Memorial Day parade

This year's Plymouth Memorial Day parade, featuring the Plymouth Canton High School marching band, local veterans, the Village Voice singers and more, begins at 8:30 a.m. Monday at Main and Wing streets.

It will be followed by a 9:30 a.m. ceremony at Veterans Memorial Park, at Main and Church, the parade's end point.

"So many other communities have abandoned this very, very important recognition," said Steven Monaghan, commander of Plymouth Township's American Legion Post 112, this year's parade organizer.

The parade is a long-time community favorite. Participants will include local veterans groups; Boy Scout, Cub Scout and Girl Scout troops; a Young Marines detachment from Canton Township; politicians; a Knights of Columbus color guard; the high school marching band; and Elks and Lions clubs members.

At the park, following the parade, the marching band and the Village Voice singers will perform the national anthem and *God Bless America*, Boy Scouts with the rank of Eagle will lead the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance, and there will be a rifle volley salute by the color guard from the local Vietnam Veterans of America chapter.

The guest speaker will be Lt. Col. Ted Wells of the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, who is assigned to the Selfridge Air National Guard base.

Plymouth Elks dedicated to helping veterans in need

Amid the bustle of the Memorial Day holiday, Vivian Biegun doesn't want people to forget Michigan's ailing and needy veterans — or what her Plymouth Elks do for them.

In 2008, for example, folks at the Plymouth Elks Lodge 1780 raised over \$4,500 to buy Christmas gifts for veterans in the Detroit, Ann Arbor and Battle Creek Veterans Administration hospitals, and at three homeless shelters; donated more than 230 bags of clothing to the Michigan Veterans Foundation; sponsored regular game days and ice cream socials for hospitalized and homeless veterans; hosted steak lunches for veterans who are bused to the Elks

lodge from around the region; and donated deer hides used to make gloves given to veterans who use wheelchairs.

The work last year meant 2,124 man-hours and more than 22,000 miles of travel by participating Elks, said Biegun, a Plymouth Township resident and an Elk for three years. Their service reached nearly 6,300 veterans, she said.

"I feel like it's giving something to people who helped our country," Biegun said.

Biegun said the Plymouth Elks have won state and national honors for their work with the veterans.

"I don't think people know exactly what the Elks do for the veterans," she said.

Agape Christian Academy to close

The Agape Family Worship Center on Geddes Road in Canton Township has been a part of Pastor Mark Moore's life for 31 years.

It was he and his parents, Earl and Bobbi Moore, who opened the doors of the church in Plymouth in 1978. Five years later, Agape Christian Academy began with 23 kindergarten and first graders, eventually adding a grade each year until it became a K-12 school with an enrollment reaching a high of 310 students. Finally, there was a move to Canton a dozen years ago.

A lot of blood, sweat and tears for the Moore family which will soon become a distant memory as the church and school fall to circumstances not unlike many homeowners in Canton, throughout Michigan and the country.

Moore said the church and school are being shuttered because of foreclosure proceedings by Fidelity Bank in Dearborn, despite his efforts to develop a plan to catch up on a 60-day late mortgage payment. In fact, Moore said he was only three days from being current on the mortgage when the bank pulled the rug out from under him.

"With the downturn in the economy we started running into financial problems," admitted Moore. "We lost some of our base and got behind in payments for the church and school."

"Working with the bank we had a recovery plan with them, but within three days of being current with the bank in December they met with us and said they no

longer wanted to do business with us," he said. "We feel like we were being targeted because we were a church. Other nonprofits are still doing business with them. The bottom line is they served us with foreclosure papers in February and said we were going up for sheriff's sale in March."

Moore said he was unable to find other financing for the \$3.5 million mortgage, but three weeks ago he received a call from bank president, Mike Ross, wanting to help.

"We had already announced the school was closing and we have 180 students now trying to find another school, 30 people without jobs and 350 church members trying to find a new place to worship," Moore said. "It was too late for me to rally the troops."

Fidelity Bank President Mike Ross declined to discuss specifics of the Agape mortgage.

"We have suspended the foreclosure proceedings," said Ross. "I discussed with Pastor Moore some options he may have. He's been pursuing those and we're waiting to hear from him."

Kristin Organ and her family moved from Toronto to Canton three years ago, away from family and friends. Finding Agape was a godsend.

"These people became our family, it's like home for us," said Organ, who is PTO president. "Pastor Moore has been a real rock, and it's very sad and frustrating to hear the details of what happened. It breaks my heart."

"God always has a plan,

Couple charged with embezzling PTO funds

A Canton Township couple has been arraigned on charges they embezzled more than \$13,000 from the Fiegel Elementary PTO.

Kimberly and Robert Smith were arraigned Monday in 35th District Court in Plymouth on one count each of embezzlement of funds greater than \$1,000 but less than \$20,000. Robert Smith was also arraigned on an additional charge of receiving and concealing stolen property greater than \$1,000 but less than \$20,000.

Both crimes are felonies that carry a penalty of five years imprisonment and/or a \$10,000 fine, or three times

the amount embezzled or concealed, whichever is greater.

"The PTO wrote a check to cover a balance to a fundraising company and when it bounced it set off an alarm," said Canton Township Police Sgt. Mark Gajeski. "The principal (Jim Johnson) contacted Kim Smith, the treasurer of the PTO, and said he wanted all the records. She gave him everything except the check book."

Gajeski said the investigation started in March and culminated with the charges on Monday. Gajeski said Kimberly Smith wrote some checks to retail stores, though it's not known exactly what was purchased, and some checks were written to her husband.

Bond for both defendants was set at \$5,000 personal by Judge Ronald Lowe. Their preliminary exam is scheduled for May 29.

Fiegel Principal Jim Johnson declined comment until he and the PTO meet with parents on Wednesday. Johnson said he and PTO members plan to attend the preliminary exam.

Holiday means closings, delayed trash pickup

Monday is Memorial Day and a day off for most Plymouth and Plymouth Township employees, with the major exceptions being police officers and firefighters.

City and township offices will be closed for the holiday. Banks and some businesses will also be closed.

There will be no household trash, recycling or yard-waste pickup on Monday in either Plymouth or Plymouth Township, and the pickup schedule for the rest of the

week will be delayed by one day.

Neighborhoods that regularly have a Monday pickup will have it on Tuesday this week, for example. Waste-hauling crews will be working on Saturday, May 30, to handle their normal Friday pickups.

The regular pickup schedule will resume on Monday, June 1.

The Plymouth community's Memorial Day parade begins at 8:30 a.m. Monday at Wing and Main streets and proceeds to Veterans Memorial Park

at Main and Church streets. The parade will be followed by a 9:30 a.m. ceremony at the park.

City officials anticipate that Main between Wing and Union streets will be closed during this time. Crossing Main at Ann Arbor Trail, Penniman and Church will be prohibited during the parade. In addition, drivers can expect increased traffic in the area of Wing and Harvey, the parade's staging area.

