70 percent of my idea. I said to my boss, 'That's the story I wanted to do.'"

Now, 15 years later, he is fulfill-

ing his dream and bringing his idea to the screen in "Rumble in the Bronx."

"I had to change it a little from my original concept," Chan said. "After 15 years I couldn't be a student, so I made my character a Hong Kong cop on vacation."

In the film, Jackie's Uncle Bill (Bill Tung) sells the family market to unsuspecting Elaine, played by Hong Kong film and recording star Anita Mui, who discovers too late that the neighborhood is infested with bikers who've been ripping the store off for years. Jackie's efforts to help Elaine lead from bad to worse culminating in total destruction when the bikers decide to rip off diamonds stolen by the mob, and the store and its denizens caught

in the middle. The most chilling stunt in "Rumble" comes when Jackie, trapped on a rooftop by pursuers, leaps to a balcony on an adjoining building — a drop of 40 feet to a three-foot target 26-feet away. County board OKs new golf course

A \$6.4 million contract was approved Thursday to construct the Inkster Valley Golf Course and two wetland projects.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners approved the contract to build the 18-hole course, which will straddle the border of Westland and Inkster. It will spread east from Merriman north of Michigan Avenue across Henry Ruff and Middlebelt roads, with five holes on 93 acres in Westland and 13 holes on 200 acres in Inkster.

Local commissioners Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township, Michelle Plawewski, D-Dearborn Heights, and Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, voted in favor with commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, voting against.

Russell Gronevelt, assistant county executive and director of public services, called the project one of the hardest he's ever worked on because of environmental concerns.

The project received a lot of scrutiny by the communities, the Department of Natural Resources and environmental groups, he said.

"They all had a whack at making sure this had a minimal im-

pact, and made sure we will be a good neighbor to them," he said.

DeAngelis Landscape Inc. of Woodhaven won the contract. The company will be the excavator, creating fill, berm and enhancement that "will make the golf course one that will attract many people," Gronevelt said, adding the county plans to build "a formidable golf course."

The project consists of a golf course and two wetland projects. About \$5.5 million of the money will come from the general fund, with \$445,510 from a federal grant and \$449,457 from Waste Management Co. One wetland project is the construction of a manmade wetland and the other involves mitigation of a landfill built by Waste Management Co. in a wetland area in Canton Township. The company was required by consent judgment to contribute money for a wetland project, and the county is the trustee, Gronevelt said.

All of the golf course land is in

the flood plain, and it's all county-owned, Gronevelt said.

The proposed clubhouse will be just north of the River Rouge on the west side of Middlebelt Road. Eleven bridges will be built to prevent golfers from walking through wetlands. A bridge will be built under Middlebelt Road at the Rouge River bridge so that golfers won't have to maneuver through traffic on Middlebelt.

Property at the corner of Merriman and Michigan Avenue has been sold to be commercially developed, and another parcel north of it will go on the market shortly, Gronevelt said.

Ray Glenn, manager of golf and a PGA professional at the Wayne county-owned Warren Valley Golf Course in Dearborn Heights, said the new course will be designed so any skill level can play. There will be four sets of tees ranging from short to tournament play.

Beard made the motion to approve the contract, which she said

has been years in the making.

"It's taken over 20 years," Beard said. "Thank you all my colleagues who voted yes."

McCotter said he voted against because the \$6.4 million could have been spent on other things, such as the cleanup of the county-owned Northville Township property and repair of roads such as Seven Mile.

"I can think of better ways to spend \$6 million," he said.

Patterson said he normally would be insistent that private enterprise initiate a project such as the golf course, but that this project would serve to vitalize that area.

About 20 residents and officials from the city of Inkster attended the meeting and applauded after the commission approved the contract.

Canton victory over Churchill earns a title

What's the difference between a good trial attorney and basketball defense?

The defense can rest in a court of law.

If it rests on a court of basketball, the team pays for it.

Plymouth Canton turned in a half-game of spider-web defense Friday night and rode it to a 66-54 victory over Livonia Churchill to clinch the championship of the Western Lakes Activities Association and the top seed for the league playoffs.

The Chiefs will host No. 8 seed Walled Lake Western this Friday night in a first-round playoff game.

"I told our team that now is when it all counts," coach Dan Young of Canton said after his team upped its record to 16-1 overall and 10-1 in the WLAA. "Our tournament and then

the (MSHAA) Districts.

"Everything you work for is that. So now we've got to get ready in practice. And get ready in the tournaments."

The Chiefs hope to have junior Rob Johnson running this week, practicing as soon as his knee allows and playing by the time the state tournament rolls around in early March.

"Johnson is about a week away," Young said. "Maybe 10 days."

Canton's defense was sensational — for half the game. It was 17-8 after one quarter and 36-17 at halftime. But the Chiefs gave up 20 points in the third quarter and 17 in the fourth.

"I don't want to dwell on that," Young said. "But I did mention it to the team."

"We came out and played hard. We

moved the ball well. If you do that, you'll have a pretty decent team."

"They deserve to be the champions," Churchill coach Tom Lang said. "Right now they've got the best ball club in our league."

"They have good size. They play great man-to-man defense. They box out. They hit the boards and they run on you."

His team's defense irritated Lang. At least the way point guard Shawn Woloszyn wasn't playing it.