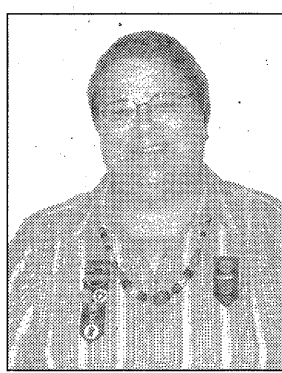

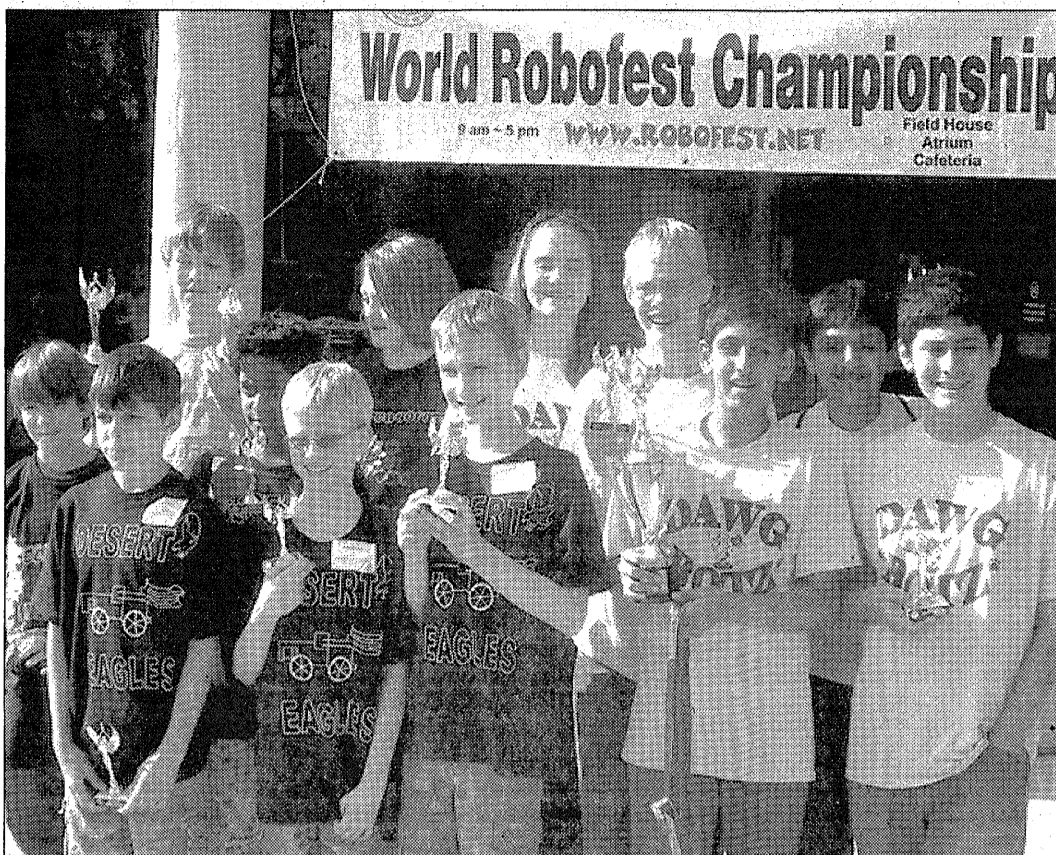

Academy teams tops at annual Robofest

Three teams sponsored by Canton Charter Academy won U.S. Army development grants during the 10th annual World Robofest Championship recently held at Lawrence Technological University in Southfield.

The Joint Center for Robotics at the Tank Automotive Research, Development and Engineering Center (TARDEC) in Warren awarded grants to teams demonstrating creative and innovative robotics projects with entrepreneurship components.

"Events like Robofest are important to TARDEC because they help us lay the groundwork for the future of Michigan's engineering and technical workforce," said

Bernard Theisen, project manager for outreach at the Joint Center for Robotics. "Robotics is a multidisciplinary field, so students are exposed to the computer science, electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, physics, and math disciplines."

Robofest, founded by Lawrence Tech professor CJ Chung, is an international competition of autonomous robots - computer-programmed to act independently and not radio-controlled. The competition encourages students to have fun while learning principles of computer science, physics, math, engineering and technology. This year some 1,700 students from 10 states and five countries

participated.

The three Canton teams competed in the junior division (grades 5-9). One three-student team named TILT (Technology in Layman's Terms) built a pinball-type game that moves in concert with a player who is seated on a large exercise ball. The Desert Eagles created an eco-friendly RoboRecycler that sorts recyclables into categories.

CCA's Dawg Botz won a People's Choice Award with CART (Carrying Autonomous Robotic Technology). This multipurpose robot uses infrared light to follow a person by employing ultrasonic and infrared sensors to avoid hitting obstacles.

Plymouth woman's show wins two Emmys

Sport Science, the popular television series featuring WSU's associate professor of biomedical engineering and Plymouth resident Cynthia Bir won two of the five Sports Emmys it was nominated for recently at Lincoln Center in New York City.

The Sport Science team took home awards for Outstanding Graphic Design and Outstanding New Approaches and was nominated for Outstanding Edited Sports Series/Anthology, Outstanding Technical Team Studio and Outstanding Production Design/Art Design. Sport Science also was nominated last year for four Sports Emmys and won for Outstanding Graphic Design.

The series, which is in its second season, brings professional sports stars and scientists to Sport Science's elaborate sports laboratory in Los Angeles to test athletic prowess and feats of the highest level.

This season's first episode tested what generates more power - natural adrenaline or an adrenaline shot, with mixed martial arts fighter Houston Alexander agreeing to be injected with a dose of epinephrine.

"The shows are appreciated by a lot of different audiences, different age groups and backgrounds," said Bir. "In all the shows we've applied the tools developed in the lab to record, measure and map the speed, force and range of the human body, specifically the athlete. The final product is not only entertaining, but educational."

Last season the show caught the attention of many science teachers who then used it as a teaching tool. This year, Wayne State University is providing science teachers with a curriculum based on segments of the show.

Sport Science airs Sundays at 9 p.m. on Fox Sports Network.

Foundation hands out \$25k in scholarships

Jack Wilcox, a life-long resident of the City of Plymouth, died June 30, 2000. Prior to his death, he established and funded the Wilcox Foundation.

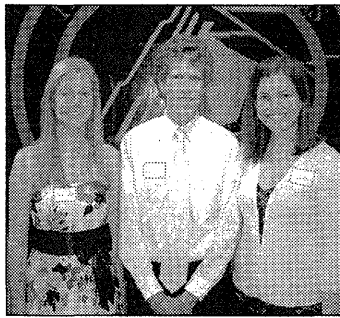
Accordingly, he said, the criteria for selecting the participants is centered around the time and effort put into research, resourcefulness in tracking down sources of information and interest shown by the student.

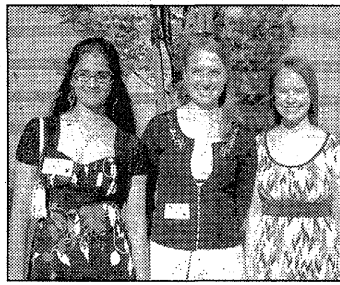

'Treasure hunting every day'

St. Vincent de Paul thrift store offer bargains in hard times

Shoppers feeling the economic pinch can find what Michael Saine considers a treasure trove inside the Society of St. Vincent de Paul thrift store he manages in Westland.

Consumers can find brand-name clothing, Noritake crystal, televisions, Haviland Limoges china, books, furniture, cappuccino machines, sports cards, games, wedding dresses, vinyl records and a Cinderella music box among the thousands of items neatly arranged inside the store, located in a shopping center on the northwest corner of Wayne and Hunter roads.

More important in a tough economy, shoppers pay a fraction of what it would cost them to buy the items new, and it's all for a good cause. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul, with 10 stores in southeast Michigan alone, spends 92 cents for every dollar it earns to provide food, clothing, shelter, youth camps and other services to people in need.

Under the umbrella of the Archdiocesan Council of Detroit, the local organization receives its merchandise from donors and then sells it to bargain-hunters who need to stretch a dollar, especially as Michigan battles a 12 percent unemployment rate.

"It's a perfect redistribution of wealth without government intervention," Saine said.

He manages the store with six

employees, including assistant managers Sharonda Smiley and Barbara Flood, and volunteers like 22-year-old Westland mom Christina Peterson, who stops in two or three days a week to hang up clothes, put price tags on merchandise and help reorganize displays.

"I also shop here for my kids' clothing and toys," she said. "You can't beat the prices." A worldwide organization, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul was started 175 years ago and has operated in the Detroit area for 121 years. In this region alone, it helps some 100,000 people a year.

Saine also proudly described the charity as environmen-

tally friendly, saying the stores "recycle" merchandise every week that might otherwise end up in landfills. Moreover, it only accepts appliances and other items that work and don't need repairs because, Saine said, it wouldn't be fair to sell broken goods that "economically challenged" patrons would have to spend money to fix.

Shoppers can find a nearly new couch for \$100, a brand-name T-shirt as low as \$1, Haviland Limoges china for \$1.99 a piece and wedding gowns for well under \$100 — a price that "doesn't take a bite out of Dad's pocket" as he helps his daughter prepare for her big day.

"We're not out to pick anybody's pocket," Saine said.

People who want to donate to the organization can take items like clothing directly to the stores or arrange to have bigger merchandise, such as furniture, picked up by calling the Society's toll free number at (877) 788-4623. The Westland store, located at 6613 N. Wayne Road, can be reached at (734) 729-3088. Much more information, including how to make a monetary donation, is available online at www.svdpdet.org.

For those who merely want a good deal, the store hours are 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily except for Sundays when it's noon to 5 p.m. As Saine put it, "it's treasure hunting every day."

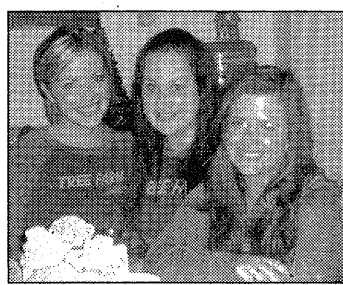
Residents support team's effort to fight cancer

Man killed in accident at Detroit Diesel

A Canton man was killed Wednesday by a machine he was repairing at a Redford Township engine plant.

Jeff Malins, a 51-year-old Canton resident, died at Detroit Diesel when a machine he was repairing switched on Wednesday afternoon. According

to police reports, the man was working on the machine that started to back up. Medical workers at the factory attempted to treat the man's head injury in preparation for the arrival of emergency responders.

Redford Township police and fire department officers went out to the factory, 12100 Telegraph, to try to save the man's life but were unable to do so. Malins was

pronounced dead at the scene at 4:20 p.m. and was taken from the scene by representatives of the Wayne County Medical Examiner's office.

Redford Township Police Capt. Kraig Brueck declined to comment on the incident, saying that the accident at the plant is under investigation by the State of Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Bankruptcy law gives people a second chance

Q: Dear Rick: I generally agree with what you say and I like your down to earth approach, however, I question one of your recent columns in which you seem to suggest that bankruptcy isn't such a bad idea. I think too many people go into bankruptcy when they don't

have to. I think too many people are taking advantage of the system. I would hope that in the future you would discourage people from using bankruptcy.

A: I understand where you are coming from and part of me agrees with you, however, I don't think I should be discouraging people from pursuing bankruptcy where needed.

There are people who take advantage of bankruptcy laws and over the last few years bankruptcy reform has attempted to reduce the number of abuses. Most people use bankruptcy laws as they were intended.

The purpose of bankruptcy laws is to provide an individual with a second chance. Whether he/she was irresponsible with personal finances or ran into bad luck, the laws are meant to protect in either circumstance.

Bankruptcy should not be the first choice when individuals run into financial difficulty. Even during difficult economic times, there are consequences when someone goes into bankruptcy — even for those with good credit. When someone runs into financial difficulty, they should explore all options — bankruptcy is one.

It is not immoral or unethical to take advantage of bankruptcy laws when someone is in financial distress.

In this country, the economic and financial system runs according to rules and bankruptcy laws are part of this system. American businesses operate as they do in part because of bankruptcy laws.

For example, there are usury laws which govern how much interest an individual is allowed to be charged. The charge card companies have been able to exclude themselves from that law and can charge virtually unlimited

amounts of interest on charge card debt. One of their reasons for seeking this exclusion was to offset losses that occur when consumers go into bankruptcy. When consumers pay high interest rates on charge cards they have more or less bought an insurance policy on their debt. The premium is in the form of higher interest rates. Don't be overly concerned for charge card companies when

they have to take a loss due to bankruptcy because they have already been compensated by charging higher interest rates. Businesses — large and small — factor bad debt into the equation when determining the price of their products. We all pay a higher price on goods and services to offset losses that companies incur due to bankruptcy. I don't mean to seem cava-

lier about filing for bankruptcy; however, I also don't want to be holier than thou and claim that I wouldn't recommend bankruptcy to anyone. I believe individuals, just like corporations, should not hesitate to use bankruptcy in order to get a fresh start. There is no doubt many people misuse the bankruptcy laws. In many of those situations the individual is com-

mitting a fraud and there are legal consequences if they are caught. Over the years, I've had mixed reactions when the topic of bankruptcy arises. There are a number of people who believe there is a moral obligation to pay back debts and that bankruptcy is never an option. I respect that belief, but I disagree. One reason we are such a

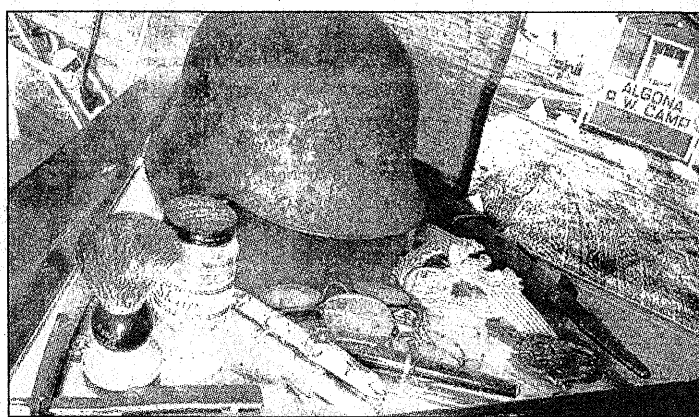

Rolling history lesson makes local stop

On Friday morning, a large green bus came rolling into Canton and parked next to the library. While it may have looked a little out of place, the bus was actually a traveling museum housing artifacts from World War II.

Nearly 60 people visited the converted school bus, or "buseum," during its stay. They got a first hand look at what life was like for German prisoners of war. The exhibit paints a picture of POW life as captured soldiers experienced it. Using artifacts, photographs, documents, audio and DVD documentaries, it focuses on the experiences of the roughly 372,000 German POWs held in U.S. Army-operated camps across the United States.

Prisoners were sent out to harvest or process crops, build roads, fell trees, roof barns, erect silos, work in light non-military industry, lay city sewers and construct tract housing, wash U.S. Army laundry and do other practical wartime tasks. With the high rate of 19th-century German immigration to the Midwest, many of those who worked with POWs spoke to them in

their native tongue — some even had relatives or former neighbors among them. In the process, they formed friendships with their American captors. A number of POWs even chose to immigrate to the United States after the war.

The Canton Veterans Memorial Association and Friends of the Canton Public Library sponsored the buseum's visit. Admission was free.

"The buseum presents a part of American history that demonstrates how two different groups of people can have a big impact on each other

and on global relations," said Laurie Golden, spokesperson for the Canton Public Library. "This exhibit shows that how, in the worst of times, treating people with dignity brings out the best in everyone. The Canton Public Library, the Veteran's Memorial Association and the Friends of the library are happy to bring this to our community."

The TRACES' mobile museum is currently touring six Midwest states reaching schools, libraries and historical societies. The bus is being driven by Irving Kellman.

"While there is quite a bit of

information about American soldiers held prisoner in WWII Nazi Germany, less is known about captured Germans soldiers held prisoner in America during the war. This exhibit tells their story," said John Spencer, president of the Canton Veterans Memorial Association.