Woloszyn has excellent ball-handling skills but nothing came of it against Canton. He was unable to take Nick Hurley off the dribble and he couldn't stop Mark Bray or Hurley.

So Lang yanked him after a couple of minutes of the second half and sat Woloszyn the rest of the game.

2 in a row: Rocks stay unbeaten in dual meets

No dramatic finish here. Indeed, the final dual meet of Plymouth Salem's swim season, the one that would — if won — ensure the Rocks of their second-straight undefeated dual-meet season, was as anti-climactic as possible.

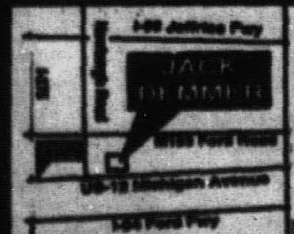

Skylark redo stresses creature comforts

It really depends on who you talk to about the 1996 Buick Skylark. I think it's the perception people have about the Buick brand.

You've got the average guy out on the street who says, "Yep, that's a Buick."

Then you've got me. Still average-gal material. But I just loved the way the Skylark looked a couple of years ago.

I don't know if you remember it, but the old Skylark had stark, distinct lines, a front end that was radically different (for a Buick) and a sporty look like no other on the road.

I really liked that Skylark. In fact, people were stopping me and asking me what I was driving. It was a lot like when I first drove the Riviera.

Although the pointed front fascia is gone, the Skylark is still very distinct—but really toned down. Buick calls it a "classic, contemporary" look.

I just wish it wasn't so ordinary. Don't get me wrong. This is a fine premium compact coupe and sedan.

It has all the creature comforts and features you would expect from a Buick. And more

For example, the Skylark this year features a restyled exterior, an all-new interior with dual airbags, a smoother and quieter standard engine and a new 4-speed automatic transmission.

And at a base price of \$15,995, you'll get quite a bit of bang for your buck.

Outside, you'll find a new fascia, grille, hood, parking lamps, headlamps and taillamps and updated side moldings that provide a smooth transition from front to rear.

At dusk and in low lighting, the side moldings light up, providing a real separation that really shows off

the Skylark's new lines and rounded corners.

Inside you'll find the real change—a totally redone interior. I'm not talking about rearrangement of instrumentation here.

I'm talking comfy new seating, an updated door and trim, new instrument panel and controls, new seat belts and a new steering wheel.

The instrument controls are a lot larger, easier to read and even easier to use this year. What's really neat are the radio controls. They're easy to use even when you're driving.

I already said the seats were comfortable, but here's a little more. Cloth is standard, but the Skylark I was in had leather bucket seats. (A bit cold on the tush in the winter and hot in the summer. But it's soft leather. The kind that envelops you and makes you really feel safe and warm.)

You can choose from a 55/45 split bench or bucket seats and both can be outfitted with driver's lumbar control. Leather's only available in buckets.

Power windows, door locks and rear defogger have all been moved around and are now backlit. That makes it really easy to find those

buttons in a dark garage.

And now the real treat: The engine. The standard engine is a 2.4-liter Twin Cam 4-cylinder that's significantly quieter and smoother than last year's, even with its 150 horses. It's mated to an electronically controlled 4-speed automatic.

The new Skylark's EPA rating is 22 mpg city and 32 mpg highway.

The optional engine, the tried-and-true 3100 V6 rated at 155 horsepower, provides a quiet alternative and pretty good fuel economy at 21 in the city and 29 on the highway.

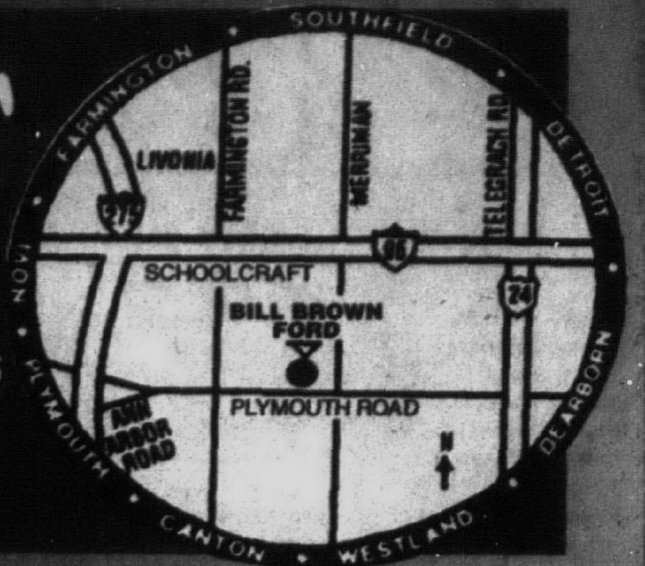

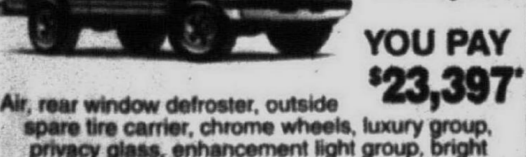

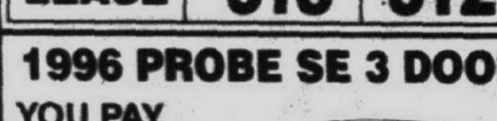