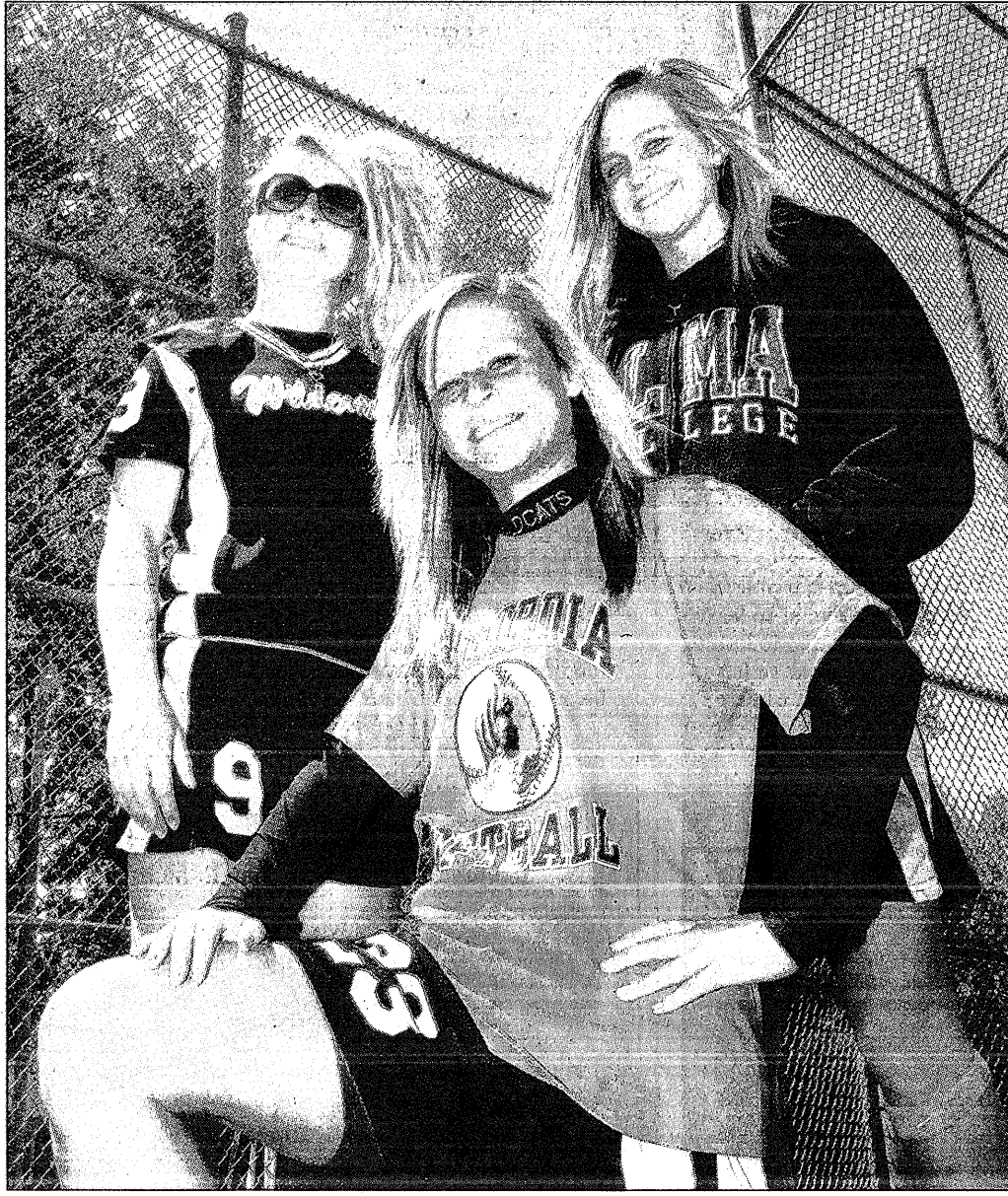
"I know they're all going to be successful in college because of the ladder of success they've climbed throughout high school. All three have been tremendous assets to our program."

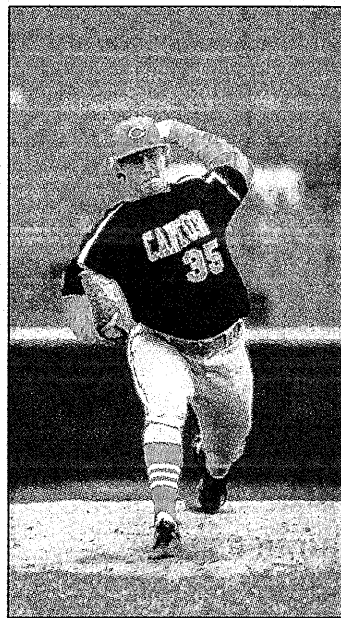

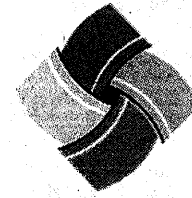

Local golfers perform well at district event

Things went pretty much according to script in Thursday's Division I district boys golf tournament held under challenging conditions at Tanglewood G.C.

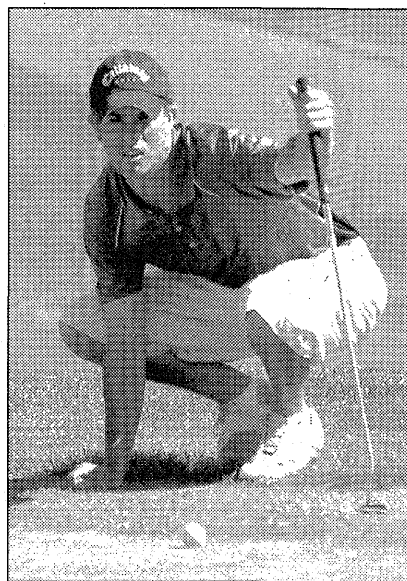
The state's top-ranked team, Northville, earned its third consecutive district crown with a four-player total of 320.

Livonia Stevenson, the only team to defeat the Mustangs in a dual match this season, finished second with 325 and will be joined at next Friday's Lakes of Taylor regional by Canton (326), Livonia Churchill (327), Plymouth (338) and Dearborn (344).

Only three players broke 80 among the 12-team field led by medalist Zach Conrad, a junior from Canton, who carded the low round with a 75.

Northville was led by Trevor Grigg's 78, while Steve Brown (80), Alex Bernstein (81) and Wes Gates (81) also figured in the Mustangs' four-player total.

"We were happy to win and come away with the district championship - our number one goal was to qualify," said Northville coach Matt

Stetson, who returned three starters from last year's team, which finished third in Division I. "We scored a little higher than I thought - but with the wind - conditions were a little

tougher.

"And there was also the pressure of playing on your home course. We wanted to play very well, but sometimes it can also backfire on you."

Two of the toughest holes came on North course - the par-3 Nos. 6 and 8.

"I didn't play well on those holes," said Conrad, who was a state qualifier last year. "I played a practice round here. The greens were tricky and I had to know where to hit my tee shots in good spots. I had to hit the right distances, but the wind effected it going left to right."

Conrad, the first Canton golfer to earn medalist honors for the Chiefs since Derek Trosper did it four years ago, practices out of Fox Hills Golf Course. He plans to play this summer on the Adams Tour and PGA Junior National series.

The stellar performance by Conrad, who also plays travel hockey, came as no surprise to his coach Tom Alles.

"Zach works like crazy and plays all summer long," Alles said. "He has a ton of experience playing competitive golf. He got off to a slow start, but has been playing well the second half of the season. He's a cool customer."

The only other player to break 80 was Stevenson's Christian Debay, who came in with a 79.

Teammates Drew Mossoian and Dan Dufour each carded 81s, while Tom Cullum and Adam Giordano each added 84s for the Spartans.

Mossoian, Stevenson's hottest player of late, was an individual state qualifier last season.

"We got a good round out of Christian (Debay) and Dan (Dufour) has been playing really well," Stevenson coach Jim Omietanski said. "And Giordano is like Drew. You always know you're going to get a score anywhere from 80 to 84."

Churchill was led by Kevin Robinson's 80 and Matt Charnley's 81, while Plymouth relied on Justin Bauer's 80.

The All-District team included Conrad, Grigg, Debay, Brown, Bauer and Robinson.

Additional individual regional qualifiers from teams that did not place in the top six included Garden City's Ron Pummill (81) and Nick Walker (82); Westland John Glenn's Andy Myers (81), Salem's Josh Perrin (82), Livonia Franklin's Chris Grund (85) and Wayne Memorial's Kevin

Sample (85).

Salem's Adam Powers, who also shot an 85, was eliminated in a one-hole playoff with Grund and Sample when he suffered a double-bogey.

It was tough day on the Rocks, who lost nine strokes and a spot ahead of Dearborn for the sixth and final team qualifying berth when a player was disqualified for rules violation (using a wind-aiding device).

"I was approached halfway through the round that I might have an issue with a player," Salem coach Rick Wilson said. "It was a device to measure the wind. I was surprised and it's something I never knew existed."

"It was a decision of the (district) golf committee. Artificial aids of any kind are not allowed. The rules of golf are clear. That's why I have a guy come in before the season from the Golf Association of Michigan and talk with our players about this stuff. I told him (the disqualified player) it was a hard lesson and we have to accept the committee's decision. He feels bad enough. He's a good player and he's a junior, so he'll have a chance to come back next year."

Improvements include architectural/structural work; process mechanical systems; piping and valve replacements; heating and ventilation improvements; electrical work and Supervisory Control and Data Acquisitions (SCADA) improvements. Improvements are required to continue to comply with the communities' sewage disposal needs including National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit requirements.

If the SRF application is successful, the County plans to begin construction of the above noted improvements within the Priority I Planning Period of 2010 to 2014 under a schedule to be established with the Rouge River Watershed Communities. Sanitary sewer service for customers will be unaffected by the proposed improvements. Construction activities will be localized to the subject facilities, with little or no impact to traffic.

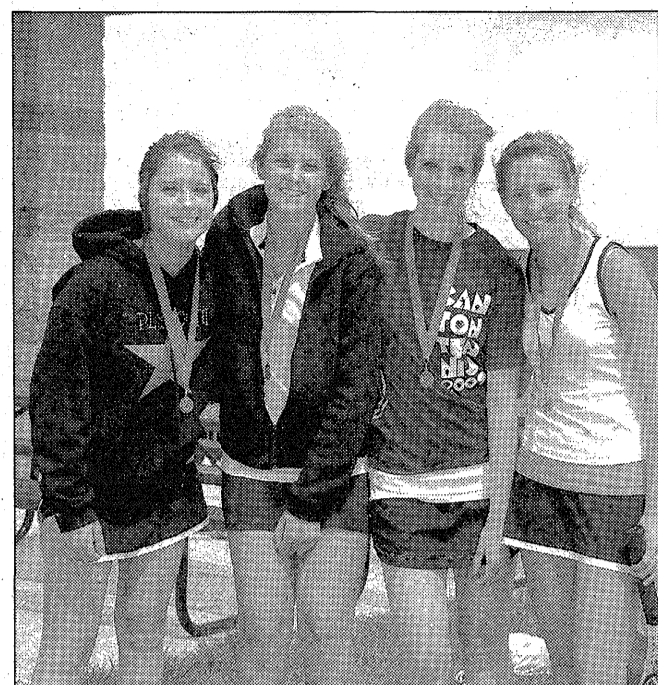

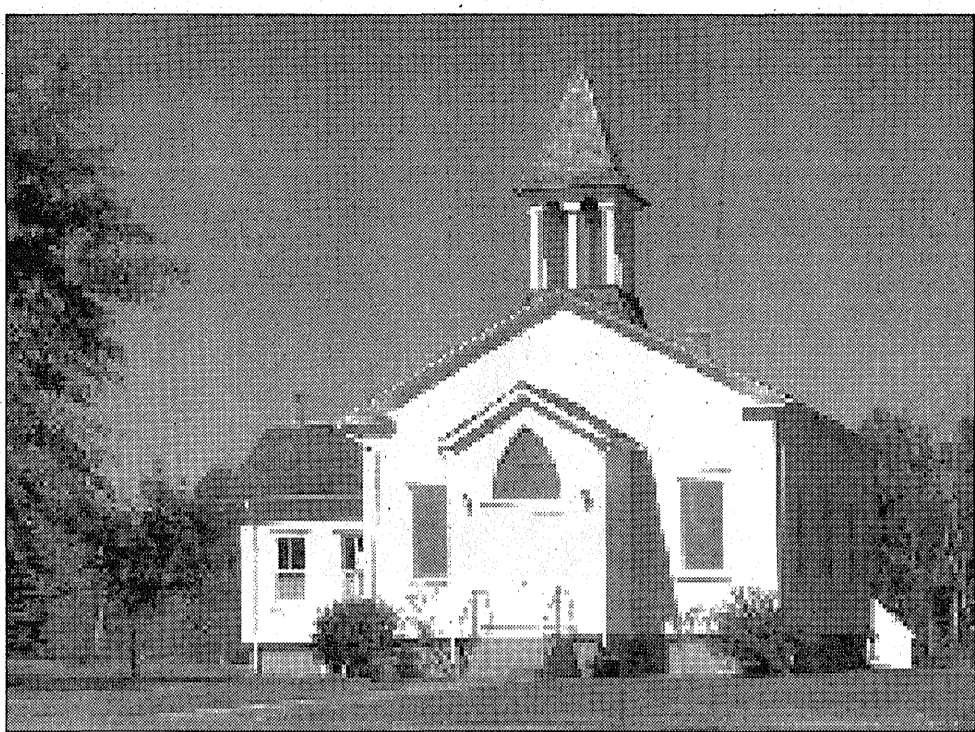

Newburg Church lauds first pastor, celebrates milestone

The Rev. Paul Perez walked amid tombstones, reading faded stone inscriptions, as he searched the small, grassy Newburgh Cemetery on Monday.

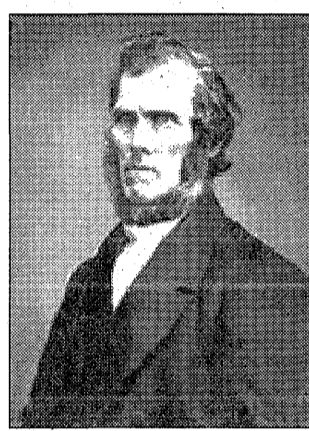
Just a short walk from the west entrance to the historic burial grounds, he noticed the polished marker, raised a few inches higher than nearby stones that lay flush with the earth.

"He was a veteran probably," he said, looking at the American Legion symbol planted near the historic grave. "This is Anna, his wife," he added, turning his attention to the old, barely legible tombstone next to Marcus Swift's final resting place.

Perez, deacon of Newburg United Methodist Church, will revisit the cemetery today, Sunday, May 24, along with other members of the congregation to lay a wreath at Swift's tomb, honoring the first pastor of the church. Swift was born in 1793 and died in 1865.

"The way that early Methodism lived and worked was that there were travelling preachers and Marcus Swift was one of them. Circuit rider was the title given to our early preachers," Perez said. Depending on how large the circuit was, a preacher might have stopped at a church once every month or every three months. Between visits lay people led the congregation.

"The first evidence of Newburg's existence was as a part of a 10 (church) circuit. That circuit was the whole length of Ann Arbor Trail," Perez noted. "It was called the Huron Circuit and it ran some 40 miles. Usually what happened was the word was sent out so that everyone knew when to expect the circuit rider."

In addition to riding his 40-mile circuit, Swift also was an outspoken abolitionist. "I think what we celebrate is the fact that he had the courage and faithfulness to speak out," said Perez, noting that Newburg church today also has a "deep commitment to Christian service" through its outreach programs.

"I like to think that it (outreach) is a part of that heritage," he said, referring to Swift's anti-slavery work.

IN TRIBUTE

Members plan to walk to the cemetery, place the wreath, say prayers and sing songs at Swift's gravesite.

"We'd like to see a good turnout," said Audrey Greenleaf. She and her husband, Harry, both longtime Newburg members, are on the planning committee for the church's 175th anniversary. The group has planned a special event each month during the yearlong celebration.

"We started in January and we won't stop until December," Greenleaf said. "In January we had a circuit rider arrive. In February we had a variety show."

Lenten dinners with special speakers followed in

March and April, with the gravesite tribute to Swift planned for May.

The church will round out the year with a choir concert, a "music Sunday," a church picnic complete with a time capsule burial, and more.

"It's a gift that the church has been here this long," Perez said. "This (church) community has survived and thrived since the first settlers came to the area. To be here for 175 years is saying a lot."

LONGTIME MEMBERS

Some of Newburg's members, like Perez, grew up in the church and have stayed involved as adults. Perez left the area for undergraduate and then seminary studies, returning with his wife and son last year to join the staff at the church.

The Greenleafs, who joined 47 years ago, are among the many members with long, active histories in the congregation.

"We moved here from New York State, just like Marcus Swift did," Greenleaf said, adding that her husband had been transferred to the area by Ford Motor Co. "My son married here. He got his music start in this church and still sings in the Livonia Chorus. My granddaughter played the baby Jesus when we had a Christmas pageant. My daughter was baptized here."

Greenleaf said her family has remained with Newburg for so many years because its members are "warm and friendly."

"It has always been a warm church. We do a lot of mission-type projects and fun stuff in church. It's not super big, so you don't get lost in it," she said. "You get to know the people."

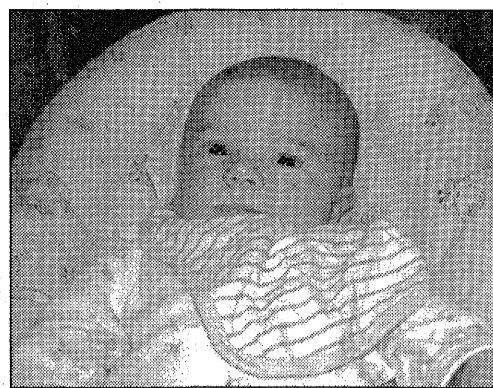

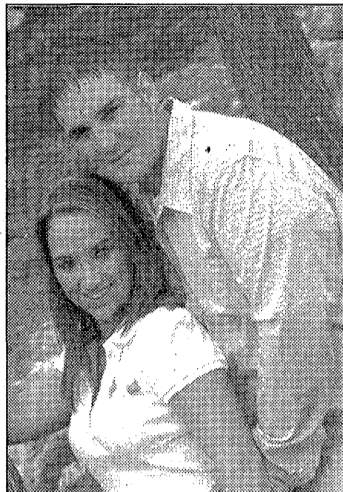

Not only will the food and jazz be great, but ticket sales help keep the music alive. The annual event raises money for the Michigan Jazz Festival held every July on campus. This year's Father's Day Brunch is crucial to the surviv-

al of the daylong jazz extravaganza featuring Michigan musicians.

Tom Saunders is especially looking forward to the food provided by the college's culinary arts department. The

trumpet player and his six-piece band, Tom Saunders & the Detroit Jazz Allstars, spice up the afternoon brunch with Dixieland and Swing.

Saunders, 61, started playing cornet at age 7 after his older brother moved on to another instrument. His career has taken him around the world where he's eaten a variety of food.

"They put on a great brunch. The meal is phenomenal and it's a great bargain for the food and entertainment," said Saunders of Grosse Pointe Park. "It's a beautiful venue. We'd love to see them all there."

Midge Ellis can't wait to hear Saunders' band swing again. They've played the brunch before. She's partial to the group's Dixieland tunes as well. Ellis expects everyone to be singing along to *When the Saints Go Marching In*.

"It's special every year because the music is good simple jazz and whole families come and bring their dads," said Ellis, the Livonia resident known as Mama Jazz, because she never stops promoting the music. "And it's America's only art form."

Ellis and the rest of the festival committee work hard to share their love of jazz with adults and youth. At age 86, Ellis realizes the music will die unless today's kids are exposed to the art form which began in the early 1900s in the south. In addition to hosting six big bands and 23 groups on six stages, the festival offers young musicians an opportunity to play with pros like pianist Dennis Tini of

Farmington Hills. "We select three students who play without rehearsal with Dennis Tini, a distinguished professor at Wayne State and his trio," said Ellis. "We also have a Future of Jazz stage in the cafeteria with young bands playing for exposure. Most of them are college students recommended by their professors. Those are things no other festival does. Our piano workshops are all solo pianists. Some of the best in the world. Called the Steinway Jazz Cafe, people learn about jazz. The musicians show how they can improvise, turn a tune into bebop. People can ask questions. We're trying to get young people involved, teach people about this art form we don't want to lose."

Without funding, though, the future of the festival remains in doubt.

Automotive suppliers, who generously supported the event in the past, have given notice they won't be able to donate money next year. That means this year's musicians may not be back and that leaves Ellis sad. She can't say enough about the talent of the 203 musicians taking to the stages Sunday, July 19, from noon until the Johnny Trudell Big Band closes the program beginning at 9:45 p.m.

"We're depending on fund-raisers and donations right now because we don't have enough to do it next year," said Ellis. "If you're going to do anything for dad and he likes jazz bring him here and help keep the festival going."

"We have some new people this year, Trish Sandor, a singer. I never heard anyone sing like that since Sarah Vaughn or Ella Fitzgerald. She's with Mike Karoub, Jim Dapogny, piano, just

a piano and cello and her. Chris Collins, jazz director at Wayne, will be on reeds with just piano by Gary Schunk, a veteran player at Baker's for years. Dave Bennett plays a tribute to Benny Goodman. There's the World's Oldest Saxophone Section, Latin jazz by Soneo, Hot Club of Detroit who play Django Reheinardt's music. The musicians hang out all day, check their instruments like they check their coats. This is like old home week and we let them sell their CDs. We treat them like royalty because that's what we think they are."

Saunders is once again among the lineup that includes young musicians in the Wayne State University Big Jazz Band and the Schoolcraft College Jazz Band as well as veterans like Ron Kischuk and the Masters of Music Big Band and CSO, directed by Motor City Brass Band leader Craig Strain. He played the festival its first year at Freedom Hill in Sterling Heights and every year since at the Botsford Inn and then Schoolcraft College.

Saunders serves on the board of the admission-free festival.

"What's special is all the musicians they get to hear, from soup to nuts," said Saunders. "If you're going to spend one day listening make it that day."

Like Ellis, Saunders is concerned about the fate of the festival about to celebrate its 15th year.

"Right now we're getting help from the national musicians union, the American Federation of Musicians, but we're pretty sure it will disappear. We can do it for one year but next year is kind of shaky because of the economy. We really count on donations from people and companies. If that dries up then you're on your own to play a lot of brunches and fund-raisers."

Phoenix Mill exhibit evokes memories for local women

One of the first items in the Phoenix Mill exhibit to evoke a reaction from Margaret Dunning and Doris Richard was a vintage photograph of the open windows along the line where they sat assembling automotive parts.

The two women recently visited the Plymouth Historical Museum where the mural-size image brought back memories of the heat they endured while working at the plant in the 1930s and '40s. The sweltering environment was the reason coffee breaks were instituted to relieve the women employed there. Dunning and Richard shudder to think of those days before air conditioning.

Phoenix Mill made history for a variety of reasons not the least of which was allowing women to work outside of the home. That was something women didn't do when the plant opened in 1922.

Dunning worked there during the Great Depression when nearly 70 women assembled voltage regulators and carburetor cutouts for automobiles and later parts for B-24 bombers built at Willow Run. Today she owns a collection of classic cars that includes a Model T with one of the regulators.

"Women were important in history where they weren't before," said Dunning of Plymouth. "They had smaller hands than the men. The work required an extremely fine attention to details."

WOMEN ONLY

The exhibit tells the story of the women and Phoenix Mill, one of 19 small manufacturing plants Henry Ford established on former mill sites to produce parts using water power from the Rouge River. Ford hired mostly farmers at the plants. The exception was Phoenix Mill which employed

only women who sat on stools as they worked in the building designed by Albert Kahn Associates on the site of a grist mill which burned in 1905.

Ford paid the women \$5 a day, the same as men but they had to adhere to stricter dress codes. Dunning and Richard were among the single women and widows who were required to wear dresses,

stockings and high heels even during summer. These were women who needed to work because of financial circumstances. Dunning's father, Charles, died when she was 13 and her mother was struggling to make ends meet. They sold their dairy and potato farm in Redford Township, moved into Redford and then the village of Plymouth. Dunning gradu-

ated from Plymouth High School in 1929 and then went to the University of Michigan for two years before returning home.

"It's so long ago," said Dunning, who turns 99 in June. After leaving Ford, she went on to work at First National Bank on Penniman then Plymouth United Savings Bank before purchasing a clothing store in downtown Plymouth in 1947. Dunning is well-known in the community for her philanthropic work and funded the building and addition to the museum.

"I had come back from college and was helping my mother with finances," said Dunning. "It was the only place a woman could think of to get a job. I worked on the line with everybody else. It was interesting for me because I was mechanically inclined and it was automotive. We made valves and smaller engine parts. Valve grinding was very important but that was all a man's job not women's. Phoenix Mill was strictly a woman's plant. It's a rather startling exhibit for some of the people who were not knowledgeable about what was going on, the history there. The mill made a difference. Women could get a job. There were a few jobs teaching but that

required higher education which most of the people who worked at the Ford factory did not have. It was the only place where you could go and get that kind of money. If you got in over there that was pretty special. Ford started there \$5

a day. When I went into banking the pay was way down from Ford."

HER FIRST JOB

Doris Richard fondly remembers Mrs. Sullivan, the woman who hired the "girls." Richard worked at Phoenix Mill in the early 1940s. She left in 1943 to marry her husband, Bruce, who worked for Ford as an engineer. Bruce volunteered at the museum every Monday and Wednesday for years and eventually became president of the Plymouth Historical Society. When the museum first opened, Doris helped with exhibits. Today the 87-year old woman still lives in Plymouth.

"It was really my first job," said Richard, a life member of the museum. "There were a lot of nice people there. All the women liked Mrs. Sullivan. They went to her for everything."

"She was a very, very strong woman," added Dunning. "We worked with very nice associates. You looked forward to lunch to talk with people. Lots of people were friends before they got to the factory because they lived in Plymouth. The mill meant a lot to the vicinity."

The display case is filled with original valves from the Model T and Model A cars. From 1936 to the plant closing in 1948 the Phoenix Mill women produced half of all cutouts and voltage regulators in the U.S.

"We're trying to save and preserve the history on women," said museum director Elizabeth Kerstens, who recently earned a master's degree at Eastern Michigan University in state and local history.

Dunning can't help think-

ing of the mill's history every time she drives by the building at the junction of Edward Hines Drive and Northville Road in Plymouth Township. Efforts have been under way to renovate the facility. A feasibility study suggested the building house a women's history museum that could be supported by leasing space to businesses and organizations in the community. The Friends of Phoenix Mill supports the plan, according to Friends president Beth Stewart.

The future of the mill is in the hands of Wayne County Parks which owns all of the mills located on the Rouge throughout Hines Drive as per a stipulation in the will of Clara Ford, Henry's widow. A statement from the Parks Division said there are not any future plans for the Phoenix Mill project.

Wayne County Commissioner Laura Cox supports restoring and using the building. Historic preservation and other grants could fund the project.

"Phoenix Mill would be an asset to Plymouth and the surrounding communities," said Cox. "I am in favor of the project and will continue to work with local proponents to find a way to support the project financially."

In the meantime, the parks division is using the mill as a storage facility.

"I would love to see that put back into a power plant," said Dunning. "The turbines are all there. It would be a cheap source of power if they could get that going."

West Bloomfield author offers strategies to cope with anxiety

Some days Nick Dubin has to take a moment to retrain his brain.

Anxiety is one of the common conditions that haunt individuals with Asperger's syndrome. Dubin's second book describes an incident where he backed into a car and could have blown the minor fender-bender out of proportion. He had a choice -- to berate himself for the accident or reframe his thoughts by telling himself no one was hurt and the damage minimal.

A form of autism, Asperger's syndrome is a developmental disorder affecting social skills and behavior. In his recent book, "Asperger Syndrome and Anxiety: A Guide to Successful Stress Management," Dubin offers strategies that help him during anxious times.

Although Dubin wrote the book for individuals with

Asperger's, anyone experiencing anxiety and stress could benefit from the strategies.

"I just become more mindful of my thoughts and how sometimes my thoughts mislead me," said Dubin of West Bloomfield. "That's where cognitive behavioral therapy comes in, aligning one's thoughts with the reality of the situation, stepping back, observing the situation and being mindful of how one is processing the situation, reprogramming outdated beliefs. A lot are formed in childhood and we don't question those beliefs. They become ingrained. If it doesn't make sense for the current time we need to drop that belief."

Living with Asperger's is an ongoing struggle. In the book Dubin relays some of the issues he and others deal with by providing examples. A doctoral student at the Michigan School of Professional Psychology, Dubin remembers the disastrous student teaching experience

that led him to suspect he has Asperger's. Individuals with the syndrome usually have normal or above normal IQs, but lack the ability to interact socially. He was having problems relating to colleagues at University of Detroit Mercy where he earned a master's degree in learning disabilities.

Dubin wasn't diagnosed with Asperger's until age 27 in 2004. Early on, staff in the Birmingham schools recognized his poor fine motor skills and thought he had a disability in written expression when he simply had trouble using a pen.

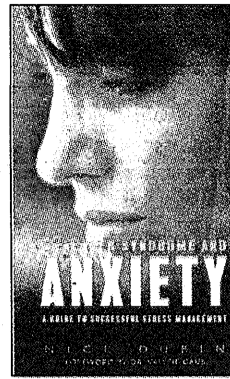
"It was the last phase at U of D," said Dubin, a graduate of Seaholm High School. "I broke the school's laminating machine, had difficulty relating to other faculty members. I thought back on my life and there seemed to be something amiss. I researched what it could be and found Asperger. Growing up I had been diagnosed with ADD, learning disabilities. Even though Asperger's was discovered in the early 1940s, it took a long time for it to be recognized."

Asperger's continues to affect Dubin's life in numerous ways but today he's controlling the

syndrome instead of it controlling him.

"Persons can go on and become successful, but there are people who don't move out of their parents' house until 40," said Dubin. "It's thought Albert Einstein, Isaac Newton had it. Socializing is a little more difficult. For me it's more of an intellectual exercise. For others it comes intuitively. For other people it's like riding a bike. Often times people with Asperger want to make connections and lack social wherewithal and basic skills."

Anxiety is created when individuals struggle with impairments that hinder nonverbal behaviors such as making eye contact. Some end up on the wrong side of the law as a result of misreading social cues. Individuals with Asperger's desperately want social contact. That's where the Judson Center steps in to help (judsoncenter.org). For the last two years Dubin has been interning in the Autism Connections Program at the center which provides services to individuals and their families. Every other week he co-leads a support group for adults with Asperger's. Originally Dubin

was hired as a public speaker by the center to give presentations about Asperger's and bullying, the topic of his first book. He currently works with individuals at the center as a mentor and coach. Dubin regularly recommends visiting wrongplanet.net whenever the need arises for interaction outside of the group. Wrong Planet is a Web community designed for individuals and parents of those with autism, Asperger syndrome, ADHD, and pervasive developmental and other neurological disorders.

"The group is a way to meet people," said Dubin. "We go over an article and discuss it and play games."

The book is a way for individuals to take control of their anxiety. "The book is very helpful for individuals on the spectrum and for family and friends trying to understand them," said Stephanie Harlan, director of the Judson Center Autism Connections program in Royal Oak. "Nick hasn't met another individual with Asperger that doesn't have anxiety. He talks about how anxiety is worse in their heads than in reality and that it's about cognitive reframing, to be present in the moment, instead of ruminating."

"At the center we try to figure out what an individual's needs are and fit the services around those needs. A lot of needs revolve around some kind of social skills help, help to look for employment. A lot of adults with Asperger are highly qualified but underemployed because of social skills. Nick and the other therapists work on social

and interviewing skills, how to shake someone's hand and make eye contact, career assessment, how to build a job skill around what they really want to do in life, keeping in mind they have different anxieties. It can be overwhelming to make calls to employers so they're doing role plays, helping with resumes. The Judson Center also offers counseling with therapists who understand the issues of Asperger and autism so they're able to deal with anxieties and depression. It's common to have those issues going on with the diagnosis."

Dubin is currently working on a third book on depression. "The depression I've gone through is common with Asperger's," said Dubin. "It's what we have to deal with, the unpredictability through the day. The transitions we have to make are a big deal for us."

Harlan is currently advocating for insurance coverage for therapeutic services for individuals from child to adulthood on the Autism Spectrum. She was in Lansing this week to encourage lawmakers to pass House Bill No. 4476. She works with AIM, an organization of more than 1400 Michigan residents who are supporting the autism insurance legislation.

"There are over 13,000 children diagnosed with autism in Michigan," said Harlan whose own child has the developmental disorder. "We're asking for insurance to cover children and adults. It's a lifelong issue. We're renovating our center to meet the needs of individuals and their families. We're adding new services like occupational and physical therapy. We served over 969 individuals last year. We have more adults than ever seeking services."

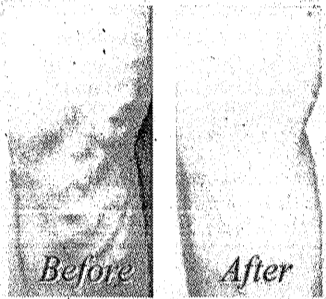

THE ROLL OF LABORATORY STUDIES IN ARTHRITIS

Doctors often hear a patient say: "I had a blood test that showed I had rheumatoid arthritis." The doctor knows differently. In arthritis, laboratory tests are difficult to interpret as the results may represent the body's response to irritants unrelated to arthritis.

The presence of "rheumatoid factor (RF)" in a blood test does not mean rheumatoid arthritis just as a "positive Anti Nuclear Antibody (ANA)" does not mean the person has Systemic Lupus Erythematosus. Physicians make the diagnosis of an arthritic condition by listening to the patient relate the details of the joint pain such as when the pain begins, where it spread what made the pain worse. The doctor then conducts an examination. Then, on the basis of the features of the history and the findings on examination, he makes a diagnosis. Blood tests help to confirm the doctor's assessment or indicate that he should rethink his initial impression.

In arthritis, the main role of laboratory testing is to assess the side effects of medications. Many of the drugs used to treat arthritis can potentially cause damage to the bone marrow, liver, or kidneys. These side effects can begin quietly with no evidence of their presence. The role of laboratory examinations is to uncover deleterious changes early and stop the offending medication before permanent damage occurs.

Used in this way, blood testing plays a role in the care of rheumatic conditions. In the future, blood analysis will indicate what drug is best for each patient's arthritis, but this tool-molecular microarray analysis-remains in development.

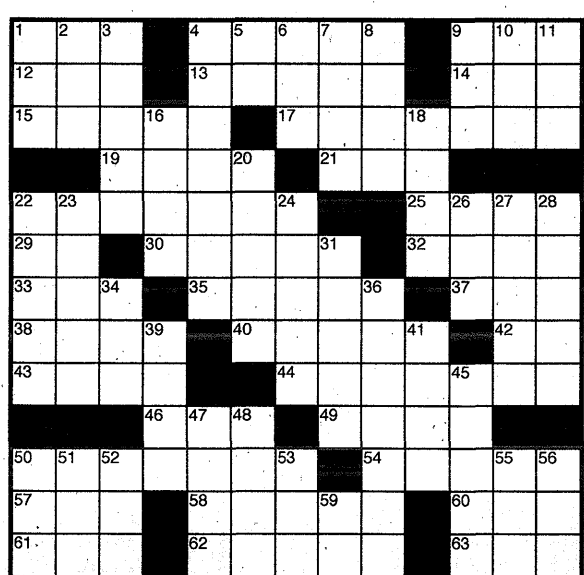

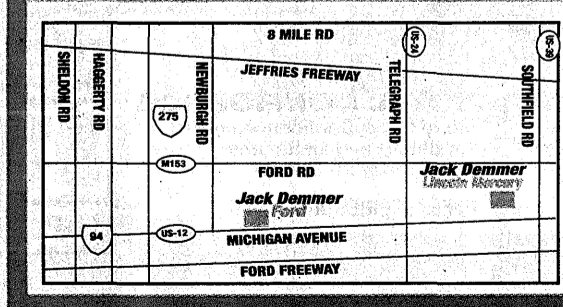

Pontiac G5 Is A Coupe Without Frills

The Pontiac G5 made its debut in the 2007 model year as a twin to the Chevrolet Cobalt, which has been around since 2005.

The G5 is still a clone of the Cobalt, meaning it shares just about everything with its corporate cousin, the good and the bad.

Only Pontiac's signature twin-port grille and other brand insignia differentiates the G5 from the Cobalt.

Offered only in coupe form, the G5 has its work cut out for it going against more popular economy sport coupes such as the Honda Civic, Scion tC and Ford Focus.

The G5 provides solid standard features for enhanced safety such as standard side-curtain airbags.

The five-passenger G5 comes in two trims: base and GT. The base G5 comes with air conditioning, power windows and door locks, remote keyless entry, carpeted floor mats and four cupholders, including two in front and two in back.

Available options on the base model include anti-lock brakes, leather-appointed seats, OnStar, a seven-speaker Pioneer sound system with 10-inch subwoofer, a six-disc in-dash CD changer, cruise control, traction control, remote start, sunroof, cargo net, fog lamps, a leather-wrapped steering wheel and shift knob, and 16-inch

custom spoke or aluminum wheels.

The GT model adds anti-lock brakes, 17-inch aluminum wheels, sport rocker moldings, heated seats, fog lamps, cruise control, leather-wrapped steering wheel with audio controls, leather-wrapped shift knob and a cargo net.

The GT naturally gets stiffer suspension tuning than the base car, giving it a sportier ride and better handling.

Added options for the GT include heated leather seats, a moonroof and a 228-watt, seven-speaker stereo.

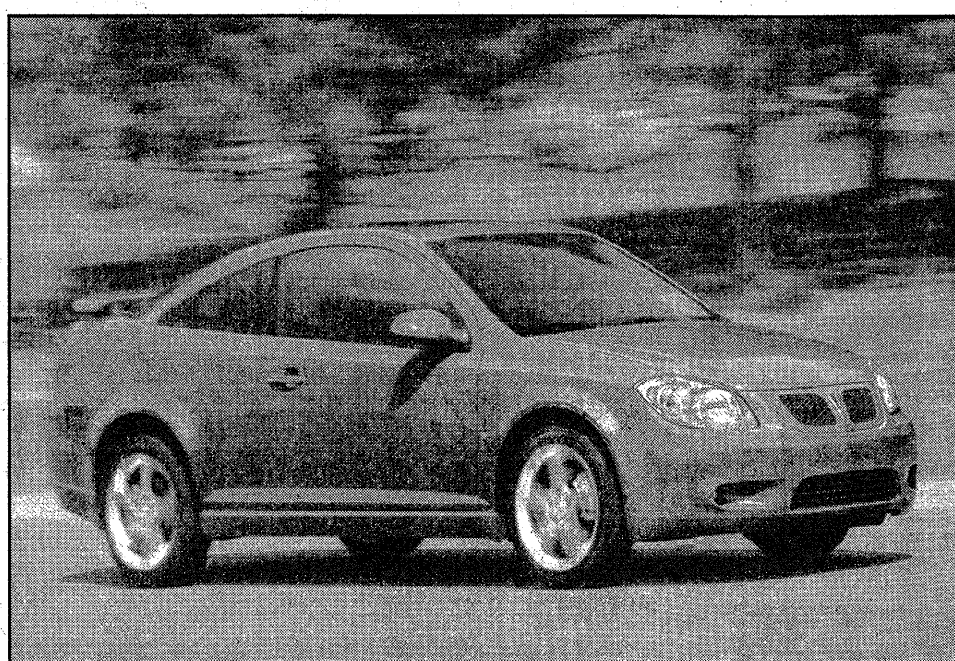
Both models are available in nine exterior colors, including Midnight Blue Metallic, Nitrous Blue Metallic and Dark Slate Metallic.

XM Satellite Radio is standard on both base and GT models.

The cars sell for under \$19,000, for the most part, and as low as around \$15K for your bare-bones versions.

The G5's standard 4-cylinder engine is good for 148 horsepower. GT models get a bigger 4-cylinder boosting output to 171 horsepower. A five-speed manual transmission is standard on both models, and a four-speed automatic is optional.

With the manual transmission the GT gets 22 miles per gallon in the city and 32 on the highway.



The Pontiac G5 is the spitting image of the Chevy Cobalt.

The GT's interior features metallic accents on the gear shifter, steering wheel and doors to liven up the cabin. Both trims feature a trip computer that provides information such as outside temperature, fuel range, coolant temperature and various warning messages.

For added ease to enter and exit the backseat, the G5 features a quick-release lever on the front passenger seat, allowing the seat to tilt and slide forward. This is a nice touch, but Pontiac doesn't offer the feature on the driver's side as well. With a trunk rating of 13.9 cubic feet, the G5 is competitive in this segment. And for carrying more cargo, the rear seat can be folded down.

Safety is provided by anti-lock brakes on the GT. Disc/drum brakes with optional ABS come with the base G5. Side-impact airbags are standard for all G5s. GT models come with the StabiliTrak electronic stability system.

StabiliTrak helps drivers maintain control during sudden maneuvers or in low-traction conditions by using a series of sensors to measure acceleration, deceleration and steering angle.

The system automatically controls the vehicle to help maintain the driver's intended path when a measurable deviation from the intended course is detected.
